





WASHINGTON, D. C. - MANY PROPOSALS NOW BEFORE THE CONGRESS would have been almost unthinkable a few brief years ago. Doubtless some of the ideas and the philosophy behind them have been in the minds of many who are now the chief sponsors, but until recently they had little hope of seeing such and Mrs. Gene Grimshaw will be enacted into law.

ANOTHER LEGISLATIVE LANDMARK WAS ESTABLISH-ED last week with the passage of a Federal Aid to Education Bill. This measure has a little something for many areas, and is was so designed to get support for it. The fact that a Federal official, namely the Commissioner of Education, is given broad and almost! dictatorial power over the administration of the measure does not seem to be any great objection. Federal controls are spelled out in the measure, and yet it is said by the proponents that control is not to be exercised over local

ANOTHER MEASURE SOON UP OR DEBATE is Medical Care for the Elderly. Many people have been led to believe that a clear choice is possible between so-called Medicare and Eldercare. As a matter of fact, neither of these approaches is directly identifiable in the measure just agreed upon by the Ways and Means Committee. The Bill which will be brought up for decision will be presented under what is commonly known as a "closed Rule," which means it is a "take it or leave it" proposition, not subject to amendment.

THE BILL WILL BE A COM-BINATION of Medicare, Eldercare, additions to the Kerr-Mills Act, and a number of other provisions not yet well publicized. It will be more than 200 printed pages in length and virtually every word will be meaningful.






