Another \$550,000 in federal funds is expected to match the producer-state contributions and keep the program running until July 1. At that time, it is expected that the work will become entirely federally-supported.

"The program already has saved our stockmen untold millions of dollars in screwworm damage,' Hankins declared. "This is a relatively small sum we are being asked to provide, in view of the vast amounts the program has already saved us."





> THE WRITINGS OF BAS-TIAT HAD DEEP SIGNIFI-CANCE in that troubled period of France. At that point in history socialist and communist reforms were sweeping the Country. The political and social upheavals were not always defined in these terms, any more than they are in our own America today, but conditions are similar.

tained, if through exercise of man's facilities to natural resources (liberty) he is able to convert those resources to useable products (property). A man would perish if his access to life, liberty and property were denied him. All three are necessary requirements of life and the preservation of any one is completely dependent upon the other two.

THEREFORE, IF MAN IS TO LIVE, he must protect his three basic rights, even with force against the elements or the depre-

SINCE AN INDIVIDUAL MAY USE FORCE TO PRO-TECT his life, liberty and property, he may choose with other individuals to form a common force (Law) to protect the three rights of all participants constantly. But the authority of that common force can be no greater than the individual authority for which it acts as a substitute. This is to say no individual is empowered to invade the rights of others and hence, the Law contrived by several banding together under agreement can not do so either.

PROTECTION OF INDIVID-UAL RIGHTS, defined as Justice, is achieved when the Law sticks to its outhorized role. Stated another way, the sole purpose of the Law is to prevent injustice - to prevent the invasion of individual rights to life, liberty and property.

AS AN EXAMPLE, BASTIAT DEFINED TWO KINDS OF PLUNDER — illegal plunder as those crimes defined in penal codes such as theft, arson, murder and so forth, for which the Law was formed to punish. He said there is also legal plunder which the Law may even promote. How is legal plunder to be identified? Well, Bastiat answers this question quite simply. "See if the Law takes from some persons what belongs to them and gives it to other persons to whom it does not belong. See if the Law benefits one citizen at the expense of another by doing what the citizen himself can not do without committing a crime." The writer again says quite simply that if this is the case, then abolish the Law without delay.
