Mrs. H. H. Pullig, Pioneer Natural Gas Co. Employee, To Retire On May First

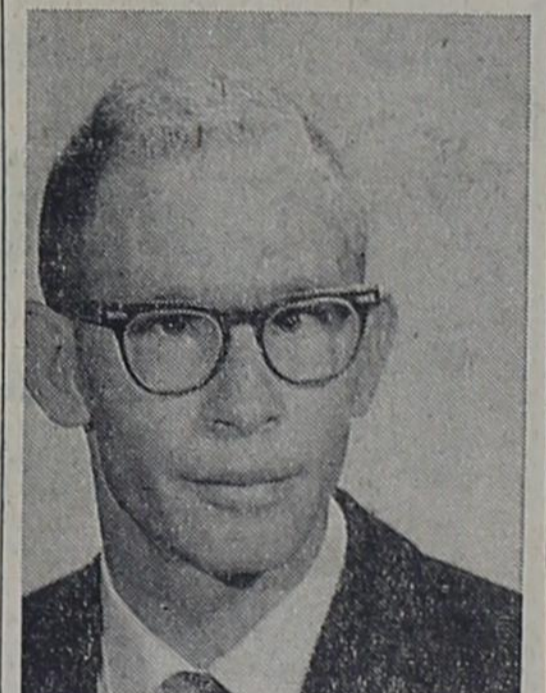

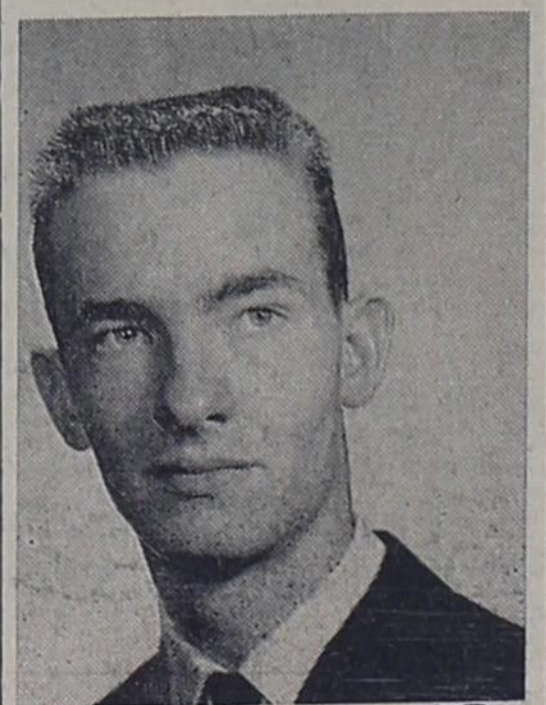
Mrs. Hulon H. Pullig will retire from the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. on May First, following some twenty-eight years service with the company and its fore-runners.

Too, they had been singing all day and were probably getting just a wee bit weary. Singers from far and near enjoy these singings in Gorman once each month, on the Fourth Sunday.

Rev. Marion F. Dennis followed in the footsteps of his maternal grandfather, the late Rev. Hutch S. Anglin, when he organized the local Congregational Methodist Church with nine charter members in 1856.

The Rev. Mr. Anglin, an early area pioneer, organized the Gorman Methodist Church in 1891, in the Masonic Hall Building. There were thirteen members. Mr. Anglin had preached at several stations since being ordained by Bishop Hendricks in 1876.

By 1905 the movement to farm land in Eastland and Comanche

counties brought the membership to 161, and a red brick church was built. This building was replaced in 1958 with the present educational building and sanctuary, now known as the First Methodist Church, with a membership of 285.

Before the organizational meeting, the potential membership had raised \$1,000, borrowed \$1,000 and purchased the site and building of the Church of God from trustees of the disbanded congregation. The improvements on the building during the past seven years amounts to an equal amount

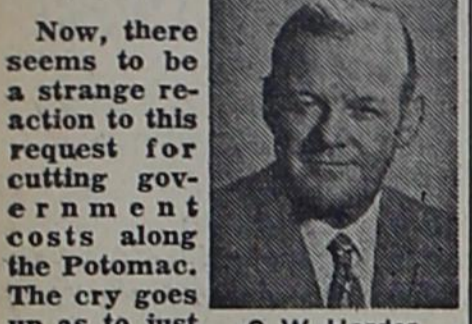
with all labor being contributed by members. It is debt free, and the present membership is twenty six.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

While the nation's independent business and professional people, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business favor a reduction in taxes now, almost 85% of the businessmen also say government costs should be cut to offset to a tax slash.

For quite some time, the nation's independent businessmen have voted protesting foreign aid.

Why is this not done? Nobody seems to know.

The entire foreign give away scheme was sold as a means of helping some war torn nations get on their feet.

For example, somehow the Swedes got up to the trough. As everyone knows, Sweden is the most prosperous country in Europe and with an average factory wage rate of \$1 per hour, maintains the highest wage scale in Europe.

Thus, not only has a shell or bomb never dropped on the Swedes, but during the hostilities they have been able to do some quite profitable business in military hardware.

Thus, the Swedes need help about as much as Paul Getty needs to receive social security checks. Yet, they have been able to tap the American taxpayers for \$111 million.

And there are other paradoxes. On one hand, the American taxpayer has been tapped to give Israel some \$870 million, of which 40% is an outright gift, and also \$628 million has gone to the United Arab Republic, of which 40% is also an outright gift.

This is somewhat similar to the situation that would result if a City Council voted about equal amounts of money to the local cops and robbers to buy ammunition with which to shoot at each other, and then have the Mayor say we want peace around town.

In addition, there has come into being another new wrinkle. Every time a black tribe in Africa decides to set up a nation under the guise of anti colonialism, they apparently immediately qualify for U.S. foreign give away gifts.

At the present time, the American taxpayer has been tapped for \$4 1/4 billion to spread around some 36 African nations. These billions have been given, not loaned, to the Togos, the Ugandas, the Mali, the Ghana, and all the rest, because no matter how primitive these tribesmen are, there is always a chief smart enough to know the value of the U.S. dollar.

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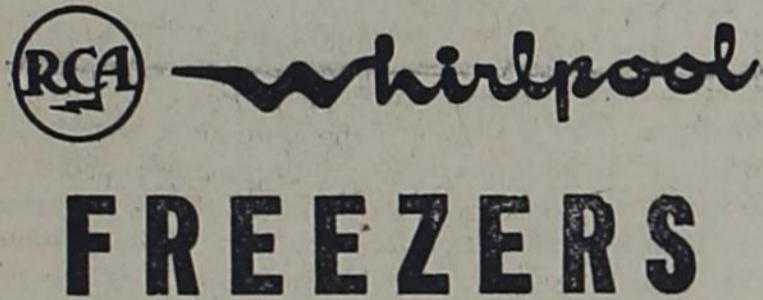


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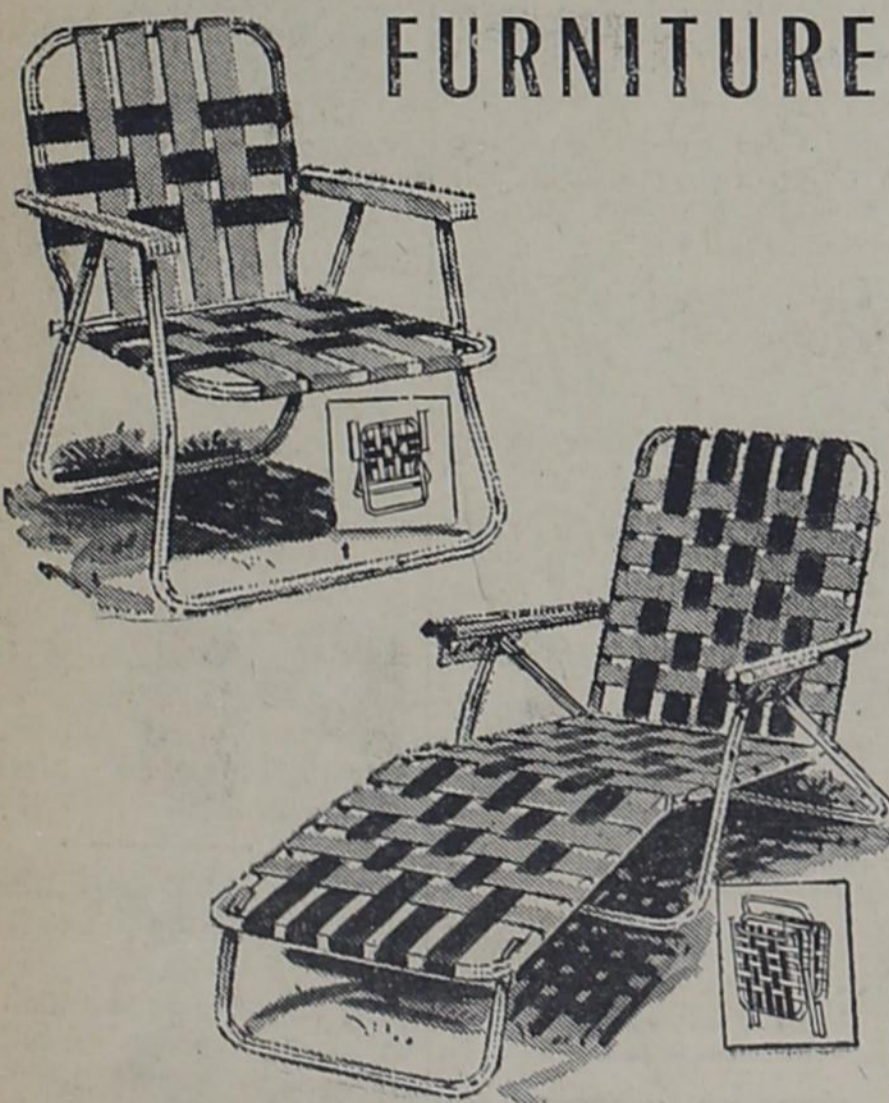


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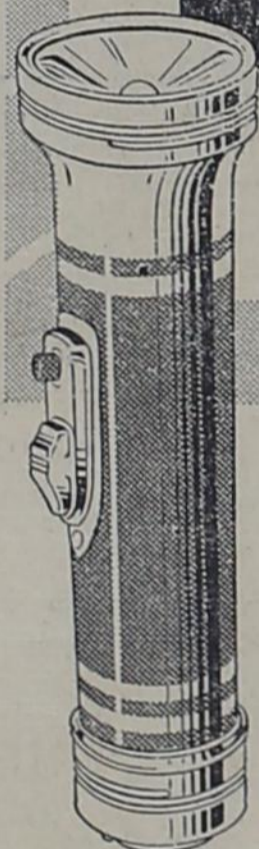

Cheese is an excellent meat alternate.

There are many different products at the dairy display case, but they generally fall into three classes. To refresh your memory, here they are:

The natural cheeses. These are sold just as they are produced, with no additional processing. You will find them labeled "natural cheddar" or "natural swiss" or other term names. Natural cheeses are apt to be different each time you buy them. The sharpness may be more or less evident. If you plan to buy a large amount of natural cheese at one time, it's a good idea to sample the product to make sure you are getting just what you want.

Process cheeses, the second category, are cheeses made by combining one or more natural cheeses. The natural cheeses are heated, pasteurized and blended together. The same brand of process cheese will taste the same way every time you buy it. Process cheese also melts easier and blends with other foods easier than does natural cheese.

The third group is the process

cheese foods or spreads. They resemble the process cheeses, but have more moisture and may also have dry milk solids and seasonings added. As a rule, they are much softer than process and natural cheeses.

Need some help in understanding or interpreting guarantees? Consumers may want to do some research and find answers to these questions about guarantees.

Who is to make good — the retailer or manufacturer?

Must the product be returned to the store, or is it to be repaired at home?

Does the guarantee cover only parts that rarely wear out or the entire product?

Does it cover service for routine maintenance?

Is the guarantee based on "suggested" retail price or on the price paid?

Is the guarantee in writing? Who pays the labor charge?

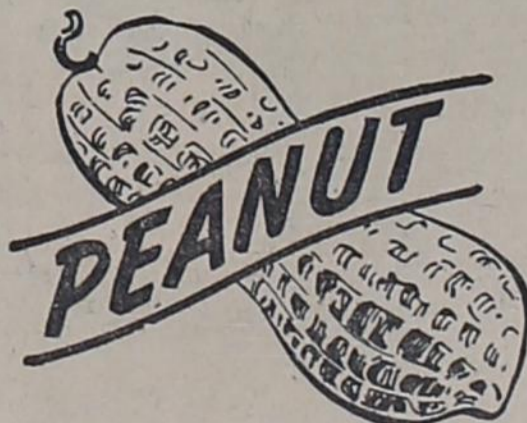

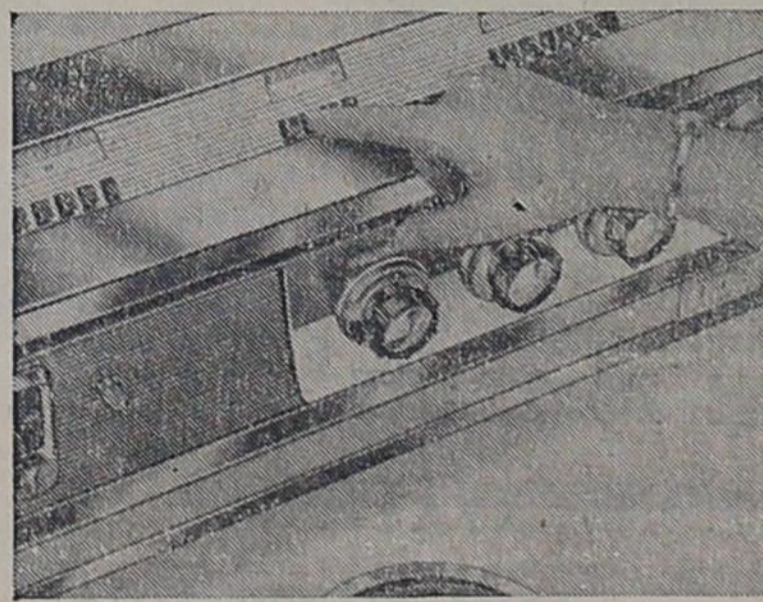

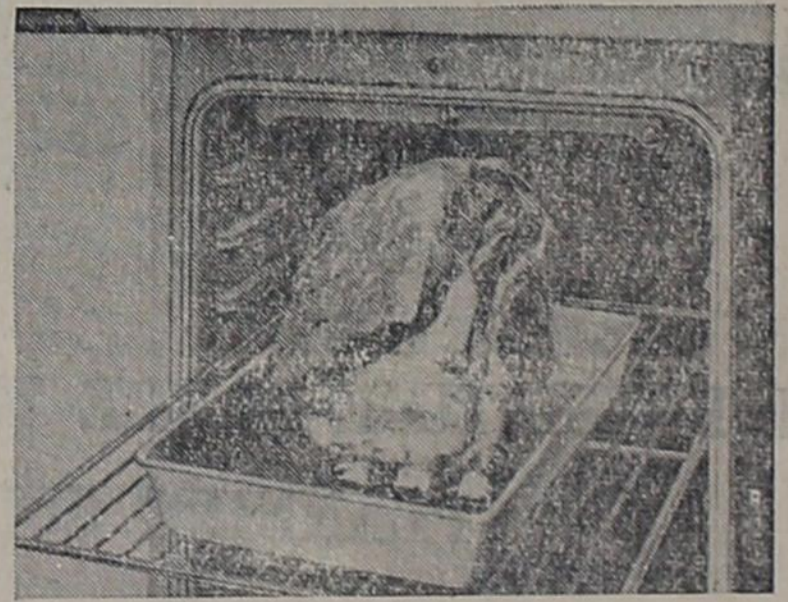

Boom Town Roars Into Being For Six Flags Opening

Premiering at the opening of Six Flags Over Texas, which opened its 1963 season April 20, is a six-acre site known as "Boom Town." A new portion of the USA Section has been added to house this new attraction which is part of the \$1,000,000 1963 expansion program.

Here, the excitement and activity typical of the towns that grew like prairie grass around the Corsicana and Beaumont areas during the great oil discoveries of the late 1890's and early 1900's is recreated.

Boom Towns were likened to the Klondike, "California or Bust" the Oklahoma Land Rush and the Florida Boom, all rolled into one small town. In those days everyone ate, dreamed, and breathed oil.

At the corner of "Boom Town" stands a wooden cable tool rig with all its machinery in full working order. Dominating the entire area is the "Sky Hook." Towering 190 feet in the air, this ride, which looks like a giant crane with two arms extended, carries aloft 28 people at one time in two steel baskets suspended from steel cables.

This new ride was an outstanding attraction at the 1958 Brussels World's Fair and is the only one of its kind in the world.

A major contribution towards the success that Six Flags enjoys stems from the hundreds of college and high school students that make up the staff at the huge historical amusement park.

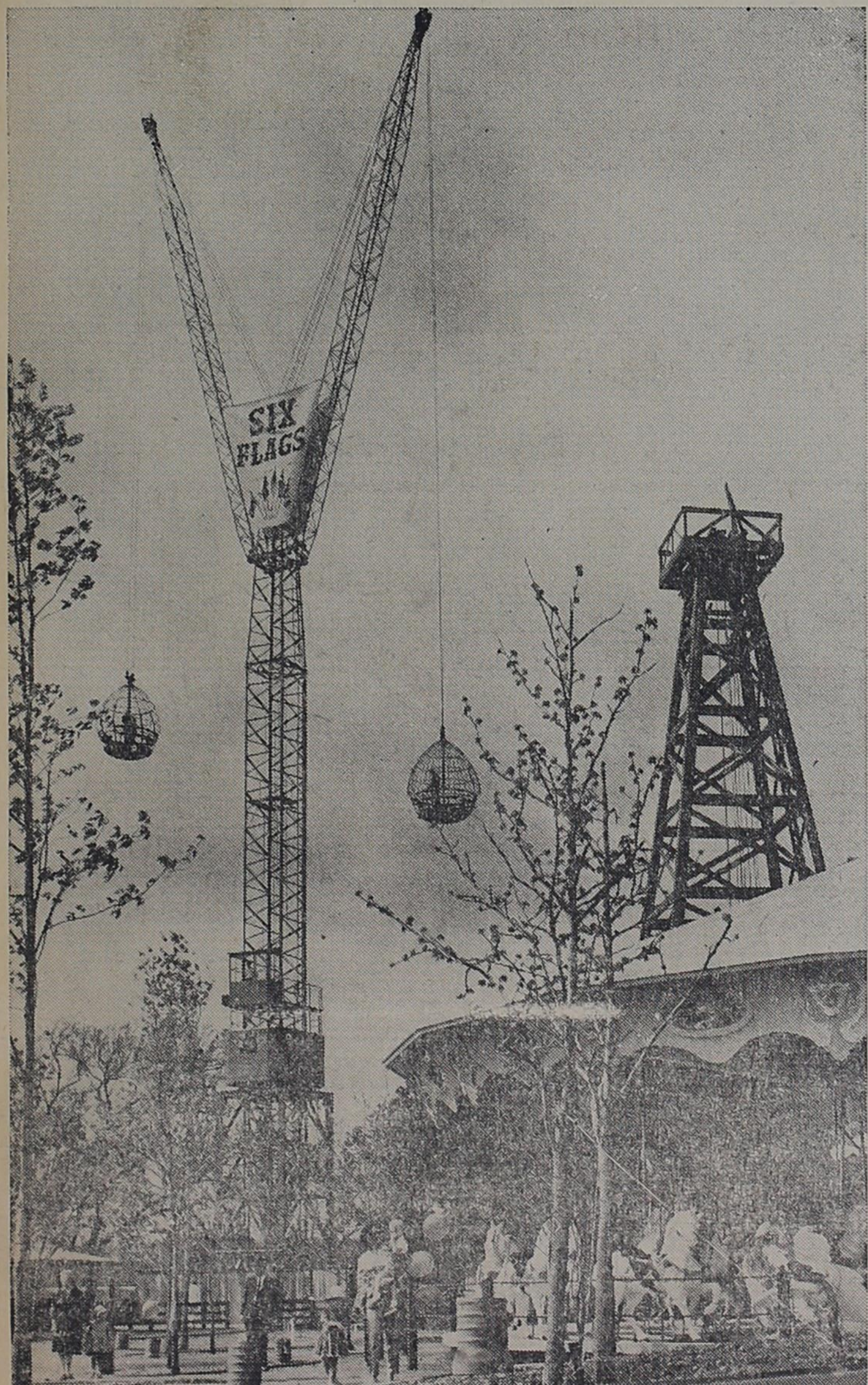
