The Gorman City Commission has scheduled a Town Hall Meeting for 8 p. m. Monday, June 28 in the High School Auditorium. The meeting is open to all Gorman residents. The city's program for the coming year will be explained and a discussion period will follow in which questions, suggestions and comments of citizens will be welcomed.

All persons who live in the city are urged to be present so that they may better understand the operation, program and problems of the City. The mayor and members of the City Commission feel that an informative meeting of this type will lead to better understanding between the Commission and the citizens of the city.

Some of the items to be discussed include modification of the city sewage disposal system, the railroad situation, budget for 1955-66, improvement of water system, street improvement and other city activities in which those present express interest. Although the agenda may not seem to be drama-packed, it is believed that most persons will be interested in learning more about how their city tax dollar is used in carrying on the business of the city. At least, it is the desire of the Commission to provide this opportunty to the people of Gorman.
