Special Election To Vote On Amendment Set For September 7

The first of two special elections in which the electorate will vote on proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas, will be held in Gorman Tuesday, September 7. The elections are of a state-wide pattern of voter action on ten amendments submitted by the Texas Legislature for action this year.

Voters will vote September 7 on the amendment Senate Joint Resolution No. 44, which proposes to increase the number of State Senators from 31 to 39.

This proposed amendment affects Senate 2 and 25, Article III of the Constitution and actually has two major purposes (1) to remove from the Constitution the restriction that "no single county shall be entitled to more than one Senator . . ." and (2) to increase the size of the Texas Senate from 31 to 39 members. A third change included in the amendment makes population the basis for division of the state into senatorial districts rather than "number of qualified electors -", as presently provided.

Judge Scott Bailey announced that election judge for Gorman Precinct Four, will be Mr. W. G. Baker and clerks will be Mmes. Dorothy Hatcher and Viola Eaker, Mr. Odie Brightwell and Mr. E. G. Henderson.

The election will be held in the Fire Hall and polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

The ten amendments to be voted on November 2, 1965 are:

1. Amendment to Sec. 17, Article VII, increasing state ad valorem tax by five cents on \$100 valuation to be used for building construction for state institutions of higher learning.

2. Amendment to Sec. 49-b of Article III to increase the Veterans Land Fund by \$200 million, and extending the program for eight years.

3. Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care for the needy aged; expanding age categories of those eligible for blind assistance and needy children, needy individuals permanently and totally disabled.

4. Amendment providing for four year terms for the Governor and other state elective offices.

5. Amendment raising the Teachers retirement funds and system administration.

6. Amendment authorizing Legislature to provide loans to students at institutions of higher education within the state.

7. Amendment exempting certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes under certain conditions.

8. Providing for automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judge for old age and creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission, providing for removal of District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and for retirement of Judges in case of disability.

9. Amendment allowing an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature for Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House, increasing per diem pay for members of the Legislature from \$12 for 120 days to \$20 for 140 days during regular sessions and 30 days each special session.

10. Amendment providing four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives.

Wednesday, July 28
Now that I finally have some free time, I shall attempt to bring you up to date on the details. And that's going to be hard to do, 'cause Indianapolis, NY, Stockholm, Helsinki, Leningrad and Kiev are all one big blur to me. It all happened so quickly.

I'm feeling very trim and fit now - I didn't get sick crossing the Atlantic til just an hour before we landed in Stockholm. Then I lost everything, but of course, felt immensely better afterwards. I was assigned to the 2nd plane from S. to H. so we had a 12-hour layover in Sweden, and got the grand tour. Unfortunately, it was Sunday, so everything was closed. We had lunch at a nice restaurant overlooking the harbor, then took a sight-seeing bus to see the Palace, the Royal Gardens, Parliament and downtown. Nordic (Scandinavian) civilization is much closer to American I think than Continental European. Stockholm is a beautiful, spotlessly clean city and strikingly modern and progressive. Stores and buildings are nearly identical with ours. One eyesore is their youth - the number of beathniks is unbelievable.

Well, let's change the scene to Helsinki. To tell the truth, nobody saw anything there but the hotel and the RR station. We were so exhausted nobody cared about anything. We didn't mind not having time to look around or get souvenirs there because we'll be back after our stay in Russia. Finland is a "deprived" country, but the hotel was all right. It is arranged in suites of 5 rooms - in each 5-room suite there's a bathroom and a shower. We took a Russian train from Helsinki. Our car was very nice - we found out from some Norwegian students who came back to visit us (ours was the very last car of the 20-car train) that the others didn't have "quite as nice facilities." At the border there were a simple wire fence (which looked rather lonely and forlorn - there are no fences in Finland), watchtowers, and soldiers. We were delayed an hour while they checked under all the cars with flashlights (it was broad daylight) and took our

passports. They counted all our money and we filled out meticulous customs declarations. Then 2 customs men and a soldier boarded every car and started checking the baggage of about every 4th person. They went thru mine. They got off at the next stop an hour later. Surprise - Intourist had supper for us at the RR restaurant, complete with a US flag on every table! And everywhere since then, there's always been a flag. There was no diner on the train, and we were all prepared to stick it out till Leningrad, where we were due at 11:30. We arrived at 11:23 and immediately fell into bed at the Moskovakaya Hotel, an all-Intourist, foreigners-only place. We got

to see very little of Leningrad. It's a cold, grim city. We had lunch at the airport - it was very nice - our first borshch. It's a 5-hour flight from there to Tbilisi with a 20-minute layover in Kiev. We just had time to see the airport terminal at Kiev - it is beautiful - only two years old, and up-to-date in every way. (Enclosed is my baggage check to Tbilisi and a candy wrapper.) On all Russian planes, the stewardess hands out candy just before take-off and landing. You're supposed to suck on it and swallow often and that's supposed to help equalize your ear pressure. The Russian steppes and their villages and fields are a sight to behold from the air.

Now we come to Tbilisi. I can't get over how much this city reminds me of Mexico. I confessed to the girl who was sitting next to me on the bus on the way from the airport (she has been to Mexico, too) and she admitted she was thinking the same thing, but didn't say so for fear of sounding utterly ridiculous. We finally decided the common denominator is the Arabic influences. Streets are narrow, arched windows and doorways, balconies, and iron railings everywhere. The people are dark and insist on growing scraggly little moustaches. There is a lot of traffic, hundreds of busses, palm trees and palmettos, flowers on every traffic island, hot weather, fruit vendors on the corner. But the standard of living is immensely higher. Everyone is neatly dressed and in shoes, and there are rows and rows of identical apartment buildings. Last night just before supper, I met a Georgian who know Spanish. My curiosity as to how a Georgian (who as a rule have enough trouble with Russian) knew Spanish all but exploded. It turned out he was in Cuba 2 years as an agronomist. It seems Russians and Cubans don't mix so well, but Georgians and Cubans do fine. I can see why in a minute. We had a tremendously rapid conversation in Spanish with him. About 25 others gathered around, and about 15 or 20 of our group. They wanted me to translate into Russian the gist of the conversation, but I refused and tried to steer him to Russian - he wouldn't budge. I know none of the other Georgians knew a word of Spanish, so it would have been to their benefit

to switch to Russian. But he insisted on staying in Spanish. Odd. But we had a marvelous time.

We went sight-seeing this morning. We visited an absolutely fantastic church - it has been all rebuilt and is in fine condition, but the original dates back to the fifth century. The Georgians have been Christians almost as far back as history knows anything about them. Then we saw the University. Beautiful! Well cared-for walks, flowers, fountains. Then we went up to a look-out on top of the mountain here - there's a funicular and cable cars, but we went by bus. Breath-taking view of the whole city and the river running thru the middle of it. There are gardens up there, too, some of the most intricate and beautiful designs of plantings I ever hope to see. Bushes growing inside each other so that designs, such as circles, stripes, or the topping of supposedly one shrub appear in different dollages and colors. One such arrangement was trimmed as a huge jar, and from the slightest distance it looks like ceramics.

I lost my camera in Stockholm - left in on the sight-seeing bus. I very rarely do things like this, but I do have an excuse. Mick stayed up to pack the last night at Bloomington (he hadn't begun, you see) and I just got 4 hours of sleep that night. Then there was the trip to Indianapolis, the flight to NY, four boring hours of waiting there, a 7-hour trip across the Atlantic, and 12 hours of sight-seeing in Stockholm - I was going on 49 hours without a wink of sleep when I forgot it. So maybe there's some justification. Anyway, I plan to take full advantage of the polaroid which we all chipped in to buy, such as the enclosed photo. At my left is our eternal Intourist guide, Valery, opening a bottle of champagne. Which explains the silly expression on my face, waiting for the bang. I hasten to explain that we were not served the champagne - it was a gift from a gay bunch of French tourists at the next table. Valery will be with our group the whole time we're in the Soviet Union (note the wedding band on his right hand). Then there's another guide from Intourist for every city we visit. A peculiarity of Russian dining rooms is the eternally obvious re-

frigerator in plain sight. Maybe they're proud of it. See behind me? I feel fine, am doing fine, and am just generally doing and seeing everything I get a chance at. This is a fantastic country.

Thursday, July 29
Greetings from the Southern Ossetian Autonomous Region of the Russian Soviet Federated Socialist Republic! Whose capital is Ordzhonikidzi, no less, and that's where I am now. We left Tbilisi at 9 a. m. by bus, arrived here at 7 p. m. We stopped at 2 old churches and at a very pleasant garden-restaurant for lunch and twice again in the mountains for to take pictures of the mountains and to munch on the watermelons we brought along. Am enclosing a picture of one of the 16th. century churches at Ananuri Georgia. The mountains are just beautiful, some snow-covered. We followed a river valley up to the Caucasian Continental Divide and then another river valley all the way to Ordzhonikidzi. The road beats anything I've ever seen in my life or hope to see. "Hairpin" doesn't begin to describe what we did to get around them. It is fairly narrow, and there are sheer drops of 1,000 feet and more frequently, but it is safe at all points. I have a picture of one of the "sheer drops" but I'll wait till tomorrow to send it. It was quite cold up there in the mountains, especially after being in such summery weather in Tbilisi.

We saw an enormous church at Mtskheta - just enormous. Built in the 1500's. I don't know how they ever did it. Oh, and also included is a view of our hotel in Tbilisi. Speaking of hotels, this one in Ordzhonikidzi is the nicest we've been in yet. It's not a new building, but it looks like it, and it's well-kept-up. This room is huge, and - wonder of wonders - the rooms on our floor have private baths. The time is an hour earlier here than in Tbilisi. We'll be here all day tomorrow, leave for Dombai the next day. I seem to have settled down more or less to a routine now. I have begun to learn just how things are done over here. It's really very simple, and it's nice to know the language. I'm getting along fine, and things couldn't be peachier. Tell everyone hello for me.

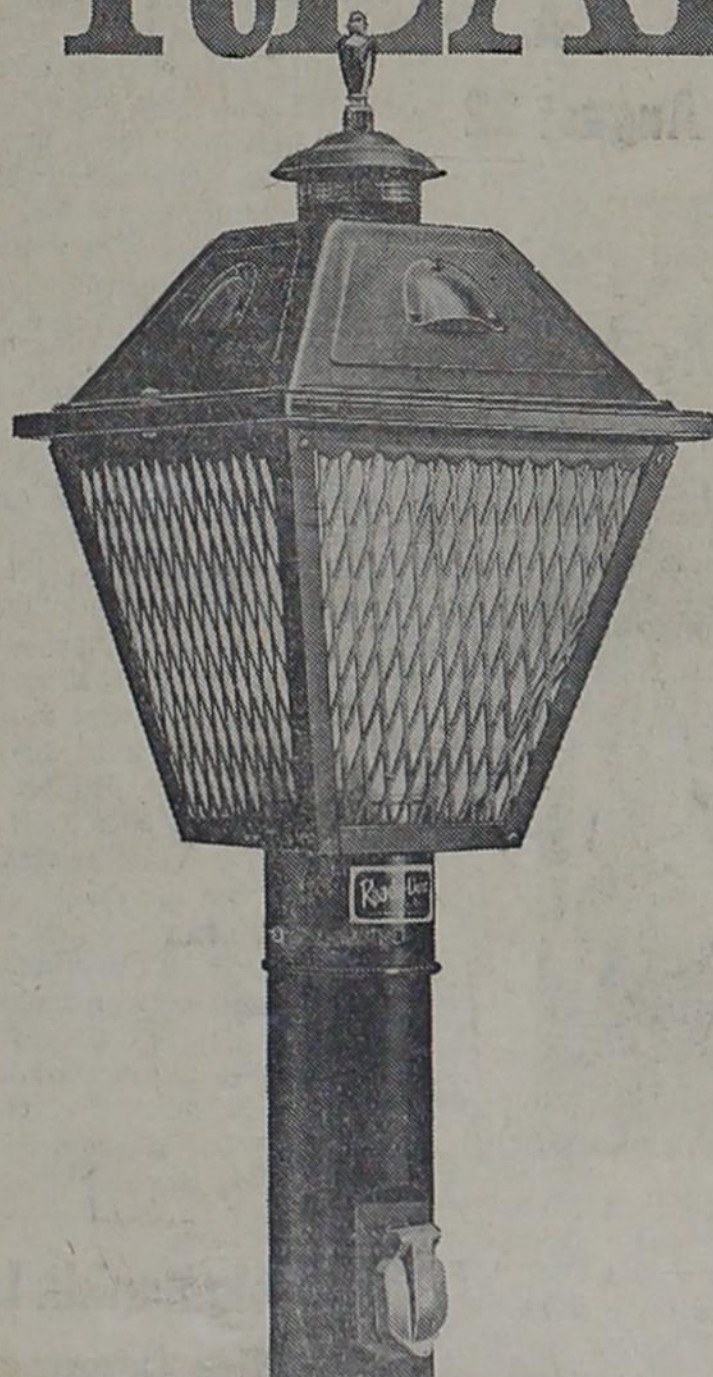
