WASHINGTON, D. C. - SINCE 1962. THREE TAX CUTS have been wrangled through Congress. Total tax reductions in three separate actions will amount to about \$20 billion.

THE CUT IN 1962 reduced corporate taxes by approximately \$1.3 billion through more liberal depreciation rates.

THE REALLY BIG ONE CAME IN 1964, when the reduction was \$14 billion.

THE RECENT EXCISE TAX CUTS ARE ESTIMATED TO SAVE CONSUMERS about \$5 billion by 1969, when all the benefits will be in effect. EACH OF THESE MEASURES

TOOK QUITE A BIT of doing, since logic suggests that when there are budget deficits, it is no time to cut taxes.

THE THEORY HAS BEEN
