The marker is located on Highway 16 south of the city limits on the Desdemona-De Leon Highway, near the home of Mrs. Docy Williams.

Fort Blair, the largest far western "family fort", was used thruout the Civil War. It was during the years 1857-1862 when the Indians, especially the Comanches, were active along the frontier that Charles Culpepper Blair, an early Eastland County settler, establishd the fort, which bears his name. Other families who lived in Fort Blair were the Ellisons, Kuykendalls, Gilberts, Manskers, the Blairs, Jaspers, and McGoughs.

The Fort had twelve log cabins, fourteen square feet, and fourteen feet apart in two parallel rows. Saturday, August 14, 1965 The space between the cabins were walled up by pickets. Ammunition | Congregation Singing and supplies could be brought only by making long, dangerous trips to the Brazos settlements to the south. It was difficult to spare men from the fort for the trips, because they, of course, also served as the fort's defenders against Indians.

C. C. Blair, founder of Fort Blair, was born in Ireland and came to the U.S. when he was 20 years old and settled in Georgia. He later moved to Tennessee, and then to Eastland County in 1855. Sarah Jane was married to Berry Moore Keith, son of Gaberiel and Jane Keith. They were the first couple to be married in Eastland County. The wedding took place at four o'clock on a July afternoon in 1883 in the yard at Fort Blair. Performing the ceremony was Rev. Coker of Comanche. The marriage license was purchased in Comanche as the courthouse in Eastland County had not been built.

B. M. Keith took his bride to the wilderness, near what is now Desdemona, and pre-empted 160 acres of land and built a log cabin. Here he lived the rest of his life as he increased his original land holdings. He was a charter member of the Texas Rangers and the Texas Cattleman's Association. Keith also served in the Confederate Army.

He and his wife had 16 children, including two sets of twin boys. Two of the children survive, Mrs. Middie Eoff of Abilene and Alf Keith of Norman, Oklahoma.

A great-granddaughter, Mrs. Pug Guthery (nee Vonnie Rue Keith) lives in Desdemona, and two grandsons are Mack Keith of Monahans and Bernard Keith of Odessa.

The Association, whose membership exceels 10,000 growers, completed its 28th. year of operation on June 30, 1965. The Association's activities are administered by a board of 7 directors, 4 in Texas and 3 in Oklahoma. The scope of operation also includes the peanut production areas of New Mexico, Arizona and California. The principal function of the organization is carrying out the peanut price support program in the Southwest for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Wilson points out that in addition to this function, the Association has been given other responsibilities in recent years. These include the handling of government owned shelled stocks in cold storage, supervision and record keeping relative to the diversion of surplus stocks and functions related to the peanut quality control program under the recently established Peanut Marketing Agreement. The Association has also been active through the years in research and promotional activities on a state and regional basis. A complete report will be given at the Stephenville meeting on all phases of the 1964-65 operation.

Another highlight of this year's meeting will be a report by Dr. George P. Donaldson, Executive Secretary of the Georgia Agricultural Commodity Commission for Peanuts. Extensive promotional activities are being conducted and financed by peanut growers in Georgia and Alabama, and these will be described by Donaldson. Also, the growers will hear reports on the latest research findings on soil fertility, weed control, leaf spot, nematode control and harvesting and curing practices. These subjects will be discussed by staff members of Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State Univer-

Other activities on the agenda include the awarding of certificates for outstanding production accomplishments, the awarding of door prizes and lunch, compliments of the Association.





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

Sweaters are important parts of fall and winter wardrobes. They can be high fashion items as well as practical.

Selection of a sweater usually depends on several considerations: Individual preference, activity of the person, clothing budget, and the method of care the garment will require.

Sweaters are cut and sewn as in regular fabrics, or are shaped by full fashioning where the designs are knitted to a particular shape. The full fashion sweaters are more expensive.

Many of today's sweaters have decorative trim.
