If you are 65 or older and now receive Social Security, railroad retirement of Federal civil service retirement benefits, you will be notified by mail within the next 6 months of the new Medicare program. You do NOT have to go to your Social Security District Office. You qualify automatically for the BASIC PLAN benefits described below, but you must fill in and promptly return the sign-up card (which you will receive from the Social Security Administration) if you want the SUPPLEMENTARY PLAN coverage, also described below.

However, if you are 65 or past (even though you are still working) you should: 1. Go to your nearest Social Security District Office right away if you have work

ed under Social Security but never applied for benefits. 2. Go to your District Office after September 1, 1965 to apply for Medicare benefits if you never worked under Social Security and receive no payments.

**BASIC PLAN:**  
Effective July 1, 1966, except nursing home care - effective on January 1, 1967.

**HOSPITAL CARE:** The Basic Plan provides 60 days of hospitalization during a spell of illness. You pay the first \$40.00 of the hospital charges. For an additional 30 days in the hospital you pay at the rate of \$10.00 per day. After you have been out of the hospital for 60 days these benefits are renewable. Psychiatric care is provided on the same basis but is limited to a total of 190 days during the patient's lifetime.

**NURSING HOME CARE:** After discharge from the hospital - provided you were hospitalized at least 3 days - you may receive 100 days of care in a nursing home. Beginning with the 21st day you pay the Nursing Home \$5.00 per day.

**CARE IN OWN HOME:** After discharge from the hospital or nursing home - provided you stayed in either at least 3 days - you may receive up to 100 home visits by nurses, physical therapists or other health workers.

**OUT-PATIENT DIAGNOSTIC SERVICES** as provided in the outpatient department of the hospital. You pay the first \$20.00 of the charges incurred for these services within a 20-day period. Then the Plan pays 80 per cent of the remaining charges.

**SUPPLEMENTARY PLAN**  
Effective July 1, 1966. Participation in this plan is voluntary. It costs \$3.00 per month per person. Benefits under this plan are as follows:

**DOCTORS' SERVICES:** After you pay a doctor, or doctors, a total of \$50.00 in a year this Plan will cover 80 per cent of the remaining charges for services they provide. Certain services rendered by dental surgeons are included. This coverage also includes the charges of medical specialists for pathology, radiology, physiatry (physical medicine) or anesthesiology provided in the hospital for in-patients. (Note: these services are not covered under the Basic Plan.)

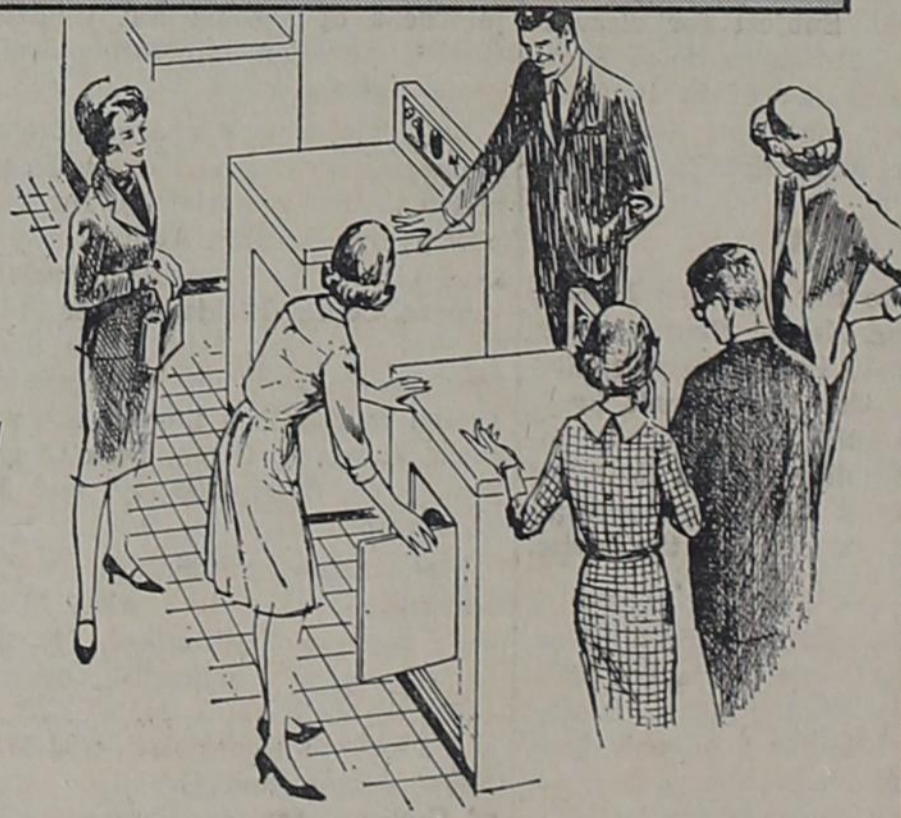

# Across the centuries

*the Sermon on the Mount comes to you  
more meaningful and important than ever*

SEENING the crowds, he went up on the mountain, and when he sat down his disciples came to him. And he opened his mouth and taught them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God.

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are you when men revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so men persecuted the prophets who were before you.

"You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trodden under foot by men.

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

"Think not that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets; I have come not to abolish them but to fulfill them. For truly, I say to you, till heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Whoever then relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches men so, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but he who does them and teaches them shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

"You have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not kill; and whoever kills shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that every one who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother shall be liable to the council, and whoever says, 'You fool!' shall be liable to the hell of fire. So if you are offering your gift at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Make friends quickly with your accuser, while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison: truly, I say to you, you will never get out till you have paid the last penny.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that every one who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, pluck it out and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your

members than that your whole body go into hell.

"It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that every one who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, makes her an adulteress; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

"Again you have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil.

"You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, Do not resist one who is evil. But if any one strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also; and if any one would sue you and take your coat, let him have your cloak as well; and if any one forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. Give to him who begs from you, and do not refuse him who would borrow from you.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love those who love you, what reward have you? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you salute only your brethren, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? You, therefore, must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect.

**B**EWARE of practicing your piety before men in order to be seen by them; for then you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven.

"Thus, when you give alms, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by men. Truly, I say to you they have their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And when you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, that they may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have their reward. But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And in praying do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard for their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. Pray then like this:

*'Our Father who art in heaven,  
Hallowed be thy name.*

*Thy kingdom come,  
Thy will be done,*

*On earth as it is in heaven.  
Give us this day our daily bread;*

*And forgive us our debts,  
As we also have forgiven our debtors;*

*And lead us not into temptation,  
But deliver us from evil.'*

For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father also will forgive you; but if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.

"And when you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by men but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal; for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

"The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is sound, your whole body will be full of light; but if your eye is not sound, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness!

"No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon.

"Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by being anxious can add one cubit to his span of life? And why be anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O men of little faith? Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek all these things; and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well.

"Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Let the day's own trouble be sufficient for the day.

**J**UDGE not, that you be not judged. For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye.

"Do not give dogs what is holy; and do not throw your pearls before swine, lest they trample them underfoot and turn to attack you.

"Ask, and it will be given you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For every one who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened. Or what man of you, if his son asks him for a loaf, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a serpent?

If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him? So whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them; for this is the law and the prophets.

"Enter by the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the way is easy, that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few.

"Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves. You will know them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thorns, or figs from thistles? So, every sound tree bears good fruit, but the bad tree bears evil fruit. A sound tree cannot bear evil fruit, nor can a bad tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Thus you will know them by their fruits.

"Not every one who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name? And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you evil-doers.'

"Every one then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house upon the rock; and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat upon that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock. And every one who hears these words of mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand; and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell; and great was the fall of it."

And when Jesus finished these sayings, the crowds were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as their scribes.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — MANY BEAUTIFUL WORDS WERE WRITTEN and spoken on the occasion of the death of Adlai Stevenson. Anyone who had had any else association with him can recall that he was a person with whom you could disagree but was never disagreeable. He was a man of strong opinions, but never opinionated.

KNOWING HIS FAMILY, IT IS UNDERSTANDABLE that found on his bedside table in his New York apartment after his death, was a marked page from "Desiderata," a collection of inspirational thoughts, originally found in Old St. Paul's

Church, in Baltimore, Maryland dated 1692.

THIS IS THE MARKED PAGE OPEN BESIDE his bed for night reading:

"GO PLACIDLY AMID THE NOISE AND THE HASTE and learn what peace there may be in silence . . . Speak your truth quietly and clearly; and listen to others, even the dull and ignorant; they too have their story . . . If you compare yourself with others you may become vain and bitter; for always there will be greater and lesser persons than yourself.

"ENJOY YOUR ACHIEVEMENTS as well as your plans. Keep interested in your career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs; for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what

Items having foam rubber backing or padding can be fire hazards. Potential threats are the padded knees of children's crawlers and the foam rubber backs of many skid-proof rugs.

It's best to air dry these items since the foam may build up heat in the dryer and catch on fire if left at a high temperature for a long period of time.

If these items are accidentally dried in the dryer, lay them aside to cool away from the rest of the laundry. Folding and stacking with other items will hold in the heat and it may continue to build up in the foam until there are

The type of fabric will determine the best way to remove a fruit stain.

If you are not sure whether or not the fabric can withstand boiling water, sponge immediately with cool water. Then apply a glycerine or soapless shampoo and rinse. Do not use soap, as this will set the stain.

If the stain remains after the shampoo treatment, use a chlorine or peroxygen bleach. Be sure to test the effect of bleaches on a sample of the fabric before using the bleach on the stain.

If the fabric will withstand boiling water, pour it through the fabric while the stain is still fresh. If the stain is allowed to dry or set, it will be much more difficult to remove.

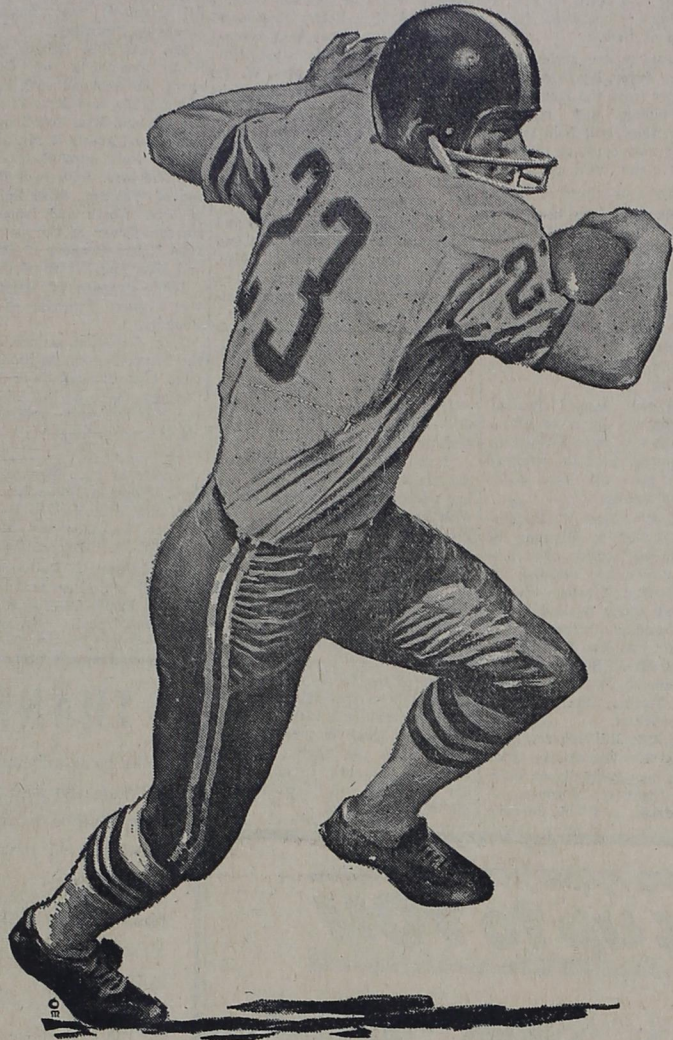

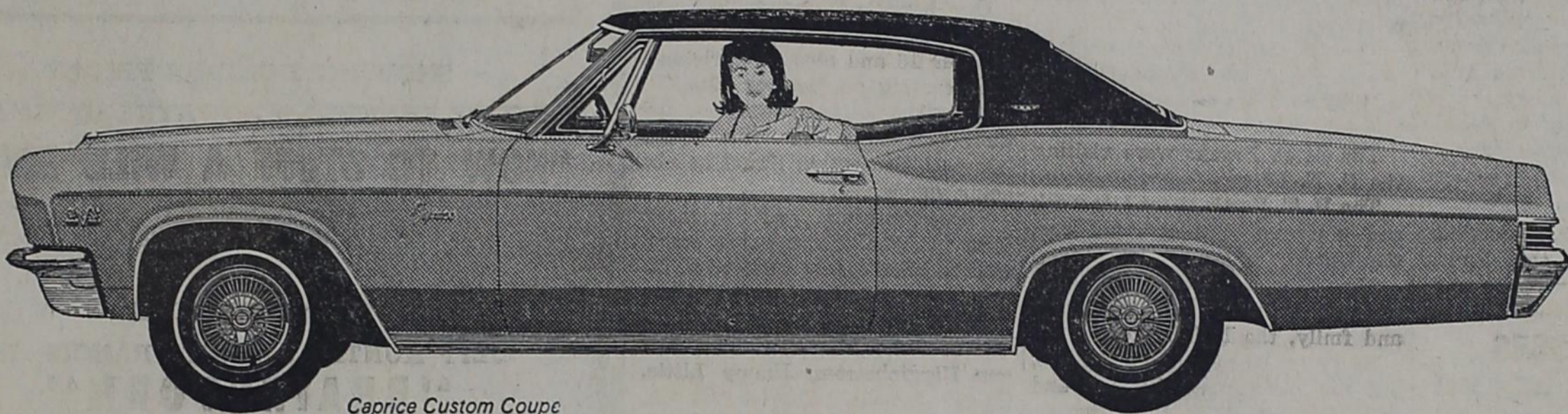

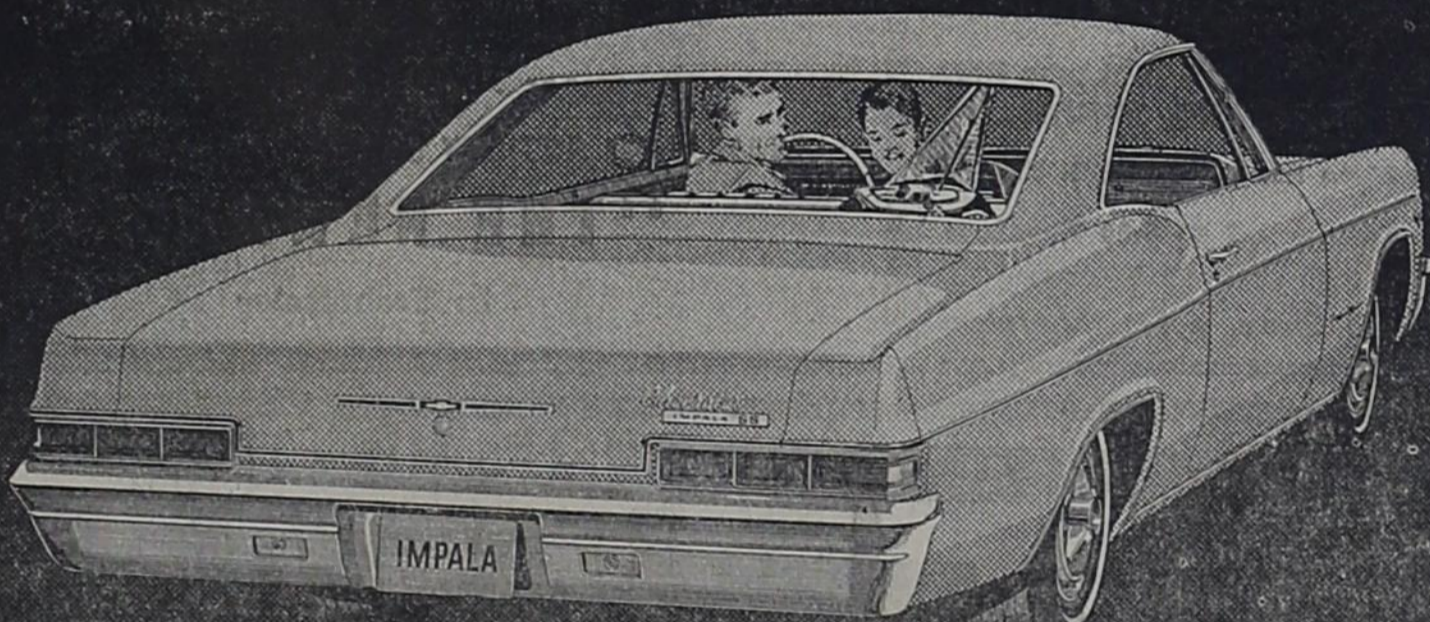

### Coastal Bermuda Tour Slated For October 13 In Desdemona Area

A total of 4450 acres were sprigged in the county in 1965 according to the records. Personnel of the agencies are of the opinion that several thousand acres properly established and managed would materially increase the over-all agricultural economy of the county from the sale more livestock.

Farmers, ranchers, business and professional people are cordially invited and urged to participate on the tour. The group will assemble and leave from the Methodist Church promptly at One O'clock on the above date.

The R. L. Lewis, the Ed Harrison and the Sam Powers farms are to be visited on the tour.
