## Gorman Woman Displays Bedspread 150 Years Old

Mrs. M. F. Allen, retired public school teacher, is the proud owner of an heirloom, 150 years old. On Monday when she was hostess to the Woman's Society of Christian Service, she showed a bedspread handed down five generations.

Cotton from which the spread is made was grown in the early 1800's by slaves on a Murray County, Georgia plantation owned by the great-great-grandparents of Mrs. Allen.

The great-great grandmother, Mrs. Arilla Jane Field, spun the thread and wove cloth from which she designed the full-sized spread. The embroidered pattern is "The Tree of Life." The border is a four inch fringe.

When guests inquired how it had retained its whiteness and its strength, Mrs. Allen said she was puzzled about that herself but said she was able to launder it in an automatic washer. It had never been bleached, that she knew of. And it has been in use.

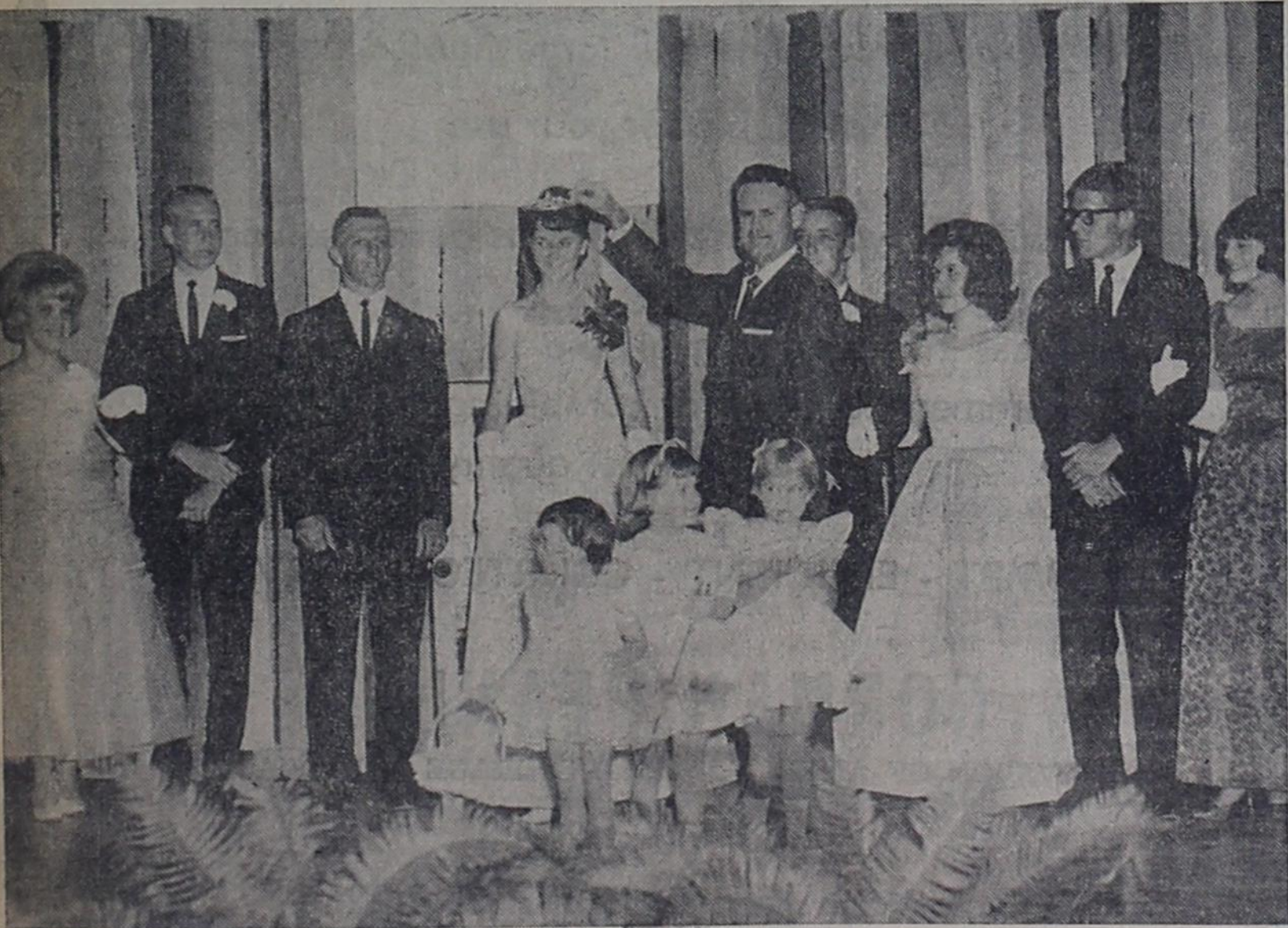

**AN ORDINANCE EMPOWERING THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, TO PLACE AND MAINTAIN TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES, WITH REQUIRED SPECIFICATIONS UPON PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS FOR THE PURPOSE OF REGULATING, WARNING OR GUIDING TRAFFIC, AND REGULATE THE STOPPING, STANDING AND PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES UPON PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, AS HE MAY DEEM NECESSARY, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY**

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Gorman, Texas:

**SECTION 1:** The Director of Public Works of the City of Gorman, Texas, may place and maintain, or provide for such placing or maintaining such traffic control devices, conforming to the manual and specifications for traffic control devices adopted and approved by Article 6701d, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, upon all public streets and alleys within the City of Gorman, Texas, as he may deem necessary, to regulate, warn or guide traffic.

**SECTION 2:** No driver of a vehicle shall disobey the instructions of any official traffic control device placed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, unless at the time otherwise directed by a police officer.

**SECTION 3:** No person shall without lawful authority attempt to or in fact, alter, deface, injure, knock down, or remove any official traffic control device or any railroad sign or signal or any inscription, shield or insignia thereon, or any other part thereof.

**SECTION 4:** No person shall place, maintain, or display upon or in view of any public street or alley any unauthorized sign, signal marking or device which purports to be or is imitation of or resembles an official traffic control device or railroad sign or signal or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic or which hides from view or interferes with the effectiveness of any official traffic control device or any railroad sign or signal; and no person shall place or maintain upon any street or alley any traffic sign or signal bearing thereon any commercial advertising. This shall not be deemed to prohibit the erection upon private property adjacent to public streets or alleys of signs giving useful directional information and of a type cannot be mistaken for official signs.

**SECTION 5:** Every such prohibitive sign or marking is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the Director of Public Works of the City of Gorman, Texas, is hereby empowered to remove the same or cause it to be removed without notice.

**SECTION 6:** The Director of Public Works of the City of Gorman, Texas, may place signs prohibiting or restricting the stopping or parking of vehicles on any public street or alley within the corporate limits of the City of Gorman, Texas, where in the opinion of the Director of Public Works, such stopping, standing or parking is dangerous to those using the public street or alley or where the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles would unduly interfere with the free movement of traffic thereon. Such signs shall be official signs and no person shall stop, stand or park any vehicle in violation of the restriction stated on such sign.

**SECTION 7:** It is a misdemeanor for any person to violate any provision of this ordinance.

**SECTION 8:** Every person convicted of a misdemeanor for a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished for by a fine of not less than ONE DOLLAR nor more than TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS.

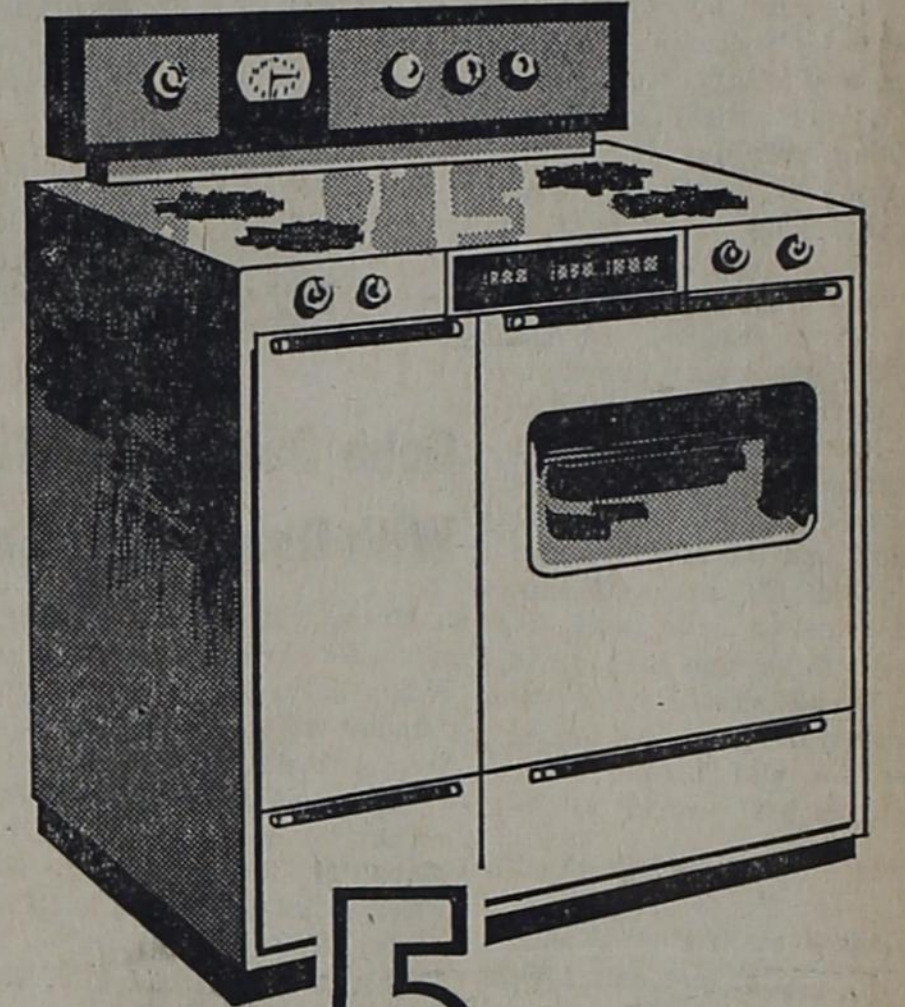

# As It Looks

## From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. - AFTER NINE MONTHS THE GRINDING 1st Session of the 89th Congress is approaching adjournment. There are still guesses as to the exact date.

IN THESE NINE MONTHS, ALL-TIME RECORDS have been set. From the standpoint of volume, this Congress has handled more legislation than any Session in history. As a matter of fact, it has produced more than any other in a full two-year Session. It is a matter of opinion as to the quality of some of the measures passed, but it represents the greatest effort in history.

FROM JANUARY 4 TO OCTOBER 7, 11,500 Bills have been introduced in the House of Representatives, plus 685 Joint Resolutions with the Senate. Senators have introduced 2,616 Bills and 116 Senate Joint Resolutions.

OF THIS NUMBER, 240 BILLS HAVE BEEN SIGNED INTO LAW. This does not include lesser legislation dealt with by Resolutions not required to be signed by the President or Treaty Agreements ratified by the Senate.

SOME MEASURES INTRODUCED NEVER SEE THE light of day out of Committee, but many of them have hearings. Proposals considered by Committees during the First Session of the 89th Congress can be carried over to the Second Session, beginning in January, 1966, but in the meantime new bills will be introduced.

### RECORD PEANUT CROP HARVESTED

CHARLOTTE — What is believed to be the first 200-bushel-per-acre yield of peanuts ever produced in South Texas has been harvested on the J. D. Starr Sr. farm near here.

After combining 184 acres of a 268-acre peanut allotment, Starr reported a whopping 216 bushels per acre on one 50-acre tract. The over-all average was 145 bushels per acre.

"I've never seen anything like it before," said Starr, referring to the 200-bushel plus production. In reviewing his operation on his farm northeast of this Atascosa County community, commented that "the cornerstone for high yields and high grades in peanut production is good fertility and the best seed available."

Starr seeded his crop with Wilco large size certified Starr (not named after him) peanuts at the rate of about 100 pounds per acre on beds about six inches above soil level.

"I used terrachlor on all of my acreage and I didn't add any dirt to that terrachlor-treated soil as some do," he explained. "Sulphur was used as often as needed and especially during pegging time. Then the crop was dusted every 10 days."

The well-known Atascosa County farmer related that "I never let weeds grow in my fields. I keep them worked all year and I'm a firm believer in soil testing which should be done at least once or twice a year to insure that basic minerals are kept at a constant level."

He suggested that "you shouldn't go over an eight or 10-day irrigation pattern to obtain good results in this dry area, and I personally don't alter this program of constant irrigation unless it rains more than two inches."

In addition to the record early crop, Starr has 84 acres of late peanuts planted two rows a bed. These are Wilco registered Starr peanuts which will produce certified seed. Indications are that these also will produce another good crop for the owner.
