Heavy Rains In Area Stops Peanut Harvest

The two inch plus rainfall received here in the early hours on Monday has slowed down the beginning of the peanut harvest.

Several farmers have peanuts up and within the next few days, providing the weather continues to remain dry, harvest will get into full swing.

So far we have not been able to get a report on the production of the peanuts grown this year. Not enough farmers have taken up and some have not been marketed. We contacted Norman Park and Pete Mauney, who have harvested a portion of their peanuts, and peanut grades were all the information available. Both farmers had a production grade of 70. Park's peanuts were on irrigated land and Mauney's were dryland.
