Park's peanuts were on irrigated land and Mauney's were dryland.

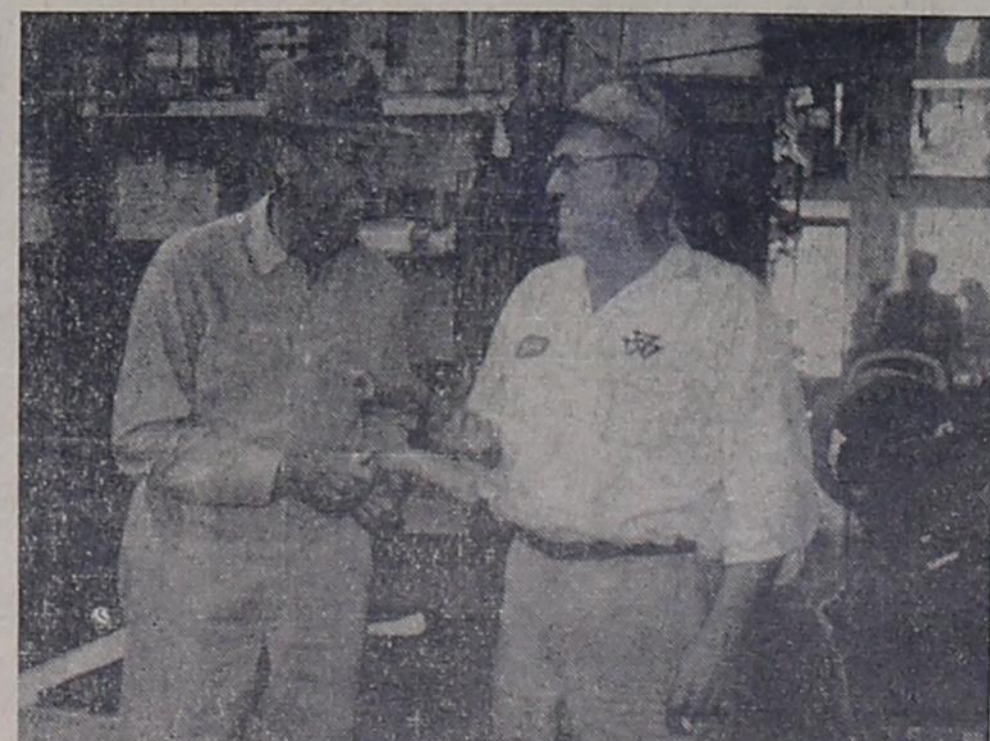

The Veterans Administration announces it is paying dividends on all GI life insurance, regardless of whether the insurance is in force.

The dividend is 50 cents a month per \$1,000 for each month in service. But veterans must ask for it.

Veterans should write to Veterans Administration Center, Fort Snelling, St. Paul, Minn. 55111, giving name, address, branch of service, serial number, date of birth, dates of enlistment and discharge and GI insurance policy number, if known.
