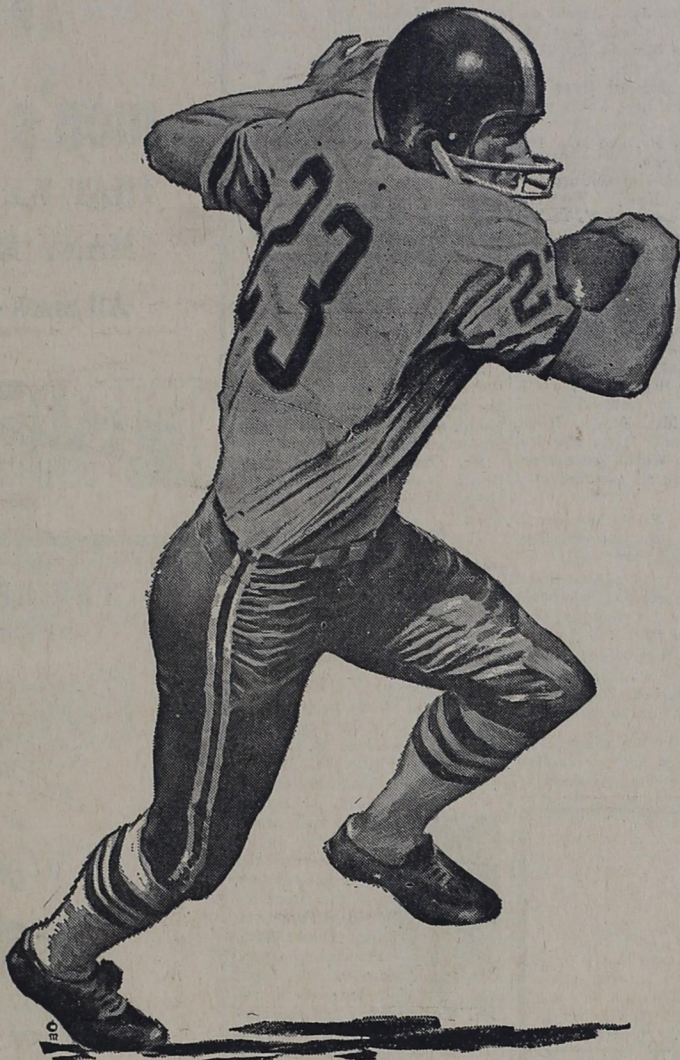

## Browsing with Bev

More bonded fabrics will be on the market this winter than ever before. Manufacturers predict that in a few years about 60 percent of all fashion fabrics, including linens and bedding, will be bonded.

Consumers often ask why some bonded fabric separate. The type of manufacturing process determines the longevity of the bond. There are three types of laminating methods used in making bonded fabrics:

- (1) Adhesives glue the fabrics together. This is the least expensive process and the least successful as the glue is easily dissolved by solvents used in a dry cleaning process.
- (2) Heat setting a polyurethane foam between two fabrics is more expensive but lasts longer since it is not destroyed by dry cleaning solvents. This middle layer, however, is so thin that it is difficult to distinguish it from an adhesive.
- (3) Locklined fabrics are made of two layers connected during the weaving process. This is rarely found in clothing because of the expense of the construction process.

Medicare Information

ABILENE, TEXAS — Congressman Omar Burleson has expressed a concern that people over 65 years of age may not be aware of certain advantages to them under the new Medicare legislation.

FOR INSTANCE, BURLESON SAYS THAT THE Abilene Social Security Office advises him that out of some 32,000 persons over the age of 65 in the 14-county area covered by that office, there are at least 6,000 persons who will not be automatically notified of their eligibility under the Program. Only those receiving Social Security Benefits, Railroad Retirement or Old Age Assistance will be notified. This has caused Congressman Burleson and the Social Security officials to feel that attention should be called to the provisions of the new Law.

BURLESON SAYS THAT ALL THOSE OVER 65 years of age should be reminded that they are eligible for certain benefits under the Medicare Program. Choices in this matter must be made prior to March 31, 1966 by all who wish to enroll in the Health Insurance Program, commonly known as Medicare under Social Security.

THE HOSPITALIZATION PORTION IS AUTOMATIC for those receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits. Others must apply for it.

ALL PERSONS OVER 65, WHO WISH TO ENROLL in the Supplementary Medical Insurance part must make that decision known to the Social Security Administration by March 31, 1966, for they can not enroll after that date until October-December, 1967.

THAT PART OF MEDICARE WILL COST \$3.00 per month. All Social Security offices have leaflets explaining the provisions and the people in those offices will be glad to answer your particular questions so that you may make an informed decision.

IT WOULD BE MOST UNFORTUNATE IF, by inadvertence or otherwise, there were those who did not exercise their right of choice, in order to benefit in the best possible way in accordance with their needs.
