



Medicare Information

ABILENE, TEXAS - Congressman Omar Burleson has expressed a concern that people over 65 years of age may not be aware of certain advantages to them under the new Medicare legislation.

FOR INSTANCE, BURLE-SON SAYS THAT THE Abilene Social Security Office advises him that out of some 32,000 perons over the age of 65 in the 14-county area covered by that office, there are at least 6,000 persons who will not be automatically notified of their eligibility under the Program. Only those receiving Social Security Benefits, Railroad Retirement or Old Age Assistance will be notified. This has caused Congressman Burleson and the Social Security officials to feel that attention should be called to the provisins of the new Law.

BURLESON SAYS THAT ALL THOSE OVER 65 years of age should be reminded that they are eligible for certain benefits under the Medicare Program. Choices in this matter must be made prior to March 31, 1966 by all who wish to enroll in the Health Insurance Program, commonly known as Medicare under Social Security.

T H E HOSPITALIZATION PORTION IS AUTOMATIC for those receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits. Others must apply for it.

ALL PERSONS OVER 65, WHO WISH TO ENROLL in the Supplementary Medical Insurance part must make that decision known to the Social Security Administration by March 31, 1966, for they can not enroll after that date until October-December, 1967.
