

Elementary grades will have individual classroom programs and exchanging of gifts and the High School will meet in the auditorium for their program and Christmas tree.



"Do you like it, Jacques?" "If you will pardon my saying it, sir, you are not the best of sign painters."


"Indeed not, but it serves the purpose. Place it on the door," The head waiter obliged and soon customers were turning away after reading the message:



"The safest way to deal with inexperience on the road is to cut down speed. Speed to fast for existing conditions is one of the major factors contributing to fatal accidents."

"And, don't overload your car with packages or passangers. Do not pile books, clothes or packages so high in the back seat of your car that the rear view window is blocked. If you must hang clothing in the car, make sure you have outside rear view mirrors."

In closing, Musick further advised students to get plenty of sleep before starting trips and to take several rest stops along the way.

"If possible, alternate with other drivers. It's much less tiring and a great deal safer."

"Sure, I still got a typewriter. I've also got five dollars and a note that says, "Buddy, you need it more'n me!"




