Connally told him that he did not have the Constitutional power to do this and it could only be done by calling a special session of the Legislature which in turn would have necessitated a special election.

Mr. Musgrove has gotten a volunteer group of law students in Austin to act as observers while the Legislature is in session to keep him informed as to what is going on. Heading this staff is Jim Browning, who may be reached at G R8-8110, Austin, Texas.

Although Mr. Musgrove has entered the race for Representative of the 63rd. District, he expressed hope that we would not interpret his conference call as a political move. Personally, I do not consider it as such but will give him the same consideration as other candidates before casting my vote for our representative.

As for Mr. Wayne Gibbens, I would hesitate to ever vote for him again as I believe he did our District wrong in leaving us without representation.

National Future Farmers of America Week Set Feb. 19-26

Future Farmers of America Week is to be observed during the February 19-26 period. And the theme that has been chosen for it — "Agriculture Is More Than Farming" — admirably points up the week's purpose and significance.

There is a term, "Agri-Business", which often is used in reference to all the occupations that are related to farming. The chain of agriculture starts with the suppliers to farmers — those who provide goods and services ranging from machinery and chemicals to insurance and technical services. Farmers, the producers of raw materials, are the center link. Then come marketing, processing, transportation and distribution. All in all, this agricultural complex employs many millions of people and is America's largest industry.

Vocational agricultural education in the high schools provides a start for boys to obtain the training needed to enter these occupations. Some will go on to college or technical schools. About a third will return directly to the farm, and they will have the knowledge that additional education is available to them in young farmer and adult farmer classes conducted by teachers of vocational agriculture.

The Future Farmers' organization supplements the regular school instruction by providing opportunities for leadership development. Its goal is to help train young men for a wide horizon of agricultural occupations. And this is a needed and invaluable work.

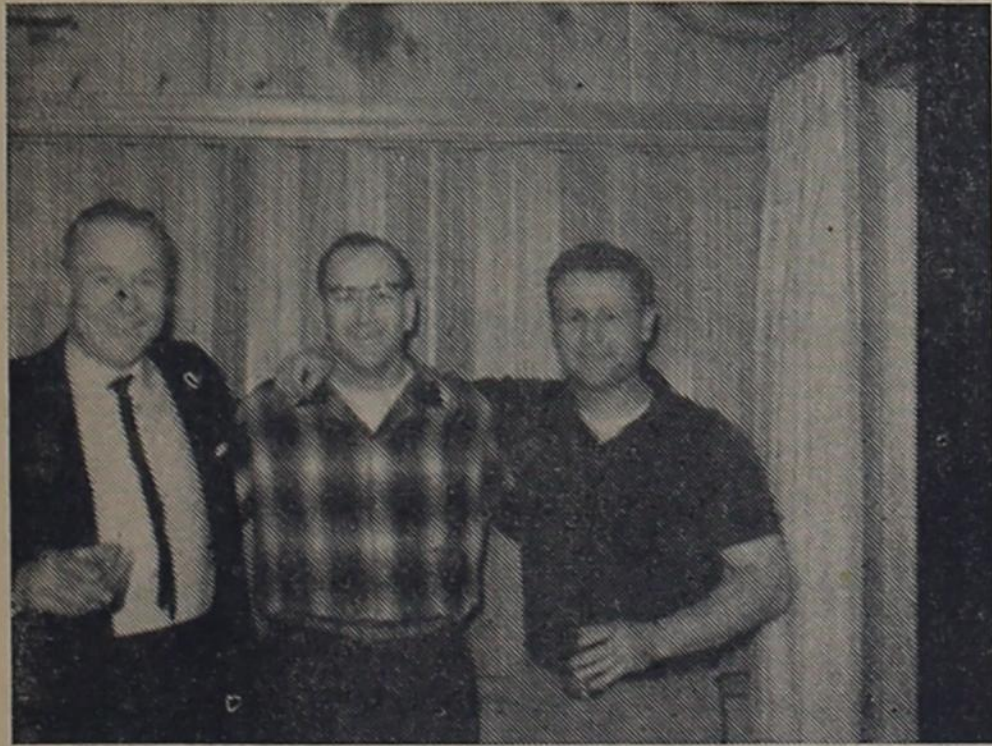

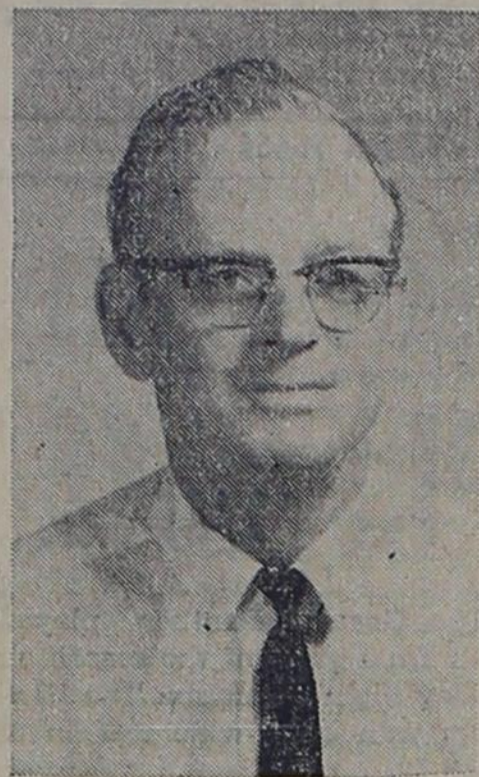

Joel R. Barton To Teach Welding Short Course At Carbon



A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held February 21 through 24th under the sponsorship of the Carbon High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Travis Spence, Superintendent, and Mr. John E. Rodgers, teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agriculture Division of the Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course.

Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Barton and all have met with outstanding success, states Mr. J. B. Payne, Area Supervisor of Stephenville.

The short course at Carbon is scheduled to begin February 21 at 7:30 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instructions, according to John E. Rodgers, Vo-Ag teacher.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of School Mr. Travis Spence, or the teacher of Vo-Ag, Mr. John E. Rodgers. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Barton states that short courses will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operation in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.
