PEANUT TEAM TO TALK WITH COUNTY FARMERS MARCH 16

Eastland County farmers will soon have a chance to learn the latest practices in peanut production. A team of specialists from the Agricultural Extension Service will be in Gorman at the High School Auditorium from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. Wednesday afternoon, March 16th.

The team consists of Ben Spears, Agronomist; Wendell Horne, Plant Pathologist; Henry O'Neal, Agricultural Engineer; and Phil Hammon, Entomologist. The group will cover such items as fertilization, diseases, insects, uses of herbicides, and other problems in peanut production.

The meeting is not intended to be a complete course in peanut production, but is meant to bring farmers up to date on the latest ideas, methods, materials, and equipment.

Every peanut farmer or person interested in peanut production is encouraged to attend. There will be a question and answer period after the program.

Peanut Irrigation Course Termed As Highly Successful

The Peanut Irrigation Short Course conducted by personnel of the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, in the Gorman-De Leon area last week has been described as highly successful by those responsible for planning and sponsoring it.

The course, taught by Mr. Wayne Keese, Agricultural Engineer, Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, and Mr. James Denton, Area Farm Management Specialist, Agricultural Extension Service, was held in De Leon on Monday and Tuesday nights, February 28 and March 1, with the site shifting to Gorman for the two concluding nights, March 3 and 4.

Registration figures reflected an average attendance of approximately 150 persons at each of the meetings which is a fairly accurate barometer of interest shown in peanut irrigation in this area. Growers attended from about all communities in Comanche and Eastland counties. Another indication of the interest in the course was the fact that only a very small number of those attending the first session failed to attend all sessions.

During the first three nights of the course Mr. Keese covered pertinent data pertaining to irrigation wells, drilling and casing, developing and testing. He also discussed the selection of the proper irrigation pump for the capacity of the well and other related factors.

Under the general topic of sprinkler systems he stressed such items as application rate, system capacity, depth of water application, and uniformity of water application. He defined the different types of soil, the water carrying capacity, effective root zone depth, and field water capacity.

Under the general heading of water management Keese explained factors relating to soil moisture storage and daily water requirements. Keese explained in detail how to determine the amount of water an individual system is applying in a given period of time.

Mr. James Denton discussed the economic aspects of peanut irrigation after having done considerable research concerning irrigation conditions in Comanche and Eastland counties. He pointed out average costs of initial investment in installing irrigation systems. He stated that for an irrigation well with an output of 100 gallons per minute an average yield of 47 bushels per acre under irrigation will be required to return to the grower the same proceeds as would be provided for 30 bushels per acre dry land yield. He covered average production harvesting and fixed cost per acre.

Assisting Comanche County Agent Floyd Key and Bill McCutchin, Ass't. County Agent for Eastland County (acting for Mr. J. M. Cooper, who was ill) was the De Leon Chamber of Commerce, De Leon and Gorman Public Schools, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, and Gorman Peanuts. Those in attendance on the final night were furnished a barbecue meal compliments of Gorman Peanuts.

DEADLINE FOR THE REGISTRATION OF VOTERS MARCH 17

Texas' 15-day Voter Registration began Thursday, March 3, and the deadline for registration is Thursday, March 17.

The special free registration period was brought about when a Federal Court ruled that Texas' poll tax voting requirement was unconstitutional.

People who have paid their current poll tax do not have to re-register. But persons that did not pay their poll tax have until March 17 in which to register. All persons between the age of 21 and 59 who have not paid their poll tax may register to vote. Persons 60 or older receive an exemption and do not have to register in Eastland County.

Registration blanks are available at the Progress office or at Todd's Variety Store, which may be filled out and mailed or taken to the County Tax Assessor's office.

Two More Candidates File For Places On April 5 City Ballot

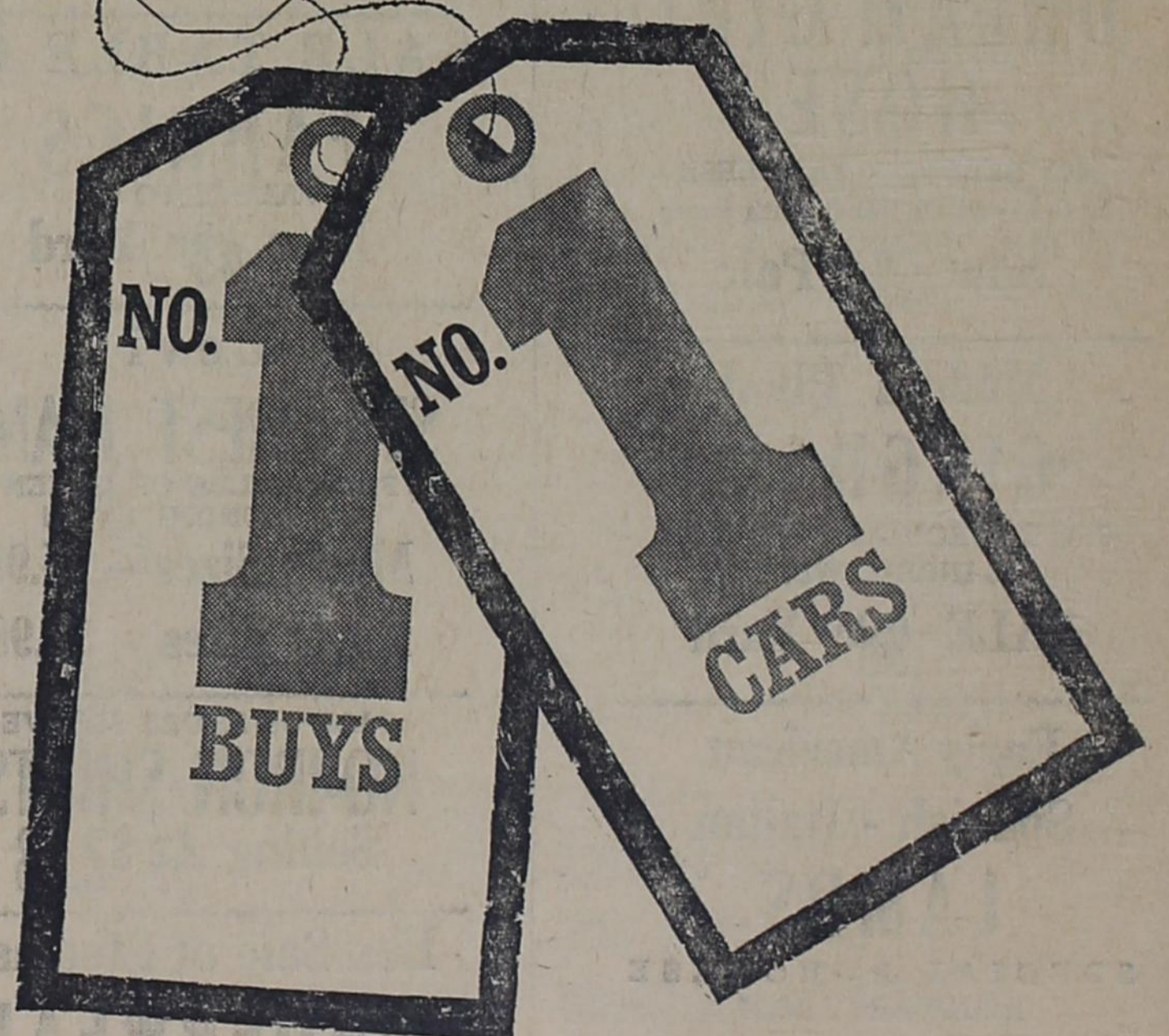

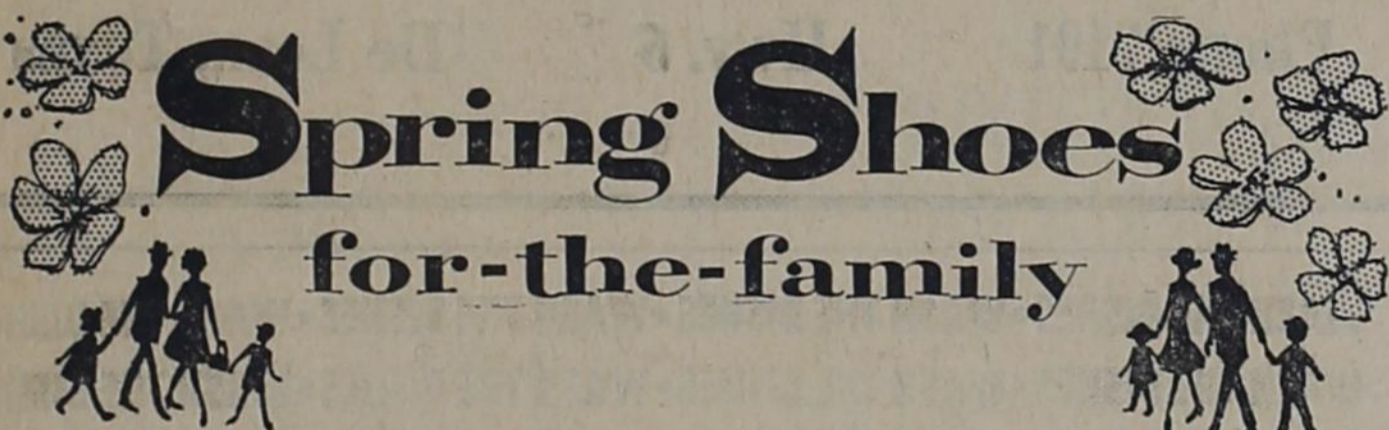

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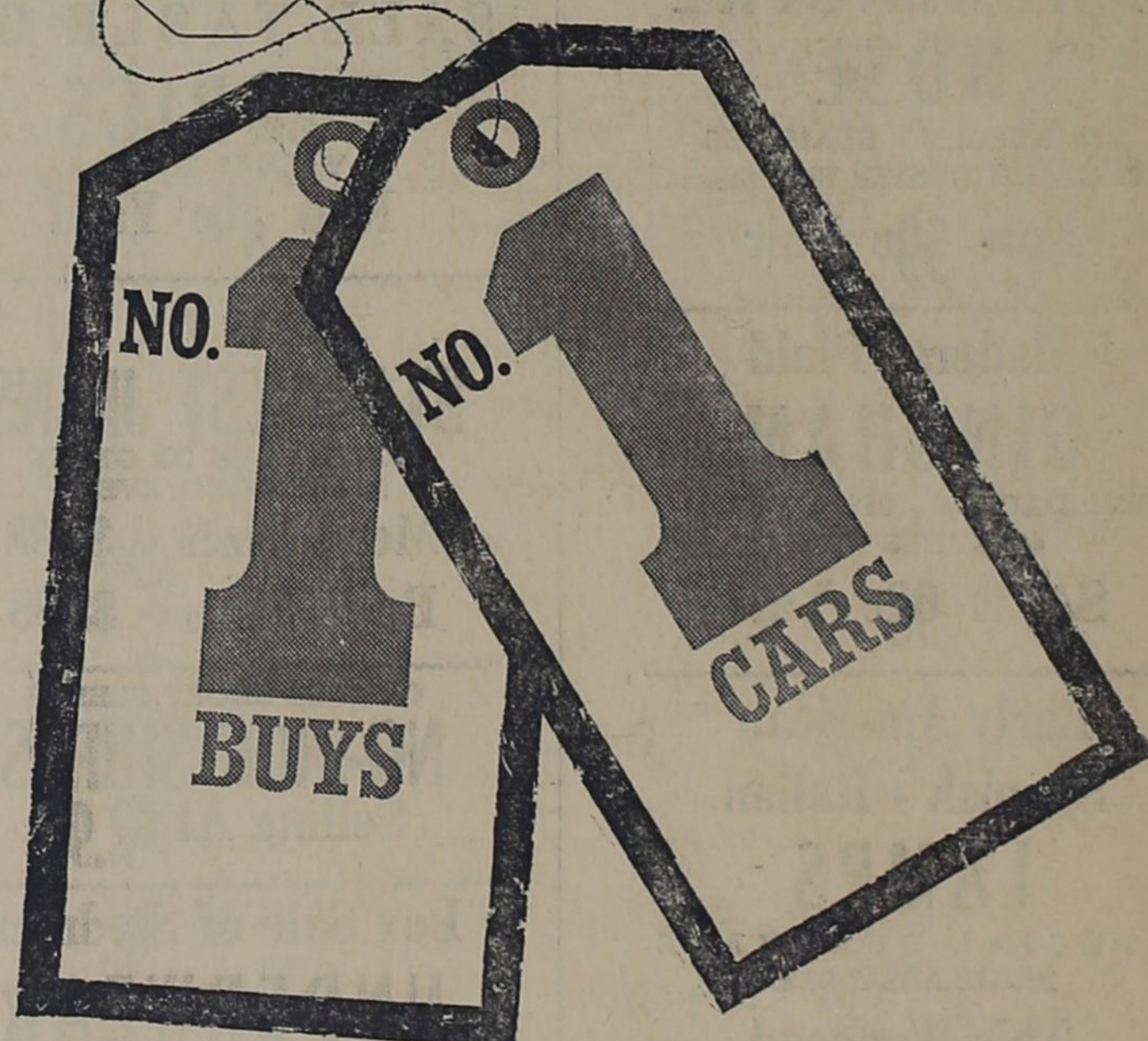

Labor's New Goal; Secondary Boycott

Having lost the battle to impose compulsory unionism on the nation's employed, organized labor has now retired to prepared positions in order to re-form its ranks and begin a new assault. This time, its goal is amendment of the Taft-Hartley provision banning secondary boycotts in labor disputes.

The immediate target is Congressional sanction for on-site (or common situs) picketing of construction projects. The AFL-CIO and its allies are rallying behind H.R. 10027, a bill embodying the hopes of the building trades unions for a powerful grip on the construction industry.

Under the present law, unions cannot throw picket lines around a plant whose only offense in labor's eyes is that it is doing business with a struck plant. This kind of secondary boycott, Congress felt, punished industries and their workers who were, in effect, innocent bystanders in the primary labor dispute.

The building trades unions protested lustily. Since construction involves many different contractors and trades, however, allowing the plumbers or carpenters to keep out the plasterers and the electricians from a construction site would bring hardship to those who had no stake in the particular labor management dispute causing the trouble.

H.R. 10027, if passed, will permit one union involved in a dispute with one contractor to throw up a picket line around an entire construction site, thereby bringing to a halt all work there — and at any other site where the struck contractor is working.

Opponents of this AFL-CIO-inspired measure argue that this would put enormous powers of coercion in the hands of the labor bureaucracy and work against the interests of workers. If H.R. 10027 passes, they will be thrown out of work at any time and forced into indeterminate periods of idleness. Contractors, no matter how good their labor relations might be, would be penalized for conflicts not of their own making.

While giving virtual veto power to any building trades union,

the proposed bill would drastically increase the amount of time lost in strikes. Building costs, it is argued, are high enough. H.R. 10027, there is general agreement among labor experts, would hike those costs even higher. In the long run this would hurt the present Administration's efforts to increase low cost housing and add new inflationary pressures to those already affecting the national economy.

At a time of national crisis, it would bring new labor difficulties to contractors working on national defense construction projects and slow down the production of material vitally needed in the Vietnam war. It would also lead to serious work stoppages at missile construction sites which have already been hurt by too many crippling strikes.

Like the thoroughly-defeated effort to repeal 14(b), the anti-compulsion provision of the Taft-Hartley Act, H.R. 10027 would have almost no chance of passage if Congress voted its own views and those of the general public. But strong pressure from powerful unions, in an election year when many congressmen and senators are counting on la-

bor funds and help, has kept H. R. 10027 very much alive.

The ensuing legislative battle will be between an apathetic public opinion and the strong labor lobby. Political observers see it as a toss-up, with the anti-Negro practices of some building trades unions as the possible determining factor.

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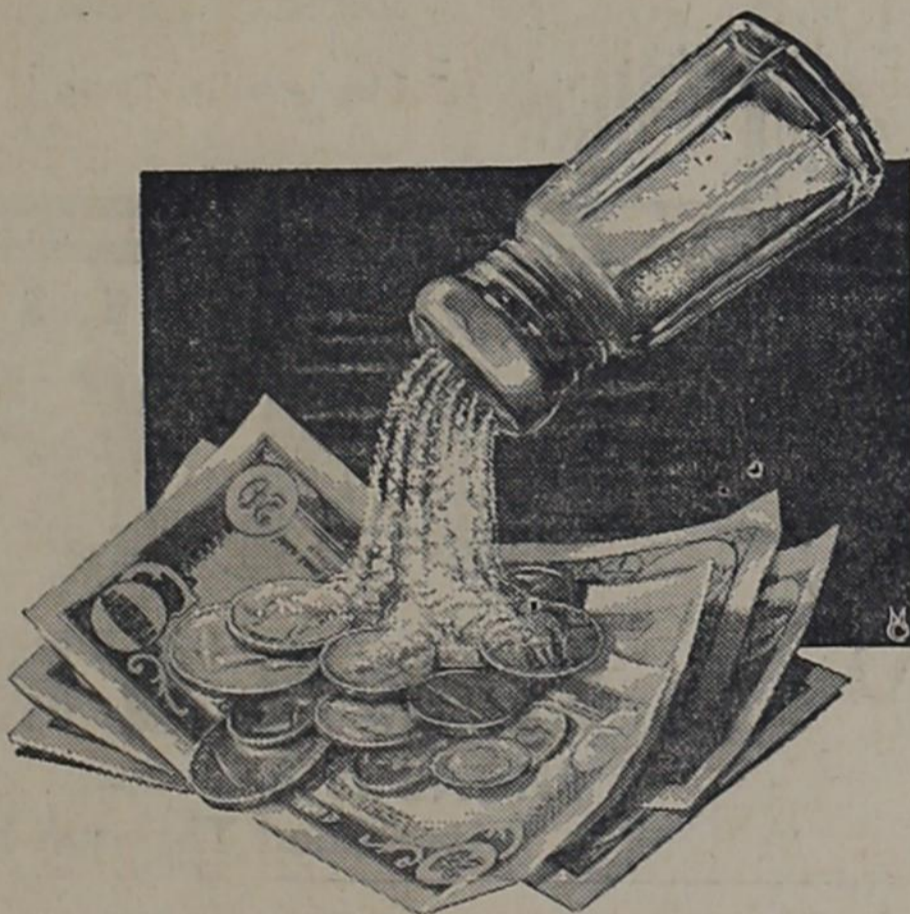

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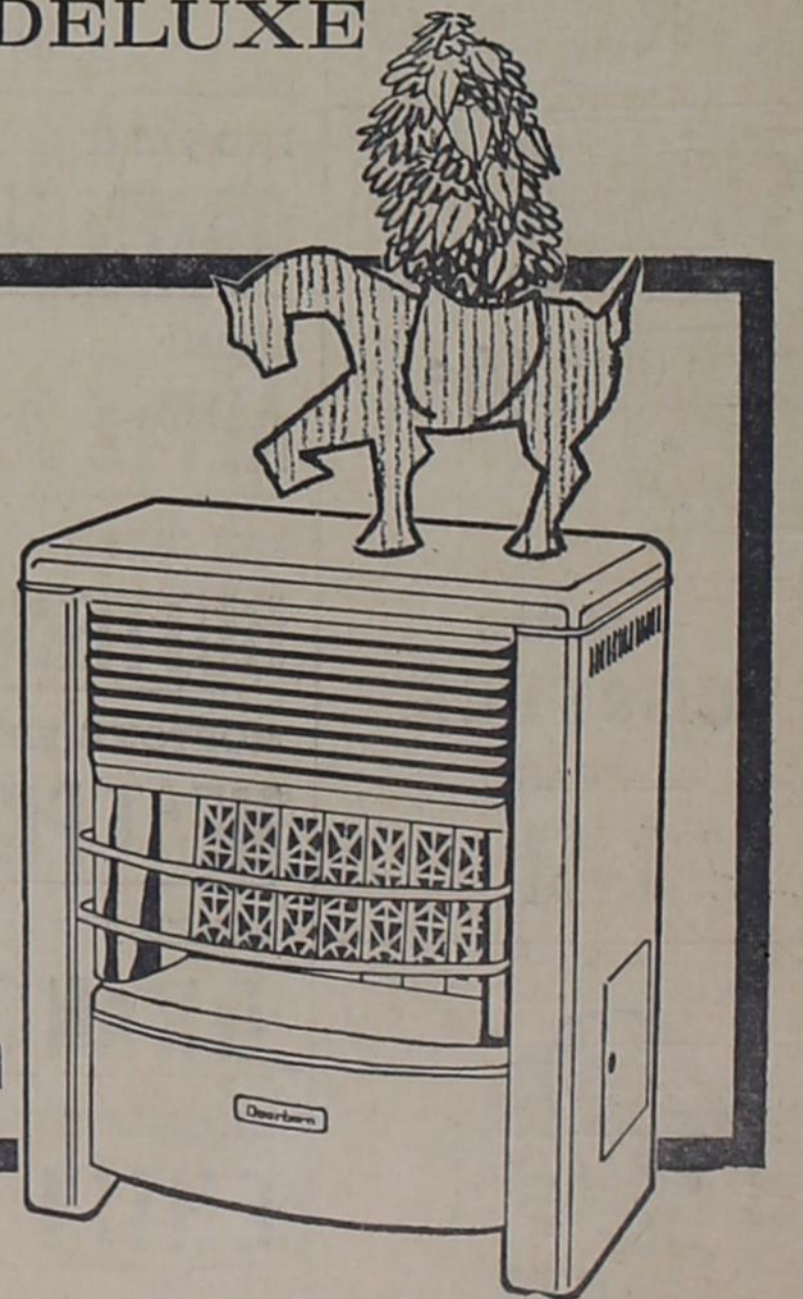
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Band Boosters Call Meeting For March 17 On Band Calendars

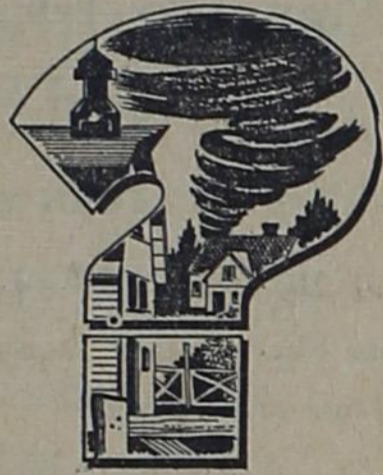

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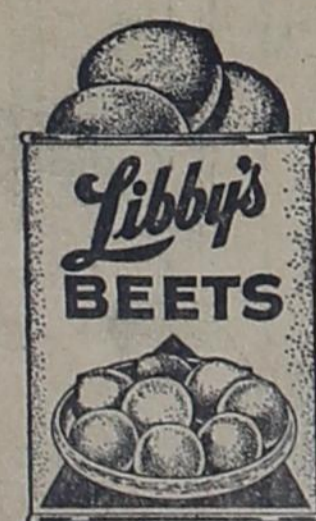
