



He doesn't know the identities of the remaining 25. He asks our readers to check with their friends and relatives and, if they have taken no action as yet on Medicare, urge them to write a card or letter to "Social Security, Abilene, Texas 79604." They should say they do or do not want to sign up for Medicare.

"I'd like to suggest that every person over 65 who has not yet notified the Social Security Admniistration do so before March 31. Those who say "No" or who just don't reply, will get another chance in October of 1967. However, a person who signs up by March 31 can cancel his enrollment anytime before July 1; in effect, he is getting 90 more days to reach a final decision," Tuley added.
