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

A driver of a motor vehicle involved in an accident which results in injury, death or total property damage of \$25 or more must make a report within 10 days, so states the Texas Department of Public Safety. The failure or refusal of any person to report an accident is cause for the suspension of such person's driver's license. This failure is also a misdemeanor, punishable by fine not to exceed \$200.

All reports are, by law, confidential and cannot be used as evidence in any trial. The principal purpose of this report is to develop information useful in accident prevention.


