

Biographical Facts About Eldon Mahon, Candidate For Rep.

Birthplace, Early Years

Eldon Mahon, son of a pioneer West Texas family, was born and grew up in Loraine, Texas, in Mitchell County, where his father has long been prominent as a successful merchant and farmer.

Wife And Family

A devoted husband and father, Eldon is married to the former Nova Lee Groom, whose parents reside in Abilene. They have two daughters and a son: Jana, age 18; Martha, age 14; and Brad, age 9.

Early Schooling

Eldon got his first taste of public life when as a boy of 10 he began clerking in his father's retail store . . . at those times when he wasn't working on the farm. In school he was outstanding, both as a student and athlete. In addition to lettering in football, basketball and track, he was a member of the debating team and Salutatorian of his graduating class.

College, Beginnings of Professional Life

After high school, Eldon entered

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ed McMurry College in Abilene, earning his own way by clerking in a department store and working during the summers as a Park Ranger at Carlsbad Caverns, New Mexico. In college, Eldon again proved his scholastic ability by winning a place in "Who's Who in Colleges and Universities", becoming a member of the National Honor Society, Alpha Chi, and the college debating team . . . the latter experience leading ultimately to his becoming one of the state's best-known public speakers. In 1942 he was graduated from McMurry with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in history and government. (Years later, he was to become a member of the Board of Trustees of his alma mater.) It was also in 1942 that Eldon received a Bachelor of Law Degree from the University of Texas, in Austin. While attending law school, he worked as clerk in the Texas Attorney General's office under Attorneys General Gerald C. Mann and Grover Sellers.

Military Experience

Like many other men of the time, Eldon responded to the call of duty when his country went to war. He enlisted in the U. S. Air Force as a Private in 1942; less than a year later, he had completed Officer's Training and received a commission. After a period of duty with the Judge Advocate's Office in the United States, he served a year overseas with the Fifth Air Force in the South Pacific. He was discharged in 1945 with the rank of Captain.

Legal Career

Between World War II and the present, Eldon has held an extensive range of elective and appointive posts as a skilled lawyer and juridical expert. He has been

Gov. Connally Warns Against Failure to Vote

Austin — Governor John Connally warned Texans here this week that failure to vote and to attend precinct conventions Saturday, May 7th could result in a takeover of the state Democratic party by a minority group. "Frankly, a small, militant group of people is trying this year to take over the Democratic Party of Texas for their own purposes," Connally said. "The only way to prevent this is for conscientious citizens to turn out in mass at the polls, and at their neighborhood precinct conventions to make sure that the voice of the majority continues to shape our party and government."

"Voter apathy is the constant threat to good government," he said. "And if we like the kind of stability and progress we've had in Texas, we'd better guard it carefully on election day. The fellow who thinks his vote isn't important this year couldn't be more wrong, regardless whether some of the races may appear close."

"It is very important that all qualified Texans be certain to vote on May 7th. And I particularly urge them to attend their precinct conventions after the polls close. I hope they will elect delegates to their county conventions who will support my administration, and our program for continued progress in Texas."

Delegates named in precinct conventions will attend county conventions May 14, and those conventions in turn select delegations to the state convention in September in Austin.

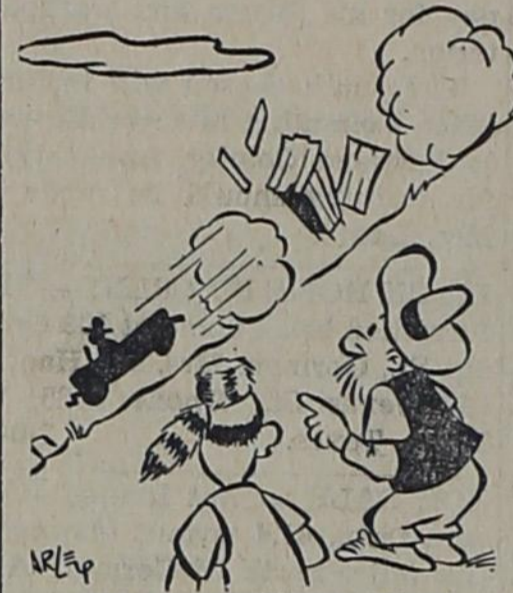

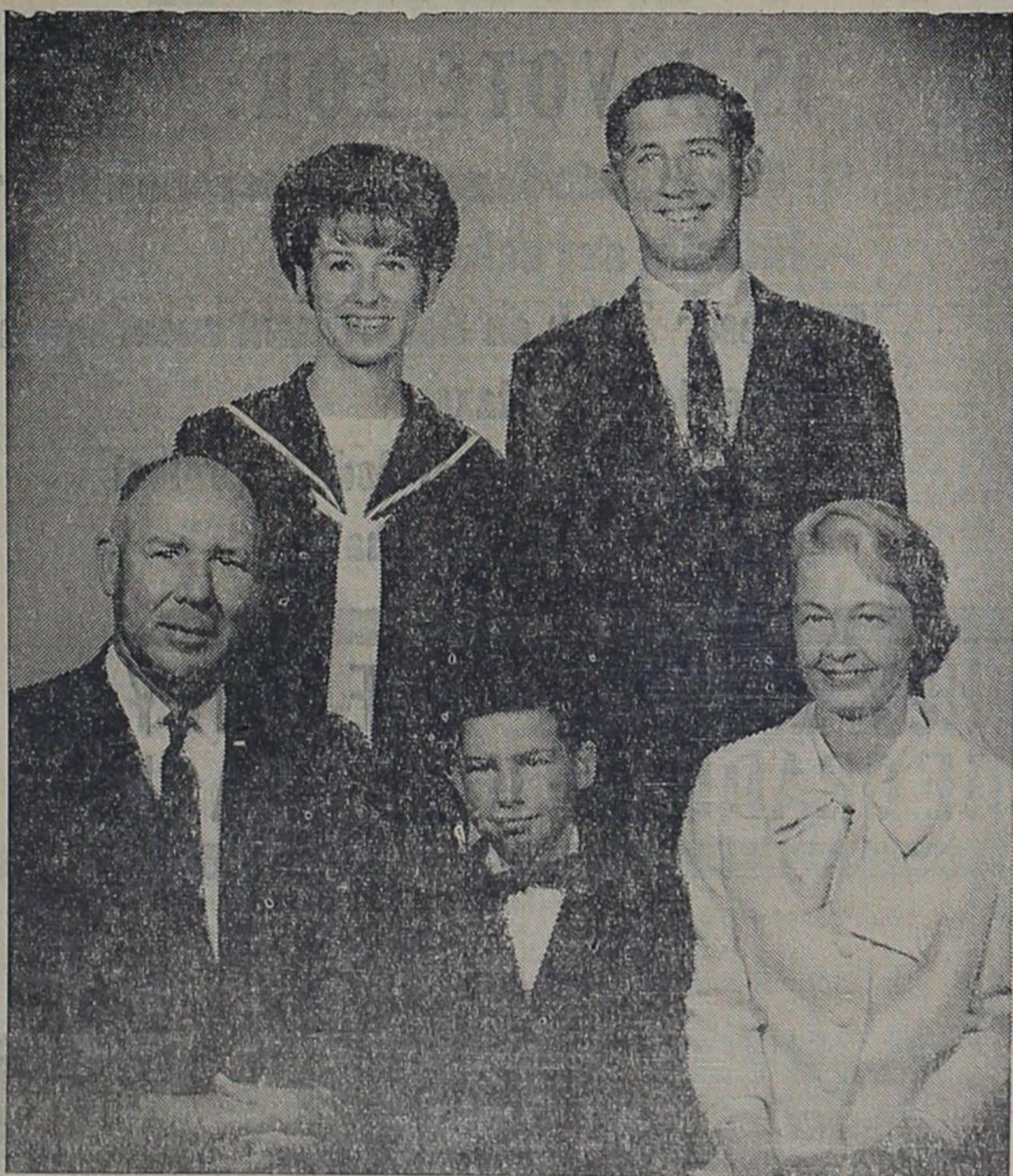

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Under the laws of the land at present an illegitimate child is worth more than other children.

This somewhat whimsical situation was recently highlighted by an editorial appearing in the Union County Leader in New Mexico. The editor pointed out that under the Aid to Dependent Children, the government will pay out more than \$800 per year for the upkeep on an illegitimate child. But for income tax purposes, only \$600 is allowed to a family for each legitimate child.

The New Mexico editor also pointed out that under the Cuban refugee program a minimum of \$1200 per year is paid for each refugee child's upkeep, but if the child is attending school an extra \$1000 per year is allowed.

In addition the editorial states that in the Federal Job Corp, the government spends \$7000 per year per child.

And according to government figures, the VISTA program, (Volunteer in Service in America) spent \$3.1 million in the last fiscal year to turn out only 202 trainees, indicating that in this government agency the cost of training one child runs to more than \$15,000 per year.

Thus, the editor asks "How" © National Federation of Independent Business

in the world do you expect parents to provide all these things plus clothes, recreation, books, medicine . . . for \$600 per year? With your own figures you admit it can't be done.

This editorial poses some very pertinent questions. The question is magnified when it is realized that the government costs per child cited at actual outlays, while the tax deduction granted for a child in a family is only \$600, which means that cash savings is only the sum arrived at by multiplying the \$600 by the tax rate. For example, the actual cash for a child on a 15% income tax bracket is \$90.

Recently in the Congress there was again defeated an amendment to the tax revision bill which would have permitted parents to take a small extra exemption for children attending college.

Purportedly, the present aim of the government is to encourage more education. But more education for whom?

For example, as cited by the New Mexico editor, a Cuban refugee child is given an extra \$1000 if attending school, but the American middle class family, which pays largely for Cuban students, gets absolutely no breaks of any kind.

It would almost appear the Great Society has a great aim.

That is to develop the non-demonstrating middle class into an illiterate class while increasing the erudition in the ranks of the pickets and demonstrators.

sign up for doctor bill insurance if they are to have coverage by July 1, 1966, the date that medicare coverage begins.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for the Social Security in Abilene urged all senior citizens age 65 or over who have not signed up for doctor bill insurance to visit their social security office immediately, so that they may have protection when the program starts on July 1.

Almost all persons 65 or over are eligible for the two types of health insurance under the medicare program, hospital insurance and doctor bill insurance. Social Security beneficiaries are automatically enrolled in the hospital insurance program, but persons who are still working or who do not receive social security benefits must sign up for hospital insurance. On the other hand, in order to get protection toward the cost of doctor bills at a cost of \$3 a month, ALL persons must enroll.

According to Tuley persons who were 65 before March 1, 1966 and fail to enroll before the deadline, May 31, will have to wait til October, 1967 before they will have another chance to apply for doctor bill protection. He added that as senior citizens become 65 they should visit their social security office no later than the month before their 65th birthday to have protection as soon as they reach 65.

Peace Corps Tests To Be Given On May 14

Gorman area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 9 a. m. on Saturday, May 14 at Brownwood Main Post Office.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicated a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The Placement Test requires no preparation and is non-competitive — an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C.

The Placement Test takes about an hour and a half. An optional achievement test for applicants who have studied French or Spanish requires another hour.

LAND PRICES AND SALES INCREASE IN TEXAS

A recently released study by agricultural economists at TA&MU dealing with land sales and prices shows that both have increased during the past three years. Since 1949 land prices have increased each year but volume of sales consistently declined. This trend in sales has done an about face during the past 3 years, says Economists A. B. Wooten and F. B. Andrews. They cite urban influence as the reason for the steadily increasing prices. Urban demand for land for hobby farming, rural homesites, speculation and recreation push prices higher each year.

HIGHLIGHTS And SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Texas — Next year's legislative session may see state employees battling as hard for a pay raise as school teachers.

Furthermore, help is assured. Gov. John Connally says that "substantial pay raises for state employees" will be among his "strongest recommendations" to lawmakers.

Indications are that the pay boosts could run as high as \$17,500,000 a year.

According to Connally, state government is slipping farther

and farther behind in its efforts to keep qualified workers — not only in the lowest pay levels but in the higher brackets of professional personnel.

Connally says that:

More than 7,800 of the 45,000 state employees (not including those at colleges and universities) make less than \$3,000 a year, the federal "poverty line."

Turnover is running 30 per cent per year.

Lower-bracket hospital aides get as little as \$193 a month.

There are 313 vacancies in the hospital system, 77 in parks and wildlife operations, 100 in the prison system, 135 in the highway patrol and 148 in the Texas Education Agency.

"If we do not reverse the trend," warns Connally, "not only

will the stability and efficiency of our operations be threatened, but we will also weaken our entire system of local self government and responsibility."

Salary issue promptly was injected into the governor's race.

Stanley Woods, Connally's opponent for the Democratic nomination, chided the governor for not having spoken out on the subject before election time.

Woods' ticketmate, State Rep. Bill Hollowell, running for lieutenant governor, said Connally should submit the raises to an immediate special session of the Legislature rather than waiting eight months until the regular session opens.

GINNERS FIRST ON CONTROL LIST? — Texas' new nine-member State Air Control Board now has held its second meeting since Governor Connally named the group, whose purpose it is to protect the public from air pollution. Indications are that Texas' more than 1,300 cotton gins will be the first area subject to air control rules and regulations.

Conclusions after a year-long study of pollutants caused by cotton gins is that smoke emitted from burr burning contains significant quantities of arsenic and tars. These poisons, along with gin dust, have contributed to the 20 to 30 per cent increase in complaints about respiratory diseases suffered by downwind residents during ginning season. Also, there have been adverse effects on trees and vegetation downwind from arsenic and other evidences of pollutants.

Report states that much of the increased pollutants from the gins are caused from an increase in trash — leaves, limbs, immature bolls, and dust — picked up by mechanical harvesters. Recommendations for curing these problems will be in the report of the Board's staff.

WATER QUALITY COSTS GOING UP — Taxpayers, as well as the men who run the sewage treatment plants in growing cities, must get used to the fact that in the future they are going to have to maintain high standards of operation of their plants. Higher quality water means higher cost of treatment.

This came out in the Texas Water Pollution Control Board's meeting when the City of Dallas objected to a doubling of the Board's usual chlorination requirement, arguing it would cost more than it would be worth.

Dave Smallhorst, the Board's executive secretary, said: "The cities, including Dallas, have to recognize the fact that an increase in water quality requirements is going to mean an increase in cost." Smallhorst said chlorination is necessary to protect public health and the Board's first concern is the health of the public.

COURTS SPEAK — A trial ruling that Rice University must integrate can be appealed by school alumni, Texas Supreme Court held.

Houston Court of Civil Appeals was ordered to consider the appeal. A provision of charitable trust establishing the school specified that it admit only white students. Trial court said the restriction is invalid and the Court of Civil Appeals held that only Attorney General Waggoner Carr could appeal.

Court of Criminal Appeals filed a request by Jasper attorney Joe Tonnahill that Jack Ruby be given an early sanity hearing, but took no immediate action.

State Supreme Court's refusal of the appeal of oil operator William Crawford of Dallas means Mrs. Madge Yeatts of Jones County will be entitled to collect \$17,064 for damage to her farm caused by oilfield salt water disposal.

AG OPINIONS — Even under the new Criminal Code, habitual violators of Texas' traffic laws will not be able to protect their driver's licenses from being revoked by pleading no contest to charges. So ruled Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

In other recent opinions, Carr held that:

Wilbarger County Hospital District may pay for land acquired to establish a community center for mental health and mental retardation services out of a building bond issue or district tax levy.

Tax bonds of Texas junior college districts are not eligible to secure deposits of state funds, but revenue bonds are eligible to extent provided by statutes.

County clerks in misdemeanor cases have authority to issue arrest writs to any peace officer.

Wilbarger County Hospital District bonds are not acceptable as security for state deposits.

No inheritance tax is due the state on a veteran's estate which passed to the U. S. on his death.

Secretary of State has no authority to accept and file applications for certificate of withdrawal from foreign corporations unless they comply with all requirements of Texas Business Corporation Act.

HEARING SET — Railroad Commission has set a hearing for May 27 to investigate purchasing and transportation practices of the Gulf Oil Corporation and Gulf Refining Company in the Pittsburg Field in Camp County.

T. D. Humphrey Jr. and Southern Union Production Company requested the hearing.

In separate action, Sinclair Refining Company asked the Commission a second time for a rule change to permit operators in the East Texas Oil Field to transfer their allowable to another producing well when the casing of a well springs a leak. Independent

oil operator Byran Payne of Tyler opposed the change. Such a proposal was rejected by the Commission last year.

INDIVIDUAL WATER RIGHTS TESTED — Considering a case which could affect every rancher, farmer and other landowner in the state — so far as water rights on their own land is concerned — are the three judges who make up the Third Court of Civil Appeals in Austin.

Appeal by P. L. Garrison of Banderita County of a trial court decision favoring the Bexar-Medina-Atascosa Water Improvement District No. 1 may revise the process authorized by the Legislature in 1959 under which a landowner could get irrigation rights to more than 200 acre feet of water a year through a relatively simple process of filing for a permit with the Water Rights Commission.

Garrison got his permit on January 8, 1964. But a few days before that, the Commission had ruled that the 1959 route to a permit for additional water did not apply where navigable waters are concerned.

Attacking the permit because of this rule, the water improvement district won a trial court verdict that the Commission's rule was valid, but Garrison's permit was not. This because the usually dry west prong of the Medina River, covered by the permit, is part of a "navigable stream."

Garrison fought two sides in the arguments before the appellate court, because the Commission's attorney said he would rather the court uphold the rule than the permit, even though both were issued by the Water Rights Commission.

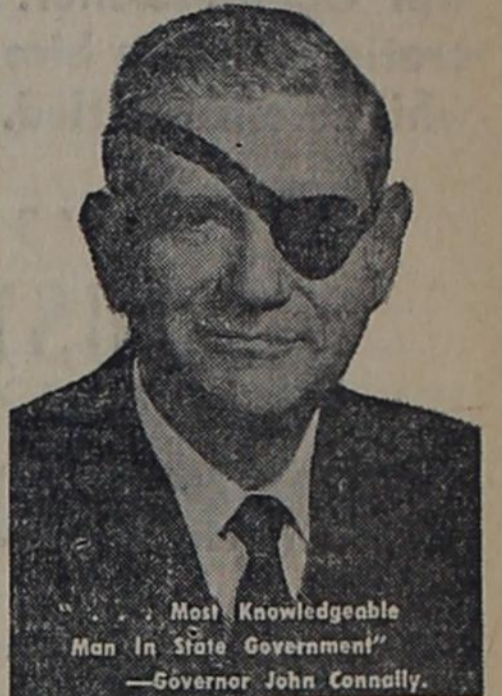

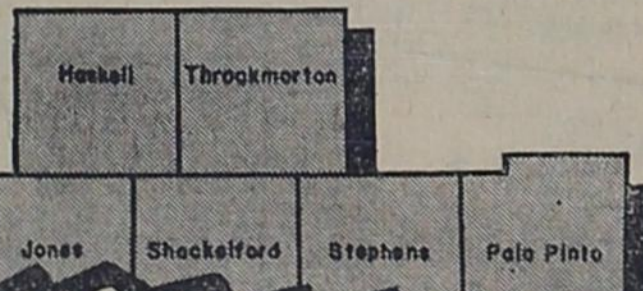

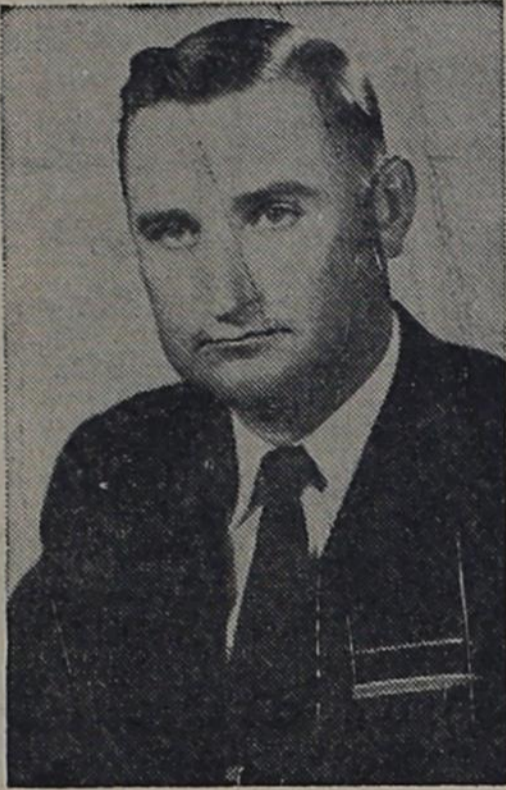

Where I Stand On.....

FREE ENTERPRISE

"I am not one of those who apologizes for or takes a defensive attitude toward the free enterprise system. It doesn't need defending. It's the best system ever devised for satisfying the material needs and aspirations of the people. There is room for improvement, of course, but this can be done without altering the basic principles which make it function."

FEDERAL BUREAUCRACY

"I believe that too much control of our government's affairs has passed out of the hands of Congress, and into the hands of the regulatory and administrative agencies. This authority, which has been lost by default, must be re-claimed by the Congress. The trend of surrendering authority to agencies and commissions—who are supposed to administer the laws instead of making them—should be halted. I think it is time that Congress recognize this usurpation of its power and authority for what it is: government by bureaucracy. When Congress loses its authority, then the people lose theirs, for Congress is the voice of the people."

GOVERNMENT SPENDING

"There is no justification for deficit spending except during times of national emergency. I think all new proposals for spending should be carefully screened and that a determined stand be made against unnecessary spending. These are prosperous times, and it is now that we should be paying the national debt, rather than creating more of it. If we don't pay off our national debt during good times, when do we pay it?"

VIET NAM

"I will always support an unyielding stand against communism, and I feel that there is no other tenable position for us to take in Viet Nam than that which the President has so firmly taken. We cannot be soft toward an ideology that has set out to destroy our own way of life. At all times, of course, I believe we should keep the doors open for possible negotiations that would bring about a peaceful solution to open conflicts such as we have in Viet Nam. Our goal in Viet Nam is to stop aggression on the part of the communists toward a peaceful people who have every right to seek their own destiny."

OIL AND GAS

"I will support legislation aimed toward bringing about a healthier oil and gas industry. This is a prime business—an indispensable business—to our District, and contributes substantially to the welfare of us all. As to the 27½% oil depletion allowance, I am in full accord with it and would resist any measure that would seek to change it to the disadvantage of the industry and the District."

EDUCATION

"Education is the single most important function of an enlightened society. We must make it as accessible as possible, for as many as possible, without either reducing our scholastic standards or jeopardizing our traditional academic freedom. I will favor legislation that broadens our educational base, insofar as it does so without giving the Federal Government control over our curricula. The selection of textbooks and the teaching of subjects should be left exclusively in the hands of the local schools, without infringement of any kind on the part of the government."

"I am also interested in seeing our schools extend their efforts in the direction of more technical and vocational training, and would support legislation that would encourage this. I feel that this would lessen the high drop-out rate, as well as provide useful training to those who do not have an opportunity to go to college. This would also enhance the national employment picture, as the overall demand for trained technicians and specialized workers in nearly all fields is greater than the supply."

"As your Congressman, I would support legislation that would give a tax relief to parents of students enrolled in colleges. Such a bill should allow tax deductions for the amount put out for academic expenses such as tuition, fees, and books, or perhaps give the parents an additional standard tax exemption similar to the present \$600 exemptions allowed for dependents. Such educational exemptions, of course, would continue only for the established four year period."

"It is my firm conviction that we cannot legislate poverty out of existence, but we can go a long way toward eliminating it through education."

JUDICIAL SYSTEM

"As a former District Judge and District Attorney, I am extremely proud of the lead the legal profession has traditionally taken in the affairs of our government. Especially do I hold our courts in high esteem."

"To keep our court system above the criticism and reproach it has occasionally undergone in the past, I would introduce and urge passage of legislation that would prescribe basic qualifications for Judges appointed to the federal judiciary. In addition I think it would be desirable to establish a mandatory retirement age, and a procedure for removing judges when they become unfit for service because of health or other reasons."

NATIONAL DEFENSE

"I will always be a strong advocate of a national defense force large enough and modern enough to maintain our peace and security anywhere it might be threatened. Such a force should be second to none in the quality of its personnel, its leadership, and its weaponry. I believe such a force can be achieved and maintained without a wasteful expenditure of the taxpayer's money."

WATER CONSERVATION

"There is no greater problem facing our District than the need for adequate water, now and in the future. I will support any feasible legislation that promises to create greater water resources for our area. Obviously, such legislation is a must, because we don't have enough water as it is, and to neglect it further would be to compound a tragedy. The problem is of such magnitude that it is going to require great study, imagination and vision to solve it. I, for one, am ready to begin."

AGRICULTURE

"I believe the present Omnibus Farm Bill places too much authority in the hands of the Agricultural Department and its Secretary. As a case in point, there is the arbitrary policy ruling by the Agricultural Department, that adversely affects the farmer by altering skip-row planting practices. I would favor farm legislation that would take into consideration the different and varying characteristics from one farming region to another. Especially would I work diligently to amend the program to again permit the kind of skip-row planting that the farmer of this district wants and needs."

LABOR LEGISLATION

"I have always favored the right of labor to organize for the purpose of achieving desirable objectives for its working members."

I also support the principle of collective bargaining, as it is the only just way to reach a livable balance between labor and management."

I do not believe that either labor or management should be allowed to walk rough-shod over the other. It takes both to produce the goods and manufacture the wealth in which we all share, and both have legitimate viewpoints which must be evaluated and adjudicated equitably in any controversy between them."

I do not favor any act or measure that would directly or indirectly compel anyone to become a member of any labor, trade, or business organization on a mandatory basis. This, to me, is a dangerous encroachment on the freedom of the individual."

VETERAN'S AFFAIRS

"As an overseas veteran of World War II myself, I am a supporter of the broad objectives of the Veterans' Program, and I particularly endorse the educational provisions of the G. I. Bill and the extensions of it to include veterans of recent conflicts. As to future legislation for veterans, I will give due consideration to any measure that will tangibly improve the lot of the veteran without putting an unfair penalty on other segments of the population."

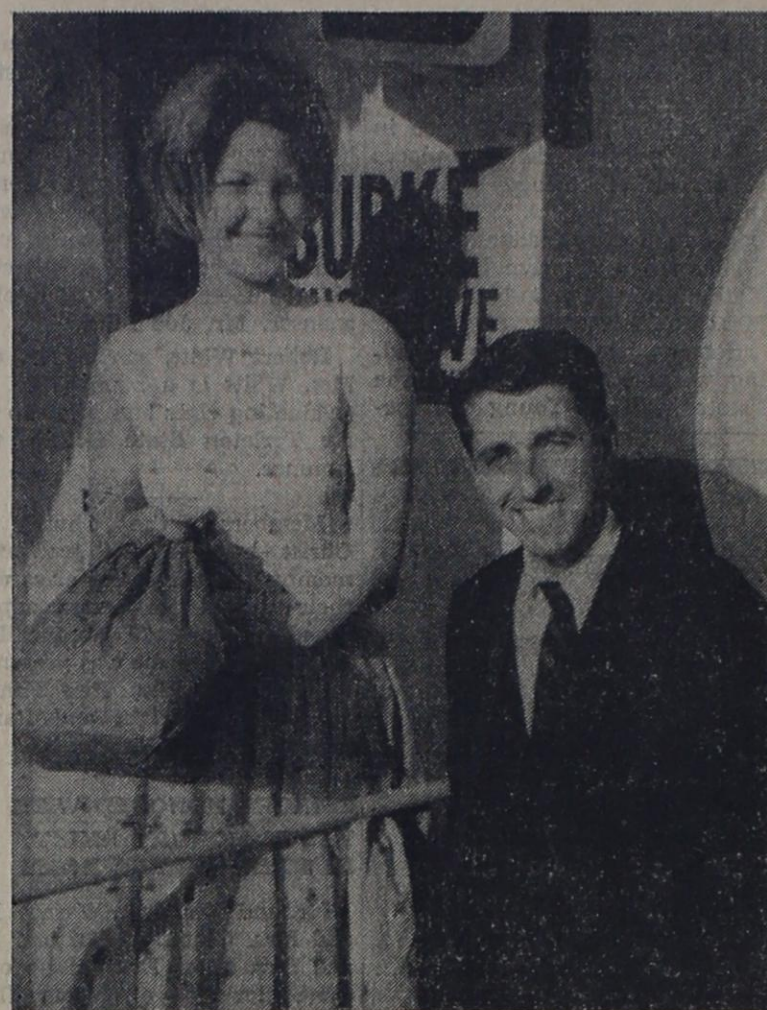

Dallas, Texas - New Tax Withholding Tables and Instructions for the 65 to 70 million persons who will be affected by the Tax Adjustment Act of 1966 are enroute to the IRS Regional Service Centers for labeling and mailing. IRS Director Ellis Campbell, Jr., announced today. The rates at which tax is withheld have been revised to more closely approximate the rates upon which year-end liability is based. However, this is not a tax increase, since the taxpayer's total yearly liability will not be affected.

Although new withholding rates were to become effective May 1, IRS is expediting information to give employers and employees the necessary new withholding system forms.

To make it as easy as possible for employers and employees to comply with the withholding provisions of the new act, IRS has included in the Employer's Tax Guide not only the new tax tables but a one-page fact sheet with sample tables and a new W-4 for employees.
