A large quantity of news releases, magazines and papers are received by publishers each month. Many reach the waste basket without being opened but some are worth reading. Tuesday night, while taking a brief rest, I picked up a copy of "The Texas Tax Journal". It is published by Frank R. Connally, 717 Littlefield Bldg., Austin. The magazine has several thought-provoking articles - especially the following:

BAND OF SILENCE

Writing in Nation's Business, Alden H. Sypher, retired editor and life-long journalist, noted that "Government by fear is causing bands of silence to fall across the land . . ."

"Noise, still rises from bearded builders of dissension but in increasing numbers the more responsible, mature and highly qualified people are withdrawing from public discussion . . ."

He goes on to say that the inclination toward silence is "restricting the exchange of ideas that could result in honest consensus. It is the product of fear - the fear of a vastly increased central authority with tremendous power and little restraint in its use."

"The fear of farmers whose livelihood is largely controlled in Washington and whose product prices have been affected by stockpile manipulations."

"Of businessmen who have seen controls become effective not by law, nor uniform patterns, but by unbearable pressure of central power and authority."

"Of educators who have seen sudden withdrawal of federal funds for failure to conform - and just as sudden replacement of the funds through intervention not by educators, but by political figures."

"Of city leaders who see in the anti-poverty war new political alignments that may be directed or at least greatly influenced by Washington."

"Of little people who rest uneasily under the benevolence of power they have seen unleashed, over which they have no control."

And, says the Oregon Voter, "beyond the self-imposed silence and fear of economic repercussions, there lies the historically proven danger of becoming a subservient, obedient and abject people. Thus, the more we fear and the longer we stay silent, the greater are our chances of becoming weak-self-committed captives."

Several, seeing my name listed as one of the delegates from this precinct appointed to attend the Democratic County Convention Saturday, have questioned my being a Democrat. Yes, I am a Democrat, and I come from a long line of Democrats. Yes, I have voted against several so-called Democrat "politicians" because I felt they were controlled and influenced and did not have the majority of the peoples' interest at heart.

For instance, I fear the elimination of Section 14-B of the Taft Hartley Act and the passage of House Bill 8282.

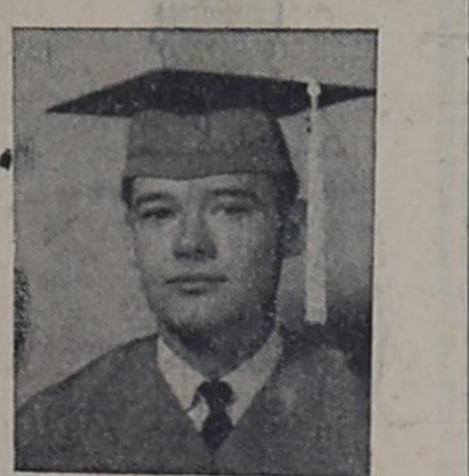

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HIGHLIGHTS And SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

AUSTIN, Texas — Although the poll tax now is officially dead, as a voting requirement, the fight over registration procedures continues.

U. S. Supreme Court, as expected, agreed with a three-judge federal court here that the 74-year-old levy is unconstitutional. Court already had stated in a Virginia case that a state is prohibited from placing a charge on the right to vote.

Action, however, was necessary to place in full effect the voter registration law passed by the Texas Legislature in special session last February.

Texas voters still will cast ballots next November on a proposed state constitutional amendment to "repeal" the poll tax. Same amendment provides that an annual registration system will replace the levy.

Some groups are urging defeat of the November amendment. This so that annual registration

will not be built into the state constitution. They will continue their drive for a permanent registration plan, whereby a voter once registered remains eligible simply by voting regularly in elections.

New Election Law Study Committee indicated it will devote much of its effort to improving the system enacted under emergency circumstances. Committee has requested that suggestions in general for amending Texas election laws be submitted to the Texas Legislative Council before June 30.

COURT SPEAKS — Should federal court-ordered principle of equal population for congressional and legislative districts apply to county commissioners precincts as well?

State Supreme Court heard arguments on the question in a suit filed by Midland Mayor H. C. (Hank) Avery to bring the one-man-one-vote theory to precinct level. If court agrees, major changes could result in county government throughout Texas.

Opponents said Texas Constitution provides that precincts will be created "for the convenience of the people."

High Court also agreed to review a May 25 suit to void Jefferson County contracts for replacement of Pleasure Island Bridge to Port Arthur.

After a 13-week trial, a Travis County District court jury held that more than \$1,000,000 was "misappropriated" from Lumberman's Insurance Corporation of Dallas as the result of a scheme involving bankers and an insurance agency owner.

AG RULES — Texas State Library and Historical Commission may make direct monetary grants to local public library units under federal act, subject to approval of state plan, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr held.

In other opinions, the attorney general has ruled that:

— Cigarette vending machines operated on a military reservation are subject to the regular permit fees.

— Residence in which the Cameron Independent School District superintendent lives is tax exempt, since it is owned and maintained by the district to encourage qualified personnel, and there fore serves a "public purpose."

— Acquittal of the charge of driving while intoxicated, second offense, would bar a subsequent prosecution for driving while intoxicated, first offense.

— Registration fees may be paid by state for Veterans Land Board appraisers attending an appraisal school at Texas A&M.

— Trust agreement for investment of perpetual care funds may be amended to permit investment in corporate stocks and other investments authorized by Texas Trust Act.

DPS NEEDS RECRUITS — Col Homer Garrison, director for the Department of Public Safety, is looking for applications for the next DPS training school for patrolmen. Application deadline is June 6.

Garrison said training pay has been increased from \$375 to \$400 a month. Pay will be \$468 to \$484 upon graduation. Men between 21 and 35 are accepted for the 16-week training program. They pick their branch of service and are assigned to posts throughout the state.

FLOOD AID SOUGHT — Gov. John Connally has requested the President to declare 19 northeast Texas counties as part of a major disaster area as a result of heavy rains and floods.

His initial request for federal emergency relief funds for rehabilitation of public facilities total \$1,500,000.

The 19 counties included are Bowie, Camp, Cass, Collin, Fannin, Freestone, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Lamar, Marion, Morris, Navarro, Rains, Red River, Rusk, Shelby, Titus and Upshur. Others may be added in a supplemental request when damage estimates are complete. At least 13 other counties suffered flood damage.

Connally pointed out that rains and flooding in the lower Rio Grande and along the Texas coast may require assistance to that area. Allocation of funds is made

on the basis of surveys conducted jointly by local, state and federal agencies.

WATER — Texas Water Development Board decided to enter a master agreement with the Sulphur River Municipal Water District, North Texas Municipal Water District, the City of Irving and the U. S. Corps of Engineers to pay part of the cost of construction of Cooper Dam Reservoir and Texarkana Reservoir.

Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, Army Corps of Engineers, has approved the Aquilla Reservoir on Aquilla Creek.

Board recommended construction of a \$23,600,000 dam and reservoir for flood control, water supply, recreation and fish and wildlife enhancement between Hillsboro and Waco.

Texas Water Rights Commission announced plans and specifications for Livingston Dam and Reservoir in Polk and San Jacinto Counties. Design calls for construction of an earthen embankment on an over-consolidated, low-strength clay. Project would be major water source for Houston.

TEXTBOOK COMMITTEE — Texas' 15-member State Textbook Committee has been appointed by the State Board of Education. Committee has the job of evaluating more than 225 textbook offerings and deciding which five in each subject should be offered for school board adoption.

HIGHWAYS DAMAGED — An estimated \$961,000 worth of damage was done to Texas highways in April by the floods which hit many parts of the state.

Dallas, Tyler and Atlanta districts were hurt the most.

State Highway Department estimated flood damage to highways and roads in the Atlanta and Tyler areas at \$250,000 each in April, and Dallas' district (May figures not included), \$200,000. In other districts, damage was estimated at \$25,000, Paris; \$75,000, Fort Worth; \$37,000, Waco; \$25,000, Houston; \$2,500, Yoakum; \$10,000, Austin; \$11,000, Beaumont; and \$75,000, Del Rio. In the 11 months prior to May, highway damage from floods had totaled only \$360,000 for all 25 districts.

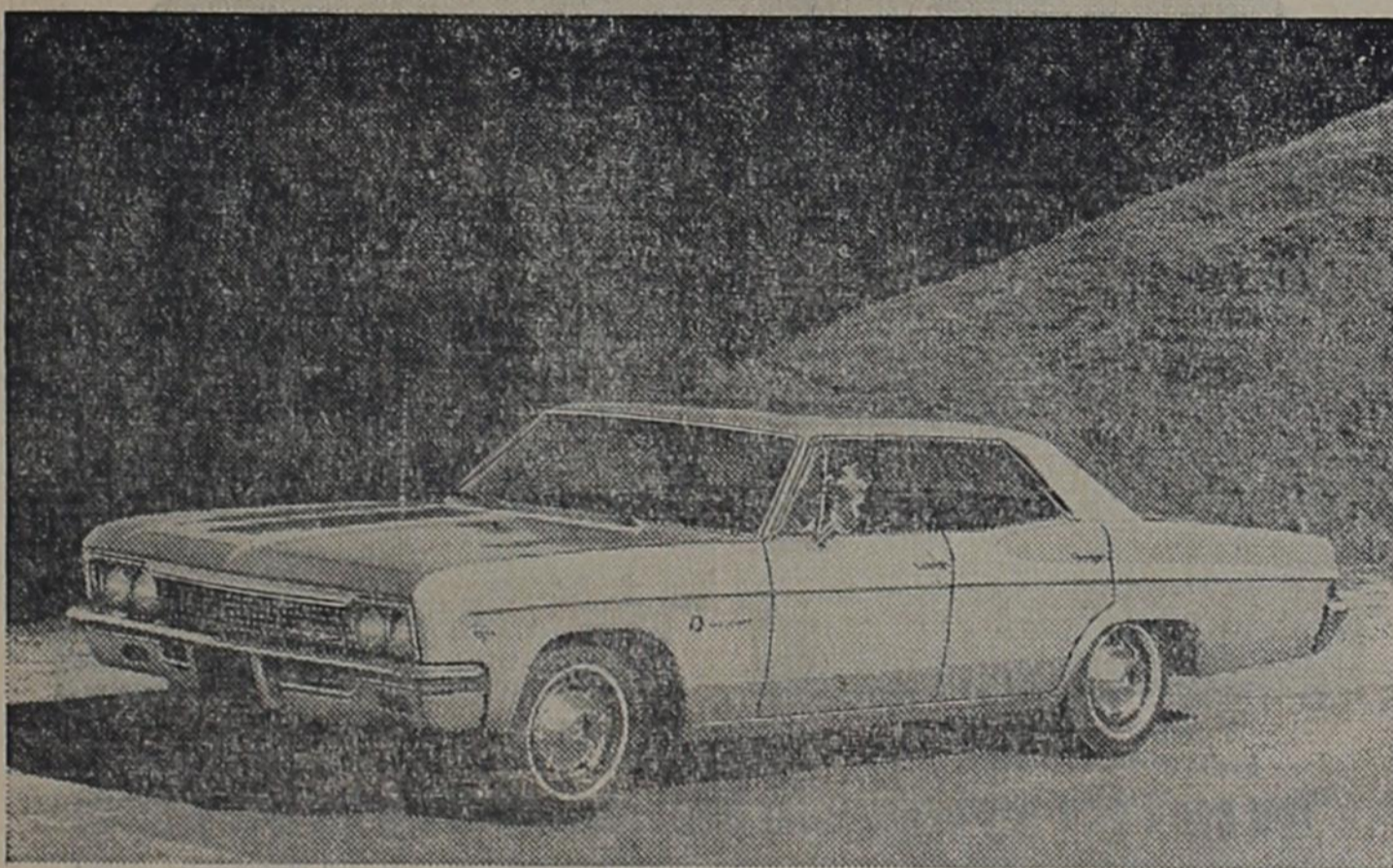

Postmaster Baze today urged local citizens who have funds on deposit in the abolished Postal Savings System to convert their holdings into United States Savings Bonds.

"Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien, who is Chairman of the Federal Savings Bonds Campaign, has appealed to the 930,000 Americans who have \$285,000,000 on deposit with the Post Office Department to convert their investments into United States Savings Bonds," Mr. Baze stated.

"I join him in urging local citizens, who have Postal Savings Accounts, to make that change which will be of great benefit to both themselves and our country. Savings Bonds offer every advantage of convenience and security formerly available through Postal Savings Certificates, plus many other advantages unique to Savings Bonds.

"Among those special advantages, are Savings Bonds' new, higher interest rate of 4.15 per cent and the great intangible benefit of supporting our country in the fight for freedom in the world and for economic progress and security here at home," Baze added.

Mr. Baze said details about the procedure for conversion can be obtained from the postmaster of any Postal Savings Depository Post Office.

The Postal Savings System, in operation since January 1, 1911, was discontinued April 27, 1966 by Act of Congress. The Post Office Department presently is liquidating its accounts and on July 1, 1967, will transfer all unclaimed assets of the System to the Treasury Department.

The decision to abolish the Postal Savings System was made because of declining interest in it by the general public as a savings and investment medium. Higher interest rates paid by financial institutions and other means of investment had attracted the bulk of funds which formerly went into Postal Savings and the convenience factor was negated by expanded hours of service by banks.

The original purposes of the Postal Savings System were to (1) get money out of hiding, (2) attract the savings of Immigrants who were accustomed to saving at post offices in their native countries, (3) provide safe depositories for people who had lost confidence in private banks, and (4) provide more convenient depositories for savings of working people who were unable to bank during regular banking hours.

"Those purposes have long since been fulfilled," Postmaster Baze commented, "and, as Mr. O'Brien has emphasized, no greater new purpose could now be served by funds on deposit in the Postal Savings System than to put them to work for America in the form of United States Savings Bonds," Baze concluded.

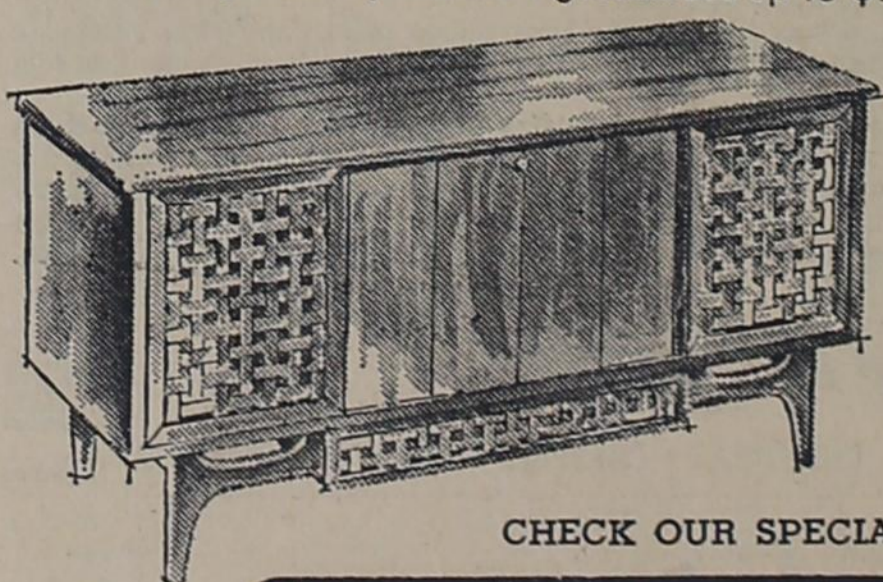

Browsing with Bev

As we continue to honor our county's Senior Citizens during National Senior Citizens' Month, let's look at a couple more ideas for making use of our state's most valuable resource, our Senior Citizen.

Curbstone Conference: Combine business with pleasure with an informal meeting at the civic center, high school gymnasium, or other large meeting place. Enlist local resource people from social security, welfare, health department, medical society, etc. to answer questions of concern to elderly citizens. Locate resource people at tables in one area of the room, maintaining an informal setting. In another area of the meeting room provide table games and/or other entertainment. Serve light refreshments.

Recognition of Outstanding Senior Citizen: This might be done in each town. This selection can be made either by a committee or by popular vote. If popular vote is used, set up simple criteria for the selection (age limit, number of years in city, contributions to city's growth and development, etc.) Ask your local newspaper and radio to publicize the event and encourage participation. Arrange for special announcements to be made at civic clubs explaining the basis for the selection and encouraging participation by club members in nominating worthy candidates. The newspaper might run a printed ballot that can be completed and returned to the committee. Plan a special event for the announcement of the outstanding citizen and presentation of a certificate or recognition. The final selection and announcement should be made as near the middle of the month as possible. This will provide sufficient time for publicity promoting the selection and time for the outstanding citizen to participate officially in special activities.

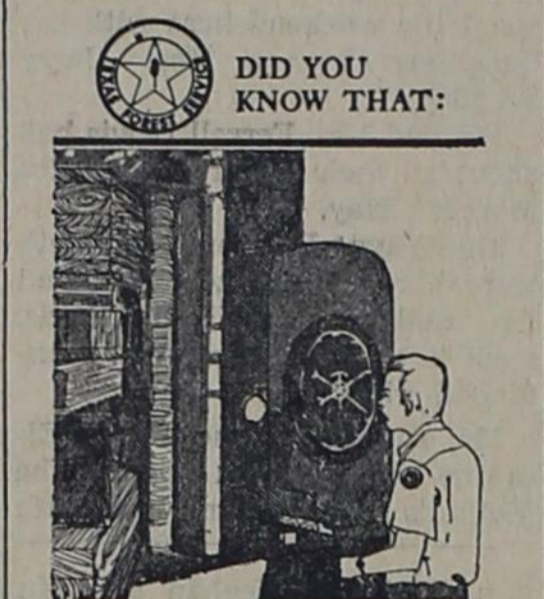

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

As every housewife knows, the cost of living, especially food prices, have been escalating rapidly, with all predictions they will soar still higher.

While there are several factors involved in this trend of ballooning food prices, a major one has been the interference in farming last season by Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz.

Because of his refusal to let growers, especially in California, have labor to harvest, the tomato crop was short. The Labor Department statistics on cost of living shows that between November 1965 and December 1965, the price paid by consumers for canned tomatoes shot up an astounding 1.4 per cent.

The late Rep. John Baldwin before he died compiled figures showing what the Wirtz policies did not only to the price of canned white asparagus to the domestic consumers, but also to the U.S. balance of trade problem.

The Congressman pointed out that the four year average, 1960 through 1964 of white asparagus was 2,058,150. In 1965, because it was impossible to harvest the crop, the pack dropped to 1,269,000 case, or a decrease of 52%.

Grocery stores prices in the product have thus skyrocketed, and at family dinner tables all over the country when it comes time to say grace there is perhaps lifted heavenward a fervent thanks that Wirtz has.

made it possible to do without asparagus. ***

Even more serious in the long range national viewpoint is the fact that canned white asparagus had been built up over the years as a major export item. Congressman Baldwin says that in 1963 and 1964 more than 50 per cent of all canned vegetable items exported by the U.S. were accounted for by white asparagus.

He further reported that while the export value of canned asparagus had been running close to \$16 million, the Wirtz actions have cut this in half, for a loss to U.S. export business of around \$8 million.

If there is added to this loss, the estimated \$6½ million dollar loss in unharvested asparagus, plus lost wages to cannery workers and truckers, the total can run to \$20 million or more.

In addition, if added to this are the losses on tomatoes, strawberries, and other items, plus the extra costs being paid by consumer, it probably would add up to somewhere around a half billion dollars.

So, to paraphrase a famous item of Churchilliana, it could perhaps be said "That never before has a single bureaucrat cost so many so much."

Or to paraphrase another quotation "Consider the bureaucrats. They have neither toiled nor spun, yet are dressed in the finest of raiment and are always ready to interfere with those who do toil and spin." It is awesome to contemplate that one man can cost people a half billion dollars. Even mighty Caesar could not have gotten away with this kind of nonsense.

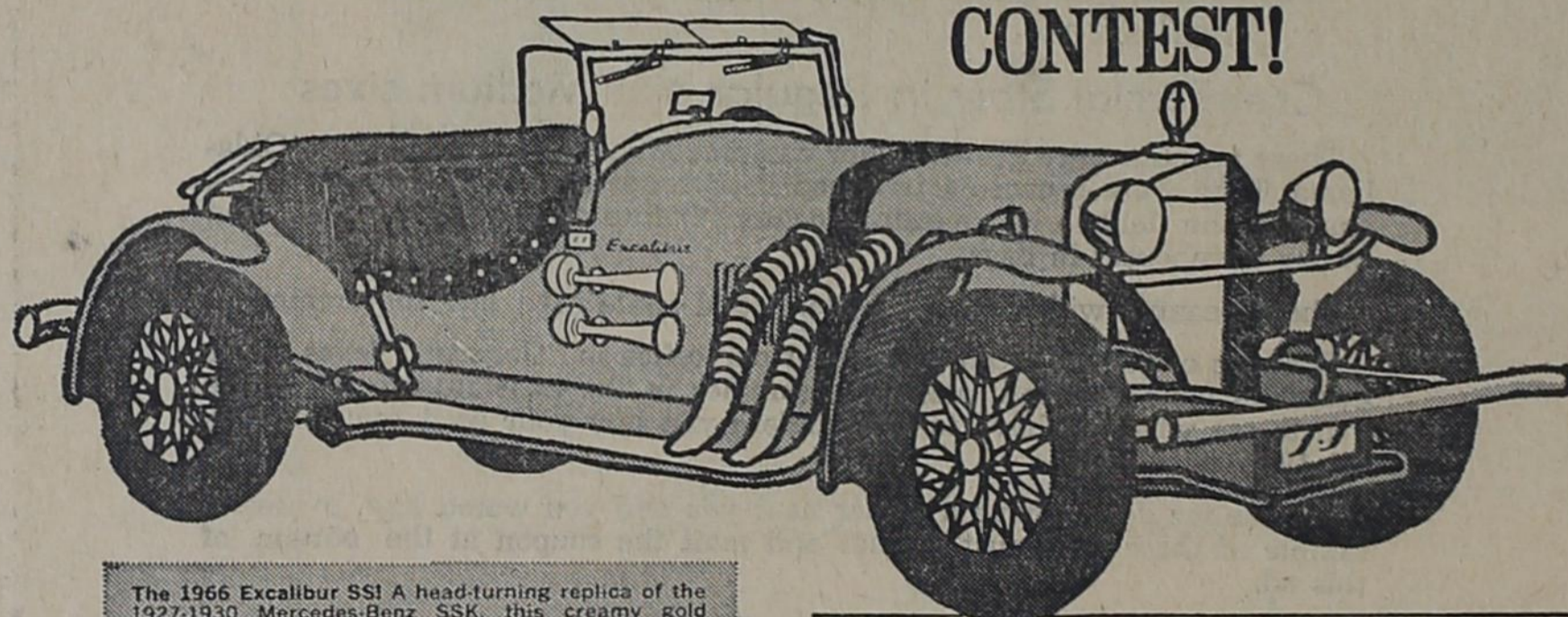

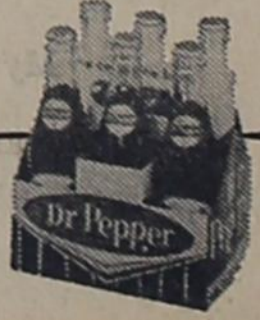

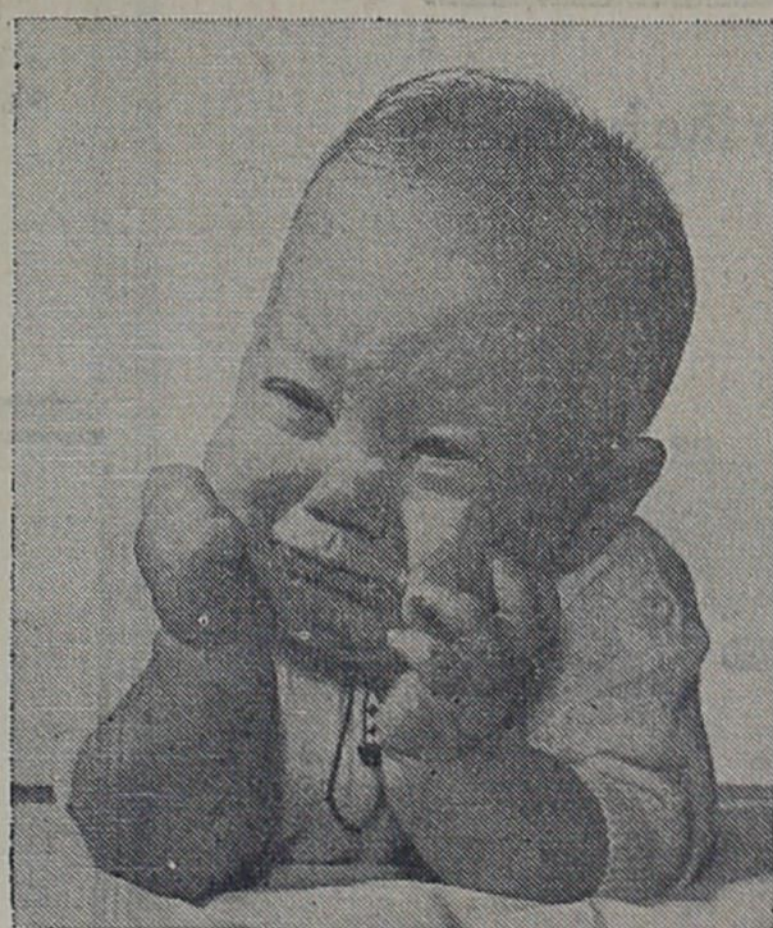
