Ross Wilson Appointed To State Agriculture Study Committee

Mr. Ross Wilson has been appointed a member of the State Agriculture Study Committee. The members of this committee are appointed by the Board of Directors of Texas A&M University. The purpose is to make a comprehensive study of Texas agriculture so that recommendations will result pointing the way for changes in agricultural legislation, agricultural curriculum in Texas colleges, water conservation and resource needs, and improvements through new and expanded research relating to agricultural commodities growing in Texas.

In a meeting held August 17 at A&M, Ross Wilson was elected Chairman of the Peanut and Oil Seed Crops Committee. This will include peanuts, castor beans, soy beans, flax, and safflower. Sub-committee reports and recommendations are to be completed by October 1, 1966; and the next meeting of the full committee will be October 12 at Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

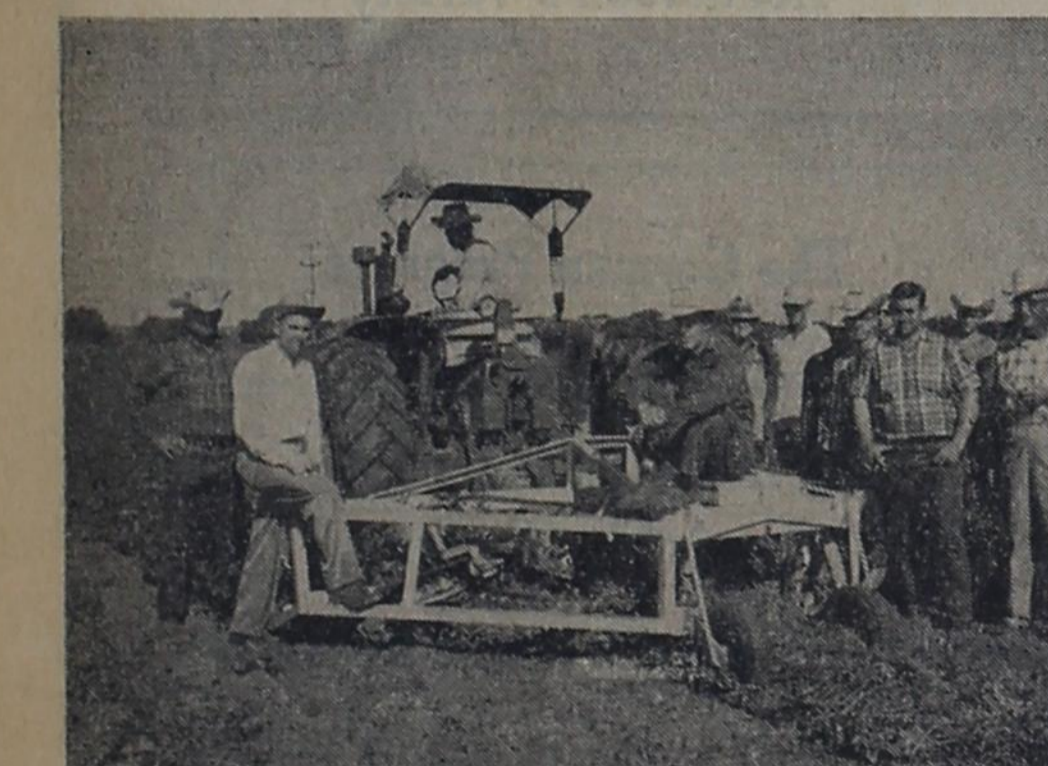

Mr. Morrow's son, Marvin, assisted with the demonstration. About one hundred farmers and men interested in peanuts were present for the demonstration.

Mr. Morrow, who has an engineering degree, stated he was raised on a farm and with the exception of a few years that he worked as an aeronautical engineer, has stayed with farming. He moved his family from Oklahoma to Texas in 1951, settling near Lubbock. In 1952 the Morrrows moved to Portales, New Mexico where they produced their first crop of cotton, peanuts, maize and sweet potatoes. They discovered conventional diggers couldn't be used and the family, which included four sons and one daughter, was doing all the work by hand. (Some of the farmers around Gorman can probably recall when they did the same thing.)

In 1957 Mr. Morrow got an idea for a digger by putting a bunch of nails in a board and a series of belts in a frame to symbolize a twist to turn the peanuts over. Some of his neighbors became interested, so the Morrow family built a 40x100 ft. barn to start working on machinery. In 1959 Mr. Morrow began perfecting the present machines on the market at present. Some of the machines are operating in South Texas and Oklahoma.

The ground was rather damp during the demonstration on Fuller's place but many of the farmers present were impressed by the neat way the peanuts were laid in one row so the sun could dry them faster.

Kernel's Note: During a meeting sponsored by the West Cross Timbers Peanut Growers' Association at the school auditorium the night before this demonstration, Robbie Robertson, manager of Gorman Peanuts, was asked to speak. During his short talk he stated they had compiled the following information at one buying point for the entire 1965 season on "time required to dry peanuts going into dryer at various moisture levels."

Thinking that this information might be of interest to peanut farmers who were not at the meeting, we are reproducing it.

He arrived Tuesday in Dallas and will be visiting this week with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Mehaffey.

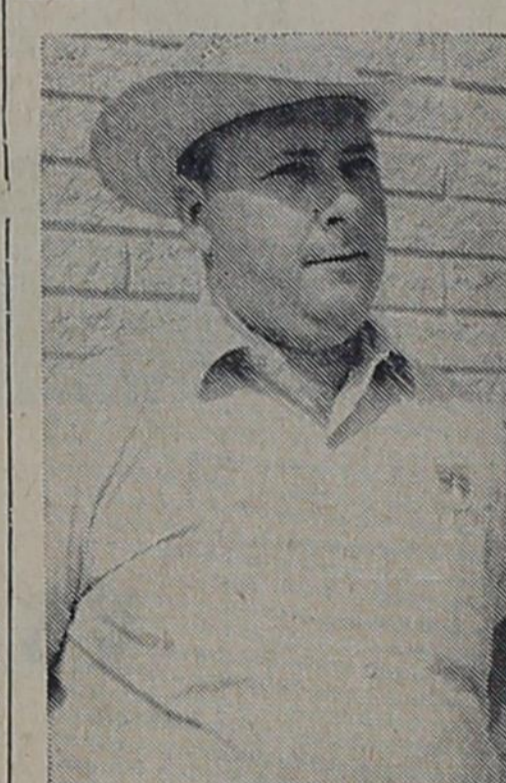
Panthers To Open Season At Evant On Friday At 7:30

The Panthers have been working very hard in preparation for the oncoming season and have shown much spirit and determination in drills and scrimmages.

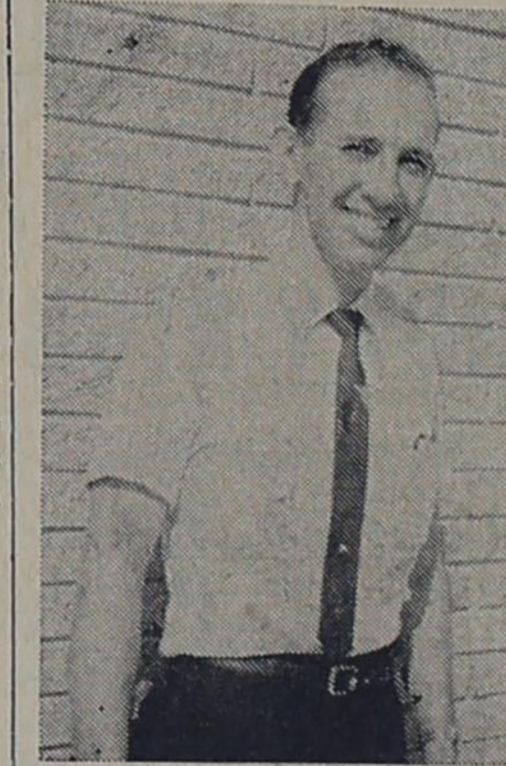
Weldon Locke And Paul Huffman Join Lone Star Gas Staff

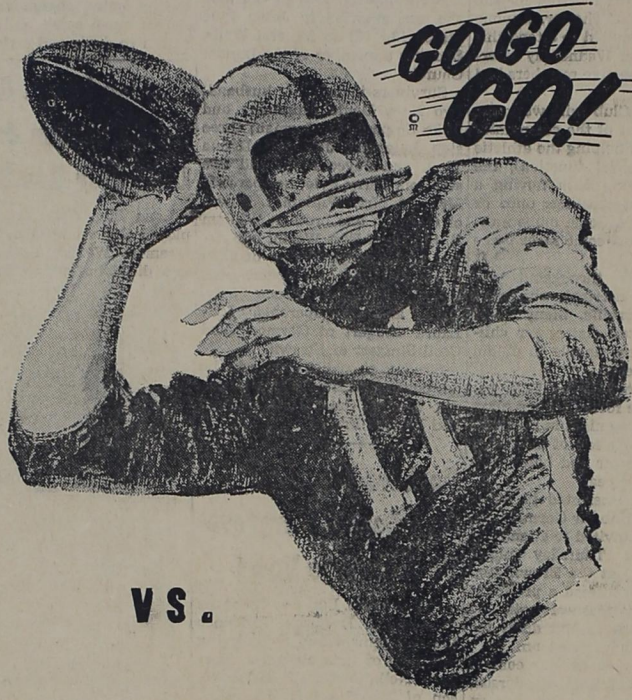

Browsing with Bev

Here are some interesting and helpful hints on shopping for shoes.

When you shop for shoes, put your largest foot forward. It's the best foot for measuring, since this helps get a better fit. The difference between one shoe size and the next is a mere 1/16th of an inch. A shoe should fit comfortably when bought.

Foot measurements frequently vary according to the time of day. During the afternoon, the foot is about midpoint in size. This is the best time to shop for shoes.

As shoe style change, so do sizes. Changing from a sedentary job to an active one can also cause a change in shoe size. When fitting shoes, try on both shoes and ask if you can walk on a hard surfaced floor. Your walking will be chiefly on hard surfaces, and this helps judge comfort. Try a combination last if a snugger heel fit is needed.

A good rule to follow when using electrical appliances in the home is one item per outlet. The use of a double socket is not wise, for soon families will get away from small items like lamps or clocks, and begin using bigger appliances. The result may soon be

Gorman Graduate To Enter Mission Work In Mexico Village

A young store official in Lubbock will take his savings accumulated over a period of 14 years and go to Mexico as a missionary this month.

He is Jack Bice, 1626 16th St., who expects to establish a home for children about 100 miles from Monterrey, Mexico, and to later seek to establish a village in southern Mexico.

Movie Interested Him
A few years ago Bice saw a movie about missionary work with Indian tribes in Mexico and he began studying information about Latin American countries. The idea developed that he wanted to be a missionary. Last January he began seriously making plans.

When he announced his intention to do mission work, he was endorsed by the church of which he is a member, Lakeview Baptist Church at 806 48th St., and was designated by the American Baptist Association as a Christian missionary—the designation

the association gives to missionaries who are not ministers. The association has headquarters in Texarkana, Arkansas.

Bice said he will not receive a salary from the association and plans to use his savings to begin the work on the home and for personal living expenses. He also plans to buy a few hundred head of goats and put them in the mountains, with a village man as headman.

Concerning money, he said, "I figure it will be there when I need it."

Finds Plans "Refreshing"

He said support has not been promised by churches, but that some might later help support the work, designating money for the purpose—which would be sent to Mexico by the American Baptist Association. He said his decision to go to Mexico was not dependent upon offer of support for the work, however.

Some people have expressed surprise that he would leave a comfortable position and home to go to work without a salary.

His answer is that, "I find it rather refreshing," and that, "I feel the Lord has blessed me in giving me a good job. I have saved some money and I want to go and help someone. I can't wait to get there."

Bice, a graduate of high school at Gorman and Draughon's Business College in Lubbock, has been employed by Sears Roebuck & Co. 14 years. The position he will leave is that of division manager of the carpet department, a position he has held since February. He formerly managed the paint and electric and boys' wear departments.

Departed August 19

Bice departed August 19 for Mexico. He expected to buy a panel truck before leaving and to use it to transport material to the home to be established and to transport children back and forth from the home to school.

In Monterrey, he will join the Rev. I. Rodriguez, missionary who has established a seminary there. Following language study at the seminary, he expects to begin building the home for children. It is expected to house some orphans but primarily will be established for children from mountain villages that do not have schools. The children would stay in the home while attending elementary school and would be transported back and forth to a nearby village for schooling, Bice said. They later likely would be transferred to the school directed by the Rev. Mr. Rodriguez at

It's Time For... EYE CARE

DEPTH PERCEPTION

There is a great deal of misconception about depth perception. It is possible to enjoy this phenomenon even if he has only one eye. The use of two eyes, naturally, heightens the effect of depth perception, but if you were to lose an eye, you would regain monocular depth perception very quickly. The employment of two eyes when viewing an object, enables us to "see around" it. That is, you see one side with one eye and the opposite side with the other. This increases your perspective because you see the object from two different angles.

Some one-eyed people are able to achieve a simulated type of normal depth perception by moving their eye rapidly from side. This gives an illusion of depth.

Once a person adapts to his one-eyed condition, his depth perception is almost as keen as the normal viewer. Some of you may recall Wiley Post, the famous aviator. He wore a patch on one eye to cover his blind eye. Even with this handicap he became one of America's most outstanding air pioneers.

Although the one-eyed person does have a restricted visual field, there are many animals whose eye placement is different from humans and who see the world vastly changed from the manner in which we view it. The horse and the rabbit are two common examples of this. They do not use the two eyes together but they have a much wider field of vision.

It is only when the eyes are placed in front of the head that the two will work together and provide binocular, or two-eyed depth perception.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

One of the greatest efforts being made by the bureaucrats along the Potomac is to prove Abe Lincoln was wrong.

As every schoolboy knows, it was Lincoln who said "You can fool part of the people all the time, all the people part of the time, but you cannot fool all the people all the time."

So far, the bureaucrats have been fooling, if not all the people, at least a good share of them, for C. W. Harder some time. There are indications, however, that this era may not last too much longer.

Senator Norris Cotton of New Hampshire recently put this entire matter of Federal expenditures into a different light which many people are beginning to see.

He says the Tax Foundation has come up with the data that if Uncle Sam were to seize all individual income over \$25,000 per year, there would be just enough to run the government for four days.

The same data also shows that if all income over \$10,000 per year was taken, there would be only enough to run the government at the present rate for 24 days.

Senator Cotton points out that in the Appropriations Committee on which he serves, consideration must now be given to government bureaus seeking money to run 100 programs at home, plus foreign give aways to some 100 nations.

The big fallacy in all this vast squandering of funds is the propaganda that somehow the "rich are being soaked."

But as the Senator says "the millions with small incomes pay the billions in taxes."

Congressman H. R. Cross, Iowa, points out that the Federal debt ceiling, "permanently" set at \$285 billion has now been "temporarily" raised to \$330 billion.

He also points out that even now the interest on this government debt is costing \$13 billion per year, will go higher.

Thus, the interest alone is taking more than half the income taxes collected from all corporations.

Or, to figure it another way, 25 cents out of every dollar of income tax paid by the individual is going to pay this interest.

There are signs that people are beginning to see this is ridiculous.

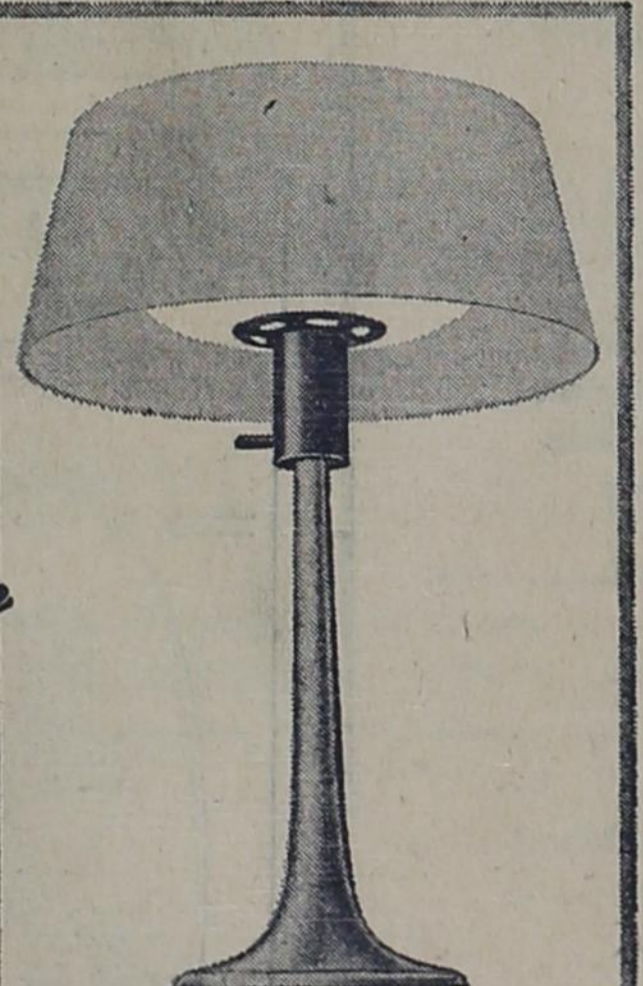
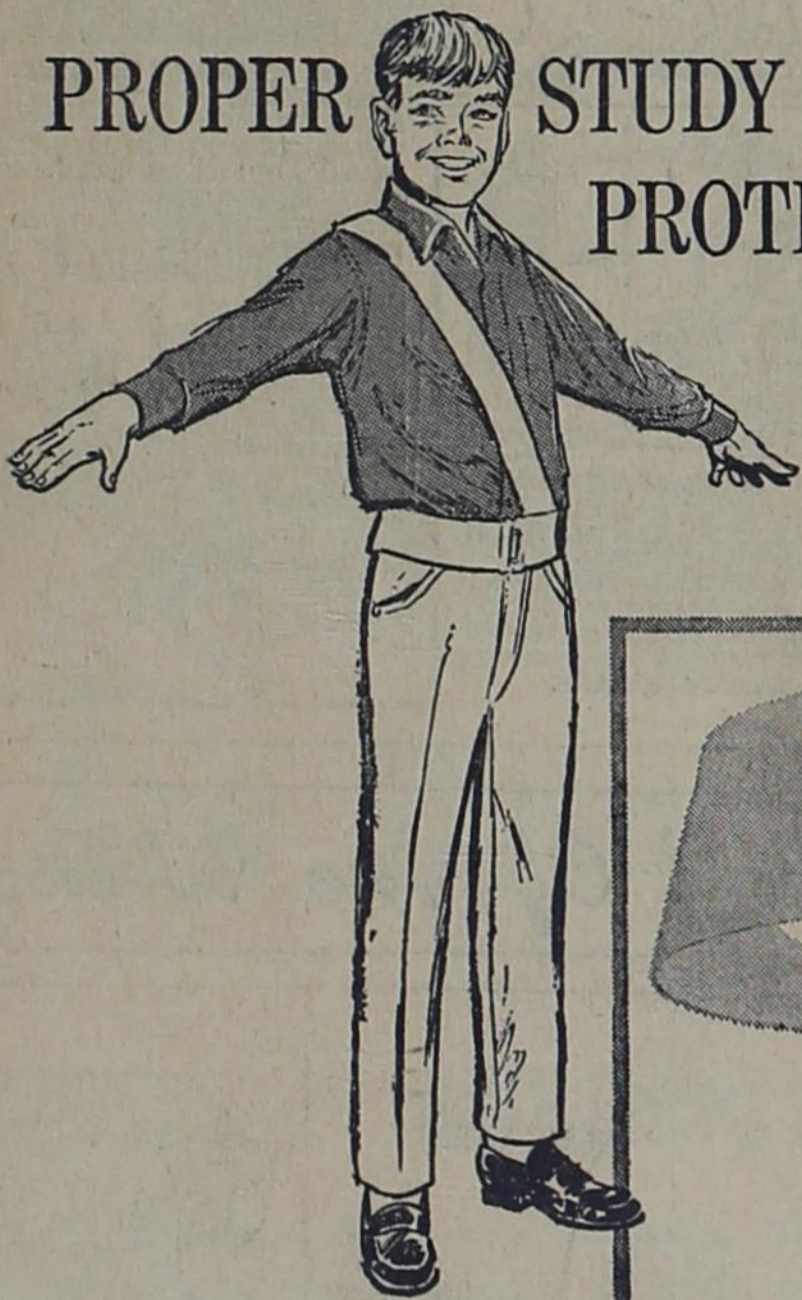
