Jay, Cu Bell as she is fondly known, also assisted at the store for many years.

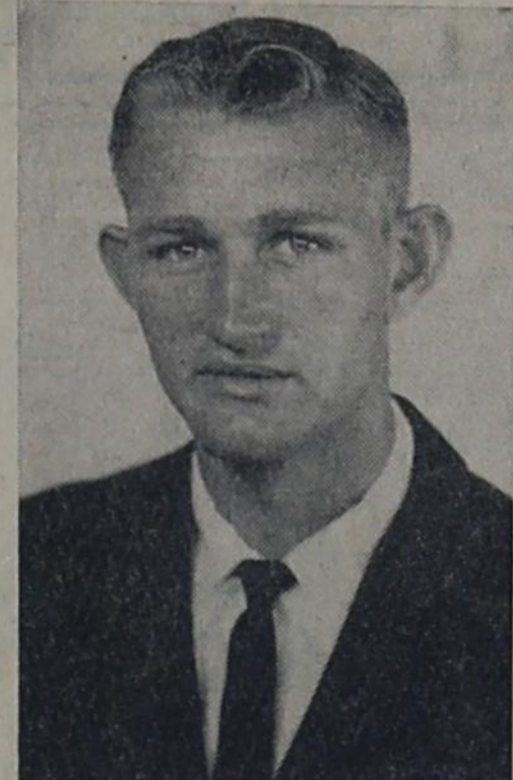

City Ordinance On Weeds & Unightly Debris To Be Enforced

In May the City Commission of Gorman adopted an ordinance on the control of weeds and unsightly debris on city property. This ordinance has been violated by many property owners and the commission will take the necessary steps to see that these properties are cleaned if owners do not take care of them soon.

The commission has had the city sprayed with insecticides to control mosquitoes and insects, however, an adequate job cannot be accomplished with all the tall grass and weeds growing on many lots. Soon the grass will be dry and will also become a fire hazard.

The City Commission asks owners of old junk automobiles to dispose of them, as many have been parked over a year on the streets. The commission also has received many complaints about vehicles being parked on the sidewalks and driveways of business firms. Motorists are asked to discontinue this way of parking.

Cooperation will be appreciated in the observance of the ordinance.

The ordinance is as follows: "An ordinance to protect the public health and promote the welfare of the City of Gorman, Texas, by providing for the filling up of drainage of lots that shall have unwholesome place or places where stagnant water may accumulate thereon; the cleaning of any building or premises of filth, carrion or other impure or unwholesome matter; requiring owners or occupants of lots in the City of Gorman to keep said lots free from weeds, rubbish, brush, and other unsightly or insanitary matter; providing for notice to be given to owners of premises in case of failure of owner to make lots and/or premises sanitary and sightly that the same may be done at the expense of the City of Gorman; providing for the fixing of a lein against such lots for such improvements; and declaring an emergency."

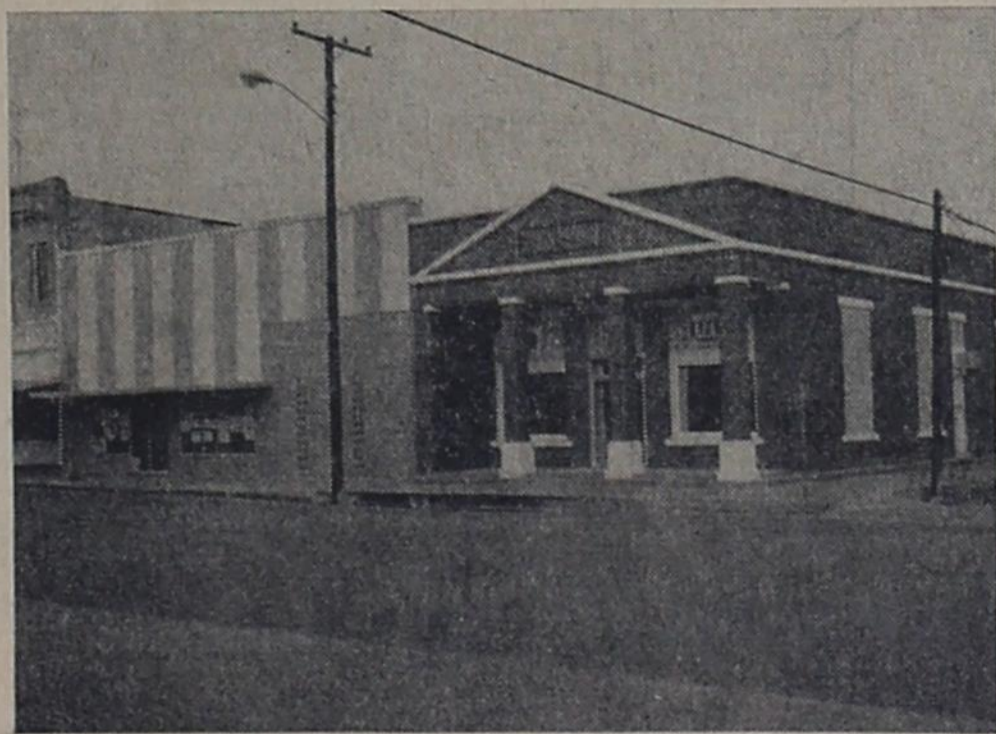

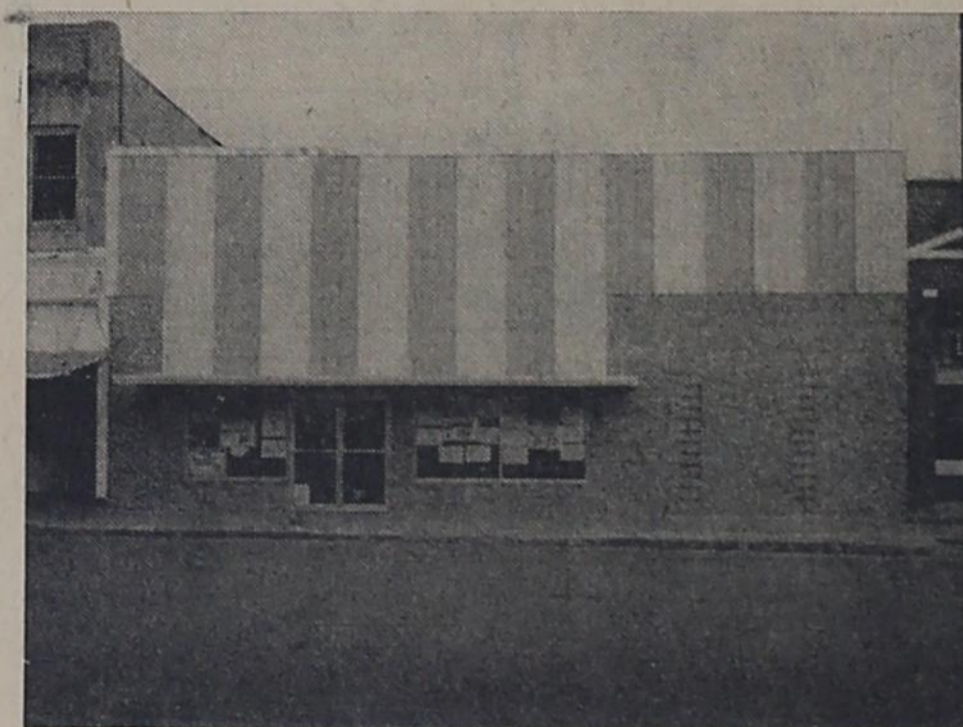

Browsing with Bev

Mushrooms, once used mainly in gourmet cooking, are being used for a wide variety of purposes. Mushrooms can be broiled, cauteed, simmered, marinated, and served raw in salads. They complement meat, poultry, fish, eggs and other vegetables, mushrooms are low in calories and rich in iron.

Fresh mushrooms should feel dry and firm. Small brown spots on the crown mean the mushroom is ripe, not spoiled. The size of a mushroom is not related to its age and does not have any particular effect on quality or taste.

If not used immediately, mushrooms should be refrigerated in a shallow tray covered by a soft, moist towel. Moisten the towel each day to keep the mushrooms fresh. When ready to use, run cold water over the mushrooms and wipe dry with a paper towel. Do not soak them. If you like, snip off the stems but do not peel the crowns. Much of a mushroom's nourishment and flavor is in the peel.

Never cook mushrooms more than ten minutes or they lose their natural moisture. Canned mushrooms may be used in place or fresh mushrooms except where raw mushrooms are specified. Crowns are best suited for stuffing and broiling and for garnishing meats. Buttons, slices and bits and pieces are best for sauces, gravies, soups, omelets and casseroles. Frozen mushrooms require little thawing and can always be used in place of fresh ones. Dehydrated mushrooms are often used in soups.

Never pick wild mushrooms to eat. Some are mildly poisonous, and only someone professionally trained can determine these poisonous species.

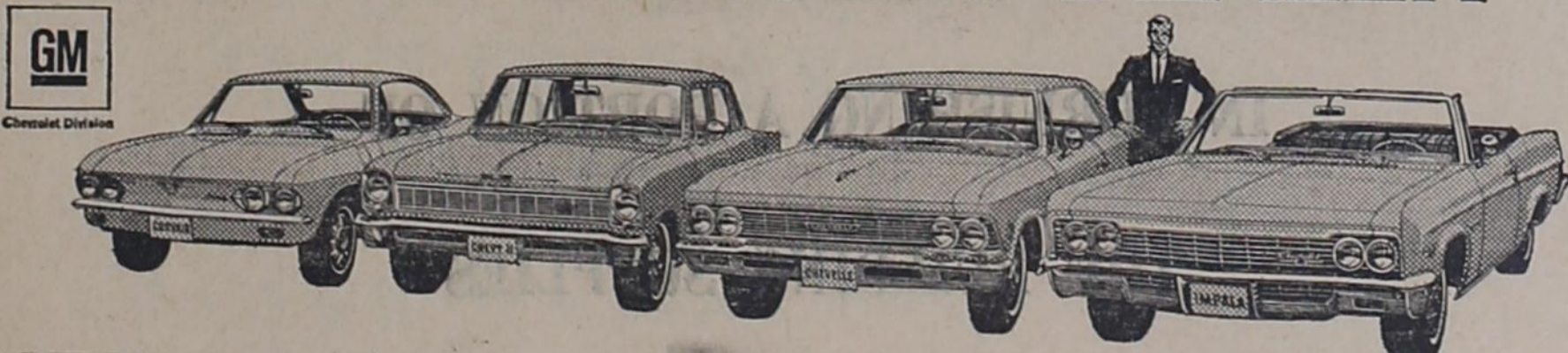
"This is the first time formal recognition has been accorded these hard-working dedicated individuals," Shepperd said.

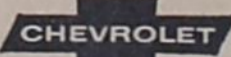

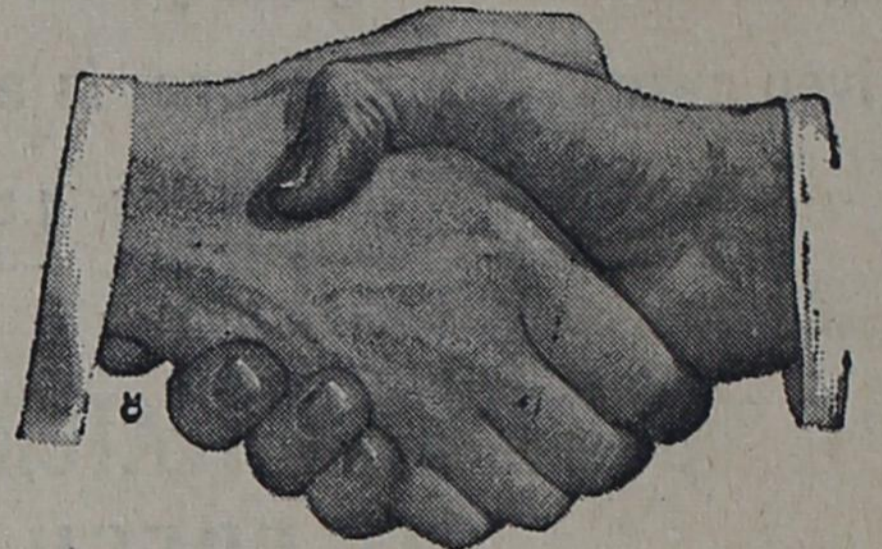

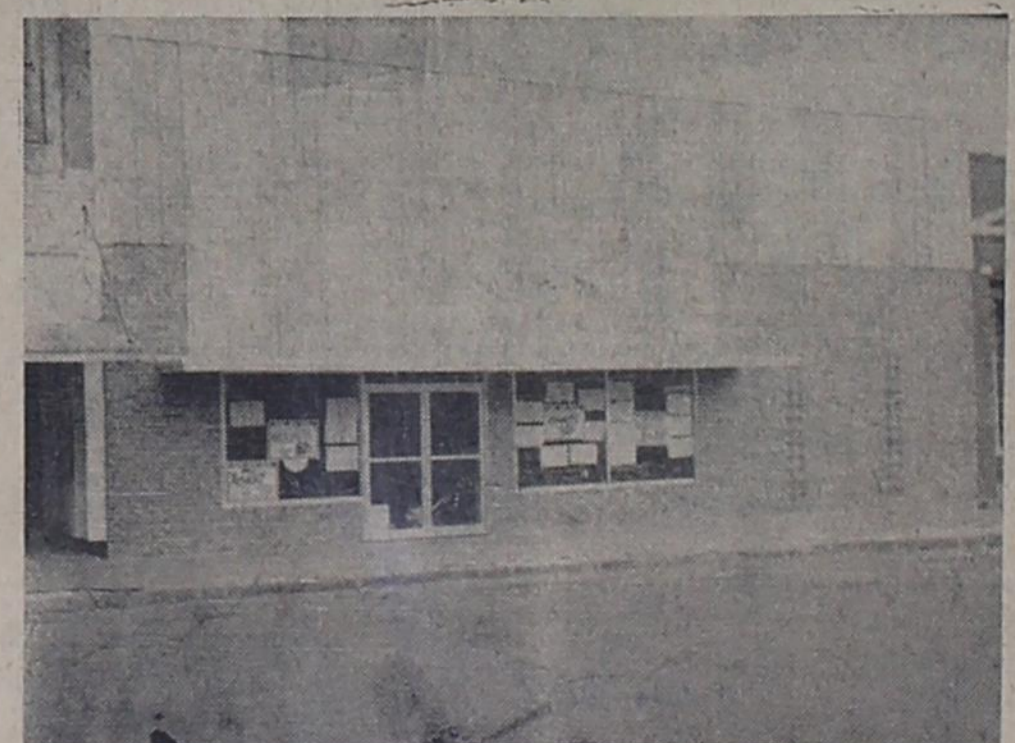
