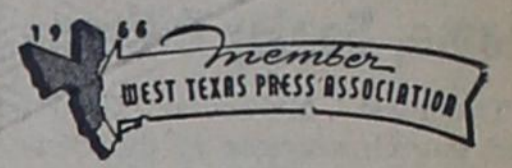

## Rainbow Of Fashions To Be Shown At 4-H County Dress Revue

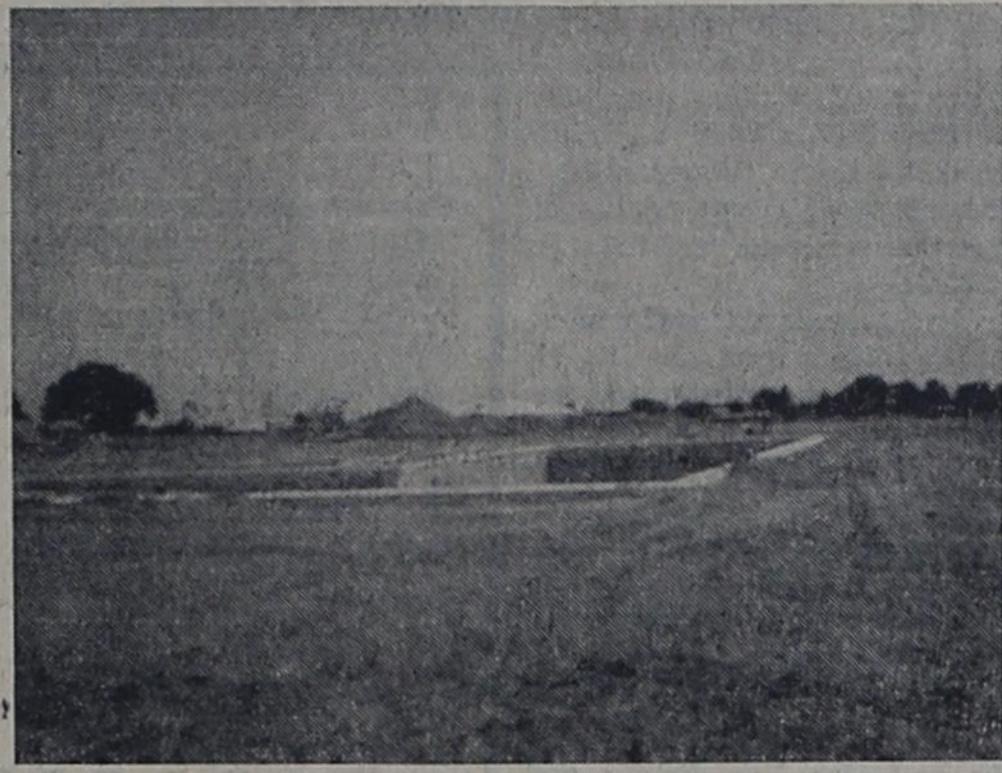

The garments which they model are made by the girls themselves and are judged on the girl, her posture, poise, grooming and attitude; the garment on the girl - general appearance, neat, becomingness, suitability of fabric, style, and color, the fit and the accessories chosen; the construction of the garment and the Dress Revue Record Book.

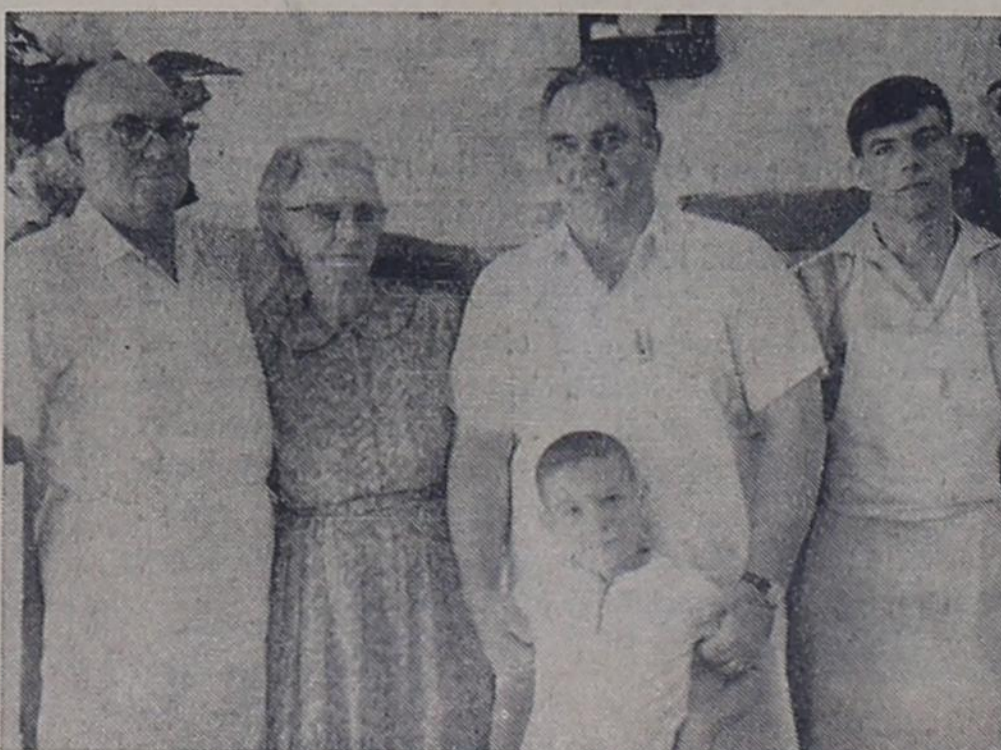

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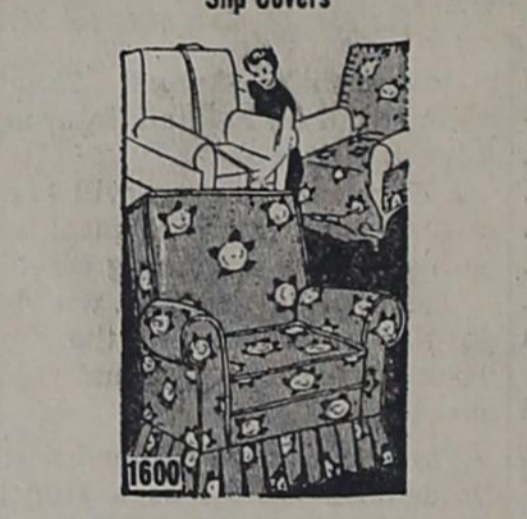

It's Time For... EYE CARE

Dr. Newton K. Wesley PROTECTIVE REFLEXES OF THE EYE

There are many examples of eye protection reflexes. Blinking, for instance, is a protective reflex. In a wink the eyelids can be closed to shut out excessive light, or a foreign object.

Many contact lens wearers become more conscious of dust in the air. Sometimes they will close their eyes so rapidly they will catch a dust particle before it strikes the eye and they can feel it between the lid margins. The contact lens wearer's lid reaction is more sensitive because dust underneath the lens can result in great discomfort.

We have all seen photographs taken with a flash bulb that reveals someone with their eyes closed. It is incredible how fast the eye can react.

Tearing is another good example of protective reflex. If a foreign object finds its way into the eye, the tears will well up immediately to wash out the particle. Tears are antiseptic and tend to negate the action of the foreign object. In warmer or dryer weather the tears increase automatically. This action is also protective. The pupil of the eye will react to different degrees of light. If there is very little light, the pupil will enlarge and if there is too much, it will dilate, or grow smaller. The reflex to dilate the pupil takes a little longer than the contracting action.

**Browsing with Bev**

Your shoes should be built for walking, and your old shoes are your best guides to what you need in a new pair.

So, if you made mistakes in selecting your last pair of shoes, both your shoes and you have suffered. The way the old shoes look now may show you what those mistakes were.

Here are some of the common signs you may find on your old shoes that indicate some "buy-manship" mistakes.

If the shoe is worn unevenly, with most of the signs of wear in the front, the shoe is too short for you. Soles should wear thru first at the center.

If the upper portions of the shoe bulge over the shoe line, the shoe is too narrow. Shoes that are worn completely out of shape show that size shoe is all wrong for you. In that case, you'd better have your shoe salesman make a special check of the exact size you need.

When the shoe heel pushes under or new lifts are needed often, the shoe is too short. Wear at the toe tip also means that the shoe is too short.

Heels that wear on the inside indicate that your arch is weak. Slight wearing at the back or outside line is normal. When "pockets" for the toes wear inside the sole, the shoe is too tight.

A shoe that is puckered or wrinkled behind the ball along the arch shows that it is not long enough from ball to heel, thus pushing the ball of the foot forward. While the overall length of the shoe may be right, the proportion probably is not.

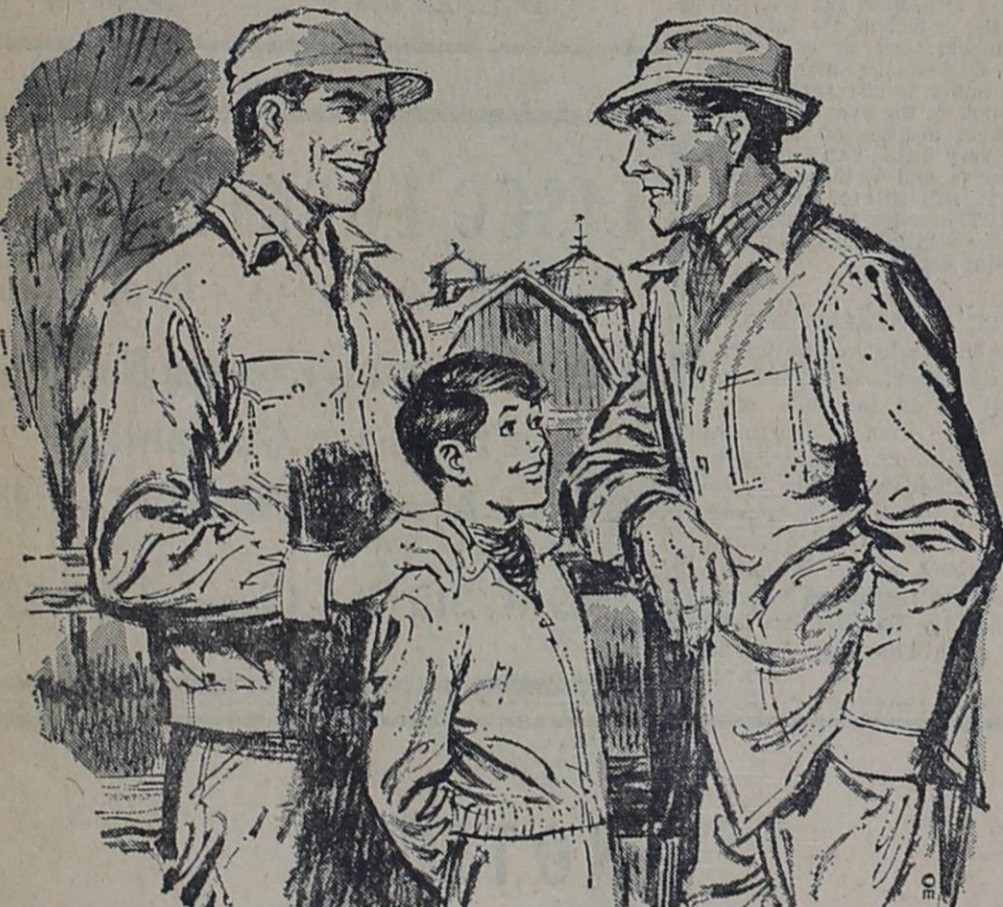
