

\$135,230 Fed. Funds Authorized For 66-67 6-County NYC Project

A total of \$135,230 in federal funds has been authorized for the

1966-67 Neighborhood Youth Corps for six counties, to be administered by the Eastland County Office.

The Eastland County NYC area includes Shackelford, Palo Pinto, Young, Throckmorton and Stephens

counties, County School Superintendent O. L. Stamey, has announced.

Some 260 enrollees will be benefitted in the six counties during the regular "in-school" session, and the summer session, he said. The total program will operate on a \$165,230 budget — with \$30,000 to be provided in counseling services provided by superintendents in one-hour guidance sessions with the enrollees each week.

A hundred students, from low income families, will be enrolled during the regular in-school portion, and 160 are authorized for the summer work next year. The eight schools in Eastland County will have 33 enrollees in school and 50 during the summer. (During the regular session, Cisco, Eastland and Ranger will each have seven students; Carbon, Olden and Desdemona, two each; and Gorman and Rising Star, three each.)

This county will lead in the six in number in the NYC program — Palo Pinto will have 22 in-school, 38 summer; Shackelford, 9 in-school; 18 summer; Stephens, 10 in-school, 6 summer; Throckmorton, 6 in-school, 16 summer; and Young, 20 in-school and 32 summer.

Authorization was for \$60,906.00 for the six-county in-school and \$74,270 for the summer portion.

Supt. Stamey and J. B. (Tip) Trthur, coordinator, were notified by Cong. Omar Bureson and State Sen. Ralph Yarborough of the Labor Department's approval for the NYC project for this area.

The in-school portion is 36 work weeks and two off-weeks during the holidays, beginning Sept. 6, and ending May 26, 1967. The summer portion begins May 29 for 12 weeks, ending Aug. 18. Enrollees work 10 hours per week at \$1.25 per hour during the in-school session, and 27 hours at \$1.25 during the summer project.

Work will be in these classifications: clerical aide, cafeteria aide, custodial aide, and library aides — all on school property and under the supervision of school personnel. Records are kept by the Eastland County School Superintendent's office and work time sheets are prepared at each school by supervisors and presented to the county office for pay every two weeks.

Sponsored by the Eastland County School Board, the NYC project is administered by Supt. Stamey, Coordinator Arther, Project Director M. J. Weaver and Secretary-Bookkeeper Mrs. Derward Morris. William T. Bailey is Regional Director.

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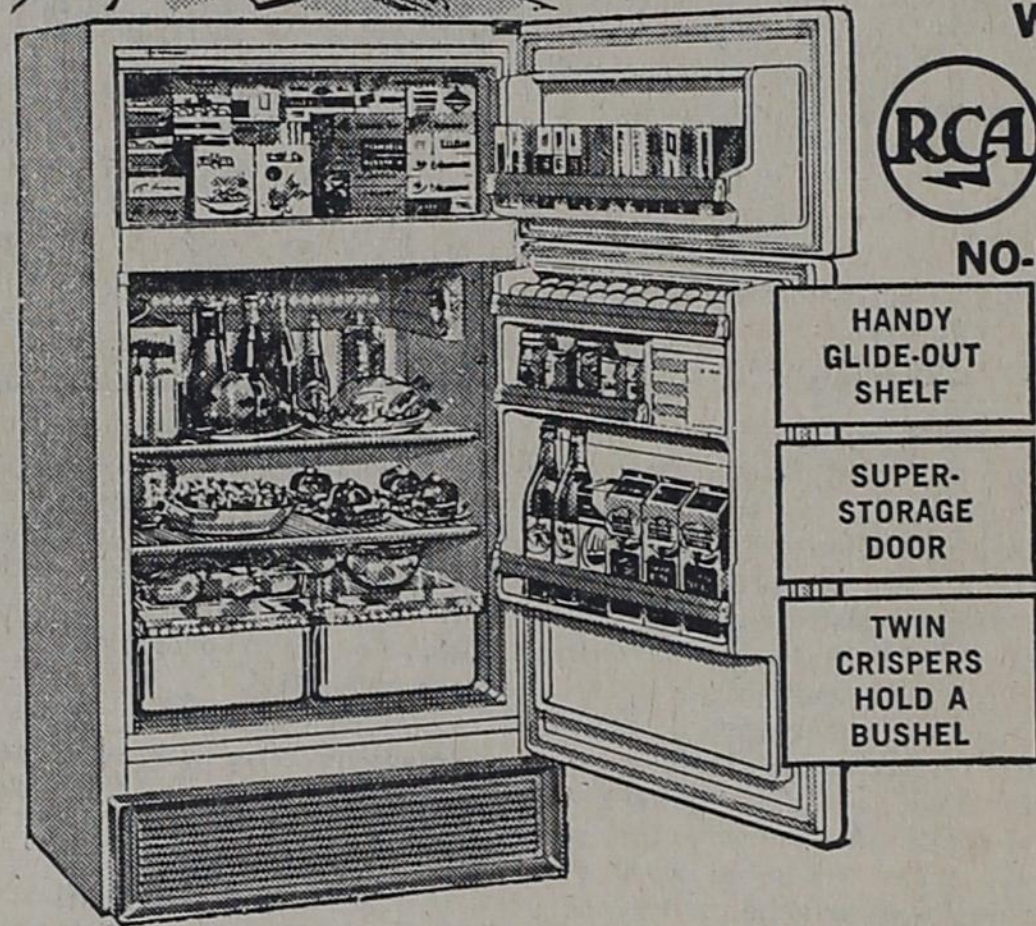
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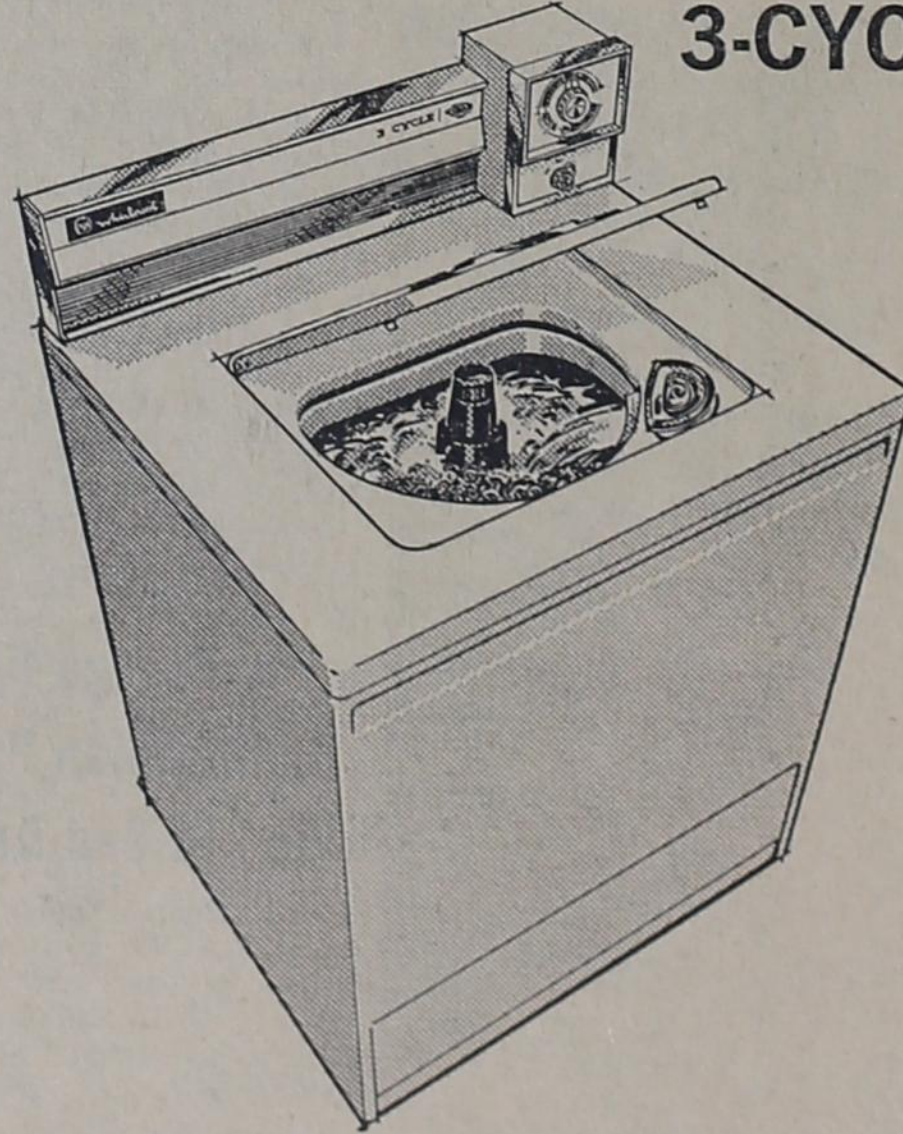

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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

For many years attention has been focused on the plight of the poor of India. Stories of starvation have been given great prominence.

In fact, billions have been taken from American taxpayers to help feed the hungry of India. But there has been little, if any mention, of why it was necessary to have hungry Indians.



It has remained for C. W. Harder, Senator Frank Lausche, Ohio, to pin the reason for starvation on the Indian politicians.

In a land as ancient as India, food stuffs cannot be grown without fertilizer as past centuries of cultivation have sapped the soil. The American International Oil Co. for many years, the Senator reports, has been ready with plans, and willing to invest some \$60 million dollars in a modern chemical fertilizer plant in India.

But for years the Indian government kept this project, so badly needed, from starting. The reason was that under its policy of socialism, the government would not let the fertilizer plant be built unless it would be managed by the Indian government bureaucrats.

Obviously, no responsible management of any company is going to invest \$60 millions of dollars of its stockholders' money in a plant and turn it over for operation by bureaucrats of any nation.

And thus, the matter stood

for several years. Millions of Indians in the meantime died of starvation, billions of American aid dollars were poured into India, but still the government would not budge one inch from its doctrine of socialism.

The government, of course, took the position that in time socialism would cure all of India's ills. And who can say that perhaps in time they may be right in this position. After all, if the population of a nation starves to death, there are no more ills... not to mention no more people, either.

However, Senator Lausche reports that this situation has now been solved. India is permitting the company to build the plant in partnership with the government, with the stipulation management will be held by the foreign investors.

Thus, perhaps, the first step has been taken toward solving the chronic starvation of India, through practical capitalism, and not with the bumbling bureaucracy of socialism. Of course, in all fairness, it should be perhaps noted that after centuries of control by British monopolies, the Indian government could have become suspicious of capitalism.

And that leads to another paradox. The British, who for generations sowed the seeds of socialism through practicing monopoly, now influence American government thinking on what should be done in other parts of the world, including Rhodesia.

This is like the Yankees trying to beef up their ball club by putting on third base a player with a lifetime batting average of .000.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

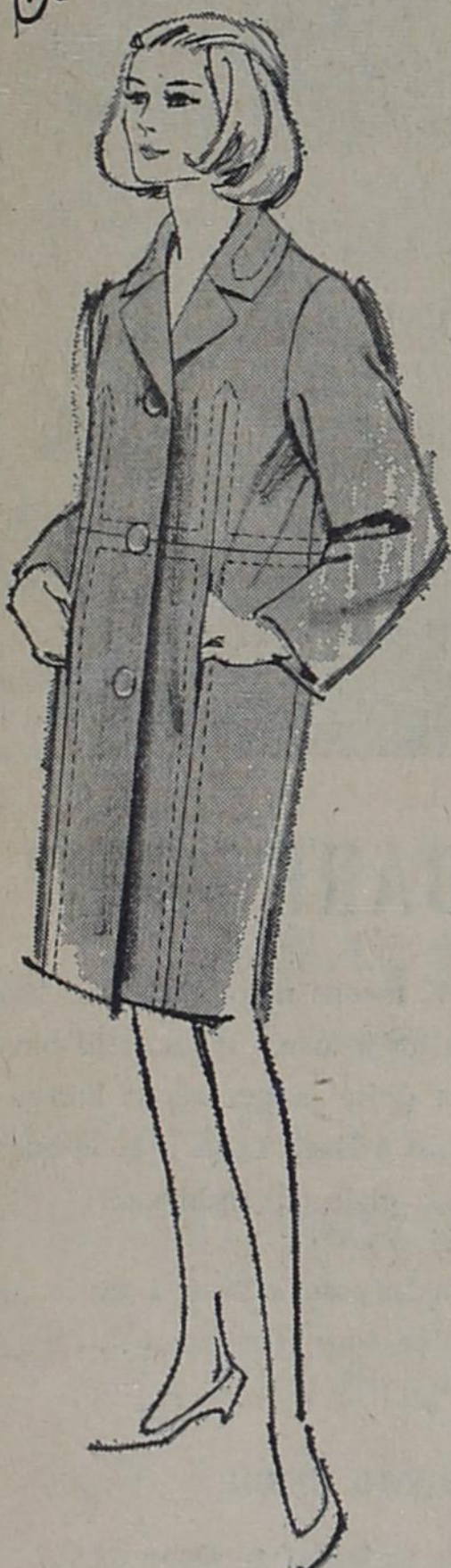
"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

"Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office. 'AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.' If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas. Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Since the time of Cicero, it has been the fashion to view the younger generation with alarm. However, of late, it has been quite the thing to seek to prove that today's students are far to the left.

Last winter presidents of big corporations circulated. In fact, even one corporation printed the alleged "data" in their stockholder's report that C. W. Harder proved that today's students are opposed to the American system of free enterprise. The data quoted was reported to have been obtained from a survey of students visiting the Hall of Free Enterprise at the New York World's Fair, and university surveys.

The staff of the National Federation of Independent Business rather doubted this so-called statistical profile of today's students. During the academic year the Federation sends to the economic instructors in all the high schools and colleges on the findings on the viewpoints of independent businessmen on various economic issues. The reception by educators and students of the independent business viewpoint did not seem to support these "findings."

The Federation presented these "findings" to the educators, and many of them conducted surveys among their students and forwarded the results to the Federation. The results on a few questions are interesting when compared.

According to the "survey,"

results that have been bruited around the country, 61 per cent of the students do not feel that the profit system is necessary for the survival of the American free enterprise system.

But the surveys carried on by the educators at the request of the Federation show only 3 per cent hold this view.

It has also been claimed that 41 per cent think freedom of the press should be cancelled.

Yet the true figures show only 2 per cent hold this view.

It has been reported that 60 per cent believe the government should take over much of the nation's industries.

But it is found that only 7 per cent hold this view.

It was also reported to large audiences that 56 per cent of the students believe it would be well to eliminate all economic problems by taking from the wealthy and giving to the poor.

Yet, the real data shows only 7 per cent hold this view.

Many other questions were also covered, but the results between what is claimed as student viewpoint and what is actually the viewpoint show the same wide differences. And yet, the heads of some of the nation's biggest corporations circulated the erroneous reports on today's students.

But before they go off on the deep end, political and social leaders, rather than take the word of some of these big business leaders, should actually find out just what the younger generation is really thinking. Their conservatism might be quite a surprise to them.

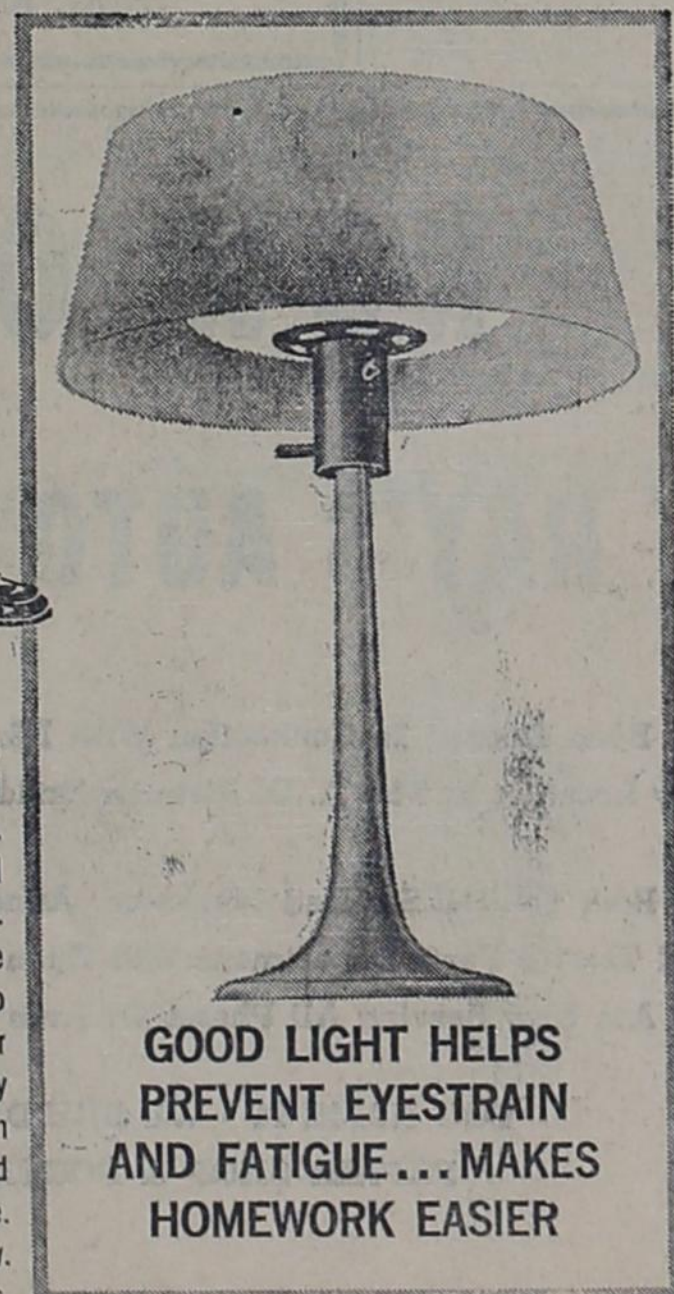
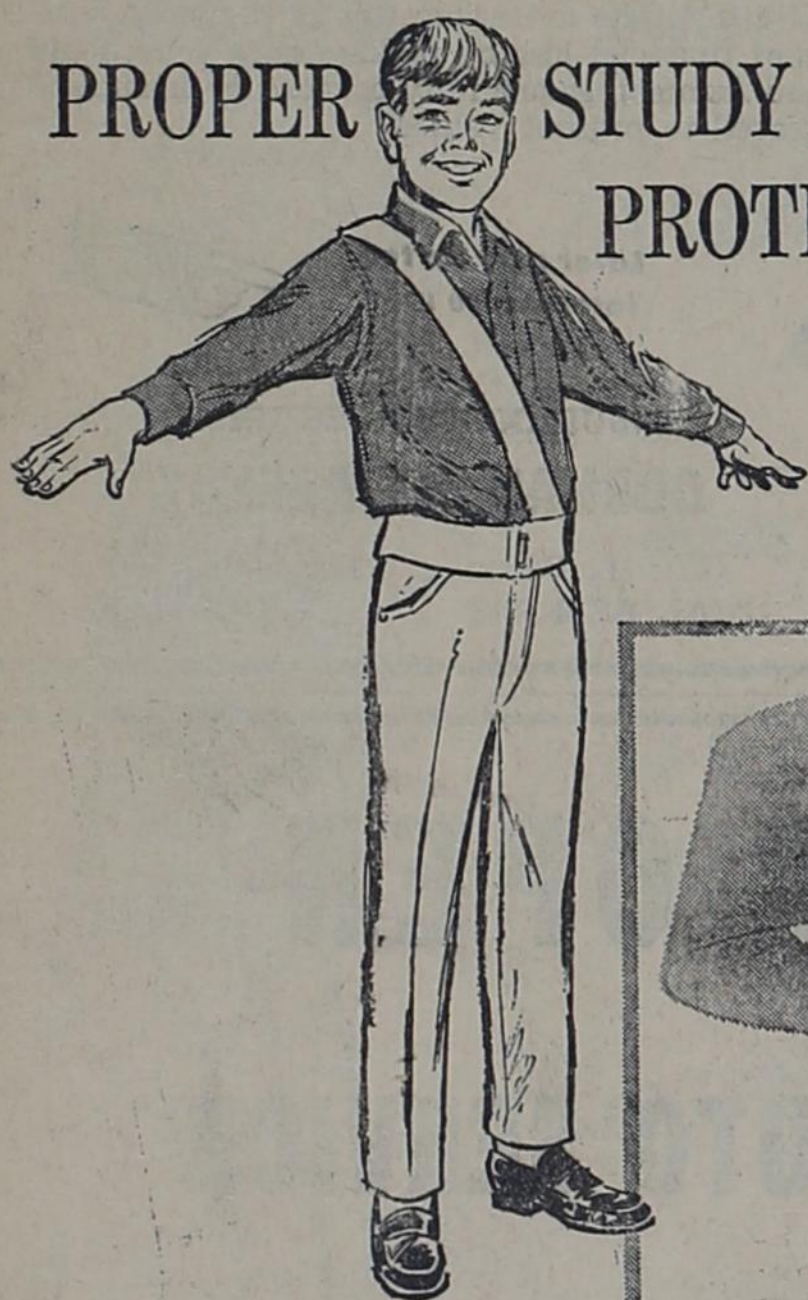
