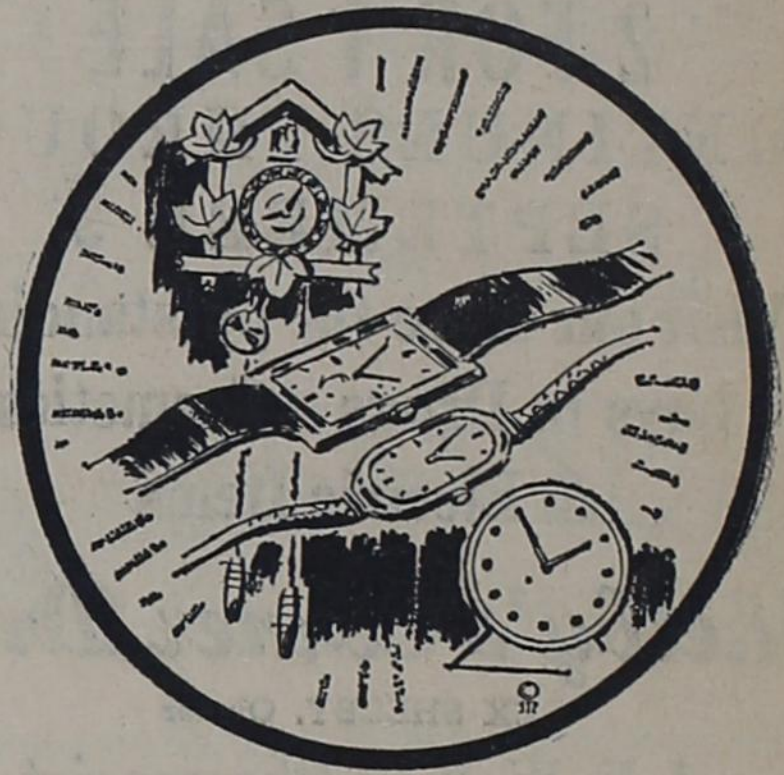

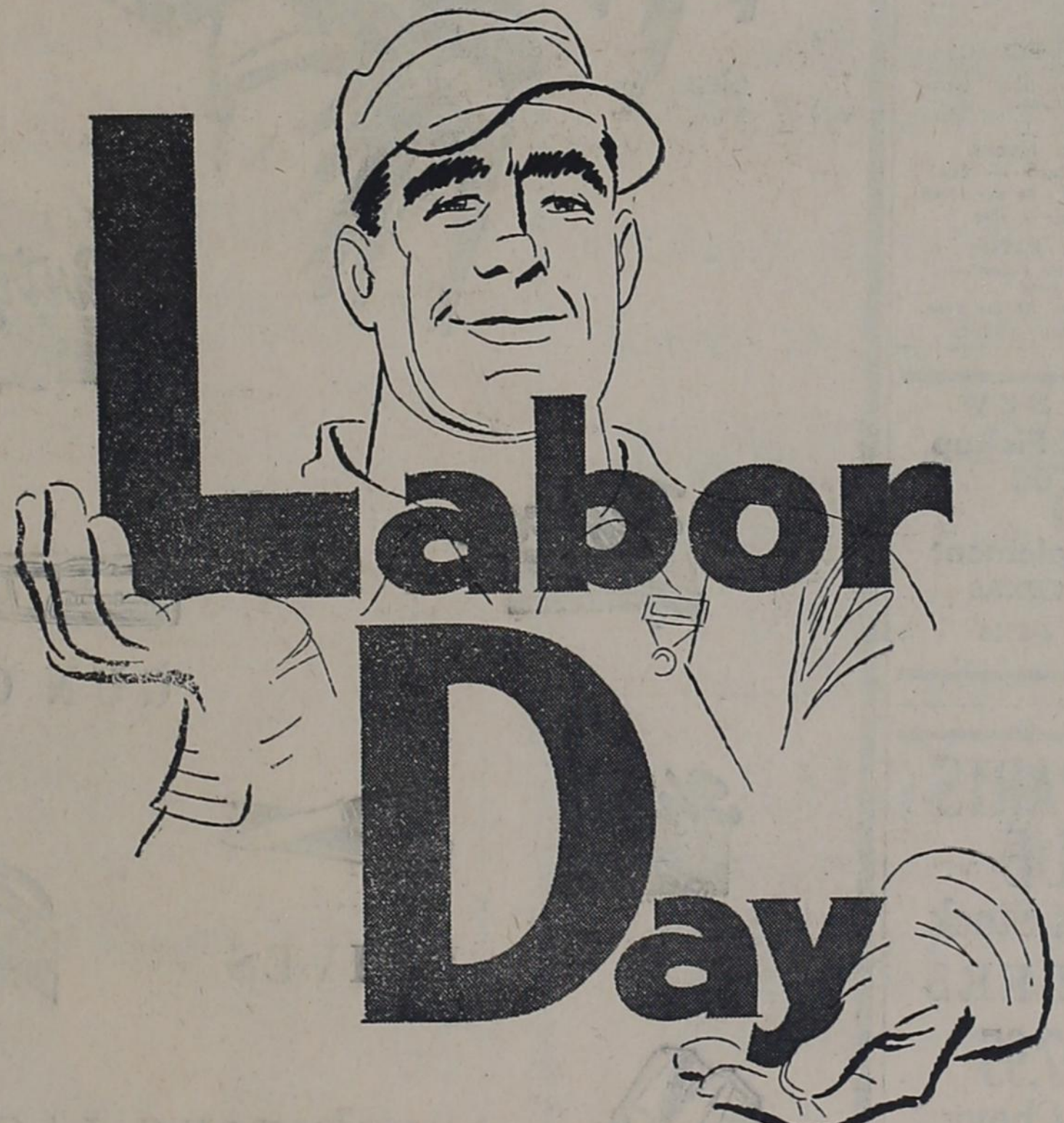

Information Sought

On Former Residents

The following letter was sent to Mrs. Hamilton of Gorman, and we are publishing it in hopes that some of our readers may be able to supply information Mrs. Guy is seeking:

Mrs. Cleopatra Hamilton
Gorman, Texas
Dear Mrs. Hamilton:

Your name has been given to me as one who might be able to help me with a bit of information which I am seeking. First I shall tell you just a bit about my reason for wanting to know this.

My great and grandparents settled in Erath County, near Purves, right after the Civil War. Many of their people lived and died there. My father was born there in 1893, but left after the turn of the century as a small boy. There are still many of them living there and near there.

I have completed working the history of all these families, but there are a few details which I'm seeking just yet. Sometime during 1905 and 1906 John Henry Newborn (my father's own dad) moved from Purves to Gorman. I am trying to find out exactly what year, but it is one of those two years. They stayed until 1908 when they moved to Oklahoma where they all died. While in Gorman in 1905 my father's little sister died. Her name was Nena Mae Newborn - age less than five years, and she is buried there somewhere. Do you know where the oldest cemeteries are where she may be buried? They lived right in town at that time and John Henry Newborn had the dray business there. When they first moved from Purves, however, they moved to the Dunn farm north of Gorman about a mile. (I believe it was the Dunn farm, but this could be wrong).

Next thing I need is this: Is there an old, old school around Gorman called the Grandew School or something like that? Could you give the correct name? I am sure I have it spelled

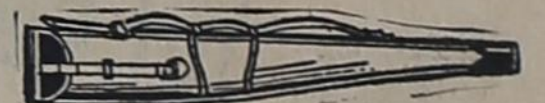

Drivers Licenses Tests Are Discontinued Here

The Department of Public Safety has notified the City of Gorman that after careful evaluation and consideration of overall work load that a new schedule of examinations was devised and that regular drivers license service in Gorman will be discontinued. However, the department stated that drivers license service will be available here for the drivers education students only during the testing period each year. 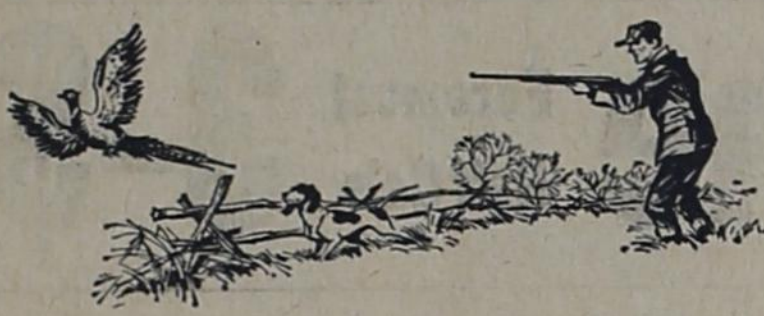

It's Time For... EYE CARE

HYGIENE FOR YOUR EYES

It is very important that the eyes be kept free of objects or diseases that can cause infections. Nature has provided us with a built-in safeguard, in this regard, by the manufacture of tears. Because of them, and their excellent antiseptic qualities, we do not have as many infections as one would think. Tears are the product of many glands. There are tear glands at the upper, outer corner of the eye underneath the frontal bone, with ducts that lead to the surface. There are also tear glands in the upper and lower eyelids. The tears of the eye are a combined effort of all these glands. And yet, only about a teaspoon a day is manufactured and dispersed onto the surface of the eye.

Besides helping to prevent eye infections tears prevent the eye from drying. Tears are sticky and viscid and this keeps them from flowing over the lid. As well as observing the rules of strict cleanliness of the eyes, the National Eye Research Foundation urges us to follow other basic, common sense practices in relation to the eye. Avoid dangerous games with arrows and darts. If you are employed where safety goggles are used, don't take chances—use them. Since eyes give us no warning, as a rule, that something is wrong, it is a good idea to have them examined every six months.

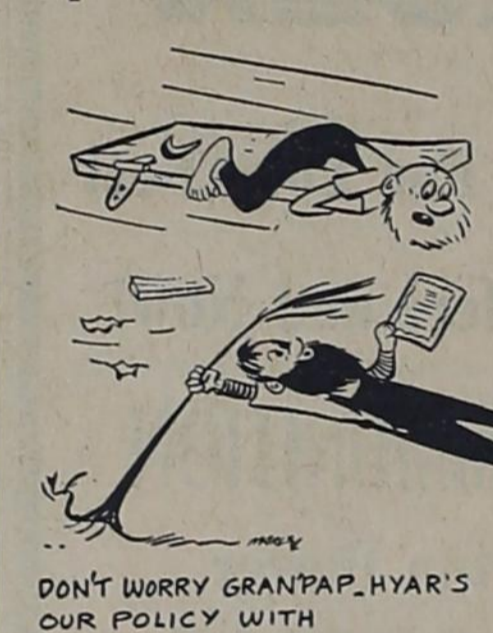
