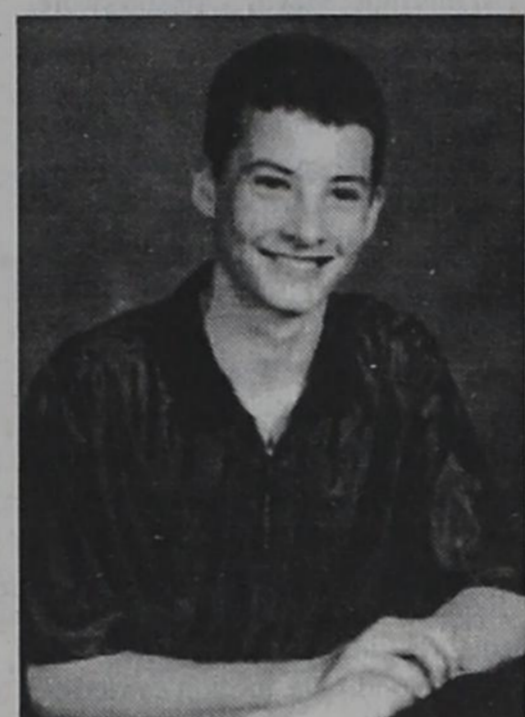
Sand Hill Cemetery Association To Meet

Glover Places Fifth At State Meet



Mark Glover, a sophomore at Gorman High School, was awarded a fifth place medal in Editorial Writing at the 1998-99 University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet held May 6-8 at the University of Texas in Austin. Glover is the son of David and Linda Glover of Gorman.

"Students who participate in UIL academics are as competitive and dedicated as any athlete or musician," said Bobby Hawthorne, UIL academic director. "They devote untold hours to practice and invitational meet competition, and for many, these hours will be among the most important they spend during their high school careers. Over the years, we've heard from hundreds of students who claim that these contests were the most fulfilling and rewarding activities of their entire high school careers."

UIL academic contests range from feature writing to accounting, and from computer science to poetry interpretation. Of the 2.2 million students who participated in UIL activities last year, 420,000 competed in one or more of the 22 general academic contests.

The purpose of these contests, Hawthorne added is to teach thinking and problem-solving skills.

"In its own way, each contest—whether math or Lincoln-Douglas debate or editorial writing—is intended to teach the thinking skills students will need in college and in the work force. We know that employers want employees who can solve problems, speak effectively and write clearly. Each contest is designed to help students reach these goals."

Through participation at the State Meet, students qualify for the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. Since its inception in 1954, the TILF has provided \$12.3 million to approximately 11,000 Texas high school students. This year, the TILF expects to award an estimated 532 new and renewed grants, valued at more than \$820,000. Grants and donations from foundations and individuals have funded these academic scholarships. Each dollar that the TILF receives goes directly for scholarships, and no administrative or other overhead expenses are deducted.

Carbon Agri Center and Masonic Lodge Building Burns

A Carbon landmark, the home of Masonic Lodge 786 for seven decades, burned to the ground early Monday morning. A business was also destroyed.

Officials said the fire spread quickly after the building was apparently struck by lightning about 12:30 a.m.

The Masonic Lodge was housed on the second floor and Carbon Agri Center Inc. was housed on the ground floor. The building was a corrugated metal structure. It was built in 1927 and had housed the Masons since that time.

"It's pretty much a pile of junk now," said Carbon Fire Chief Ronnie Pack, one of the owners of the Agri Center. "I've been to many fires. This is the first one that hit this close to home."

He said the contents of his business were partially insured, and that the business would reopen quickly. The building itself was not insured.

"We lost everything," said lodge member Don Nichols.

Lodge member Bill Carlton said the organization has about 40 members.

Lodge members will have to decide whether to disband or rebuild, Carlton said.

In addition to Carbon, firefighters from Eastland, Gorman, Rising Star and Sipe Springs also responded to the fire.

The Mayor called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

At this time, Mayor Simpson swore in the new commissioners, Bill Vaughn, and incumbent Kenneth Good. Also at this time Robert Ervin stepped out and expressed that it was his privilege to serve with these commissioners and he had enjoyed serving and then congratulated the new commissioners.

Homeowners with one tree to large commercial pecan growers will want to attend the Early Season Pecan Management Seminar to learn about the many insects, diseases, and fertility requirements a pecan tree has. This pecan year looks outstanding and in a good pecan year, pest problems can multiply quickly and growers need to know how to prevent a major loss whether you are a backyard orchard owner or a commercial grower.

The Early Season Pecan Management Seminar will be held Wednesday, May 19 at the Comanche Community Center in Comanche. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. and the seminar will start at 10:00 a.m. To preregister please call the Texas Agricultural Extension office in Comanche at 915-356-2539. Two continuing education credits will be offered to commercial and private applicators and a sponsored lunch will be served.

The Pecan Management Seminar will include three well known Extension specialists with years of work in pecans. Dr. Allen Knutson is Extension Entomologist with the Texas A&M Center in Dallas. 
