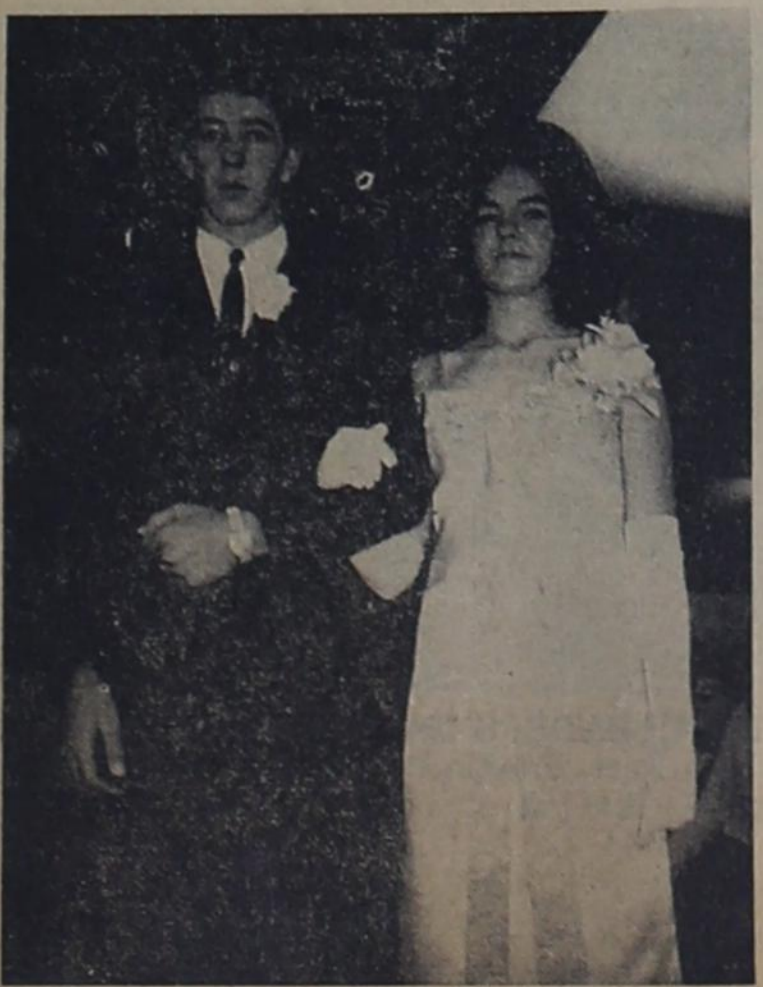

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR ELBERT DENTON HELD WEDNESDAY

Mr. Elbert Isom Denton, 63, died at 4:32 a. m. Tuesday in Blackwell Hospital. He had been seriously ill for two weeks.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday in the Church of Christ with Audy Moore, minister, officiating. Burial was in Gorman Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Born February 19, 1903 in the Jewell Community near Gorman, he had lived in Gorman most of his life with the exception of a few years when he lived in Breckenridge and Texoma. He was married to Nettie Una Cate April 5, 1945.

He had been a watch repairman in Gorman for the past 20 years following an oil field accident in 1945 at Texoma that left both his legs paralyzed.

He was a member of the Gorman Church of Christ.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Leroy A. Denton of Anaheim, Calif.; four step children, Warren Cate of Midland, Mrs. Doris Ely of Irving, Bennie E. Cate of the USAF in North Dakota, and Lawrence Cate of the USAF, Roswell, N. M.; twelve grandchildren; one brother, Alvis L. Denton of Big Lake; four sisters, Mrs. Vena Hunt, Gorman, Mrs. Ruby Stenson, San Angelo, Mrs. Nettie Mae Thompson, Waco, and Mrs. Loretta Potts of Slaton.

Pallbearers were Dick Foster, James Brown, Crofford Thurman, L. F. Kellogg, Billy Earl Simpson, and Vernon Files.

GORMAN POLLED 296 VOTES IN TUESDAY'S GENERAL ELECTION

Voting was considered light in the Tuesday General Election as only 296 ballots were cast in Gorman.

John Connally, the Democratic Party candidate for Governor, received 198 votes; T. E. Kennerly, Republican Party candidate, received 82 votes and Tommye Gillispie, Constitution Party, got 2.

In the highly contested United States Senate race between Democratic Party candidate Waggoner Carr and Republican John Tower, Tower received 173 and Carr 117.

All other names on the ballot seeking office in the state were won by those of the Democratic Party.

Congressman Omar Burleson received 261 votes. Cecil C. Collins polled 258. Frank Sparks, District Judge got 257 votes. Tom Creighton, State Senator of 22nd Senatorial District received 259 votes.

Burke Musgrove, 63rd. District Representative, 260 votes; Scott Bailey, County Judge, 261; Ellen Justice, County Treasurer, 161; Johnson Smith, County Clerk, 259; Roy Lane, District Clerk, 262; O. L. Stamey, County School Supt., 262; Dick Foster, County Commissioner Pct. 2, polled 264.

Five of the Constitutional Amendments were voted down by the Gorman voters, and included Number 3, 4, 5, 9 and 13.

Panthers To Host Bangs In 17-B District Deciding Tilt

The Gorman Panthers, who now have a 7-1 record for the season and a District 17-B record of 2-0, will host the Bangs Dragons on Friday night in the top District B game in the area. The winner of this game will be the Bi-District representative, since

the Dragons have already beaten the May Tigers. And with a win by the Panthers over the Dragons Gorman would represent District 17-B even if they were defeated by May. So you might say this is a MUST game for the fighting Panthers! And we think the Panthers will sink the unbeaten Dragons, especially if they keep rolling as they have thus far in the season. Game time will be 7:30 p. m. at Brogdon Field.

The Panthers set up this District 17-B battle for the crown with Bangs by overpowering the Blanket Tigers and the Hico Tigers.

In last Friday night's action against the Blooming Grove Lions the Panthers continued their winning ways by downing the Lions by a score of 30 to 8.

The Panthers spotted the Lions 8 points early in the first period as they lost a fumble to the Lions on the Gorman 39 yard line. The Lions scored in 7 plays, the final 26 yards coming on an aerial from Jack Armstrong to John Phillips for the TD with 8:07 left in the first. Clark Putman ran for the two extra points.

Gorman came right back on the following kickoff and drove 73 yards in 12 plays for their first score with Daryl Hirst scampering for the final 14 yards on a keeper with 1:21 left in the first period. Jackie Harrison ran for the two extra points to tie the score 8-8.

After changing possessions on three occasions, the Panthers began rolling again just before the half-time intermission. The Panthers took over on their own 29 after stopping the Lions and went 71 yards in 10 plays with Hirst crossing the goal from 19 yards out after fading back to pass and then running a clear path to the goal line with 48 seconds left in the second stanza. Hirst kicked for the extra point and Gorman led 15 to 8 at half-time.

The Third Panther tally came in the fourth period when they started a drive from their own 30 yard line and moved 70 yards in 18 plays. Robert Reeves got the score, ramming over from 1 yard out with 5:16 left in the final quarter. Hirst kicked for the extra point and Gorman led 22 to 8.

The final Panther score came late in the fourth when the Panthers took over the ball on the Lion 28 yard line and scored in five plays with David Guthery getting the final 2 yards. A pass from Hirst to Tommy Clark, split end for 20 yards set up the tally. Hirst passed to Clark for the two point conversion with 1:11 left in the game, and the final score came up Gorman 30 and Blooming Grove 8.

The Panthers were again tough on defense, proof of which shows in the statistics. The Lions were held to 1 yard on rushing in the first half and only a total of 18 yards rushing in the entire game.

Leading the defense for the Big Red were A. B. Eaves, Robert Hunt, John Shell, Jim Tom Garrett, Ed Sutton, and Dwayne Snider, along with a splendid team effort from the entire team.

Tommy Clark came through for the Panthers in this game and did a fine job of catching the ball from his split end position. He caught four tosses for a total of 36 yards. Robert Reeves was the leading ground gainer.

MISS OZELLA PULLEY AMONG HONOREES AT TESCO QUARTER CENTURY BANQUET

Miss Ozella Pulley was one of three Eastland County Texas Electric Service Co. employees welcomed into the company's Quarter Century Club at a banquet in Breckenridge on Friday night.

Division manager Frank N. Sayer was master of ceremonies and introduced board chairman and immediate past president, Beeman Fisher, who in turn, introduced the company's recently named president, Burl B. Hulsey, Jr.

In his remarks Mr. Hulsey defined the purpose of the company as serving the need of the people. "This must include serving the needs of our customers - serving the needs of the communities in which we operate - serving the needs of those who have invested their savings to make our company possible - and serving our own needs, the needs of the employees."

Guest speaker was Dr. George D. Heaton of Charlotte, N. C., who challenged the Texas Electric Service Co. employees to look for the VIP in their company - then defined VIP as "Value In Performance."

Entertainment following the event included a musical program by Katy and Mel Dacus of Fort Worth, and Bingo.

In presenting traditional gold watches to the new Quarter Century members, president Hulsey noted that Miss Pulley had formerly taught school and manages the Gorman office in the absence of Tom Hallmark.

Miss Ozella Pulley, Gorman customer service, reported for work her first day with Texas Electric at the wrong office. Miss Pulley, who completed 25 years with the company on September 15, had been working in the city office of Gorman. This office was right next door to the Texas Electric office.

"Out of habit, I had opened the city office, taken the money out of the safe and was seated at my desk," said Miss Pulley, "when the late L. D. Stewart, De Leon-Gorman manager, and the city secretary, Mr. J. E. Walker, came into the office and reminded me that I was now a TESCO employee."

Miss Pulley was born on a farm in the Jewell Community which is five miles southwest of Gorman. Her mother died when she was an infant and she was reared by her grandparents. Her father died when she was 20.

Miss Pulley attended Gorman Schools and upon graduation took the county board examination for an intermediate school teacher's certificate. Her first assignment was the New Hope School between Gorman and Carbon.

A year later she transferred to a rural school near Lamesa and before returning to Gorman three years later, Ozella taught one year in a privately-owned school on a large ranch south of Lubbock.

"The school was operated under the supervision of the county," said Ozella, "but all my expenses and my salary were paid by the rancher. I taught all grades to different aged children of the ranch hands."

Ozella returned to Gorman because of her grandmother's health and it was at this time that she accepted the job in the office of the city secretary.

Ozella is a member of the First Methodist Church, is past president of the Woman's Study Club, and a senior officer (Noble Grand) of the Rebekah Lodge.

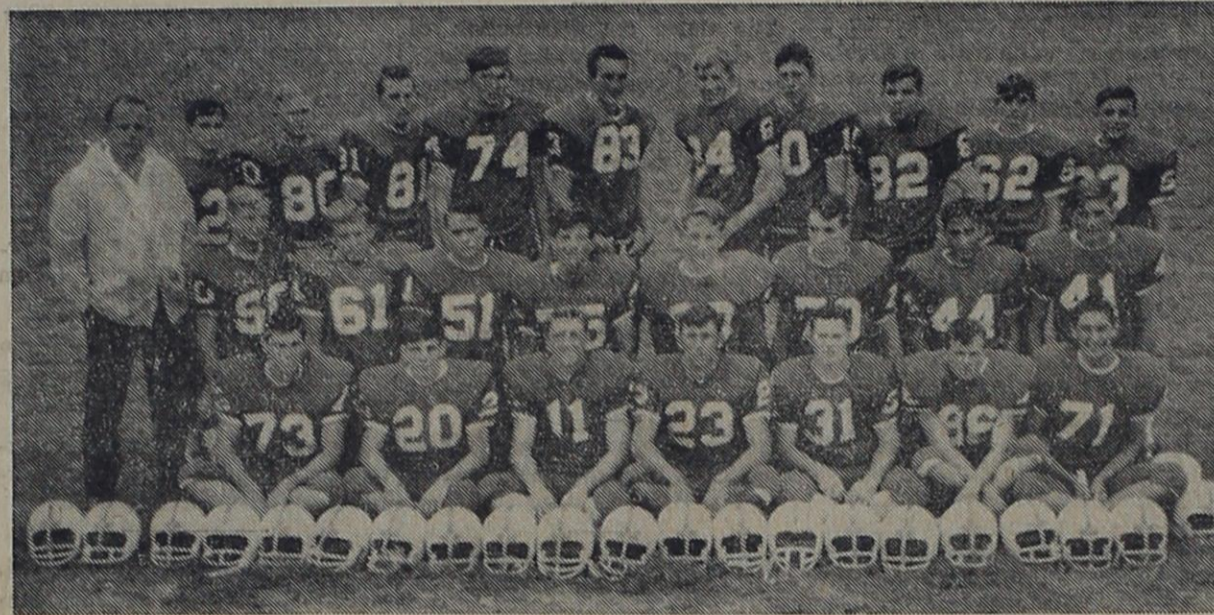

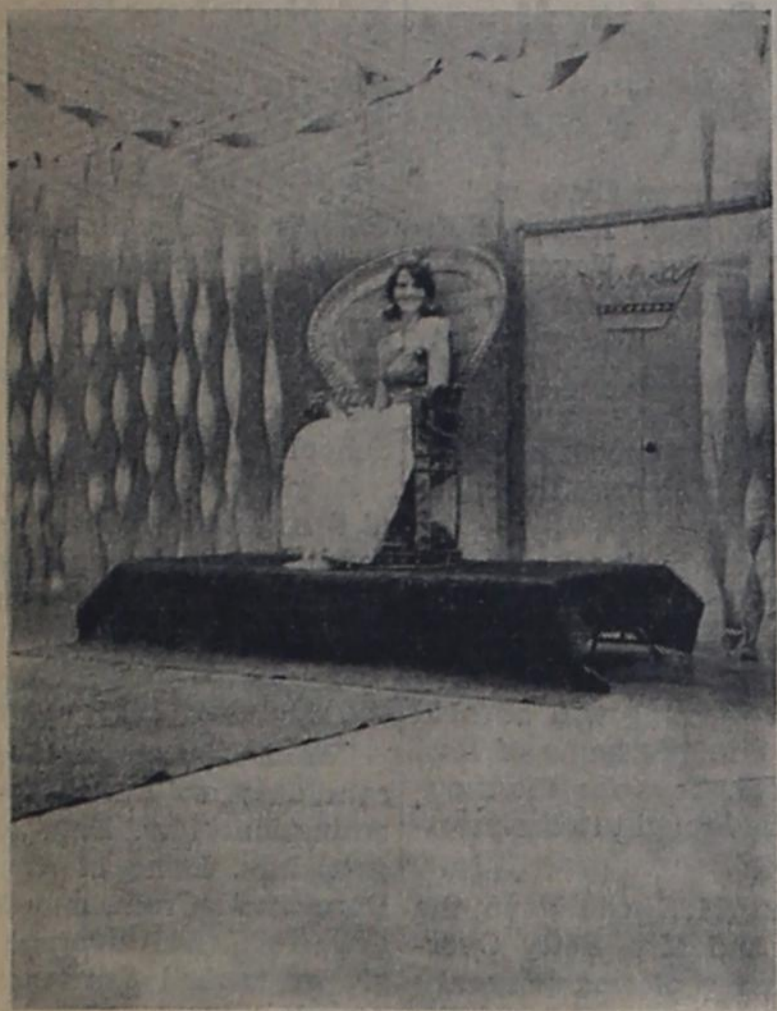

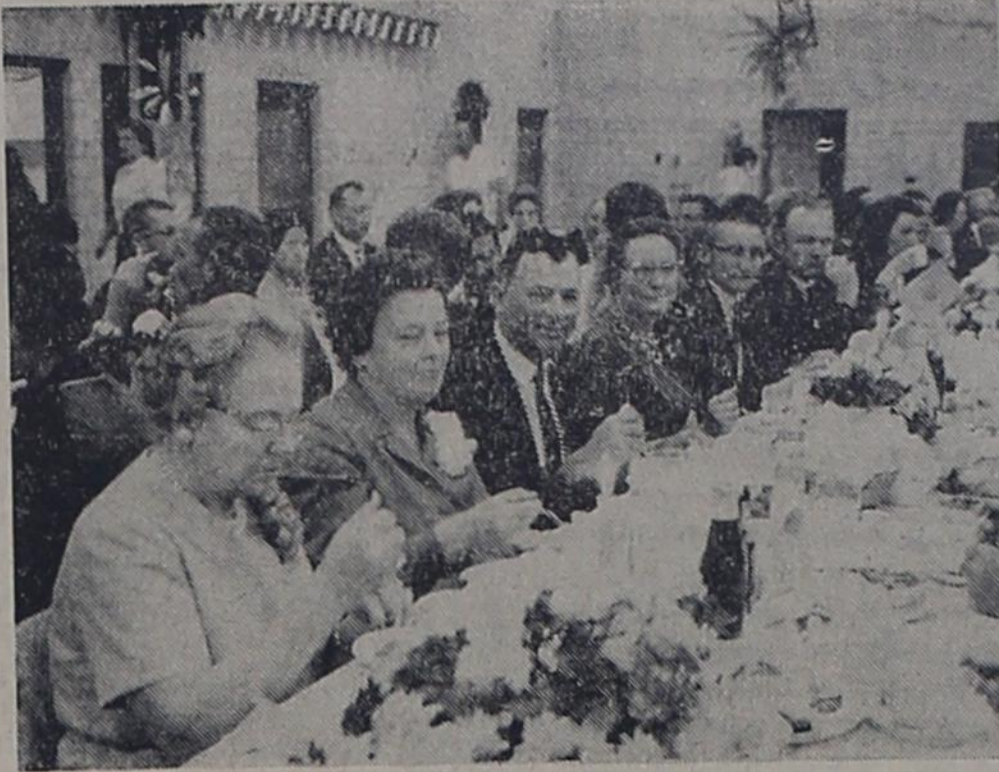
Area Pharmaceutical Association Organized

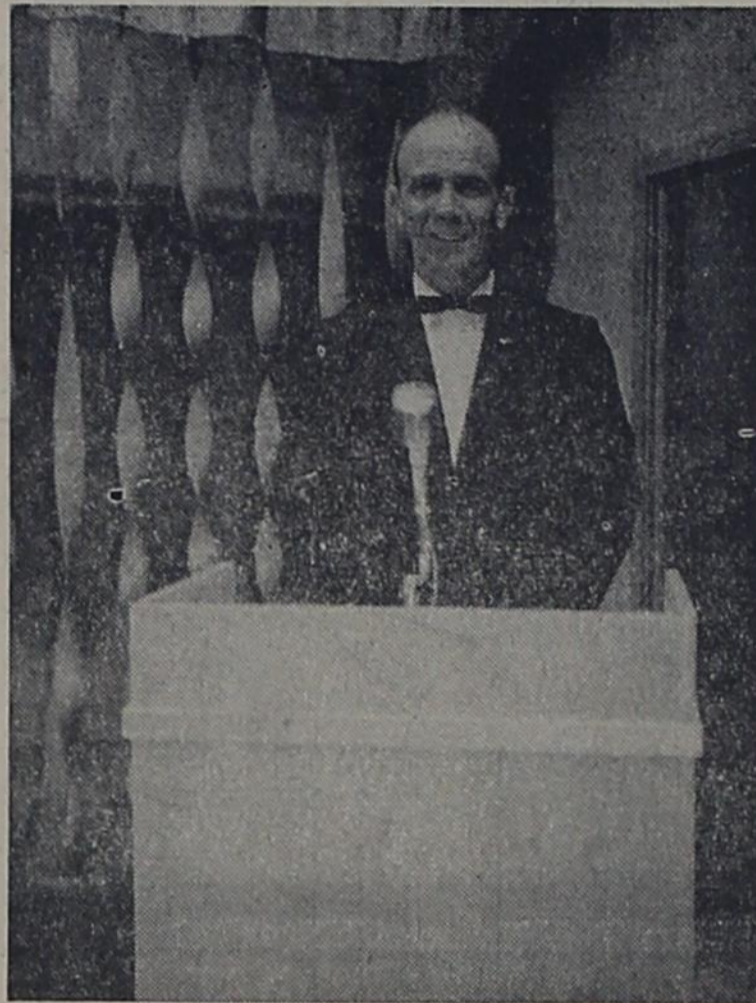
Mr. Luther Parker, executive secretary of the Texas Pharmaceutical Association, met with the group to explain the purposes of such an organization and to help with details in forming the group.

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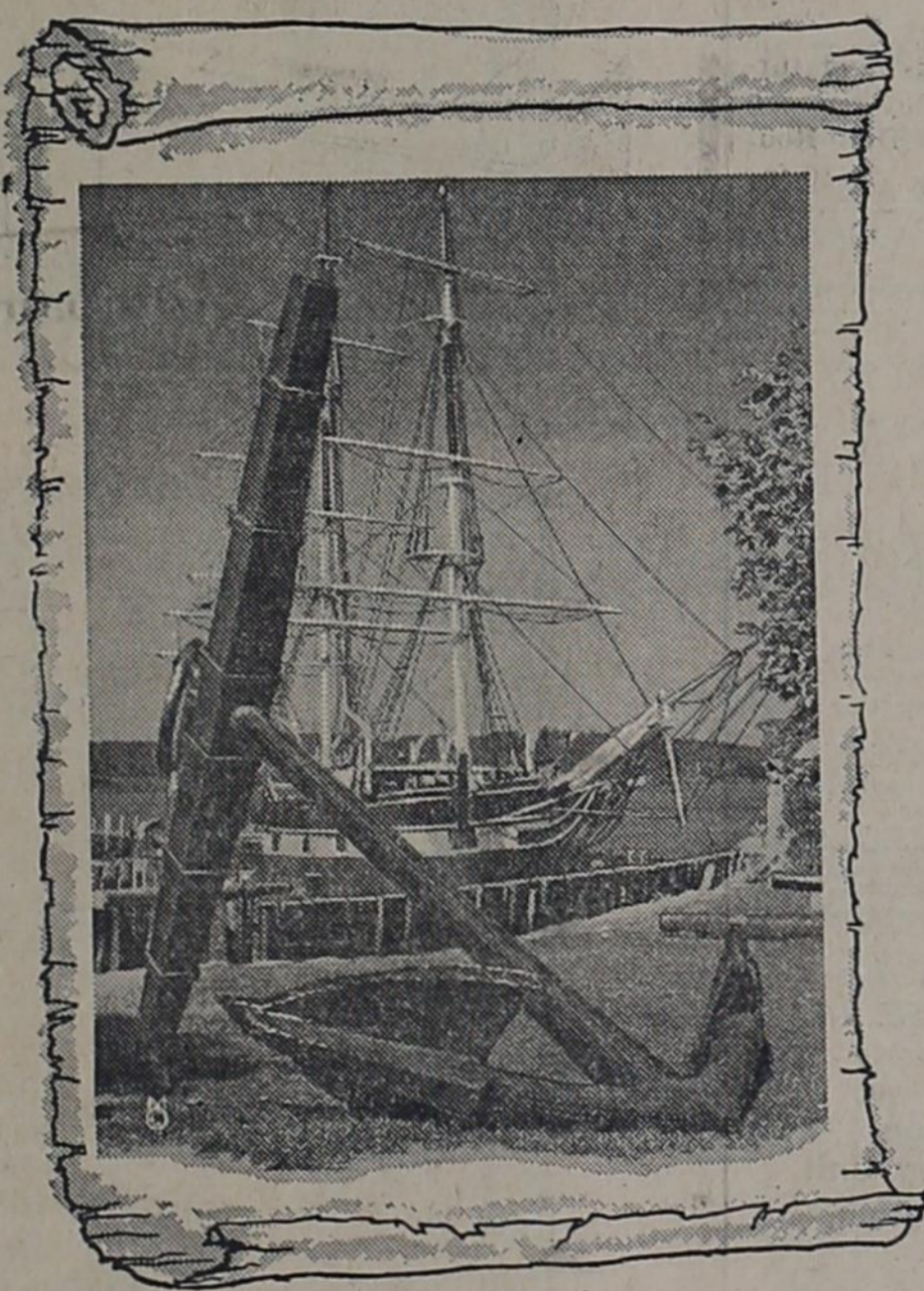
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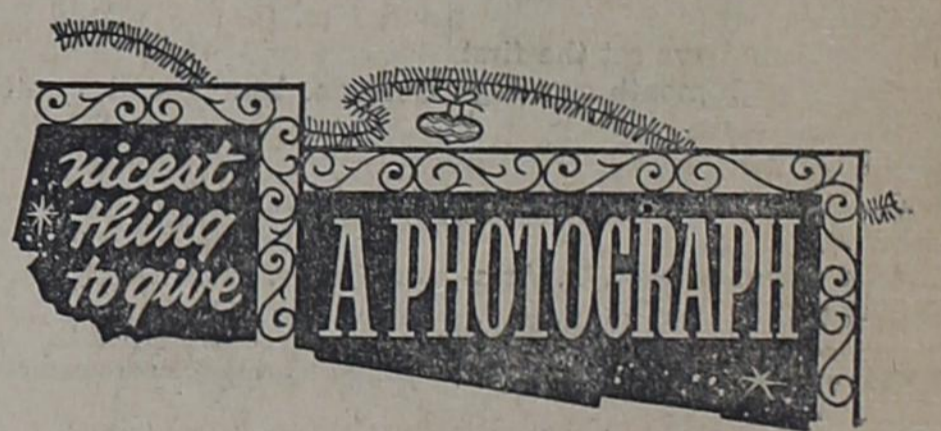
