One has only to drive past Gorman Peantus, A Division of American Cold Storage, Corp., on Highway Six, anytime and see their dryers and shelling plant operating around the clock, 7 days a week; while 50 to 100 or more trucks are waiting their turn to use one of the hundred-plus modern driers which includes 20 direct truck hook-ups. This entails a working force of 200 people.

Gorman is also fortunate in having the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association and Texas-Federal Inspection Service offices located here.

All of these, plus our fine hospital, nursing home, excellent school facilities, and new swimming pool, PLUS our well-stocked grocery stores, dry good stores, feed, hardware, furniture, variety stores, fertilizer and farm equipment facilities - - you name it and you can find it in Gorman. Our Chamber of Commerce is working diligently to get a tourist court and perhaps a cafe operating full time. Mention of the cafe is not meant as a reflection on our present cafe owners. However, serving the public is a fulltime job and Gorman sorely needs a place where people can dine on the weekend. We have too many people from other towns visiting our hospital and nursing home or here on business who do not like the idea of having to leave town to sleep and eat and then return to transact their bus-
