The Peanut Bowl Grand Parade will be held at 3 p. m. Saturday in downtown Eastland.

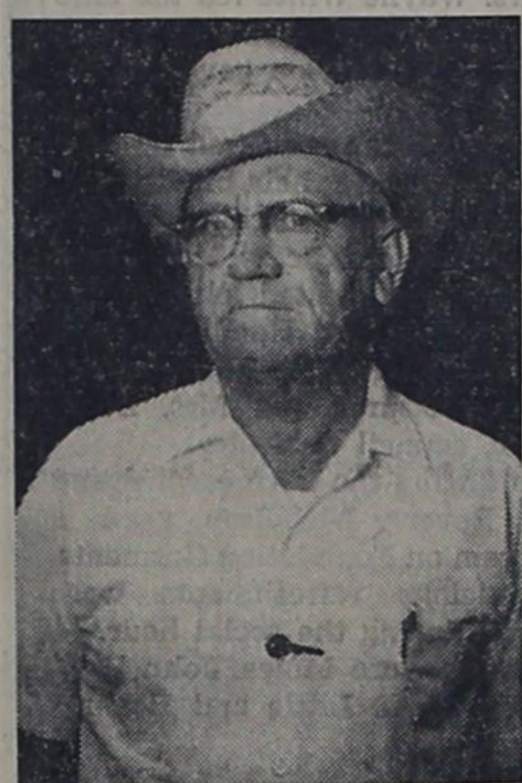

Davis Smith, who has resigned from the post because of ill health. Davis had assumed his duty as mayor in April following his election for a two year term.

The newly elected mayor, owner of Smith Bros. Chevrolet Company, is a former member of the City Commission, who has been active in public affairs of the community during his forty-three years in Gorman. He has served as Chairman of the Gorman Housing Authority and managed the business of building the City's low rent housing and also homes for Senior Citizens.

Mrs. Smith, the former Miss Clara Mae Stone, has also been active in civic and club affairs.

Mr. Smith presided at the regular meeting of the Commission during the past week, at which time phases of urban renewal were discussed with anticipation of possible future participation in some phase of same.

Other members of the Commission are Charles Underwood, who will continue to serve as mayor pro-tem, Clinton Revels, Oda Monroe and Arlton E. Smith.

A farmer for 40 years in the Kokomo Community, he says truck farming is not a hobby, although he thoroughly enjoys it, as well as growing flowers which bloom in profusion in his yard.

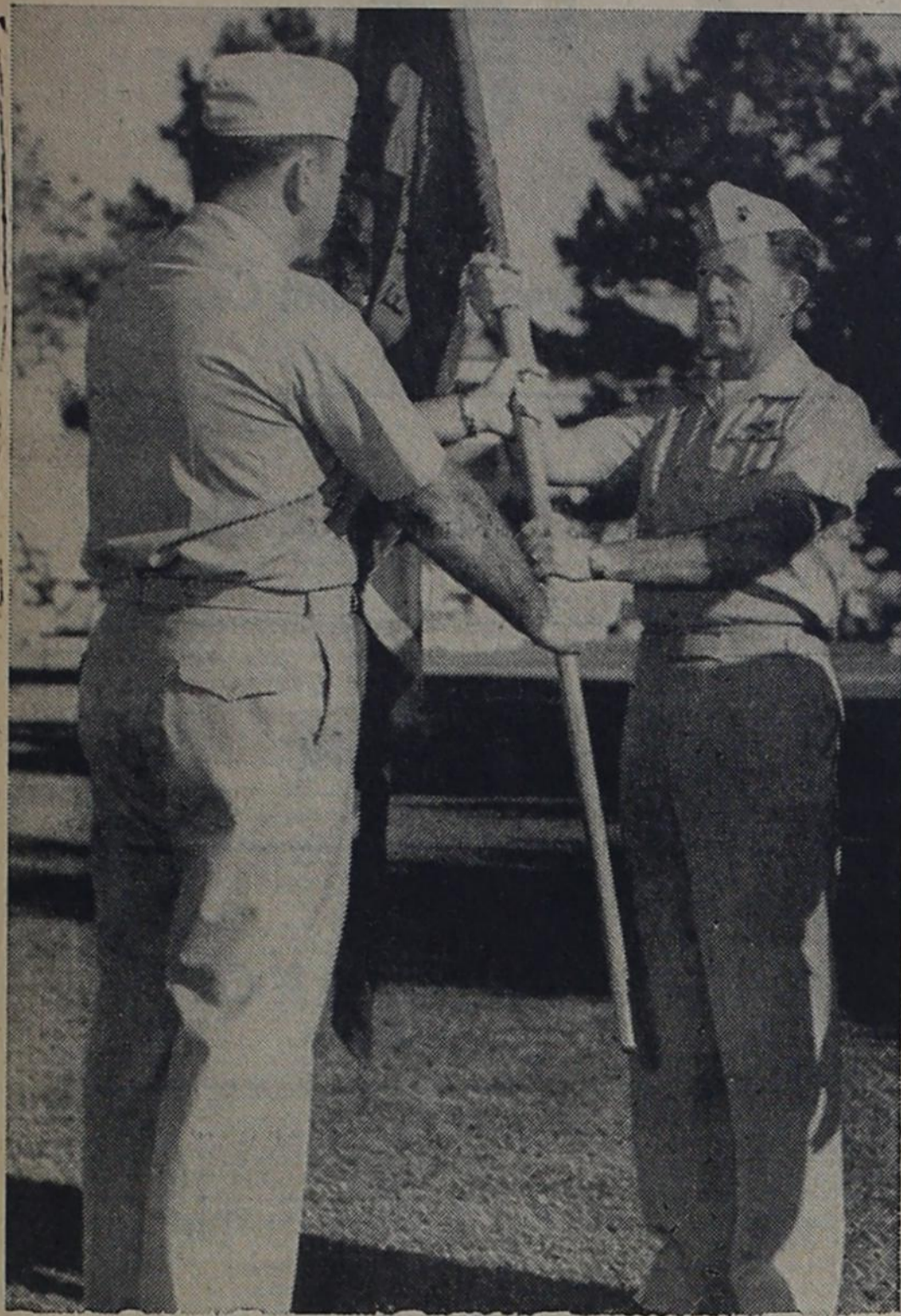

Parade Marks MAG-31 Command Change Of Colonel Harold Neill Mehaffey Of U. S. Marines

Colonel Harold Neill Mehaffey marked another step in his colorful career of Commanding Officer of Marine Aircraft Group 31 on Tuesday, September 2, during parade ceremonies at Beaufort, S. C. when Colonel Johnnie C. Vance, Jr. took the reigns of Marine Aircraft Group 31, relieving Colonel Mehaffey, who has headed the group since October, 1965.

Colonel Mehaffey will report to Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic Headquarters in Norfolk, Va. for duty.

Present for the ceremony were Major General Norman J. Anderson, Commanding General 2nd. Marine Aircraft Wing at Cherry Point, N. C., Brigadier General Marion E. Carl, Commander, Marine Corps Air Bases, Eastern Area, and Major General Rathvon McTompkins, Commanding General, MCRD, Parris, Island. Also attending the change of command were military dependents and guests of the proud participating Marines.

To begin the ceremony an F8 "Crusader" Jet zoomed across the parade area and maneuvered into a high performance climb, signaling the Group Adjutant for the familiar words, "Sound Off."

As the 2nd. Marine Aircraft Wing began to play, some 500 officers and enlisted men marched on the parade field to honor the outgoing commanding officer, Col. Mehaffey. As the Marines of MAG-31 passed in review F8 "Crusaders" and A4 "Skyhawk" jets saluted the colonel with a flyover.

Colonel Mehaffey has been serving as Commanding Officer of

Marine Aircraft Wing, at Marine Corps Air Station, Beaufort, S. C. since October 16, 1965.

Colorful Career

Born July 25, 1921 in Gorman, the Colonel attended Gorman High School until 1936 and graduated from Comanche High School in 1938. From 1940 to 1942 he attended John Tarleton State College in Stephenville, then left school to begin flight training at Naval Air Station, Dallas.

Upon completing flight training at NAS, Corpus Christi, he was commissioned a second lieutenant and designated a Naval Aviator on Feb. 10, 1943. After a brief period of training in flight operations he joined Marine Fighter Squadron 311 at Page Field, Parris Island, S. C. on May 8, 1943.

Arriving in the South Pacific theater of operations with VMF-311 during World War II, he flew combat missions in the Marshall Islands campaign. He was assigned duties at MCAS, El Toro, Calif. on his return to the U. S. in early 1945.

During the next 18 months he served at El Toro and Santa Barbara on the West Coast before reporting on Sept. 30, 1946 to Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Va. to attend the Junior Course of the Amphibious Warfare School. He completed the course in April '47.

The Colonel's next duty assignment, as operations officers, took him to Hawaii where he first served with the Marine Fighter Squadron 513, and later, with his old unit, VMF-311.

For the next three years - from March 1949 to March 1952 - he served in tactical units based at Marine Corps Air Facility, Edenton, and at Marine Air Station, Cherry Point, both in North Carolina.

In April of 1952, the colonel rejoined VFM-513, now a night fighter squadron, in Korea. He served during the Korean Conflict with VFM(N) 513 and the MAG-33 Group Staff until December of that year when he reported to Quantico for duty with the Marine Corps Equipment Board.

A three year tour of duty - from June 1954 to August 1957 - on the staff of the Deputy Commander, European Command, in Paris, France, followed for the colonel.

Returning to the U. S., he began a program of specialized training at El Toro in October of 1957. During this year he also served as the executive officer of VMA-121. He later took command there of Marine All Weather Fighter Squadron 542. In August of 1959 he led squadron overseas to NAS Atsugi, Japan, where he served until October, 1960. The following month, he reported to Headquarters Marine Corps in Washington, D. C. for duty as plans officer in the Planning Section of the G-3 Branch.

Under the College Degree Program, he was graduated in June of 1964 from George Washington University in Washington, D. C. with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration.

The colonel's next duty assignment took him to Cherry Point where he served as executive officer of Marine Aircraft Group 24 until reporting to Beaufort in October of 1965.

During the Dominican Republic Crisis of 1965, he served from April to June as the executive officer of the 6th. Marine Expeditionary Unit and the 6th. Regimental Landing Team which initially went ashore during that Caribbean crisis.

He was promoted to the rank of colonel in July of 1965.

The colonel's personal awards and decorations include three Distinguished Flying Crosses, The Bronze Star Medal with Combat 'V', 12 Air Medals, the Navy Commendation Ribbon with Combat 'V', Presidential Unit Citation, Army Commendation Medal, the American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Korean Service Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, the United Nations Service Medal, and the Korean Presidential Unit Citation.

Colonel Mehaffey and his wife, the former Mary Jane Birkelund of Santa Monica, Calif., have two daughters, Chris, 10, and Melissa, 8. They live at 4 Bay Circle, Laurel Bay, South Carolina.

The colonel's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Z. O. Mehaffey, live at Lake Leon.

Vehicle Inspection Period Now Underway

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection stickers from one of the 5500 official inspection stations," he said.

In announcing the new inspection period, the Public Safety Director pointed out that vehicle defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during 1965 were the fewest yet experienced since the inspection program began in 1951.
