Child Support Parental Responsibility

We Americans like to talk a

lot about our rights and privileges but the flip side of that coin is accepting our responsibilities. The week the House of representatives took up a bill that really was about accepting personal responsibility.

Some of the welfare reform changes that were enacted two years ago were very controversial, but one thing that almost everyone agrees with is that parents should accept responsibility for their own children. When we bring children into this world, we should not then expect the state or the federal government to pick up the costs of those children.

In other words, enforcing child support payments from absent parents is an important feature of welfare reform. As a matter of fact, Texas was able to save the money for 21,000 families previously on welfare rolls in the period 1991-1995 simply by enforcing child support courts orders.

For the most part, child support is an issue handled by the state. As Texas state offices have become much more aggressive in enforcing child support payments, there have been some kinks with the computer system which haven't yet been worked out. While those problems need to be repaired, it. doesn't' mean that the goals of the efforts are bad or should be abandoned.

Special problems arise when the custodial parent and children are in one state and the parent who has been ordered to pay child support is in another. It is in situations like this, involving potentially differing laws of more than one state, that the federal government has a role to play in child support enforcement.

The way the law stands now, an outof-state parent who has willfully failed to pay child support for more than a year, or is behind in his payments by more than \$5,000, may be fined and imprisoned for up to six months. However, first-time offenses, no matter how egregious, are not felonies under current law.


This week the House passed legislation which responds to cases of extreme first-time offense. In these cases where "deadbeat parents: move between states, or out of the United States, in order to evade their child support obligations, the House decided that a more severe penalty was in or-

Smoked Turkey

My mother's parents were farmers who lived on a 260 acre farm near Sioux City, Iowa. Every summer, our family made a pilgrimage north, and experienced cows, ponies, and chickens. My grandmother raised chickens; she fed them, gathered eggs, and even butchered her own pullets for the most delicious fried chicken in the world. I was fascinated by her butchering ritual. Grandma would bind up her hair, put on an apron, and then she was ready to begin. After catching the chickens, she would tie them (by their feet) to a wire fence, sharpen the biggest butcher knife I have ever seen, then she would go down the line, hold the head and sever the neck with one decisive slash. The chickens would wildly flap their wings, and I always knew what people meant when they said someone was like a chicken with his head cut off. Blood spattered everything, and the blood made red beads in the dust as it fell. Finally, the chicken's wild hysteria abated. Grandma cut them down, took them to the basement to pluck and gut them (she was very careful when pulling out the innards to not rupture anything that would contaminate the meat). This process took all morning, and it was so matter-of-fact that it seemed a natural part of farm life. Grandma was not murdering animals, she was preparing dinner for her family.

One day my very best friend, Jan, called and asked, "Rudy killed a turkey, do you want it?" I said, "Sure, I'll come over and pick it up." "No," she replied, "I'll bring it to you." I might have gotten suspicious, but Stan and I had been unable to bag a turkey on our lease, and it seemed proper that I should take it. I was unprepared for the animal that appeared to fill the bed of her Chevy 4 x 4 pick-up truck. Not wanting her to think I was ungrateful. I helped her carry the beast into the work side of our garage. And beast it was with closed eyes on a neck that stretched interminable from the head to the body of feathers. I discovered that it had been gutted; at least I didn't have to do that. I was only faced with the chore of plucking it and getting that horrible head and neck off. Unable to decide what to do first (or how to do it), I called my mother.

SMOKE FROM SOUTH OF THE BORDER CLOUDS AIR OVER TEXAS

went home to LaMarque for Mother's Day. As much as I enjoyed the visit with my mother, I was shocked at the air quality on the Gulf Coast. Visibility in Houston was horrible from a smoky haze hanging over the city.

It was the worst I've seen in the area where I grew up and spent the first 30 years of my life.

By now you've probably heard why this is happening. Smoke from agricultural and forest fires raging in Mexico and Central America has been wafted north across the gulf by prevailing winds. Dry conditions in Mexico have driven out of control the annual fires set to burn the remains of last year's crops and clear forest areas for more planting.

The smoke has created a public health alert in Texas, the first of its kind in recent history. A public health advisory has been issued for 51 Texas counties, including the cities of Houston, Victoria, Corpus Christi, Kingsville, Brownsville and Laredo. The National Weather Service is predicting that conditions are worsening for the cities of Austin and San Antonio. Haze can be seen in the air over Fort Worth and Wichita Falls.

The first priority of government in this situation has to be trying to stop the fires, and ensuring that Texans are aware of the health risks the smoke may cause and what precautions they can take to avoid problems.

These conditions are especially bad for the young, the ailing and the elderly. In fact, local schools have canceled all outdoor activities.

In the meantime, I and other members of the Texas congressional delegation are taking steps to see that our state doesn't suffer doubly from the increased air pollution. I have written a letter asking the Environmental Protection Agency not to sanction Texas because of these air quality problems.

I am acutely concerned about the effect of this natural event on the ability of Texas to meet federal clean air standards. Texas has worked diligently to improve its air quality greatly. San Antonio now complies fully with federal air quality standards under the Clean Air Act, but without the relief I am requesting from EPA, these fires may result in the EPA reclassifying San Antonio's air quality.

Such a reclassification would mean that EPA could mandate additional regulations that could have severe economic consequences for the area. These could include stringent new regulations on vehicles, business and industry, such as mandatory carpooling and denying permits for business expansion.

Our communities — and their economies — should not be punished for



a situation they can do nothing to alleviate when they've worked so hard for so long to remain in compliance with the law.


I have asked EPA Administrator Carol Browner, specifically, that any poor air quality due to the fires not be used to determine whether Texas cities are achieving the standards set under the Clean Air Act.

In addition, I have asked the White House to extend all possible emergency assistance to the Mexican government for its efforts to extinguish the fires. Mexico has been working feverishly to put out the fires, but has been hampered by drought and weather conditions.

The only way to lick this problem will be through cooperation: cooperation between Texas and the federal agencies involved, and cooperation between the United States and Mexico. I am working to see that these efforts begin swiftly, are carried out smoothly, and that these fires do not have lasting consequences.



The bill also strengthens the TRIO programs, which provide support, mentoring and guidance to first-generation college students and other "vulnerable" students.

> "At a time of the year when many students are graduating from high school and preparing for college, I can't think of a more appropriate way for the House to show its support of students and colleges," Stenholm noted.

WASHINGTON, D.C.- The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will authorize the sale of nearly 30,000 additional tons of dairy products under the Dairy Export Incentive Program (DEIP), according to Congressman Charles Stenholm.

Under the DEIP, the USDA enters into partnerships with private exports firms to develop export markets for U.S. dairy products.

The announcement by USDA Secretary Dan Glickman came in response to an effort launched by Stenholm, calling on the Administration to use every tool at its disposal, including DEIP, to stabilize declining milk prices.

"More needs to be done to increase the value of DEIP as a dairy product export market development tool, and to strengthen its potential for preparing the industry for a subsidy-free environment," Stenholm told Glickman. "In less than two years, dairy price supports will have been eliminated, and it is critical that you take action now."

The U.S. has agreed to a 118,000

ton annual cap on exports. Glickman's


action ensures that the full amount will be sold, including 30,000 tons that have been reported to the World Trade Organization (WTO) but not exported. Valued at \$50 million, most of the exports will go to Mexico and the Carib-

The 1996 Farm Bill provided for the elimination of the dairy price support program on December 31, 1999. Stenholm sponsored provisions in the 996 Farm Bill that made important changes to DEIP, focusing the program on market development and requiring maximum use of the program consistent with obligations under the WTO.



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
