THE DODO BIRD IS SUPPOSED TO FLY BACKWARDS, interested only in where he has been and not caring where he is going - - dumb bird they say.

ON THE OTHER HAND, HE MAY BE about half right. How can we really tell which way we are headed and what lies ahead if we ignore conditions created by where we have been?

THE ADMINISTRATION HEADED BY PRESIDENT JOHN SON emphasizes the forward look. In fact, since the days of President Roosevelt's "New Deal," all Administrations have sloganized their program for the future in inspiring terms — New Deal, Fair Deal, The Team for Peace and Prosperity, The New Frontier, and now The Great Society. George Washington said that unless there was vision a Nation perishes. So there must be the forward look to meet the rapidly changing condition.

HOWEVER, NOT ALL THE PAST IS LIKE water over the dam. — All problems created by where we have been do not dissolve and flow away, never to be recognized again. For unless we also have a backward look, — to profit from mistakes and failures, — chances are the same mistakes and failures will repeat themselves with greater thrust. To paraphrase something Emerson once wrote, "We should have reached a maturity to prove that we are capable of listening, not only to what the hours tell us, but what the centuries whisper."

GOVERNMENT AT BEST IS EXPENSIVE. New programs invite new demands and new demands invite new programs — one begets the other and seemingly there is no end. There is a limit to everything except that which Washington thinks it can provide. The limit in our personal affairs is when we spend all we have and exhaust our credit. Not so with Government.

OTHER HANGOVER PROBLEMS too numerous to mention will be around to plague the future for a long time to come. While planning new approaches to present day issues, ignoring the signpost just past, can be disastrous. Another glaring example has been our failure to distinguish friend from adversary in our far-flung Foreign Aid Program. Surely we have learned something from conditions now confronting us in many parts of the world, but as yet there is no clear indication we have.

WHAT HAS BEEN REFERRED TO AS THE "greatest show on earth" opened in Washington this week — the 89th. Congress. The tent is the same and so are most of the acts. It remains to be seen what sort of performance will be given in 1965. A wag remarked that some of our officials have more solutions than there are problems. There is an element of truth here. Unfortunately, the solution is too often the appropriation of more money and there the matter ends.

## Farm And Ranch Tax Clinic Set For January 12, Es-land

The Annual Farm and Ranch Income Tax and Social Security Clinic will be held next Tuesday, January 12, 1965.

The clinic will be held in the County courtroom (west side) on the third floor of the courthouse in Eastland beginning at 9:30 a. m. and closing about 3:00 p. m. with time out at noon for lunch. The morning session will be devoted to income tax problems with explanations concerning changes in the law as pertaining to investment credit, medicine and drug costs, sale of a residence charitable contributions and other features.

Billy Freeman, Area Farm Management Specialist, Agric. Extension Service, Stephenville, will be in charge of this part of the program.

Mr. R. R. Tuley, Abilene, District Supervisor of the Social Security Adm. or his representative will discuss any changes in the social security laws as they apply to farmers and ranchers.

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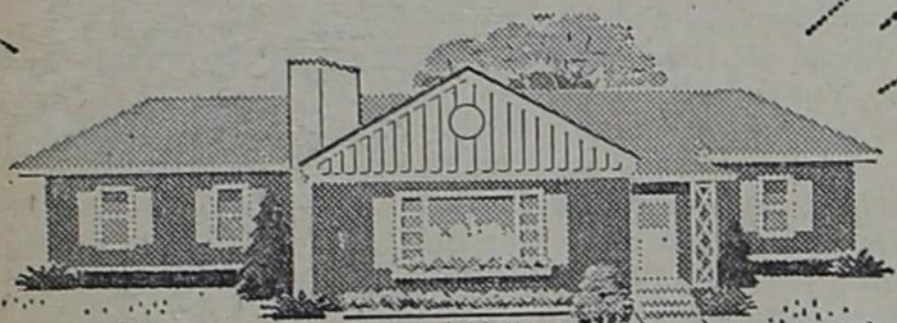

# '64 Marks Beginning Beef Futures Market

College Station—This past year will be remembered by brokers as the year cowboys invaded the trading floor.

The Chicago Mercantile Exchange began a system of beef cattle futures trading this year, and, without getting dirty boots or a sunburn, anybody with the money can become a cattle trader.

The biggest users of the new market device are expected to be traditional livestockmen - producers, feeders, dealers and slaughterers, according to Ed Uvacek, a Texas A&M University livestock marketing specialist.

"Owning cattle always involves risk of death losses, sickness, and price fluctuation," Uvacek said. "Future trading allows some of this risk to be shifted. It minimizes the effects of price changes and guarantees a price level."

The trading unit of the system is 25,000 pounds of USDA Choice grade, live steers in one of two weight ranges. One is 1,000 to 1,150 pound steers that will yield 61 percent of this weight in carcass. The other is 1,151 to 1,300 pound steers that will yield 62 percent.

As in grain trading, a delivery month is specified in the contract. Cattle futures contracts can be made in April, June, August or October delivery to stockyards in Chicago or Omaha.

A commission rate of \$36 is charged by the commodity broker for buying and selling a contract.

November 30 was the first day of cattle future trading. Uvacek said that trading started with tremendous activity and enthusiasm. At the end of the first week, contracts closed for April at \$23.40 per hundred pounds; June, \$23.65; August, \$24.05; and October, \$24.40.

"Futures are not the answer to all the problems of the beef business," Uvacek said. "They will, however, provide the opportunity for hedging against the severe price fluctuations that are common in the industry."

## Softly And Tenderly

A quiet man is heard around the world

Visitors were barred from the sick room. Dwight L. Moody, the evangelist who had stirred 50,000,000 listeners on two continents, had preached his last sermon. A gentleman in his early fifties waited outside in the hall. It was December, 1899, and cold, but the quiet man had come to Northfield, Mass., from his home in East Liverpool, Ohio to pay respects to the man who, with Singer Ira D. Sankey had "reduced the population of hell by a million souls."

Will Lamartine Thompson's gift of music and poetry was matched with "a fine character of sincerity, simplicity and righteousness." He wrote his first song in 1863 at the age of 16, and 10 years later, while studying at Boston's Conservatory of Music, came out with "Gathering Shells by the Seashore." The hit swept the nation from shore to shore and gathered a fortune for the youthful composer who left for Germany to further his musical education and returned to write "My Home on the Old Ohio" and "Under the Moonlit Sky."

Riding the crest of fame and fortune at 40, the mild-mannered composer-poet turned his back on secular compositions and turned his pen to writing hymns. He opened a music store, set

Softly and tenderly Jesus is calling,  
Calling for you and for me;  
See, on the portals He's waiting and watching,  
Watching for you and for me.

Why should we tarry when Jesus is pleading,  
Pleading for you and for me?  
Why should we linger and heed not His mercies,  
Mercies for you and for me?

up his own publishing house for church songs and bought a two-horse wagon. While Sankey, with the voice that could be heard a mile, was singing to the multitudes in America and England, Will Thompson was driving his team of horses in Ohio and singing his own hymns in rural homes. When he found no piano he simply unloaded the one on his wagon and played his own accompaniment to his "Lead Me Gently Home, Father," "There's a Great Day Coming" and "Jesus Is All the World to Me." At the same time, penitents by the thousands streamed down Moody's sawdust trail to Sankey singing of Will Thompson's "Softly and Tenderly Jesus Is Calling." The echo swept into South Africa and was translated in Hawaii.

Through the door of his sick room, Dwight L. Moody heard someone mention the name of Will Thompson. Ignoring doctors' orders, the dying evangelist demanded that he be admitted. Feebly taking the "Bard of Ohio" by the hand, he said, "Will, I would have rather written 'Softly and Tenderly Jesus Is Calling' than anything I have been able to do in my whole life." The song:

Time is now fleeing, the moments are passing,  
Passing from you and from me;  
Shadows are gathering, death-beds are coming,  
Coming for you and for me.

Oh, for the wonderful love He has promised,  
Promised for you and for me;  
Tho' we have sinned, He has mercy and pardon,  
Pardon for you and for me.



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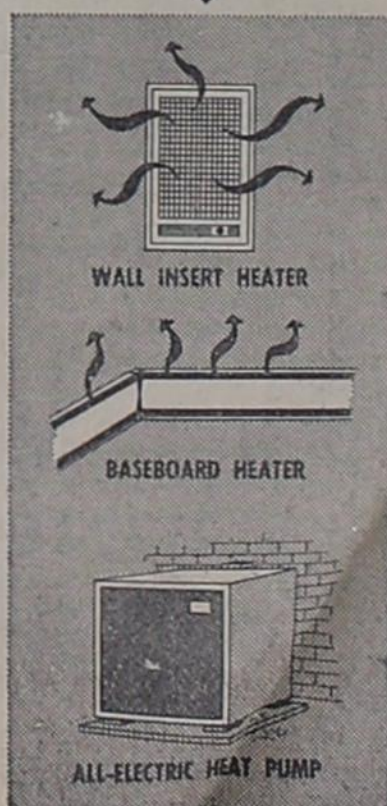

The unusual circumstance came about when Numa Pompilius supposedly created the Roman Calendar in the seventh century B.C. — a calendar that was two months behind the sun when Julius Caesar put his experts to work on the problem. The mathematicians came up with a calendar, but still had the problem of doing something about the two months needed to catch up with the sun.

They solved the problem by inserting the two months between November and December, thus giving the year 46 B.C. a total of 445 days, but also giving the following year a fresh start.
