

## CUBS LOSE OPENER TO DE LEON - JOURNEY TO DE LEON TONIGHT

The Gorman Grade School Cub football team, under Coach Lee Roy Duke, lost their opening tilt last Thursday evening to a fine De Leon passing team by the score of 20 to 0.

De Leon received the kickoff of their own 40 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage De Leon showed what was ahead offensively for the Cubcats when quarterback Hardin, a very tall boy, tossed a pass to Halfback Roach who gathered it in on the Cub 35 and rambled untouched to cross the goal for the touchdown. De Leon threw a pass for the two extra points.

## Peanut Tour On Friday Draws Large Group

The peanut farm tour held here on Friday drew a large number of peanut farmers from the Gorman area as well as surrounding areas.

The tour included farms of A. D. Pittman, Norman Park, Jug Dennis, D. B. Warren, Claude Fuller, Ted Snider, Wayne Eaves, Tom Broom and J. O. Jackson, Jr. where visitors saw production practices of irrigated and dry land peanuts. These practices included double row planting, use of herbicides for weed control and use of sulphur for leaf diseases.

Some peanuts are being dug prematurely due to the excess moisture which has been prevalent this year.

Farmers learned from the tour that dry land peanuts are expected to be as productive as the irrigated ones this year.

The informal tour was conducted by De Gordon, Eastland County Agricultural Agent. Answering farmers questions pertaining to peanut production throughout the tour were B. C. Langley and Tom Denman of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Stephenville, and John Burleson, District Agricultural Agent of Stephenville, and R. G. Burwell of Stephenville and Skippy Peanut Butter Co. He formerly served as District Agricultural Agent.

General opinion of the area farmers are for the best peanut production crop ever produced in the Gorman area.

The best looking peanuts were found on the Lizzie Jackson farm west of Gorman on the Carbon Highway and farmed by her son J. O., Jr. The only irrigation used was just before planting, and according to De Gordon, sulphur was applied at the proper time for control of leaf diseases.

## WOLVERINES WIN OVER SIDNEY 24-16; PLAY AT TOLAR TONIGHT

On Thursday night the Carbon Wolverines won their third game of the season in as many starts by downing the Sidney six man team by a score of 24 to 16.

Carbon got on the score board first as Larry Bryant caught Bobby Wilson of Sidney in the end zone for a 2 point safety.

A few plays later Ronnie Hughes ran a Sidney punt back for 75 yards and a touchdown. Alvie Allison kicked the extra point, making the score Carbon 10 and Sidney 0.

Just before the first quarter ended Nicky Pruitt ran 10 yards for Sidney's first tally. The try for points failed and the first period ended with the score of 10 to 6 in favor of Carbon.

The Wolverines scored their second marker of the night midway of the second stanza with Hughes going over from 2 yards out. This touchdown was set up with a 40 yard pass from Alvie Allison to Herbert Casey. Allison added the points after.

The two clubs exchanged possessions and the Cubs started a drive on their second possession in which they picked up three first downs before being held.

De Leon took over on their own 36 yard line. They scored their second touchdown in eight plays with Hardin ramming over on the final play from two yards out. The try for points failed, making the score 14 to 0, which was the score at halftime.

In the second half neither team could muster any offensive punch until late in the game when De Leon took over the ball on the Gorman 44. They threw two passes, one incomplete and one for 37 yards and a first down on the Cub 7 yard line. Then De Leon scored on a 7 yard burst up the middle. The try for points failed.

The Cubs came back and got a drive going in which they again made three first downs before being stopped.

The final score read De Leon 20 and Gorman 0.

We felt that the Gorman Cubs did a good job considering very few had ever played football and the fact that they had the opening game jitters.

Gorman had 7 first downs and De Leon 8. Gorman got 77 yards on the ground to De Leon's 59. De Leon's fine passing attack picked up 150 yards in 6 of 15 passes. Gorman went 0 for 7 in the passing department.

Johnny Scitern was, without a doubt of anyone, the outstanding player in the ball game. He ran well on offense making 36 yards on 15 carries and did a superb job on defense. Wesley Rogers, at quarterback got 35 yards on 13 tries. Bill Clark picked up 4 yards on two trips.

All of the Cub players got to play in the game.

The Cubs will journey to De Leon tonight for a return game in Bearcat Stadium at 7 p. m. Go get 'em Cubs!

## Ross Wilson Named Chairman Of Sabano Watershed Associat'n

Ross Wilson was named new Chairman of the Sabano River Watershed Conservation Association in a re-activation of the old organization when they met Monday night in the Gorman High School Auditorium. Wilson was elected to fill the office vacated when W. G. Kirk moved to Brownwood. Other officers are H. A. Tyron of Carbon, Vice-Chairman, and Bill Carruth of Rising Star, Secretary.

The organization has been inactive since 1964.

John Simpson of the Eastland County Soil Conservation office in Eastland, assisted by W. R. Heizer of Dublin, executive secretary of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, presented the program for the evening pertaining to flood control.

Wilson gave background information of the project and stated the 100 letters and ballots that had been mailed out to the land owners along the watershed and 73 had been returned and that 71 were for the project and many had remarked "let's get on with it!"

He further stated that the Gorman group were very interested in their phases of the project. Ham Locke of the De Leon Chamber of Commerce and Cecil Shults of the Rising Star C of C, speaking for their groups, said they were also interested in the project and are ready to get the project moving.

Area representatives from De Leon, Rising Star, Dublin, Carbon, and Gorman passed on a motion to authorize Mr. Wilson to use the present funds of the organization to carry on the work of the organization. A motion was also approved for the filing of an application for approval of the project.

Miss Uta Heigl of Moosham near Regensburg Bavaria, Germany, through the Lions Club Youth Exchange, is visiting Texas and the United States for the purpose of studying agriculture.

She and her Texas parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Echols of Caddo, visited Monday at the Gorman Peanuts plant and the peanut farm of Ted Snider where a field of peanuts was being harvested. Accompanying the group to Gorman was Mr. Tom Wade of Breckenridge Lions Club.

Miss Heigl, 23, is interested in agriculture because she is an only child and will one day take over the operation of her father's 500 acre farm (which is considered quite a large farm in Germany).

It is very unusual for a woman in Germany to be interested in agriculture and a woman can not buy land until she is qualified, and must learn all phases of agriculture to become qualified.

To get a master's degree in agriculture and be able to teach in Germany, Miss Heigl is required to get 18 months of actual farm training in all phases of farming even to repairing machinery and

18 months of advanced agricultural courses. She received 12 months training under her father on their farm. She was allowed to study under her father because he has a master's degree. She is required to learn bookkeeping. Her mother does the bookkeeping for her father's farm where they raise 120,000 broilers and 40,000 hatchery chickens each year.

She attended school in England for a year and has had four years of English, six of Latin and one of French. She took the London Chamber of Commerce examination which qualifies her for an agricultural secretarial position.

Since she has been in the U. S. she has visited in 31 states, Canada, and Mexico. She spent ten days in Hereford, Texas studying the production of potatoes and sugar beets. She will leave next week for Florida and a visit up the east coast to Washington before she departs for home.

Mr. and Mrs. Bill Echols became interested in youth exchange last year when their daughter, Melinda, was an exchange youth to Denmark.

Mid-way of the third period the Panthers got the ball on the Early 35 after Ed Sutton had intercepted a Longhorn pass. The Big Red took it for another touchdown in 11 plays. They made two first downs moving the ball to the Early 5 yard line. The Panthers got a 5 yard penalty, then lost 2 yards, made 6, another play failed to gain. On the next play Hirst rolled out to his left and skirted the left side to cross the goal line with 1 minute and 29 seconds left in the third period. Hirst booted the extra point to make the scoreboard read Gorman 20 and Early 0.

On the following kickoff Early ran the ball back to the Panther 40 yard line. From there they scored in five plays with Mann catching an 11 yard pass for the tally with only 55 seconds gone in the fourth stanza. The try for points failed, leaving the score at 20 to 6.

Neither team threatened to score in the time remaining in the fourth period and the final score read Gorman 20, Early 6.

The Panthers moved the ball well on offense during the game but were halted on several drives by penalties and miscues.

The entire team did a real fine job on defense, especially in the interior of the line. Outstanding on the defensive team were James Jay, who made several saving tackles, playing the best game of his career, Robert Reeves, Tommy Simmons, Dwayne Snider, Jim Tom Garrett, John Shell, Ed Sutton, A. B. Eaves, Louis Torrez, and Jackie Harrison.

Jackie Harrison was the leading ball carrier for the Red and Blue rolling up 69 yards of 8 carries, having one of his best nights on offense. Hirst and Reeves were the other offensive sparks.

The Panthers will host the Santa Anna Mountaineers on Saturday night in the Homecoming Game. The Mountaineers have a very fine ball club and should be a real test for the Red and Blue. Santa Anna features a real tough defense and an often bright offense. This should be a real battle for the homecoming tilt and a very large crowd is expected to witness the contest. The Panthers will have to muster all its strength and spirit for this game, and we feel they will do just that.

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**Peanut Farmers Urged To Attend Field Day At Stephenville Today**

Peanut growers and others throughout the area have the opportunity to observe first hand some of the latest developments in peanut production. All current peanut research plots will be inspected by visitors at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville during a peanut field day today, Thursday, September 29 from 1 to 4:30 p. m. New planting patterns that involve skip row and two rows versus one row on the bed are expected to be of particular interest, according to B. C. Langley, Station Superintendent. Other experiments to be featured will include plots that show results of the use of wide variety of weed control chemicals. Advanced breeding lines and new foreign introductions, some of which may eventually become commercial varieties, will be shown, stated Langley.

Also to be shown will be experiments on rate of seeding, bed heights, seed size and maturity, blight and leaf spot control and the technique of peanut breeding. Guides will conduct a walking tour through the experimental plots where specialists will discuss the various experiments.

A brief group discussion period following the tour will give opportunity for growers to ask questions pertaining to their own production problems.

The meeting will be held at the station headquarters 2 miles north of Stephenville on Highway 281.

**WCSB Begin Study Of Church's Dilemma**

Affluence and Poverty or Wealth and Want in the United States and throughout our one-world has awakened the minds of Christian people to the fact that the Church is confronted with a dilemma which must be understood and that the Church must face up to the dilemma according to the will of God.

The dilemma is the fact that the United States has an abundance and yet want exists among great numbers within its borders with millions going to bed with a hunger for bread and for the abundant life. The far horizon of this dilemma reaches to the uttermost parts of the earth.

Mrs. S. A. Baker, leading the study, gave four prevalent answers to the question "Why do some have wealth while others are in want?" From four viewpoints the answers were (1) the tragic viewpoint, the pronouncement at the gates of the Garden of Eden. Gen. 3:14; (2) the deterministic, everything is fore-ordained; (3) the ascetic, wealth is evil and there is a certain righteousness, maybe humility, in being poor; (4) the optimistic, Jesus's viewpoint that abundant living is to be desired; especially is wealth wonderful for Christians who remember the Master's words "To feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to visit the sick and those in prison . . . In as much as thou has done it unto the least of these my brethren, thou has done it unto me."
