WASHINGTON, D. C. — "THE PRESIDENT, VICE PRESIDENT and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors." This is Section 4, Article II of The Constitution.

THERE HAS BEEN MUCH DISCUSSION over the years as to what constitutes impeachable offenses. For many years the theory was maintained that impeachable offenses only were impeachable. This theory has been stoutly defended and stoutly denied. Only one case appears to exist for impeachment on an offense not subject to indictment.

MOSTLY WE THINK OF TREASON, bribery or, for that matter, any crime, as being clearly a matter of black and white. In any criminal trial in our courts, intent often determines convictions, acquittal or mitigation. Intent and motive is at the heart of solving crime as well as prosecution. The courts have held that to convict one charged with advocating the overthrow of our Government, an overt act must be proved. In other words, action must be connected with statement of the accused.

IT IS QUITE A HORSE OF ANOTHER COLOR when he attempts justification of violence and revolution directed at influencing the overthrow of the Government of the United States of which he is a part. Reading his words there seems to be no distinguishable difference between "the system," "the establishment" and established order under law.

JUSTICE DOUGLAS WRITES THAT HE hopes the revolution he is talking about will not be like the one of 1776. The revolution that is coming, he says, will arise from "the search of youth for ways and means of making the machine . . . the servant of man." Just exactly what this means is a little difficult to interpret.

THE INTERPRETATION IS LESS VAGUE when he encourages violence and says that it bothers him that the establishment may not be wise enough not to use "its stockpile of arms" to suppress the dissenters, for he thinks that will bring on an awful ordeal.

DATA IS BEING COLLECTED IN CERTAIN efforts to determine if impeachment proceedings will stand up against Justice Douglas. Included in the collection of evidence is Mr. Douglas' past association with a private foundation alleged to be tied to racketeers. "POINTS OF REBELLION" IS BEING ADDED to a Bill of Par-

JUSTICE DOUGLAS COMPARES OUR TODAY'S establishment with King George III of England. "George III was the symbol against which our founders made a revolution, now considered bright and glorious," Justice Douglas wrote. The Justice says in his book, "We must realize that today's establishment is the new George III. Whether it will continue to adhere to its tactics we do not know. If it does, the redress honored in tradition is also revolution."

THROUGHOUT HIS TREATISE, MR. DOUGLAS offers a justification for violence. In an appraisal of his writings, he acknowledges that riot has no constitutional sanctions but says that "injustices may pile so high that violence is the only answer."

IN OTHER PASSAGES, THE SUPREME COURT JUSTICE advises American protesters to risk arrest because the police have no right to interfere with their freedom. (Can you imagine this?)

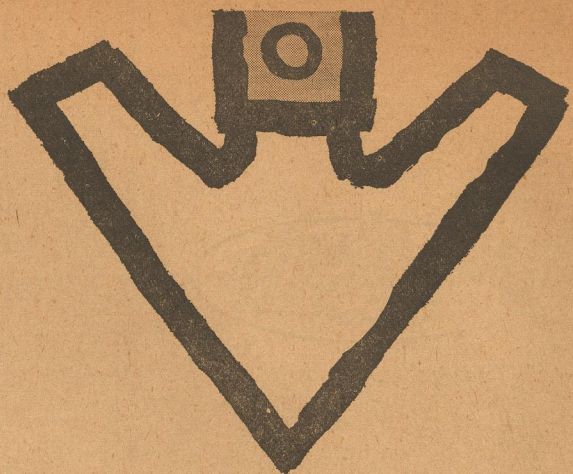
MR. JUSTICE DOUGLAS EXCORIATES the military, FBI snooping and other law enforcement agencies trying to get at lawlessness and writes an indictment of our society in general. To this criticism alone, he is entitled to his personal opinion.

At least he should resign from the Supreme Court, which he must also hate even in its recent years of applying the extreme liberal philosophy. Apparently the Justice has prejudged cases which could possibly come before him of a nature involving revolutionary activities.

Violations

Sheriff L. E. Sublett received the following from Emory C. Walton, County-District Attorney of Eastland County on February 23.

This is to advise you of a change in the liquor laws, Article 665-17, Vernon's Texas Penal Code. Previously the charges of making alcoholic beverage available to a minor, and for minor in possession of alcoholic beverage, were all handled in the Justice of the Peace courts or in the city courts. The said statute has been amended and the charges should be filed as follows:

1. The following offenses now carry a minimum fine of \$25.00 and a maximum fine of \$200.00 on first offenses, and are to be filed in the Justice of the Peace court or city court:

a. A charge of a minor purchasing any alcoholic beverage.

b. A minor in possession or consuming any alcoholic beverage unless at such time the person under the age of 21 years is accompanied by his or her parent, guardian, adult husband or adult wife, or adult person into whose custody he or she had been committed for the time being by some court, who is actually, visibly and personally present at the time such alcoholic beverage is possessed or consumed.

2. The following offenses previously filed in the Justice of the Peace Court or city court, are now misdemeanors which must be filed in the County Court:

a. To purchase an alcoholic beverage for or knowingly make available an alcoholic beverage to a person under the age of 21 years, unless the purchaser, person making available or giver is the parents, legal guardian, adult husband or adult wife of the person for whom the alcoholic beverage is purchased, made available, or to whom it is given.

b. It is also unlawful for any parent, legal guardian, adult husband or adult wife of a person under 21 years of age to purchase for or knowingly make available to a person under 21 years of age, any alcoholic beverage except for consumption in the actual, visible and personal presence of said parent, legal guardian, adult husband or adult wife.

These two charges each carry a minimum fine of \$100.00 and a maximum fine of \$500.00 on the first offense, and must be filed in the County Court.

Also, let me call to your attention that any person under 21 years of age charged with one of the above offenses in Justice of the Peace Court or city court is required to have his parent or guardian present during the proceedings; however, the court may waive the requirement of the presence of the parent or guardian for any case in which, after diligent effort, the court is unable to locate them or compel their presence. Also, the Court is required to give written notice of such offense to the parent or guardian having legal custody of such minor, who resides outside of the jurisdictional limits of the court.
