

Ed Harrison Is Named As Top Conservationist

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District has named Ed Harrison as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer and Rancher of the district and have also nominated him for state honors.

He will compete in the Texas Conservation Awards Program to be held in Fort Worth on May

2, 1970. Mr. "Ed", 50, and his wife, Marilyn, live in an attractive home on their ranch located 6 miles northeast of Gorman, where they moved in 1950 after "Ed" decided to quit as a pilot for the Pan-American Air Lines where he had worked for seven years. Mr. and Mrs. Harrison are proud of their two children, a son, Joe, a professor at John Tarlton State College at Stephenville, and a daughter, Linda Brumbelow, who lives with her husband in Eastland. Pride and joy of the Harrison family is the

2-year-old granddaughter, Sherry Lynn Brumbelow. This farming and ranching unit under the management and operation of Mr. Harrison is now considered among the best in this area. Ed developed a Conservation Plan with the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District soon after he moved to this place. He has made continuous improvement each year. In February of 1964 he was one of the first to take advantage of the Great Plains Conservation Program enacted in Eastland County. Ed developed a GPCP Contract with the assistance of SCS personnel, that has enabled him to make many of his "conservation dreams" come true.

Each farming or ranching enterprise must stand on its own - he keeps a most detailed and efficient set of records as a basis of his operations. He knows for example how each individual registered Hereford cow performs cost per acre of producing a peanut crop, oat crop or forage sorghums. As a result of these records he has established approximately 300 acres of overflow cropland along the Leon River to Coastal bermudagrass. He feels that oat or forage sorghum production on these areas year after year will not pay their way. He is quick to point out the advantages of Coastal bermuda such as (1) less soil loss due to overflow, (2) excellent summer grazing which enables him to give his 2,998 acres of rangeland a complete growing season deferment each year and (3) labor, equipment and operations costs are reduced to a minimum. He has an exceptional knowledge of grasses, how they grow and their successful management. He maintains a registered cow herd of Hereford of 131 head and runs 1500 goats to help keep his brush sprouts under control. This comparatively light rate of stocking, along with the use of Coastal bermuda assures continued range improvement. Most range land pastures are in good condition with limited areas of excellent condition.

Ed also has a peanut allotment of 188 acres on this place. His yields have been well above the local county average. Strip cropping, returning of all peanut residue to the land and a cover crop of rye following harvest are essentials of his conservation cropping system. He is quick to follow any improved method such as fertilizer, insect and disease control, improved planting, harvesting and drying equipment. He is considering the construction of a large lake for the purpose of irrigating peanuts in the future.

Peanut production from native trees along the Leon River bottomland is also a profitable enterprise on this unit. He practices brush control, timely thinning, disease and insect control. The conservation and financial success of this operation unit speaks for itself - an outstanding example of what love for the land plus managerial ability can accomplish.

He serves his neighbors and friends as a district director of the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District. His love for the land and its needs for conservation is exceeded only by his concern for his family, fel-

Each year between 100 and 150 people attend from about twenty-five counties and a few from other states, reports county agent DeMarquis Gordon.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE CLASSIC TYPE OF INFLATION is caused by too much money chasing too few goods. In the present situation, goods have been plentiful supply but as related to the availability of money over the last several years, a part of the inflationary pressures are still of the usual type. The Administration has now defined its economic policy but price increases have not responded to the extent that was hoped for by the application of the surcharge tax and the tightening of credit. The public response to these efforts has simply been lacking.

IN STATEMENTS OF THE LAST FEW DAYS, the top fiscal advisors to the Administration indicate that tight money will soon be relaxed to some degree, which would in turn ease interest rates. This action is anticipated to prevent too sharply a downturn in the economy while prices remain high.

THERE IS CONSIDERABLE DESPERATION in trying to meet the continued rise in the cost of living. The question is will every group continue to push with all its economic muscle for higher prices and wages because of this assumption, some conclude that the spiral can not be broken without wage and price controls and that as a consequence the country might just as well expect this limitation on its free economy.

THE LEAST THAT CAN BE ASKED is that before the specter of a strait jacket on a free enterprise system looms too big, executives, union leaders and others, who make decisions that are pushing wages and prices skyward, take a long hard look at what is happening. The shipping industry is an immediate case in point. While there are proposals to build many new merchant ships at a subsidized price of \$7 billion, ships are laid up in Eastern ports at the present time and others are going to foreign registry which can operate more cheaply. At this very time, ships are entering Eastern seaports without tugboats because of a strike. Obviously there is not much point in building more ships under these conditions.

THE ESSENCE OF FREEDOM IS TO LIVE AND LET LIVE. A society can exist only by some means of maintaining order and balance among its competing elements. When all voluntary restraints are thrown to the winds, the choice is between chaos and tyranny.



Census takers are needed: people who can work from three to five weeks in April and May visiting homes and interviewing some member of the household. The District Manager says that every effort will be made to assign census takers to their own neighborhoods or those nearby.

Pay will be on a piece rate basis, designed to average \$2.00 an hour, but as the District Manager pointed out, earnings will vary depending largely on the diligence of the individual census takers. Some will earn well above average, while others who work less effectively will earn less.

Census takers must be U. S. citizens, 18 or older, and must pass a written test demonstrating their ability to understand and follow printed instructions, and do simple arithmetic. It is desirable but not required that applicants have available a home telephone and a car.

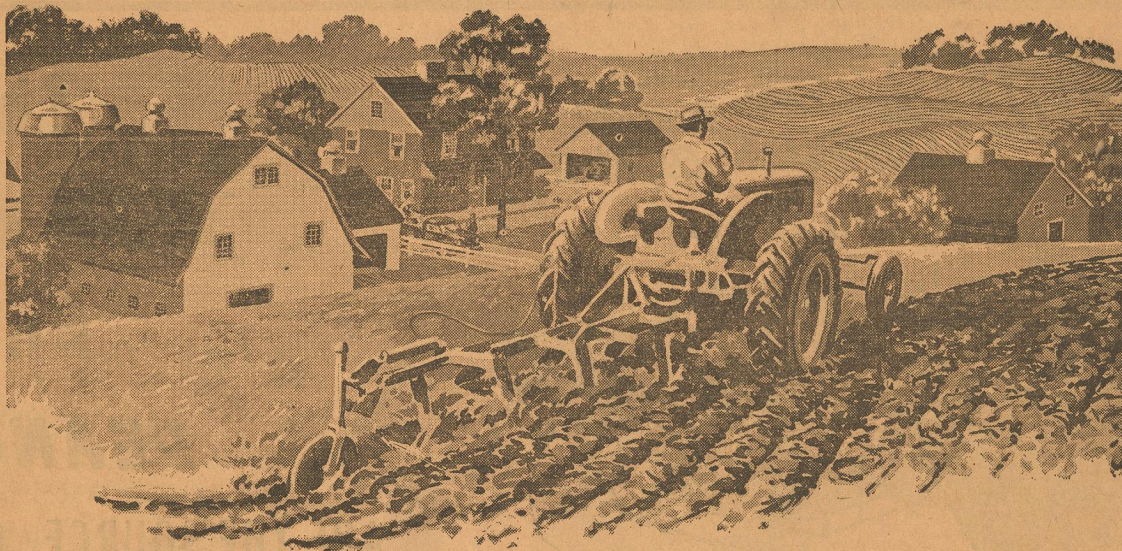
