

Panthers To Host Buffaloes In Game Opener Friday

The Gorman Panthers will begin their regular 1999 Football season this Friday night at 7:30 p.m. when they host the Cross Plains Buffaloes.

The Panthers are returning 6 starters on Offense and 5 on Defense but were hurt by graduation from last season's experienced team. The Big Red posted an 8-3 record last season and played in the playoffs, losing in the first round to Bronte.

The Big Red will have to fill several key positions for this season due to the heavy loss at graduation and will really have to play up to their potential and improve as the season progresses. Also the Panthers are using a different offensive scheme this season and it takes awhile to get the players indoctrinated to the new system.

Returning offensive starters include Dathan Wright, 6-0, 190, Senior Running Back; Bubba Hagood, 6-2, 225 Senior Lineman; Josh Johnson, 6-0, 220, Junior Lineman; Mike Torres, 5-8, 175, Junior Lineman; David Seaton, 5-8, 150, Junior Running Back; and Bradley Gilmore, 6-1, 170, Senior Wide Receiver. Returners on the Defense are Wright, LB; Hagood - DE; Johnson -DL; Torres - LB; and Seaton - LB. Wright was a All-District Running Back, 2nd Team Linebacker. Top new players who are expected to fill some important positions are Josh Longoria, 5-10, 165, Junior Quarterback and DB; Michael Lynch, 6-2, 165, Sophomore Wide Receiver and FS; and Joseph Duvall, 5-9, 170, Junior Offensive Lineman and DE. Gorman tied for the District 14A Championship with the Tolar Rattlers but lost out in the first round of the playoffs. W. H. Smith Dept. Store

In the Spring of 1920, W. H. Smith Sr. called on his bride to be, Mamie Daniell, and said "you may want to call off the wedding because I've borrowed \$7,000. From the F&M Bank to open a business with Bob Steakley."

Previously employees of Higginbotham's Steakly and Smith began a grocery, implement and hardware business in a portion of the building now occupied by the First National Bank. By 1927 their business flourished to the point that they bought the E. E. Akers Dry Goods business located at the present location of the W. H. Smith Department Store and became Steakley and Smith Stores. One year later, Mr. Smith purchased Mr. Steakley's part of the business; then Bob Steakley joined his 2 brothers in what was to become immensely successful Chevrolet dealerships. The name became "Smith Stores," with groceries on one end of the block and dry goods on the other.

In 1929, the depression caused Smith to move the grocey store stock into the bank of the dry goods store. Services, taken for granted in those days included free home delivery, "curb service" (drive up to the front or back door and honk your horn for a clerk to come out and take your order), and free coffee grinding. New products such as battery and electric RCA and Zenith radios, Norge products including gasoline powered washing machines, gas ranges, and refrigerators, helped brighten the bottom line during the early days of the big depression. Poll Parrot Shoe money was given customers when they purchased shoes. This money was redeemable in the store for dinnerware, watches, tools, etc.

In 1936, Smith sold more Norge Applicances than any other dealer in a town of this size, winning a trip to the Norge factory in Michigan and a diamond ring. In 1938, the store held a month long promo in which the grand prize, a bedroom suite, was won by Mr. and Mrs. Pete Sides. One way to amass points toward the prize was to bring in used rubber automobile tires. A picture of the tires appearing in the De Leon Free Press showed them reaching from the street to the awning the full width of the store. They were hauled to the peach orchard for possible "smudging" but later sold for scrap rubber during the early days of WWII. When food rationing was announced, Smith decided to sell out his grocery stock and devote more time to his expanding fruit orchard which he had begun in 1934.

In 1947, W. H. Smith, Sr. entracted a commitment from his son, W. H, Jr., a sophomore at Texas A&M, to return and join in managing the 435 acre fruit farm and the store. Hiram Smith, Jr. did this after receiving a BA from Texas A&M, and MBA from the University of Texas in Austin, marrying Dale Randals, a Texas Woman's University graduate and a Registered Dietitian who was reared in Hico, and spending 2 years in the U.S. Army, one in Fort Eustis, VA and 8 months in Korea.

In 1954, W. H. Smith, Jr. began managing the store and joined W. H. Smith, Sr. in operating the fruit farm. Several promotional events were introduced by the store in the years that followed. During the first several years of their January White Sale, cars filled all of the downtown parking places before the doors of the store opened. They introduced Early Bird sales starting as early as 6 a.m., Moonlight Madness Sales with prices falling as the time approached midnight. they have had pre-holiday open houses, displaying holiday and Christmas merchandise, first in the store, in the lobby of the F&M Bank and in the City Hall with live models, food, entertainment by the Tarleton Troubadors, flower arrangements by a National Garden Club Judge Instructor.

The store had an autograph party for De Leon singer/composer/TV host, Gary Chapman when he introduced his first album "Sincerely, Yours," during which he and his (then) wife, Amy Grant selected wall covering for their first apart-







Desdemona Homecoming and Reunion

School Reunion was held on Saturday, August 14, 1999 at the Community Center (old school building). This is an annual affair--the same date having been observed since it began in 1920, except the years during World War II, when it was canceled because of the shortage of gasoline, tires and to await the return of our fighting servicemen and women.

There is still some difference of opinion as to the actual year of the beginning of the Desdemona Homecoming. Some of the oldest old-timers pinpoint the beginning as far back as 1922. Others come up with the year 1932, but history records shows it began in 1920. The style of carrying on of the Homecoming has changed somewhat in the past 60 years of existence.

In the early years when population was on increase, a parade was always formed, sometime a mile in length. The citizens participated on foot bearing comical signs and placards, they rode on horseback, a string music band rode on a wagon or truck, covered wagons were decorated and vehicles from the oldest to the newest were many in number. Beef for the lunch hour was barbecue over an open pit near the present Community Tabernacle. A pitch fork was used to turn the meat. People from far and near brought baskets and boxes of food to spread together for the noon meal. We now have lunch served by a catering service. This gives more time for visiting classmates, teachers and friends. Then (as now) the program was opened with prayer, a congregational song, welcome address, response to the welcome address, recognition of visitors, presentation of engraved award plaques to the oldest man, oldest woman present and a roll call during the memorial service for those who have passed on since the last meeting. Desdemona, known as "Hogtown" reached its peak just after World War I when the discovery well blew in on September 2, 1918 on the Joe Duke farm three miles south of Desdemona in Comanche County. The Duke well, an estimated 8,000 barrels a day gusher, caught fire when it blew in and burned at length before it was brought under control. During the "Hogtown" Oil Boom" days the population was estimated 28,000 to 30,000 but soon declined as the boom ended after 18-20 months of being on of the "Greatest Oil Booms in History." Desdemona, a settlement before the Civil War, acquired its first Church in 1872. The first services were held in a log cabin near Hog Creek--it had one door and a hole for a window. The benches were hewn logs and the pulpit was blanked by guns for emergency use against the Indians. First church was named Rockdale Baptist, later on changed to First Baptist. The establishment of the first post office was in 1882. The settlement known as "Hogtown" was officially named Desdemona when the post office was established, but has never lost the title of "Hogtown." Fort Blair built by Charles Culpepper Blair and wife, Meekie (Reeves) Blair in 1859 prior to any settlement in this area. They are great grandparents of Vonnie Guthery. Stories of how Desdemona actually got its name are many. Supposedly, an oil investor of the Oil Boom Days (after many days of waiting) saw oil shooting through the top of a derrick toward the sky and he shouted "Deah's De Money." Others claim it was Desdemona named from Shakespeare's play "Othello." Officially it was named after Desdemona Wynn, a lovely daughter of the Justice of Peace, J.J. Wynn at that time. She later on taught school in Desdemona. She is buried near Kilgore at Laird's Hill. Her husband was B.O. Thompson, also buried at this place.

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

Nematode Resistant Peanut Varieties

Peanut producers to see new nema- Dr. Forrest Mitchell will discuss the tode resistant peanut varieties. Nematodes are the number one peanut pest causing thousands of dollars in damage and costing many more thousands in treatment each year. Nematodes are a microscopic pest that invades peanut roots and inhibits nutrient uptake. Several years ago Texas A&M Peanut Breeders successfully bed nematode resistance into commercial peanut lines with the hopes of some day having peanut producers plant a nematode resistant peanut. That day is fast approaching and growers can now see how those peanut plants look and perform on the Comanche County Peanut Producer Tour to be held September 15, 199. The tour will begin assembling at 8:30 a.m. for registration at the Steve and Jerry McGinnis farm on FM 2318 with the tour beginning at 9:00 a.m. FM 2318 can be reached from Hwy. 16, 10 miles north of Comanche of 6 miles south of DeLeon or from FM 587 1.7 miles west of DeLeon. The Peanut Producer Tour will include 2 hours of continuing education credit for private, commercial and non-commercial applicators as well as a sponsored noon lunch. To preregister for the Peanut Producer Tour please call the Texas Agricultural Extension Service office in Comanche at 915/356.2539.

Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in this program are encouraged to contact the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser- Rhone Poulenc Ag. Co., and Birdsong vice in Comanche County at 915/356-2539 to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made. The first stop on the tour will be at the Steve and Jerry McGinnis farm at Downing. At this stop producers will see the latest in released peanut varieties and Dr. Robert lemon, Extension Agronomist, will discuss the characteristics of these varieties and how well they are doing in other tests. Near this field is another demonstration on the Leo Page Farm for control of insect pests in peanuts. Work in the Southeast has shown some promise for reducing TSWV when insecticides are used to control insect pests.

spread of TSWV and new advances in control.

A third and final stop will be on the George Bingham field on FM 2247 about 5 miles north of Comanche. This stop includes two research plots with the nematode resistant peanut varieties. One plot includes several new nematode resistant lines that have been planted with portions of the row treated with peanut nematicide. Chris Meador is a graduate assistant who has been working on this project as a part of his Masters work. Chris will explain the research and how it will benefit producers in the future.

A second plot includes work by Dr. Charles Simpson, Peanut Plant Breeder. Charles will explain the progress being made on nematode resistance and show producers all the varieties that are being grown and tested. Also in this field is a very large block of peanuts planted to the Coan variety, the first nematode resistant release. Producers can see how well it is performing in a severe infested nematode area.

St. Jude's legal case goes to Federal Court

Saint Jude's Ranch for Children in Gorman filed a removal Monday that moved a petition for an injunction against a residential treatment center from District Court in Eastland to Federal Court in Abilene.

Since news of the petition became public, 205 Gorman area property owners have indicated they would join an intervention and would add their names to the suit.

Durwood Burgess, one of the six property owners on the original petition expressed his disappointment about the legal move.

"It now seems everything has been put on hold," Burgess said. "We were hoping to have the case heard before a local judge, because this is a local problem."

The case may be local again if Saint Jude's attorneys can't prove it belongs there. A review may put the case back in Eastland, but if the case were to stay in Federal Court, it could be 12-18 months before a rul-




