THE LAWABIDING CITIZEN - A FORGOTTEN MAN

From The Office Of Senator John G. Tower (R-Texas)

(The following is the text of Senator Tower's weekly report to Texans.)

I think we ought to remind ourselves this week about the real forgotten American — the lawabiding citizen.

Let's take a look at that forgotten man, in the form of a small merchant operating in any city or our nation.

Let's draw a typical picture of a citizen who has saved enough money, or borrowed enough money to set up a small shop where he can display his wares. This is apt to be a grocery store, or a service station or something similar.

From the very beginning this citizen of our Republic if circumscribed and directed by various levels of his government. He must conform to government-imposed ordinances about fire hazards and sanitation.

He, himself, can work as long and hard as his physical stamina will allow. But if his business gets large enough to employ a helper he must pay that helper no less than the government dictates, and the hours must be no longer than the government dictates.

He must not defraud his customers. He must not falsely advertise his products. He must not discriminate in his hiring practices, or in selling his wares. He must, in short, operate the way government tells him to operate or he must not operate at all.

The citizen of whom we speak accepts all these rules and regulations. Perhaps not happily, perhaps grudgingly, but nevertheless legally. In return he is allowed to pay a heavy tax burden to practically all levels of government.

He pays a tax for schools even though he may not have children in school. He pays taxes for parks and recreational areas even though his own business may demand so much of his time that he seldom uses a public park. He pays taxes that sometimes go to subsidize his competitors.

All this he does because it is required of him by the laws, and he is a law abiding citizen.

And, he also pays taxes for the financial upkeep of a system of law and order that is an absolute necessity if freedom is to prevail over anarchy, if the individual is to have any rights as opposed to the whims of the temporary mob.

Then, our citizen finds out too late that the policeman who walks his beat has been ordered not to be too harsh on those who would rob him, or burn his store and thereby endanger his life as well as destroy his property. He finds the Attorney General of the United States taking issue with, and undermining the authority of, local officials who have voiced their determination to see that law and order is upheld.

It has been said time and time again in the field of foreign affairs it does this nation little good to possess massive military power if we lack the will to use that power in the defense of the Republic and for the security of our citizens.

By the same token it does us little good to have the means to protect the lives and property of our citizens if we lack the will to use those means. We might as well, under those circumstances, disarm and disband our police and turn our streets over to the tender mercy of arsonists and looters.



Mrs. O. R. Buchanan Retires After Long Career As Gorman First Grade Teacher

Mrs. O. R. Buchanan was born March 7, 1908 in Lometa, Texas. After finishing high school she attended North Texas State Teachers College for two years. After attaining the eligible age of eighteen for teaching she began her career as a teacher in Coleman County schools returning for summer work until she completed her Bachelor of Science degree in the summer of 1934. That fall her teaching started in the Gorman Public School as first grade teacher and she has taught in the same capacity every year except 1935-'36 when she returned to Novice for one term.

Mrs. Buchanan was honored on Thursday night with a hamburger supper at Frank A. Gray Memorial Park when 75 members of the school faculty, school personnel and board of trustees, and their families were hostesses.

Mr. E. C. Bramlett, assisted by Teddy Higginbottom and John Gilbert, were chefs for the barbecuing of the hamburgers.

Mr. Charlie Garret, supt. of schools, paid tribute to Mrs. Buchanan in expressing appreciation for her loyalty and ability as a school employee.

I will accept the fact there is a sickness in our land. But the patient should not be identified as the law-abiding citizen.

.... MORE MORE MORE The patient should properly be identified as the fuzzy-brained, foggy-thinking, opinion-makers who blame everyone but the arsonist for burned buildings; who attempt to blame every citizen of our Republic, except the murderer of course, for murders.

Yes, there are sicknesses in our land.

There is that sickness of heart that is present in all law-abiding citizens when they see their cities, their homes, their businesses go up in smoke while looters and arsonists cavort for the benefit of television.

There is a sickness of dismay among us all when we see smoke obscure our nation's capitol.

And there is, of course, that terrible sickness which comes when we see our chief federal law enforcement officer vacillate in the face of mobs in the streets.

Yes, there is a sickness abroad in the land - it is an illness of the lawless.

And the best medicine to cure that illness is a good, stiff dose of law and order.

Kernel Gene concurs wholeheartedly with Senator Tower's article. Enroute to San Antonio Friday I listened to a news commentator speak of the dire penalties a service man in Vietnam would face if he were caught smoking a marijuana cigarette. I could not help but wonder why this boy who is facing death while on duty 24 hours a day at less than common labor wages and no overtime should be guillotined while hippies, odd people, and weed smokers could be hired by our Post Office Department in California, praised on TV, and probably refused to serve in the Armed Forces; plus receiving overtime if they worked over a limited number of hours per day.

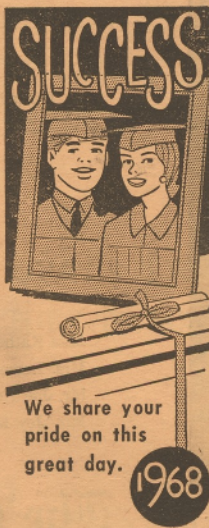

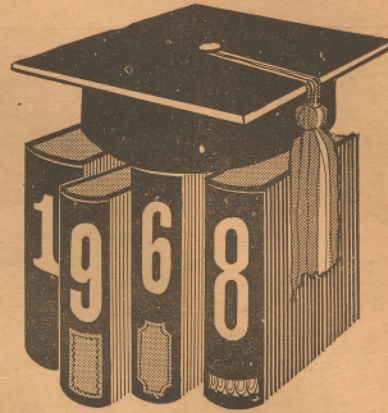

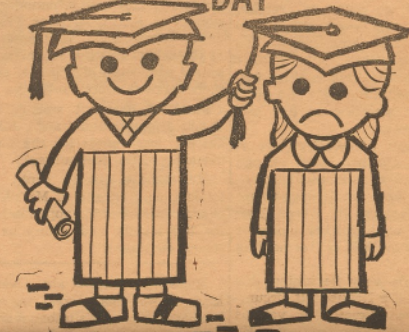

Civil Service Tests For Mailhandlers Being Accepted

The United States Civil Service Commission announces examination for Mailhandler at the starting salary of \$2.59 per hour for Substitute Employees (approximately 40 hours per week) and \$2.51 per hour for Hourly Rate Regular (approximately 20 hours per week), Grade PFS-4, for positions in Abilene, Wichita Falls and a limited number of positions in other larger Post Offices in

the following counties consisting of Zone 3 of Texas: Archer, Baylor, Callahan, Eastland, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Knox, Shackelford, Stephens, Taylor, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young. All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, political affiliations, or any other nonmerit factor. A substitute mailhandler loads, unloads, and moves bulk mail, and performs duties incidental to the movement of mail. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test based on their ability

to follow oral directions and gross dexterity, the understanding of word meaning, and the ability to remember names and locations as needed for simple sorting. Before appointment, applicants must take a strength test which consists of shouldering and carrying sacks containing up to 80 pounds. Full information and applications may be obtained from the Executive Secretary, Regional Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, General Post Office, 401 Franklin Avenue, Houston, Texas 77002, or local Post Offices or Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners.

Hospital Board Reports Progress

Members of the Gorman Hospital Board met on Monday, May 20 with the architectural firm of Preston M. Geren of Fort Worth and discussed plans relative to a hospital facility to replace the existing facility now located in Gorman. It was agreed by representatives of the board and the architectural firm that board representatives would go to Austin later this week to visit with officials of the Texas State Department of Health. The primary purpose of this visit would be to request continued operation of the existing hospital facility in Gorman for an extended period. The granting of such an extension would make possible more detailed plans relative to construction of any facility and would provide more time for planning, fund raising and the many steps which are necessary in such an event. The board viewed realistically the deadline of May 31, 1968, which it faces in submitting an application for Hill-Burton Federal Assistance Funds available to organizations erecting new hospital facilities. Members of the board voiced unanimous opinion relative to the difficulty of completing the vast amount of work necessary in this application and in getting this job done by May 31. The board feels that it is absolutely necessary and the architects present voiced similar agreement to get an extension of time so that the job can be done properly and so that further exploration of the entire problem will be possible. The hospital board wishes specifically to point out to the citizens of Gorman and others who are interested in the Gorman hospital that this facility is currently approved for medical services of all types and that should this situation change the board will give public notice. The board wishes further to advise all interested persons that it is pursuing the hospital project in a diligent manner and will make every effort to keep all interested persons properly informed of its progress. At a later date, it is expected that open forums, public meetings and other methods of informing the public will be used in educating local persons and in soliciting all local support possible relative to this project.

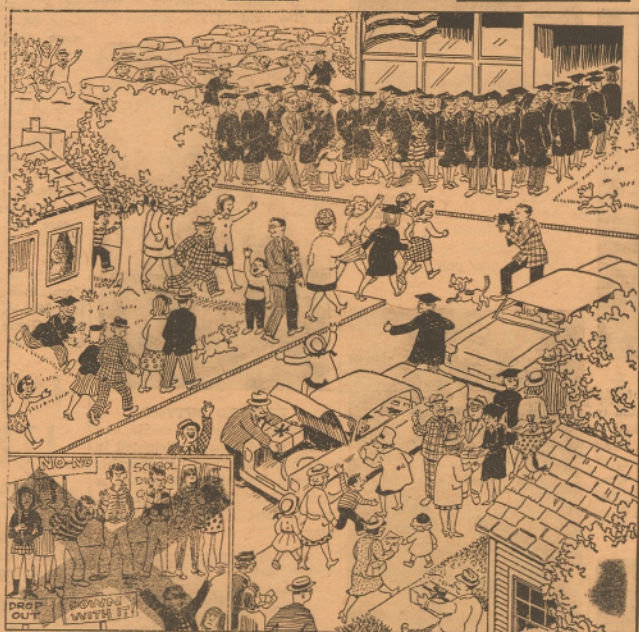

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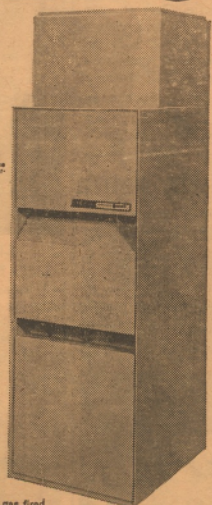
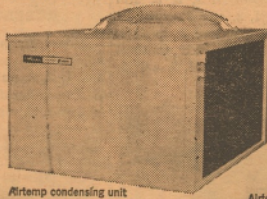
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FIFTH GRADE CLASS ENJOY WESTERN PARTY

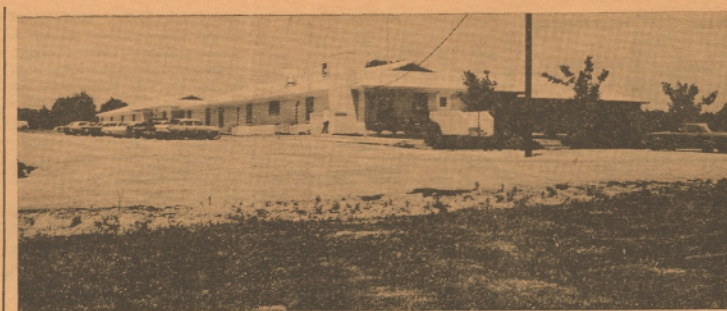

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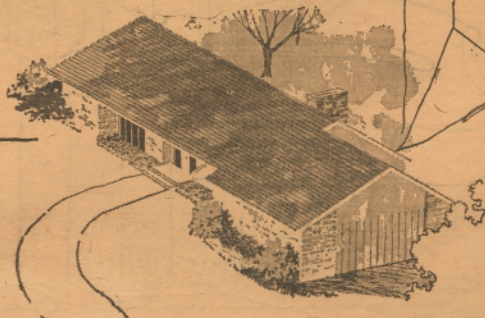

WHAT DO YOU SAY TO 1968 GRADUATES in a commencement address? Since time immemorial, graduates have been addressed pretty much along the same lines. Some speakers will tell them the world is wonderful; that all is good; that opportunities abound all about them. Others have said that everything is bad; that there is great upheaval with all sorts of trials and tribulations ahead. Some exhort; others admonish. Some will wrap up the universe in a ball and hurl it at students and tell them to go out and clean up the mess.

IT WAS SAID THAT PERICLES ON ANNUAL OCCASIONS took the youth of Athens up on the hills overlooking that great city and recited to them the stories of Greece.

SOCRATES WAS PROBABLY THE EARLIEST COMMENCEMENT speaker over 2000 years ago. He seemed to be the Dean of advisers to the youth of that age. In these times it seems justified to stray from the conventional type of address to graduating students. We, as Americans, having seemingly always believed that we could swiftly solve all problems and set about to accomplish the task. It now appears that one thing we must learn is to have the maturity to live with

problems which cannot be readily solved but rather contained and lived with.

IT MAY BE A LITTLE PAINFUL FOR US AS INDIVIDUALS to come to this conclusion but, living in a more complicated and a more complex society than any other age in which man has ever lived, this attitude, although hesitantly arrived at, seems to be a real fact.

IT WAS THE CLASSIC SUMMARY BY CHARLES DICKENS at the beginning of "Two Cities," who wrote, "It was the best of times; it was the age of wisdom; it was the age of foolishness..." and then he continued, "It was the epoch of belief and doubt; the strength of hope; the weakness of despair," and we may all of our own time, it is an era of brotherhood and hate, of courage and of fear.

THE 1968 GRADUATE IS PRESENTED A WORLD of opportunity and of advantages never experienced by any generation. He is given a goodly land whose frontiers were pushed back by others, who dared to move out ahead of their day, to make this Nation the wonderful place it is in which to live.

VISIONS OF MEN AND WOMEN OF GENERATIONS BEFORE, were those who believed in improving conditions around them by work and industry and with a devotion to leave a legacy for those to follow. They did not have a Federal Treasury to fall back upon and depended on no Government paternalism to destroy initiative and individualism.

ON THE OTHER SIDE OF THE COIN, we hand to those graduates a huge public debt, all of which is not invested in capital improvements. True enough part of this debt has been... and is presently, for the defense of our Country. A part of it is for the building of institutions, for the advantages of future generations, for the preservation of our natural resources, and for scientific developments coming out of Government research, which makes life easier.

THE FACT MEANS, HOWEVER, THAT A PART of this debt has bought nothing which we can pass on to those who will soon have the responsibility of building a stronger society. At this very moment the internal security of our Nation is being threatened by the greatest wave of lawlessness and criminal activity in the 192 years of our existence as an independent Nation. Our very form of government that is a free-enterprise structure is threatened by the insistence of conformity in the individual

dual which fosters sterility of thought and behavior; a loss of a sense of personal responsibility, which has been the hallmark of the people who made this the greatest Nation in the world.

IN SIR WALTER SCOTT'S MARMION ARE THESE LINES: "When Prussia hurried to the field, and snatched the spear, but left the shield."

IS IT POSSIBLE THAT WE ARE HURRYING ON THE FIELD with spear but leaving behind the shield of our national strength?

THE TRUE SHIELD OF AMERICA IS NOT ALONE in its armaments and far-flung forces nor is it made up entirely of the ingenuity, inventiveness and economic potential of our people.

RATHER THE TRUE SHIELD OF AMERICA CONSISTS OF THE rights and freedoms, and the duties which go with them, of its citizens. Rights, duties and responsibility are but two faces of the same shield.

IN THE FACE OF THE GRADUATE, who may point his finger at those of us of another generation and say, "What have you been doing about it?", the question becomes difficult to answer.

WE CAN, HOWEVER, SAY TO HIM THAT I WILL JOIN in pledging: "I will not trade freedom for beneficence nor my dignity for a handout. I will never cower before any master nor bend to any threat. It is my heritage to stand erect and proud; to think and act for myself; to enjoy the benefit of my creations and to face the world boldly and say, this I have done and this is what it means for the privilege of being an American."

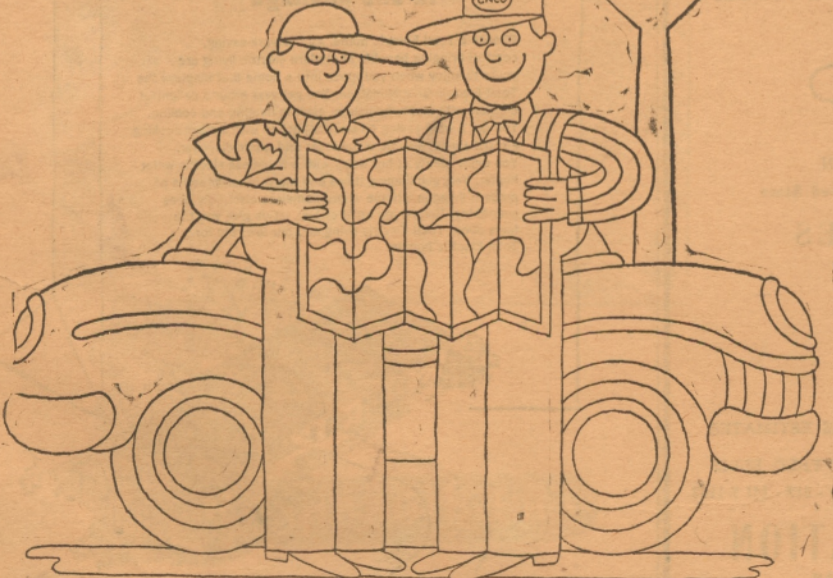
