NEW CENSUS FORM TO INVADE PRIVACY OF ALL CITIZENS-HOME

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IN 1970 A NEW CENSUS of an estimated 205 million people will be taken in the United States.

PRE-TEST QUESTIONS ARE NOW BEING TRIED out in South Carolina and Wisconsin. A certain number of people in the State of Connecticut have already had all or part of the approximately 100 questions submitted to them to test reaction and response.

SOME OF THE QUESTIONS PROPOSED FOR THE 1970 CENSUS are too embarrassing to put in public print. Some of them compare to Dr. Kinsey's Report of a few years ago and definitely invade the privacy of the individual.

TEST QUESTIONS GOING IN THE STATES on a trial basis include:

DO YOU SHARE YOUR BATH TUB OR SHOWER?

WHAT IS YOUR TELEPHONE NUMBER?

HOW MUCH RENT DO YOU PAY?

HOW MANY HOURS DID YOUR HUSBAND WORK LAST WEEK?

HOW MANY BABIES HAS YOUR WIFE HAD?

DO YOU WALK TO WORK OR TAKE A TAXICAB?

HOW MUCH MONEY DID YOU MAKE LAST YEAR.

OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS SOME IN CONGRESS and others outside Government have proposed that there be established a National Data Center which would use the Census Reports as a basis for a dossier file on every American.

NO ONE ARGUES THAT THERE SHOULD NOT BE A CENSUS and, in fact, there are good and substantial reasons why the right kind of Census should be taken every five years instead of ten. There is a vast difference, however, in accounting for the number of people, their age, sex and occupation, and those which invade privacy and to which people should not be subjected.

provided. Originally, it was intended for the purpose of apportioning the U. S. House of Representatives. To quote the authority contained in the Constitution suggests the simplicity intended: "The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such a manner as they shall by law direct." TO THE RESIDENTS OF PROPOSED SOUTH EASTLAND COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, ALL OF WHICH LIES WITHIN A PORTION OF EASTLAND AND COMANCHE COUNTIES, TEXAS, AND ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

THIS GIVES NOTICE THAT, under the authority of Section 9, Article IX, Constitution of the State of Texas, a bill which authorizes the creation of South Eastland County Hospital District, the boundaries of which are co-extensive with and identical to the boundaries of Gorman Independent School District, so that all the area lying within Gorman Independent School District shall lie within South Eastland County Hospital District, all of which area lies within Eastland and Comanche Counties, Texas, will be submitted to the 59th Legislature of the State of Texas for its consideration.

This bill, if enacted by the Legislature, provides among other things that the district has the power to issue bonds to provide funds for the acquisition or construction, or both, of necessary buildings and equipment for hospital purposes and to levy taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property in the district to support the bonds issued and the maintenance and operating expenses of the district.

HOWEVER, the bill requires the approval of a majority of the qualified property taxpaying electors of the district voting at an election called for that purpose; and the bill prohibits, after the creation of the district, all other municipalities or political subdivisions from the levy of taxes and the issuance of bonds and other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district.

THE GORDON SPOT

By Dee Gordon.

If you have not sprayed your pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer this should be done right away. The best time to spray was between May 24 and May 28. Most of the trees I have looked at have a good crop of pecans. We also expect a large number of insects so this should be the year when a good spray program will really pay off.

It also looks like insects are going to be a real problem in the vegetable garden this summer. Sometimes a small cloud of insecticide decides who will enjoy the delicious vegetables in your garden — you or those garden pests. Insecticides, applied at the right time and the right place, are your guarantee that you and your family will be able to enjoy the vegetables from your garden.

Garden chemicals are carefully screened by USDA and the Food and Drug Administration before manufacturers are allowed to make them available to producers. The label clearly states the insects for which the insecticide is effective, its rate of application and the necessary waiting interval between application and eating or processing the vegetables.

The most commonly used insecticides for home gardens are carbaryl (Sevin), chlordane, DDT, diazinon, malathion, methoxychlor, rotenone and sulfur.

For specific information on home garden insect control come by the county agent's office and pick up a copy of "Insect Control In The Home Garden."

Treatment now for cattle grubs can mean extra money in your pocket on sale day. The heel fly activity has ceased and this is a sign of the start of the cattle grub cycle.

It is best to apply systemics in this critical time before the young grubs can do their damage to meat and hide of slaughter animals. Various formulations of "Ruelene", "Co-Ral", and "Neguvon" can be applied as either dips, sprays, or back-line pour-ons. Ronnel can be administered as free choice block or granular mineral mix to range animal — "Rid-Ezy" granules and "Trolene-FM" feed mix can be mixed into animals' rations. Some of these materials will also control horn flies, lice, and ticks when used properly.

Not only do grubs damage the meat and hide, but they compete with the animal for vital nutrients. Adult flies can cause cattle fleeing from the bothersome pest to lose energy and weight.
