VIOLENCE SERVES NOTICE: AMERICAN DEMOCRACY THREATENED

LAKE TAHOE, Calif. — I was going to write to you about fun and games today — a golf match on a sylvan lake, a track meet in a municipal amphitheater.

But once again America the Beautiful has taken a bullet in its middle. The country is in surgery. The violent states of America. One bullet is mightier than one million votes.

It's not a democracy, it's a lunacy. A country that shrinks from punishing its criminals, disciplining its children, looking up its mad, is like an animal that disregards its senses. It's a lamb defending the lion's right to eat it.

We quarantine the good, the reliable, the honest. We keep a 24-hour watch on the trust-worthy but get a habeas corpus to let anarchy loose.

Freedom is being gunned down. The "right" to murder is the ultimate right in this country. Sloth is a virtue. Patriotism is a sin. Conservation is anachronism. God is over 30 years old. To be young is the only religion — as if it were a hard-won virtue. "Decency" is dirty feet, a scorn for work. "Love" is handing a flower to a naked young man with vermin in his hair while your mother sits home with a broken heart. You "love" strangers, not parents.

I will be severely criticized, even ridiculed for crying out. "Lousy sports writer, what does he know?" I can hear. "Who does he think he is, Paul Harvey?" "Fulton J. Murray," still others will sneer. This is the 20th Century, they will say, not Disneyland. Well, it's getting to look more like the caveman era every day from this seat. Americans who have a podium should use it today.

I like people with curtains on the window, not people with "pads." The next guy that calls money "bread" should be paid off in whole wheat. I'm sick of being told I should try to "understand" evil. Should a canary "understand" a cat?

STATE SOIL AND WATER BOARD CONSIDERS SABANNA PROJECT

Harvey Davis, Executive Secretary of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, recently reported to Ross Wilson, Chairman, Sabanna Watershed Association, that the State Board in its recent meeting, failed to assign a priority for the Sabanna Watershed Project. It was explained that rather than assigning priorities for six watershed projects as originally contemplated, the board assigned only three. The three priorities for watersheds assigned by the Board in its meeting were: Maverick County Watershed - Eagle Pass; Three Mile Sulfur Draw - Van Horn; and Kickapoo Creek - Lipan.

Mr. Davis explained to Wilson that only three watersheds were selected because of the backlog of planning resulting from previous priorities. On Thursday, June 6, Mr. Leland Barnes, Engineer for the State Board, was in Gorman and visited briefly with Wilson relative to the Sabanna Watershed Project. Barnes explained that he had been asked by the State Board to come by and explain more in depth the reasoning behind the State Board's assigning only three priorities at this particular time. Barnes stated that the State Board was indeed considerably behind in planning projects which had already been assigned priorities in prior years.

For example, the Paluxy Watershed in the Glen Rose area was approved by the Board and assigned a priority one year ago, but planning is just now beginning.

Barnes explained to Wilson that 24 projects were eligible to be considered for priorities by the Board in its May meeting. He said that the initial step of the Board was to select the twelve priorities which seemed to carry the most support and prestige from every standpoint of evaluation.

He explained that the Board then divided the twelve projects being considered for priorities in 1968 into three categories. One of these categories was Watersheds Containing over 200,000 Acres. It was in this category that the Sabanna project was placed along with the Maverick County Watershed at Eagle Pass and Meridian-Neils Creek in the Meridian area. Barnes pointed out that the Sabanna Project was the only one of the twelve under consideration whose application was submitted as late as 1967. The Board then determined that the dollar to be returned based on dollar cost of the Watershed projects would place the Maverick County Watershed above both that of the Sabanna and the Meridian-Neil Creek watersheds. Also, he pointed out that there was slightly more Soil Conservation practices in effect in the Maverick County Watershed than in either of the other two in this category.

He said, however, that the State Board was never more impressed in a hearing than was true with respect to the Sabanna hearing. One additional item favored the approval of the Maverick County Watershed - this being the fact that its application was submitted several years prior to the Sabanna application and this apparently was the deciding factor in awarding the top priority to the watershed at Eagle Pass.

Barnes reported that it is possible that an additional three priorities will be granted by the Board during a period of the next three to six months and, if so, the Sabanna Watershed stands an excellent opportunity of being assigned a priority at this time. If not, he said that additional priorities will be assigned in approximately one year. He stated that the only thing which could strengthen the position of the

Sabanna application at the present time would be application of additional soil conservation practices in the watershed. An effort will be made by the sponsoring organization to increase the percentage of soil conservation practices, Wilson stated. Barnes said he felt relatively certain that had six priorities been granted, the Sabanna Project would have been one of the six. It will not be necessary to conduct additional tours or hearings regarding the Sabanna Project application. It is merely a matter of the State Board meeting again with further authority to approve additional projects. When this occurs, the Sabanna Project will again be given consideration by the State Board.

Likins & Associates Awarded Contract On School Project

The Gorman Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session on Monday, June 10, 1968 at 8:30 p. m. in the High School Library. All members of the board were present for the meeting. Bids for the lunchroom and band hall were opened. Only two bids were submitted; Quality Steel of Abilene and Likins and Associates, Inc. of Abilene. After consideration of bids on plans as presented as well as an alternate proposal from Quality Steel, the Board consulted with Mr. Carl Chumney, engineer in charge of plans and construction about the alternate plan that was presented.

After considering all factors of each proposal, the bid of V. B. Likins & Associates, Inc. of Abilene, in the amount of \$30,720 was accepted. The bid is subject to adjustments to a lower figure if the board sees fit to make any adjustments in equipment or construction.

Among other business, the board elected Mrs. Jean Lasater as first grade teacher for 1968-69. Mrs. Lasater has a B. S. Degree in Elementary Education from McMurry College in Abilene. She taught one year in Smyrna, Tenn. and two years in the kindergarten school at the Bitburg AFB in Germany. Mrs. Lasater comes very highly recommended as being a very capable teacher with young children. Mrs. Lasater's husband, Brent, is employed by Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

The construction of the new building is well on schedule with the old building being wrecked to make way for the new one. The site should be cleared early in July with construction to begin near the middle of July. The building should be completed by September. This building will be a great asset to the school and community. When wrecking was begun on the old building it was discovered that it was in a much worse condition than met the eye. The floors and sub-structures were well rotted out. Had the building been repaired with these things concealed, it would have been only a matter of a year or two that another major repair would have been necessary.

The cost of the building is a little more than the board had first thought, but is still a reasonable figure for the type of building that will be constructed. The board has considered quality since this is a building that will serve for many years. It is the desire of the board to be able to complete the structure without adding an undue burden on the taxpayers. The financial condition of the District is such at this time that with minor tax adjustments the building can be constructed and paid for over a few years period without a bond issue. If those who owe delinquent taxes would clear up these accounts, this would help materially in making this building possible without adding a burden in the form of taxes. The Gorman board is making a plea that all who owe back taxes make an effort to pay these during the summer so that the amount of money needed to finance the building will not be so great. Your understanding and cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

The Equalization Board has not been completed at this time, but will be shortly and will be meeting in the near future.

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

AS TIME WENT ON IT IS COMMON KNOWLEDGE as to what happened and, finally, the Marines and Soldiers were called in to quell riots and looting.

ON THREE DIFFERENT OCCASIONS THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES passed legislation which would have the effect of nullifying many of the Supreme Court's decisions affecting arrest and prosecution of criminals. The Senate did not act.

AT LAST, THEY HAVE DONE SO, and last week a bill was passed which has as its purpose to override certain Court judgments which have handicapped law enforcement and providing assistance to police enforcement in the States.

TITLE I OF THE BILL PROVIDES planning grants and action grants to State and local law enforcement agencies to develop and strengthen the total service. Title II of the Bill seeks to give authority back to the trial courts

that they may not be handicapped by these decisions which have given encouragement to the criminal as against the public interest. The tendency of the Federal courts, and especially the Supreme Court, to disrupt the finality of State court decisions has eroded respect for law and diminished the fear of punishment.

ANOTHER IMPORTANT PART OF TITLE II SAYS THAT THE Supreme Court can not review the question of the voluntariness of a confession when the voluntary aspect has already been settled by the highest court of a State. Under the proposed legislation, the standard for admitting confessions as evidence will return to the time-tested standard of true voluntariness. It sets aside the inflexible and technical rules established in the so-called Mallory, Escobedo and Miranda cases.

TITLE III, TO WHICH MUCH OPPOSITION DEVELOPED, is concerned with permitting wiretapping in the investigation of serious Federal crimes. This section allows a court to order electronic surveillance under the "lawful search" provisions of the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution. This power will give much needed assistance in the war on organized crime. The Justice Department has identified an estimated 5,000 members of the Cosa Nostra but has succeeded in indicting only 200 and convicting only about 100 since 1961.

TITLE IV PROHIBITS INTERSTATE mail order sale of handguns. It does not affect rifles and shotguns and does not limit the right of the person under the Constitution to keep and bear arms. It does prohibit all sales of handguns to persons under 21 and to non-residents of the State. It requires gun dealers to be licensed by the Federal Government and to keep records of acquisition and disposition of their sales.

THIS IS A SECTION WHICH GIVES CONSIDERABLE CONCERN to many of us who have been opposed to the Federal Government injecting itself into this Constitutional right of the individual but as a "take it or leave it" proposition, with the other desirable provisions of the law, it was acceptable to the House of Representatives. Personally, I would prefer not to see this sort of license power given to the Federal Government, feeling it is a "foot in the door." On the other hand, the so-called Dodd Bill in the Senate imposes far-reaching restrictions, and the action in the Bill approved by the Congress and sent to the President may stop this further infringement by the Federal Government on gun control.

THE OMNIBUS CRIME CONTROL ACT already bears the imprint of many restrictive changes and additions. If America is to be made safe for its citizens, this is a long step in the right direction.

American dream will be rolling up Pennsylvania Ave. behind the roll of drums. It will be buried in Arlington. The Constitution was never conceived as a shield for degeneracy. You start out burning the flag and you end up burning Detroit. You do away with the death penalty for every-

one but presidential candidates — and presidents. The national symbol is not the eagle, it's the satafalque. The point of the country is fear. The rebellion is against good. Men of God become men of the mob. The national anthem is a scream in the night. Americans can't walk in their own parks, get on their own buses. They have to cage themselves. People cry, but it is ignored. Bare your teeth, they say. Threaten to fight back. The lion bares his teeth and the jackals sling away. A covering animal invites attack. But America is not listening. These are the things, it seems to me, that put a young senator, a servant of his people, to death. A young, vigorous country is immobilized by bumper stickers, slogans, neurotic students with their feet on desks they couldn't make, pulling down universities they wouldn't know how to rebuild.

It all begins with that — the deification of drifters, wastrels, politicians — insolent guests at the gracious table of democracy overturning it on their dismayed hosts. What have the Kennedys ever done to deserve ambushes every five years at the hands of people they ask only to serve? What apology can we offer to a noble family except to resolve to stop being ruled by our refuse, our human refuse, that is? How many good men have to die before we wrest weapons from the terrible hands of our barbarians, demand respect for our institutions, stop glorifying hate?
