Bobby, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Williams of Gorman, is a 9-year veteran in 4-H, with beef cattle and swine as major projects. He recently graduated from Gorman High School where he was an outstanding athlete.

In 4-H work, he is a Gold Star Boy, beef and swine award winner and received the Agricultural Award in 1963. He was high individual in county judging contests and attended the state leadership lab in 1966. Bobby won first in district for senior leadership and won the leadership award in 1966.

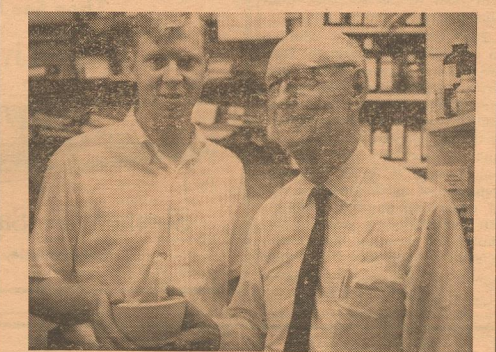

Mr. William Thomas Simpson, fondly known as "Bill", passed away at 6:00 a. m. Thursday, June 20 at Blackwell Hospital.

Bill was born in the Kokomo Community April 1, 1906 and had lived in and around Gorman all his life. He was married to Zena Brightwell December 30, 1931 in Gorman. He was engaged in farming until a year ago when failing health forced him into retirement. A member of the Church of Christ, he had served as a deacon for sixteen years and was also church treasurer at the time of his death. In the eulogy given by Audy Moore, he said "Perhaps we have few men, if any, in this congregation that will be missed more than Bill Simpson. He served faithfully as treasurer, as a deacon, and it is my personal conviction that he and his good wife, was among the best qualified in the congregation to serve as elder of this congregation. Gorman Is Hdqts. For Contractors On Telephone Project

The Caldwell Construction Co. of Caldwell, Texas received the contract of \$229,000 to build three new telephone exchanges in the area at Carbon, Olden and Desdemona. For centralization accommodations the company has chosen Gorman for their operation headquarters. The largest part of the material has already arrived and the remaining material is arriving daily.

Construction of the cable system will begin around July 3rd. The system will be all buried cable except for the townsites. The old system will continue in operation until the new system has been completed, which should be around mid-October, according to an interview with Roy D. Adams. The new exchanges will be all one party lines, and Carbon and Olden will be able to dial Eastland toll free.

A similar contract of \$440,000 for the De Leon exchange has been recently let to State Construction Company of Lennox, So. Dakota.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — ONE OF THE GREATEST BATTLES on tariffs and quotas since the enactment of the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act of 1930 is shaping up in the Congress. At least 50 industries touching all parts of the Country are voicing complaints about foreign competition in

hearings now under way in the House Ways and Means Committee.
ABOUT 25 BILLS, SOME OF WHICH have as many as 25 sponsors each, have been introduced to limit imports on specific goods, ranging all the way from steel to mink skins and strawberries.
THE IMPORT SITUATION HAS MUCH TO DO WITH OUR IMBALANCE of payments and the threat to the integrity of the dollar all around the world. The reasons for such conditions can be greatly oversimplified since every factor involved is complicated.

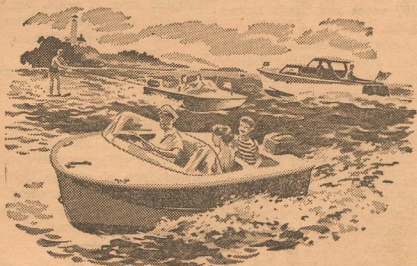

AT THE END OF WORLD WAR II THE INDUSTRIAL nations of Western Europe and Japan were rehabilitated largely with American funds. Today in many industries their factories are more modern than are our own, enabling them to produce by the assembly line method and to fill orders on schedule. Previously the United States could hold its markets pretty well for its dependability of delivering orders on time with higher quality products. This advantage in many industries has been lost.

WE OFTEN HEAR THAT WE ARE PRICING OURSELVES OUT of the world market. This is true in many respects but the reason for it makes a long story.
FOREIGN PRODUCED GOODS IN MANY INSTANCES HAVE A Government export subsidy. Generally speaking, and the reason most often given, is the maintenance of the high standard of living enjoyed in the U. S. in proportion to that of any other country in the world. The high standard of living comes about for many reasons, not the least is that of a Minimum Wage and working hours set by law.

ANOTHER REASON COMPLICATING THE SITUATION is the investments of American industries overseas. It is one thing to place quotas and tariffs on foreign owned and produced goods. It is another to limit shipment of goods produced abroad by our own industries. A case in point is petroleum products. Until the late 1940's and early 1950's the United States was a net exporter of petroleum products. Commencing at about this time we became a net importer. With the opening of the vast oil fields in the Middle East; with heavy involvement by our own major oil companies; with uncontrolled production and wages at 28c a day, our independent oil operators have been in trouble ever since.

IN 1957 A MANDATORY IMPORT OIL PROGRAM was passed by the Congress, limiting imports of foreign oil to 12.2 per cent of domestic production. The law was based on national security considerations. In time of war or disruption such as occurred in the Middle East and the lack of the use of the Suez Canal, which has since twice occurred, it has proved the proposition that we should not permit our domestic industry to deteriorate, causing dependence on foreign shipments.

UNFORTUNATELY, GOVERNMENT POLICY ADMINISTERED by the Interior Department has permitted loopholes to occur in the Law to the point that the Program is becoming meaningless unless the law is amended to close opportunities for circumvention.

We would like to congratulate Patsy Moseley for winning first in the state with her 4-H Natural Resource demonstration. I will be out of the county for a period of three weeks, June 15 through July 7, attending National Extension School in Colorado. I am one of ten Texas Extension Service employees who will be attending the school at Colorado State University at Fort Collins, Colorado. The assistant county agent, Bob Cohen, will be in the county during this time and will be available if you need to call on him.

There have been a few calls this week concerning chinch bugs in lawns. Chinch bug infestations are usually more severe in periods of high rainfall.

These small insects are usually difficult to see and may cause damage before they are noticed. The adult bug is 1/8 to 1/5 inch long, has a black body, reddish yellow legs and fully developed wings. Each front wing is mostly white, but is marked with an irregular black patch at the middle of the outer margin. The newly hatched nymph (young) is bright red and has a whitish band across the back.

Chinch bugs suck the plant juices which results in yellowish or brown patches occurring in the lawn. Injured areas frequently are first noted along the edges of the lawn. As the insects continue to infest, the brown patches enlarge as the bugs begin to work outward.

In most cases, when chinch bugs are present in sufficient numbers to cause yellow or brown patches to appear in the lawn, they may be found by part-

ing the grass in the damaged area and making close observations. If chinch bugs are present they will appear as small black or red bugs with white markings on their backs moving rather quickly when they are disturbed. When the insects appear in large numbers, they may be seen crawling over grass blades or along the sidewalk and other areas around the home.

If chinch bugs cannot be found by this method, their presence may be detected by using a metal can such as a large coffee can with both ends cut out. Force one end of the metal can about 2 or 3 inches into the ground in the yellow portion of the grass or at the margin of the damaged area. After the can has been inserted in the grass, fill with water, and if chinch bugs are present, they will float to the surface within about 5 minutes waiting period.

Mrs. Wright, 48, entered the hospital February 21.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 p. m. Monday at the College Church of Christ with Don H. Morris, President of Abilene Christian College, and James Hawkins, minister of the 11th and Willis Sts. Church of Christ, officiating.

Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park under direction of Kiker-Warren Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Joe Antilley, A. E. Wells, J. E. Connally, Glenn Thomason, Ralph Hooks, W. C. (Dub) Orr, John C. Stevens, and Briggs Todd of Dallas.

Officers and directors of the bank were honorary pallbearers. A resident of Abilene since 1954, Mrs. Wright had left the imprint of her influence and leadership in church, Parents-Teacher Association and women's organization activities.

She was an active member of the 11th and Willis Sts. Church of Christ.

Headed 3 Clubs

She was a member and past president of the Abilene Woman's Club, the Abilene Study Club and the Abilene branch of the American Association of University Women. She and her husband were active in the PTAs of the schools their children attended.

Mrs. Wright also served as chairman of the Literature and Letters Department of the Woman's Club and a member of its board; as treasurer and board member of the AAUW, and as a member of the AAUW state nominating committee.

Illness prevented the presence of Mr. and Mrs. Wright at the annual Abilene Chamber of Commerce banquet March 16 when he was honored as Abilene's Outstanding Citizen of 1967. Friends went to the hospital afterwards to advise them of the honor.

Mrs. Wright was born March 23, 1920 at South Bend near Graham. The former Ouida R. Minta Davis, she was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Davis, now of Graham.

Tech Graduate

She was reared near South Bend and Eliasville, and her husband grew up in a neighboring community. They went to high school together in Eliasville.

Mrs. Wright attended Abilene Christian College and graduated from Texas Technological College in 1940 with a bachelor of science degree.

Mr. and Mrs. Wright were married August 25, 1940 at Breckenridge. They lived first at Brownwood, then subsequently at Goldthwaite where he was county agent, in Gorman, Eastland and on their ranch in Stephens County. While in Gorman Mr. Wright was manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association and she taught in high school and coached girls basketball in the 1940s while Mr. Wright was serving in the U. S. Navy during World War II. Both were active in club and civic activities during the time they lived in Gorman and have many good friends here.

Their move to Abilene in 1954 came when Mr. Wright joined the staff of the First State Bank. Surviving Mrs. Wright are her husband; a daughter, Ouida, 21, student at Abilene Christian College; a son, John, 16, student at Cooper High School; and her parents. A brother, John Elledge Davis, died in 1928.
