Junior-Senior 4-H Demonstrations For West Tex. Fair

ABILENE - County home demonstration agents have been invited to enter junior and senior girls 4-H demonstration teams in competition at the West Texas Fair to be held here September 9-14.

Competition is scheduled for the last day of the Fair, Saturday, September 14, in the Woman's Building.

Invitations and entry forms were mailed out to home agents by Miss Carolyn Gilbert, Taylor County's associate home demonstration agent, chairman of the department.

Subjects for the 4-H demonstrations will be taken from 4-H projects said Miss Gilbert. They will include soil and water conservation, foods-nutrition, clothing, civil defense, safety and electricity and other subjects. At last year's Fair some girls gave demonstrations relating to horses, she said.

The demonstrations are from 7 to 12 minutes in length and are part of the 4-H educational program. Each spring counties have 4-H elimination contests and these various demonstrations are judged. Winners compete in the district and the district winners in the state contests that are held at the annual 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University.

Miss Gilbert has requested that entries be mailed to her at the Taylor County Courthouse by August 31.

Competition is open to both junior, ages 9-14, and seniors, ages 14-19 teams. The first place teams will receive \$5 cash awards; second place teams, \$4; and third place, \$2. First place individuals will receive \$3; second place \$2; and third, \$1.

Scoring will be as follows: Appearance of team or individual, 5 points; introduction, 10 points; presentation, 25; subject matter, 35; achievement, 20; and summary, 5 points.

Farmers Union Say The Peanut Price Support Rise Right

In a message to Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman, Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco stated that the recently announced peanut price support increase of \$13.25 per ton is a "step in the right direction."

Farmers Union has been urging Secretary Freeman to increase the support price on peanuts which has not been raised since 1961. The announced increase raises the loan value from 75 to 77 percent of parity.

The farm leader commended Secretary Freeman for the increase but urged that he take the steps necessary to provide peanut growers 100 percent of parity price assurances.

"Peanut growers are in a terrific cost-price squeeze and are entitled to a profit for producing this important food product," Naman said.

On 189,000 tons of peanuts that USDA estimates will be produced in Texas this crop year, the increase in peanut price support will bring to Texas growers an additional \$2,504,250.00.

Farmers Union is organized in the major peanut producing counties in Texas, and leading Texas peanut growers participated with representatives of other states affiliated with the National Farmers Union in peanut policy meetings with USDA officials in Washington. A piece of legislation providing for a certificate program for peanuts was recently developed in these meetings and sponsored in the House by Congressman Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls.

Peanut Crop Outlook Stated As 'Real Good' For County

Outlook for the peanut crop over Eastland County is "real good" following last week's general rains, but more rain will be needed if there is any good prospect of a bumper crop such as this section experienced in 1966, County Agent Dee Gordon stated on Monday.

The rain certainly saved the crop, especially the older acreage which was beginning to suffer from drouthy ground and would have had to be dug but for this new moisture, he said.

DESDEMONA SCHOOLS TO BEGIN CLASSES ON SEPTEMBER SECOND

Classes will begin in the Desdemona Schools Monday, September 2nd, according to Superintendent Sam Jones.

Mr. Jones announced that classes will begin Monday and that the buses will run their routes at 8:15 a. m. that day and lunch will be served in the cafeteria. Lunches will be 30c and 35c this year.

A faculty meeting is scheduled for 9:00 a. m. Friday, August 30.

Faculty members for Elementary include Mrs. Flora Singleton, first-second grades; Mrs. L. R. Higginbottom, third and fourth grades; Mae McConal, fifth and sixth grades, and also will serve as head teacher and coach for boys athletics; and L. R. Higginbottom will teach seventh and

eighth grades and social studies in High School.

High School faculty members include Mrs. Pat Corbell, commercial instructor; Mrs. Nelda Henslee, English; Larry Anderson, science; Keith McDonald, vocational agriculture; and Helen Short, homemaking. The latter two classes will be afternoon classes only.

Superintendent Jones will teach math and serve as girls basketball coach.

Teachers aides are Mrs. Sam Jones and Helen Grimshaw. R. P. Hooper is head bus driver and custodian. Other bus drivers and lunchroom workers will be hired at a later date.

All school personnel must have TB certificates by the time school begins, according to Mr. Jones.

"We will need more rain by the end of the week if the crop continues to develop. At this time of the year rains don't last long."

However, he said, there has already been enough moisture to insure an average crop.

Insect Damage

There is, of course, the prospect of insect daamage, which was so destructive in last year's crop, to be taken into consideration. Prior to going on his vacation, Gordon said he had found a few instances of lesser corn borer infestation in fields between Rising Star and Pioneer but since then he had heard of no other serious cases. The borer was the principal villain involved in last year's disappointing return from what was first regarded as a flourishing fields.

The rain, besides giving the young crop a new lease on production, helped measurably to control the borer, which likes dry warm weather, Mr. Gordon said.

Peanut processors, looking ahead to the harvest, anticipate that the bulk of the crop, if it matures well, to come to the dryer and market in a short space of time. This sudden peak of marketing would not create a serious problem in handling peanuts at Gorman Peanuts, according to Robbie Robertson, who stated that since installation of new facilities last year that the Gorman plant would be adequate to handle a bumper crop.

Most of the crop was planted within the space of a few days, after a let up in rains which were general and almost continuous during the spring. The county agent concurred, estimating that about 75 per cent of the acreage was planted during the space of a few days in mid-June, which would tend to bring it to market at about the same time of the harvest season. Some 15 per cent of the county crop was planted early. Bulk of the crop is expected between October 1st and 15th.

Conditions in Brown, Comanche and Callahan counties bordering Eastland County were similar.

32,000 Acres
Mr. Gordon estimated that there are about 32,000 peanut crop acres planted in Eastland County now; or approximately the same as last year.

The heaviest yield of peanuts in the history of this section occurred in 1966. The 1967 crop, which had favorable moisture conditions, was cut short by insect infestation. Generally, however, 1967 yield was a little above average with some growers having a total or almost total loss and others reaping a yield comparable with 1966.

Given a good crop this fall, the farmers of the section generally should be in good shape, financially, observers said.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a pre-determined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

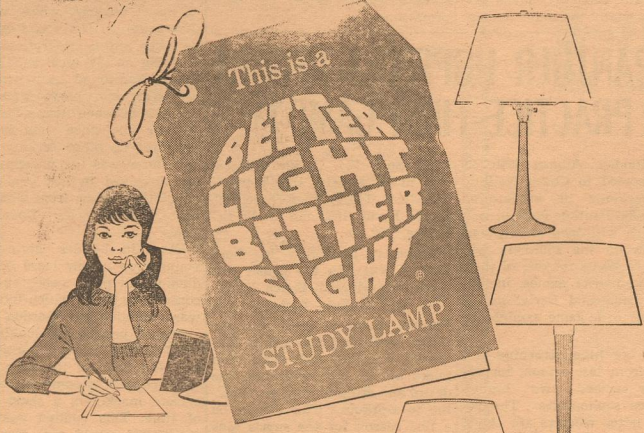

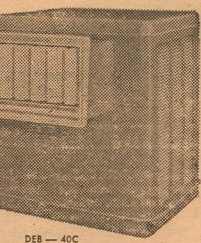

This causes leaves to fall and a reduction of yields. It has been proven that the control of this disease is economical. The leaf spot is worse in irrigated peanuts and is worse in dry land peanuts in wet years.

We had a leaf spot demonstration on Edwin Schaefer's place near Pioneer last year. Peanuts that were treated made from 12 to 28 dollars more per acre above cost of treatment than the non-treated peanuts.

This year we have another leaf spot demonstration on Claude Fuller's farm near Gorman. We are using three different fungicides — Cal-Cop 10, Kocide, and Polyram. Different rates of water are also being used. Each chemical is being applied with three different rates of water. Some plots are sprayed with 15 gallons per acre, some with 25 and some with 35 gallons per acre.

Other fungicides that are being recommended for leaf spot control are sulfur, Spertox, Dithane and Maneb.

The fungicides should be applied to the peanuts every 10 to 14 days.

I attended the Texas County Agents Association Convention in Abilene August 5 and 6. Our speakers included John McKee of the Ford Motor Company, John Hutchinson, Director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Dr. H. O. Kunkel, Dean of Agriculture, Texas A&M.

WYNNE CHESTER SAYS:
Man's Best Friend Can Be a Menace



The deer hunting season is over, as we all know—but how can one explain that to our canine friends? Dogs allowed to run loose at this time of year can be a real threat to deer herds.

Ordinarily, deer can easily outrun a pack of dogs. When a thick crust covers deep snow, however, the deer break through. Dogs, being so much lighter, do not. A deer, hampered and slowed, exhausted by its struggle to escape, doesn't stand much of a chance to escape the fangs of the dogs.

Don't believe the stories you may hear claiming that only wild or half-wild dogs will kill deer. Almost any sizeable dog will do it. If this easily preventable destruction of our deer herds is to be curtailed, we dog owners must do our part by restraining our dogs until spring, when the thaws have melted most of the snow.

One last word of warning: game wardens are required by law to shoot deer-chasing dogs on sight. Your cooperation may save not only the lives of a good many deer, but the life of your own dog as well.

PUBLIC NOTICE
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 2, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free textbooks for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and costs of collection shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

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
