It is an honor to have a 4-H member win state in an awards program. It is very unusual and a high honor to have two from the same county. There are only 35 state winners from among the 254 counties in Texas who go to the National 4-H Congress.

As I travel around the county, I see many chemical containers, some are empty and some are not. I don't think everyone re-alizes the danger involved with these chemical containers. Labels should be read before

storing for any special require-ments for storage. Some pesti-cides have warnings about low temperature storage and other

requirements.

"Empty" chemical containers can be a source of danger to humans, livestock and wildlife. All remnants of chemical should be dumped into a deep pit dug in level soil and located to avoid contaminatin of water.

Large containers such as drums or barrels should be washed thoroughly and rinse water buried. Drums and barrels should be returned to the supplier or sold

returned to the supplier or sold to a firm which can neutralize the toxicity of the chemicals. Last week I read of a tragedy that occurred at Dunning, Ne-braska, on June 29, 1968. An

Two and one-half hours later Byron got sick and was taken to the hospital. Later the other two boys got sick.

Atropine was administered to the boys. It was too late for Byron, but the other boys recovered after a serious illness.

This is a sad but true story. The parents of Byron Milleson have consented to its use with the hope that the information will in some way prevent similar accidents involving esticides and empty containers.


