Mrs. Ann Justice, office secretary, and Murl Campbell, assistant secretary of the Eastland County Farm Bureau attended an area training school June 12-13 at the Baker Hotel in Dallas.

The two-day session is one of three such schools being conducted across the state by the Texas Farm Bureau. The topics covered included Farm Bureau structure and history, membership and financial records, office procedures, county Farm Bureau newsletters, and current Farm Bureau programs and activities.

Mrs. Creola Wobbe, Waco, TFB assistant secretary, was in charge of the training school.

Other TFB personnel assisting with the school included: J. D. Jordan, Mason, TFB area field representative; and Bill Hoover, Waco, TFB information director.

The training schools are part of the Farm Bureau's expanded program of activities adopted by the voting delegates at a special meeting last year.

## CITY ADJUSTS WATER AND TRASH RATES

The Gorman City Commission met Monday night and adopted an ordinance to regulate trash pickup. The ordinance outlines the type of containers that must be used and where the containers must be placed. It also regulates rules for the dump grounds and enforces it with fines and penalties for the abuse of the dump grounds. It was decided to lower all residential trash fees from \$2.00 to \$1.50 per month and raise all businesses that are paying a minimum trash charge from \$2.00 to \$4.00 per month.

At the same time it was decided to change the minimum water charge. The water charge will be changed from 2,000 gallons at \$3.50 and increased to 3,000 gallons at \$4.00. The other rates beyond the minimum are as follows: 3,000-16,000 will be changed from .90 per 1000 gallons to \$1.16,000 and over will be changed from .70 per 1000 gallons to .80.

The new rates will be giving the water customers 1,000 gallons extra for 50 cents rather than the old price of \$1.09. The commission made this decision to try to encourage people to use more water. The city has not been selling enough water to pay the indebtedness for the obligations made for the Proctor water. The only solution at this time is to sell more water to increase the revenue.

The new rates become effective July 1st. (Approved for publication by R. C. Stephens, Don Spraberry and Ray Hughes.)

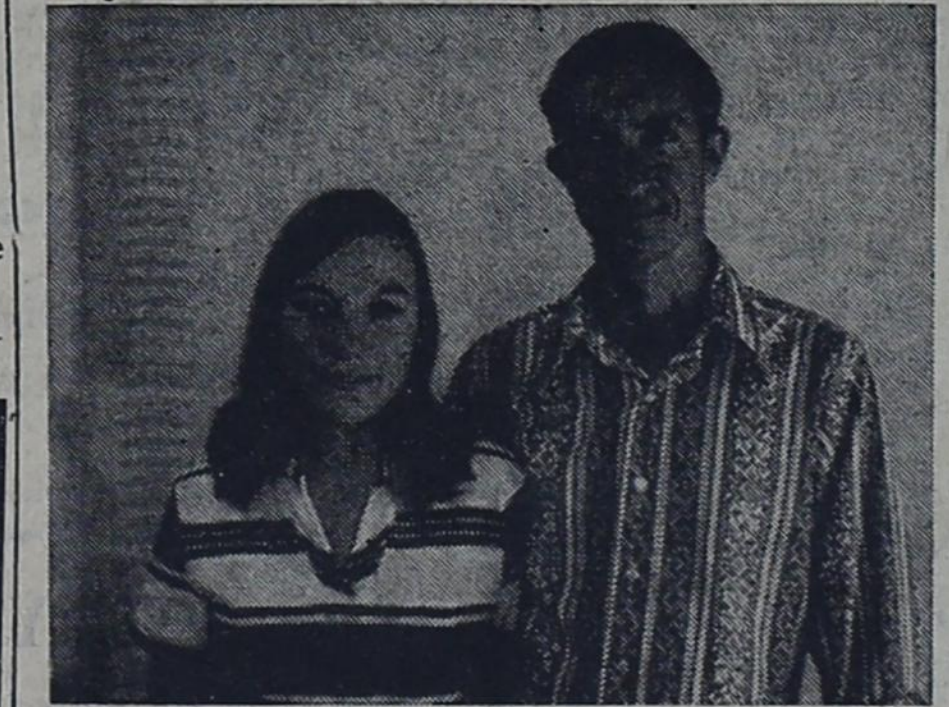

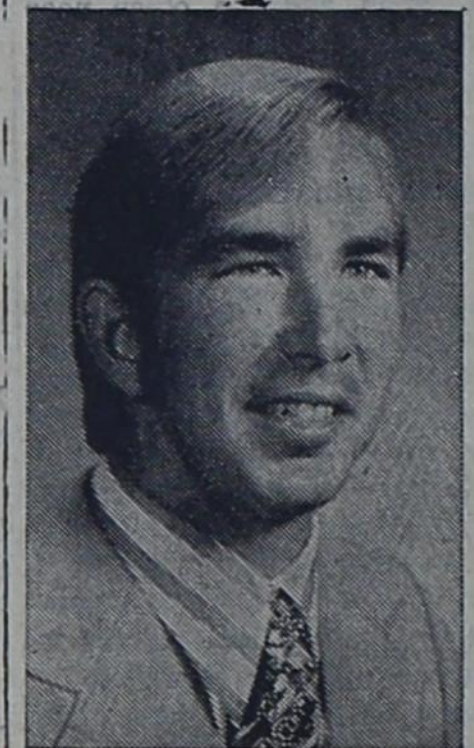

## Two Screwworm Cases Found In Eastland County

Two cases of screwworms were found in Eastland County last week reported County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. He said these were the first confirmed cases of screwworms in Eastland County in six or seven years.

One case was found near Gorman and the other near Rising Star. The confirmed cases are being treated by releasing sterile flies. These sterile flies mate with native screwworm flies causing the flies' eggs to be infertile.

"Hot-spot" treatments consist of 100,000 sterile flies being dropped on a single confirmed case. Fly releases are also being made at the rate of 500 to 800 sterile flies per square mile in a major portion of Eastland County.

Weather conditions were favorable for heavy screwworm buildups last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest, explains the agent. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild weather in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive screwworm invasion.

According to Gordon, more than 5,000 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring and summer, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak - 200 million a week - treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating livestock pest. Gordon urges all livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs, cats) to follow certain precautions:

1. Carry out all approved preventive practices to help eliminate screwworms.
2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.
3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking, castrating and dehorning only provide additional wounds for worm infestations. Studies show that almost 90 percent of all worm samples come from calf navels and man-made wounds.
4. Spray animals with an approved product before shipping them. This is a preventive measure against spreading the infestation.
5. Be cautious of livestock shipments coming from infested areas. If buying such animals, be sure to check them thoroughly for wormy wounds.
6. Care should be taken not to move infested livestock across state lines. Infestations resulting from this practice may bring about a quarantine.

7. As soon as a wormy wound is found, send a worm sample to the Screwworm Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. If the case is positive, sterile flies will be dropped as soon as possible to further protect animals in the area.

Everyone must cooperate if the screwworm eradication program is to be effective, emphasizes Gordon. This means farmers, ranchers, pet owners, auction managers and others who work with or own animals.

## FHA Loans To Eastland County Farmers Okayed

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that the Farmers Home Administration may make emergency loans to eligible farmers and ranchers in 243 Texas counties, including Eastland County, through June 30, 1973.

The Congressman said an extended drought which started in 1970 has caused substantial loss of field and feed crops and damage to pastures. Many farmers and ranchers will need emergency loans to complete their 1972 operations and for the 1973 operating year.

Farmers Home emergency loans are made to finance crop production, replace livestock, and for other expenses necessary to restore normal operations.

Applicants may apply for loans at the local Farmers Home Administration office serving the area.

To be eligible a farmer must have sustained damage from the drought or some other natural disaster. Farmers who borrow agree to repay their loans as soon as possible consistent with their repayment abilities. Loans are secured by liens as required to protect the Government's interest.

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
