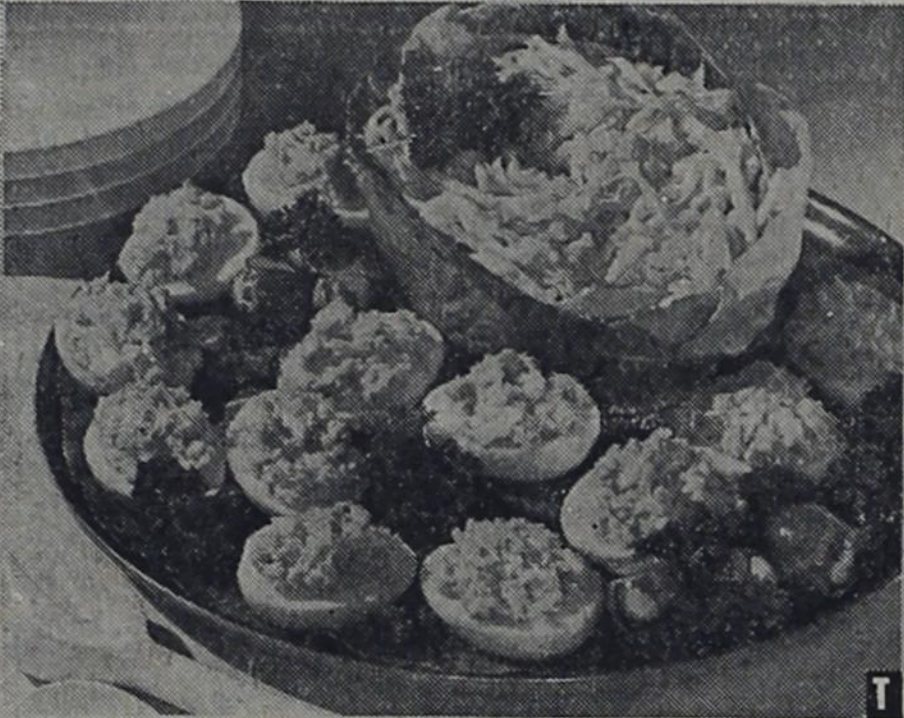

**RECORD CORN CROP** — Oscar Howard, who farms a small acreage three miles north of Gorman, has good reason to be proud of his corn crop this year. He estimates the seven acre patch to produce 50 bushels to the acre of an excellent grade corn this year. (The Progress family will vouch for the quality and flavor of the corn as they received nice samples from Mr. Howard.) After sharing the corn with his neighbors and friends (he never sells it) he feeds what is left to his small herd of cattle. The corn is of the field variety Texas 33, was irrigated, and grew to a height of nine foot. He also farms 32 acres of peanuts and has 10 acres of Coastal and five acres of blackeyed peas which he also shares with friends.

Mr. Howard has farmed the land since moving to Gorman in 1948 from Post, Texas where he was a blacksmith. He opened a blacksmith and welding shop in Gorman which he operated until recently when his son took over the operation.

## WCT Council of Governments Awarded \$27,300

AUSTIN — West Central Texas Council of Governments Abilene, was one of 26 regional and metropolitan area planning councils awarded criminal justice planning grants for fiscal 1973 today by Governor Preston Smith. Amount was \$27,300.

The awards, totaling \$793,718 will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

The West Central Texas grant will be used in implementing action projects outlined in previous plans and in updating the comprehensive five-year criminal justice plan for the 19 counties of the West Central Texas State Planning Region.

Emphasis in the region presently is being given to law enforcement officer training and education, updating and coordinating regional planning, communications, and planning in the fields of juvenile delinquency, probation services, regional corrections and justice of the peace and corporation court judges' training.

West Central Texas COG furnishes professional criminal justice planning services to each local governmental unit in the region's 19 counties and serves as a regional clearinghouse for projects.

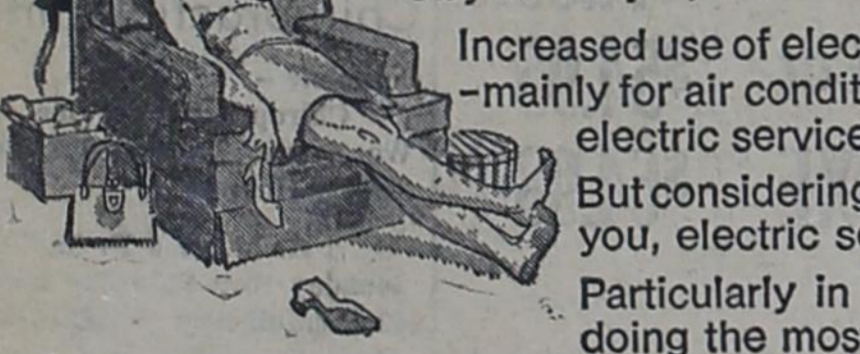
