Know Your School

The School Board approved the school budget in it's meeting on Monday night for the 1972-73 school year, in the amount of \$223,983. This is just about the same as the budget for 1971-72 school year. The income reflects \$70,290 from local sources, \$153,750 from state and federal sources, giving a total expected income og \$224,040. The expenditures show \$183,110 for administration and instruction, \$10,600 for transportation, \$8,600 for operation of the plant, \$4,500 for maintenance, \$3,300 for insurance, \$1,000 for furniture and equipment, \$12,532 for debt service, and \$351 for other demona

menses. nater reviewing the propos ed budget, I felt that we could meet the budget with no increase in the tax rate. I recom mended that the rate be set at the current rate of \$1.45 per hundred dollar evaluation and that \$0.18125 be set at the rate for bonded indebtedness and \$1.26875 be set as the rate for local maintenance. The board voted to set the rates as recommended, so there will be no increase in the tax rate. With increased costs each year, we are faced with an increase in the near future.
