

The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secre-tary of State and shall be ap-proved by the Attorney Gen-tral. The Secretary of State inall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amend-ment or amendments to each county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is confor the publication, which may not be higher than the news-paper's published national rate for advertising per column

for which the session is con-vened, may propose amend-ments revising the Constitu-tion, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as de-fined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be speci-fied by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elect-ed to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals. "A brief explanatory state-




