## Historical Program For WSC on Monday

As members of the Woman's Study Club gathered in the home of Mrs. C. O. Revels last Monday evening, it was with anticipation of a most interesting program. On arrival, everyone met the guest speaker, Mr. Clifton Caldwell of Albany, Texas. The subject announced in advance, is one more and more people everywhere are interested and concerned about — preserving, marking, and acknowledging people, places and things in Texas that are historical. Especially is this true in Eastland County just now as preparations are beginning for the Eastland County Centennial.

President Mrs. Dick Foster called the group to order and announced that procedure would be reversed; program first, then refreshments, with business last so that Mr. Caldwell would not be detained.

Mrs. Corky Brown, yearbook chairman, introduced Mr. Caldwell. A rancher in the Albany area, Mr. Caldwell is also involved in the famous Albany Fandangle and other civic affairs. Too, he is a member of the Texas Historical Survey Committee, and it was of this that he had been invited to speak. Describing the functioning of the Committee, Mr. Caldwell delighted club members with both humorous and serious incidents arising in the work. Cooperation and financial backing has improved as people have become more concerned for disappearing history. Probably the nearest Historical Marker to Gorman is at Frank A. Gray Memorial Park. Mr. Caldwell showed a film strip that the people of Freestone County prepared showing their historical sites and markers, with commentary, thus preserving in yet another manner their history. It was a most informative program, and during refreshments, the questions and discussion continued.

Mrs. Revels presented a difficult choice — apricot nectar cake or prune cake — so every body just took both, and with whipped cream. And there were tuna canapes, olives, pickles, and salted peanuts, of course, cold drinks and coffee. It was all so delicious. And a second or third cup of coffee lingered into the business session.

## Texas Tech Collecting Texas Photographs

Collecting photographs of Texas and adjoining states is a project of Texas Tech's Southwest Collection designed to preserve approximately 100 to 150 pictures of historical interest from each county desiring to participate. It is hoped that the photographs, which will be selected and identified (names, places, dates) by local citizens, will include:

1. Various scenes portraying the county's development.
2. Individuals and family groups of pioneers or early settlers.
3. Street scenes of towns or ghost towns.
4. Business buildings, landmarks, cemeteries, schools, churches, homes, hospitals, train stations geographic sites.
5. School classes, church groups, clubs, political meetings, reunions, weddings, baptisms, county fairs, rodeos, races, dances, sports events, picnics, recreational activities.
6. Interiors of homes, offices, factories, stores, gins, saloons.
7. Work activities and scenes at farms, ranches, mines, oil fields.
8. Disasters such as floods, tornadoes, dust storms, fires, droughts, wrecks, explosions, blizzards.

Pictures will be picked up by a representative of the Southwest Collection and returned by him. All pictures will be checked out and in via receipts. Approximately 30 to 45 days will be required for copying. Then the field representative will return the original photos to their original owners or the group responsible for their collection. Copies and negatives will be preserved in the Southwest Collection at Texas Tech University.

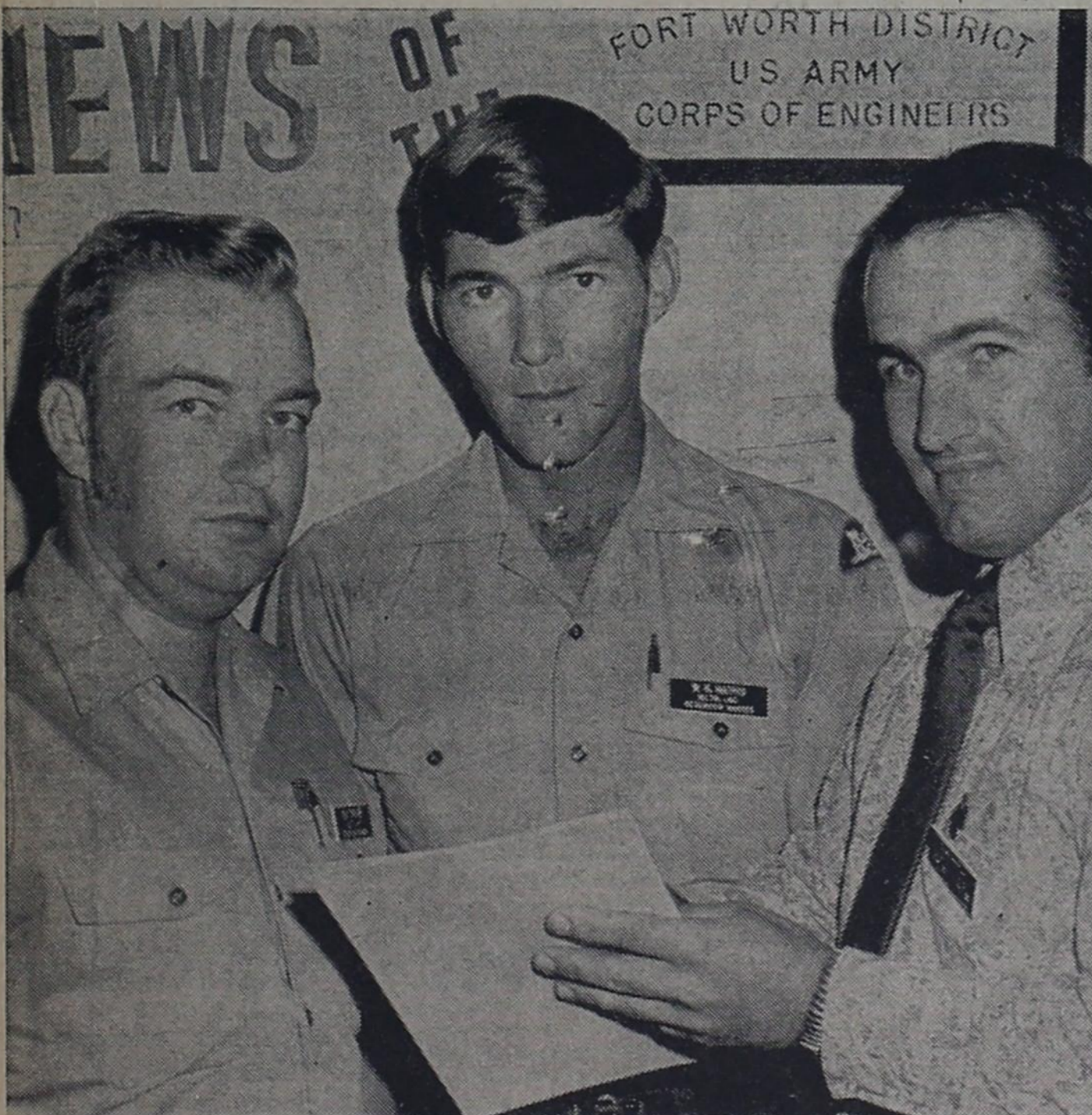

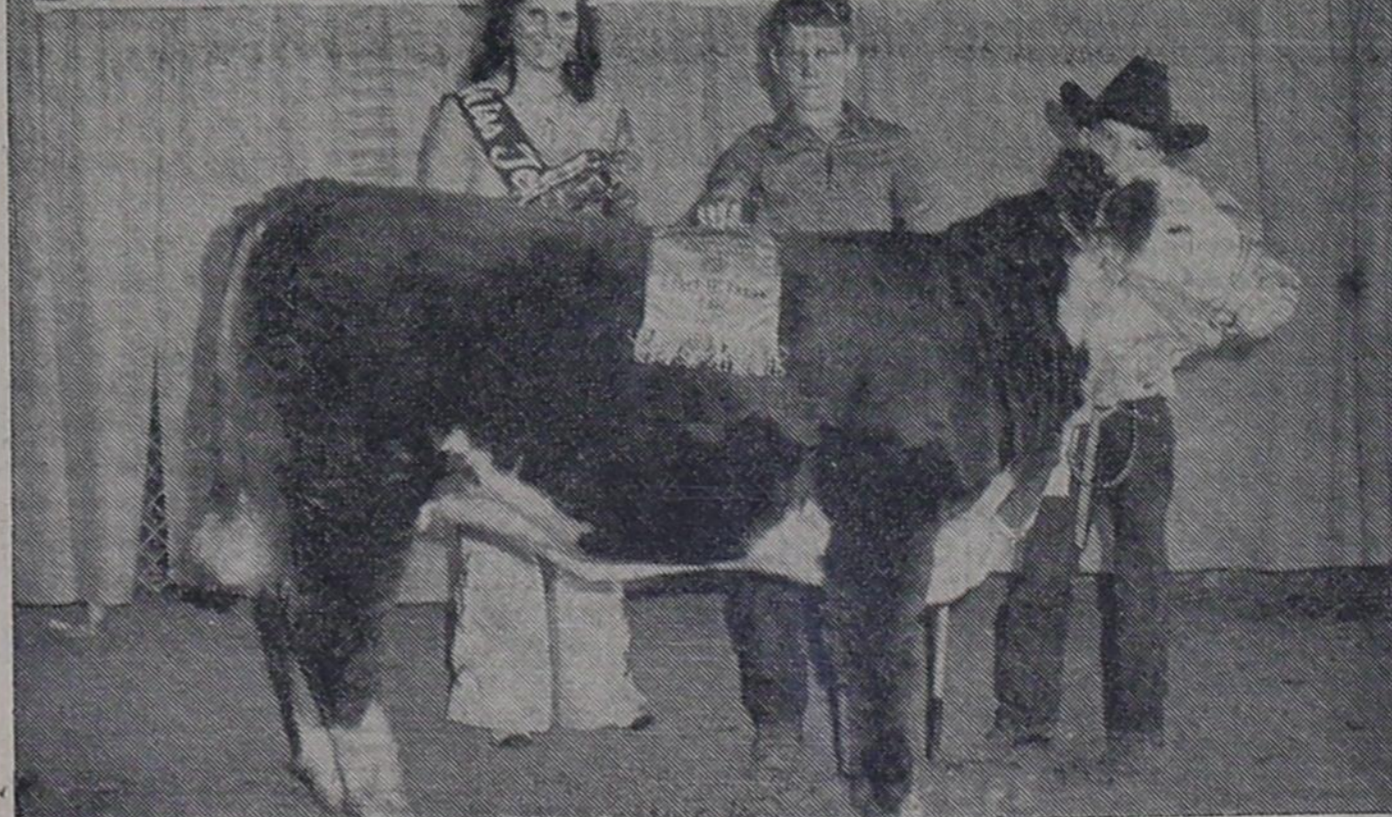
