LETTER TO THE EDITOR

It would be nice if people would get their facts straight before they talk about things.

Anyone who believes that there is no racism in Gorman either is misinformed, hasn't live here long, has their eyes closed, doesn't fraternize with Gorman residents, or believes the current level of discrimination in Gorman is normal or acceptable. When I was in high school (admittedly over twenty years ago,) almost every Hispanic was discriminated against. I know. I saw it myself. If one of them didn't do just what the white person in question thought they should, they were called a name, "wet----", implying they had come across the river and were here illegally. It didn't matter if they were born here or not. Even now, ask any Hispanic in this town if they have ever been discriminated against, whether it was being passed over for a job or promotion, being waited on after the white person who stepped to the counter after them or just a difference in attitude when people talk to them. For that matter, ask a white person who is married to a Hispanic. Ask them. I have. I am not saying that everyone in Gorman is a racist, but I have seen enough examples myself to know that it exists in abundance.

Discrimination in Gorman is not limited to minorities. I am white, but I have felt some of the same discrimination. I didn't grow up here, my brother didn't like football, and my father didn't grow peanuts (even though he was a farmer.) He did, though, serve our wonderful country for over twenty years. After being honorably discharged, he brought us here, but them (believe it or not) met with discrimination himself when he encountered those who hadn't joined the military were jealous of his retirement benefits. Ask him. I have.

I was appalled when I heard about he supposed threats by the "Gorman KKK" and so felt compelled to do some research into this. Gorman does indeed have a chapter here (it is perfectly legal) and some days you can even find their business card with address to contact them. The local police have several copies. As to whether or not this chapter is threatening St. Jude's, I am sure the FBI knows. I will leave that to them.

The paper that was handed to me (before they know who I was) at the meeting that was attended by our state representative said, "a local doctor said, 'I will hate those kids and they will hate me.'" It did NOT mention anyone's name. The meeting that I attended that brought this us still mentioned no one in particular. It also did NOT say "a local principal said." The paper DID have the fact that the statement was made "in the second person." This means that someone told the principal that, not that the principal made the comment his/herself.

People who oppose St. Jude's haven't been called "not religious." The dictionary says religious is "a member of a religious order or congregation." Being religious implies you go to church. That's it. Almost everyone opposed to and for that matter in favor of the facility goes to church. I myself am not religious. I don't go to an organized religion's facility on a specified day of the week. But you don't have to go to church to be a Christian. They Bible says, "Suffer the little children to come unto me" and "Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones." Do Christians not believe the Bible? Yes they do, and if you stand in the way of these abused, neglected children in need no matter where they are from, you are going against the Bible. It doesn't say, "Suffer the little children, as long as they live within fifty miles of your house, to come unto me. It doesn't say, "...despise not one of the little ones, as long as they live in your town."

Who says all these kids will come from big cities? It is conceivable with the admitted need here in Gorman that all the beds could be filled with children just from here!

St. Jude's to Hold Town Meeting On August 17th at 7:00 pm

The Reverend Doctor Herbert Ward, President and CEO of St. Jude's Ranch for Children National, Jim Knox, Vice President, Ralph Manning, Chairman of the Board of St. Jude's Ranch for Children Gorman and Marilyn Seay Shelby, Executive Director of the Texas Division will hold a Town Meeting, fact finding forum at the Community Center on August 17th at 7:00 p.m. St. Jude's personnel will provide information and respond to the concerns of the citizens of Gorman and Eastland County regarding the establishment of a St. Jude's Gorman Campus for abused, abandoned and neglected children. In order to expedite the meeting, citizens are requested to prepare their questions. The meeting will adjourn at 8:00 p.m.

At the August 17th meeting citizens may sign up for individual meetings with Reverend Ward on Wednesday, August 18th from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at the office on the St. Jude's Ranch for Children Gorman Campus. Appointments will be scheduled for 10 minutes each due to the time constraints of the Reverend Doctor Ward and Jim Knox. St. Jude's personnel will provide information and hear the concerns of the citizens.

Letter to the Editor and To The Members of the Gorman Community

It seems once again the St. Jude's Ranch for children, Residential Treatment Center, issue has been clouded by statements which do not pertain to the facility purposed for Gorman.

The definition for a Residential Treatment Center is - "institutions that provide residential care and treatment for emotionally disturbed children and adolescents." This is from the Texas Department of Human Resources in Austin. This is a 12 month program not a home.

You do not treat children with physical handicaps or brain damage in Residential Treatment Centers. They are treated in Basic Care Facilities or other homes where their physical needs can be taken care of. They are most certainly not cared for in a Residential Treatment Center where the staff is required to have self desecration courses to protect themselves from the residents.

The e-mail from the Mayor of Boulder City and all the laws pertaining to the operation of child care facilities including Residential Treatment Centers is available to anyone who would like to take the time to inform yourself the facts.

I have absolutely nothing to gain from my opposition to this facility other than the protection of my family, my home, and my community. Many Continued on Page Two

ABOUT THE DISEASE -

Hepatitis A is a serious liver disease caused by the hepatitis A virus (HAV), HAV is found in the stool of persons with hepatitis A. The spread of HAV is usually by close personal contact and sometimes by eating food or drinking water containing HAV.

Hepatitis A can cause whole variety of symptoms ranging from mild "flu-like" illness to more serious problems, such as yellowing of the eyes (jaundice), severe stomach pains, and diarrhea, that may require hospital admission.

A person who has Hepatitis A can easily pass the disease to others within the same household.

Vaccination is the best way to protect against hepatitis A. People who get hepatitis A vaccine have protection for years against infection with HAV. The vaccine is made from a killed virus and is given as a shot in the muscle of the upper arm (deltoid). Before hepatitis A vaccine was available, only short term protection could be achieved by giving immune globulin (also called "gamma globulin" or IG)





