WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE FOLLOWING IS FROM A SPEECH made by Congressman Burleson on the floor of the U. S. House of Representatives on the subject on Revenue Sharing passed by the Congress last week . . . The Staff.

MR. SPEAKER, IN THE DEBATE on this bill when originally approved by this House, along with others, I attempted to convince its supporters that it was the worst piece of legislation ever before this body. In principle and philosophy it is no better as presented in the conference report now before us. This report should be voted down. Should this report be disapproved at least our Ways and Means Committee and the Finance Committee of the other body, could then fix the effective date as January 1, 1973, rather than make the hand-outs provided in this measure, retroactive to January 1 of this year. The savings would amount to approximately \$6 billion, an amount near that estimated to be cut from expenditures by the President to bring spending down to \$250 billion in this fiscal year as authorized in the legislation passed 2 days ago.

MR. SPEAKER, I CONTINUE to believe there is virtue in consistency. Those of us who supported the spending limit . . . days ago will be continuing to fight against this program. Turn down this monstrosity, this Crankenstein, and the problem of keeping expenditures at \$250 billion or less will be solved.

THOSE OF YOU WHO OPPOSED setting an expenditure limit will be consistent in fighting against what is now before us because your principal argument was that this Congress should set the limitation and of the Executive. Now an opportunity to exercise prerogative. I am in full agreement that this should be prerogative and responsibility of the Congress and those of us who support

legislation placing an expenditure ceiling on the President, do so out of conviction and yes, frustration, that this Congress is failing and has failed to discipline ourselves in holding down needless spending. Now is a time of truth and proof.

I SAY PARTICULARLY TO MY Republican friends that when you support this huge spending called for in this bill, you are hardly consistent with your strong support for the request of the President for a spending ceiling.

OVER THE PERIOD OF TIME provided for in this bill, \$32 billion is added to the 72 percent of any budget already committed by long-term appropriations and over which the Congress has no control. This is only the beginning of this program which is bound to grow and grow.

ALLOW ME ONE FINAL POINT. Money provided in this bill is automatically allocated to State and local gov-

ernments. They need to do nothing but go to the mailbox. They must spend the money handed them to qualify for more funds in following years. Now what kind of a system is this? It is wrong and an innovation which I predict will be regretted by you who support it.

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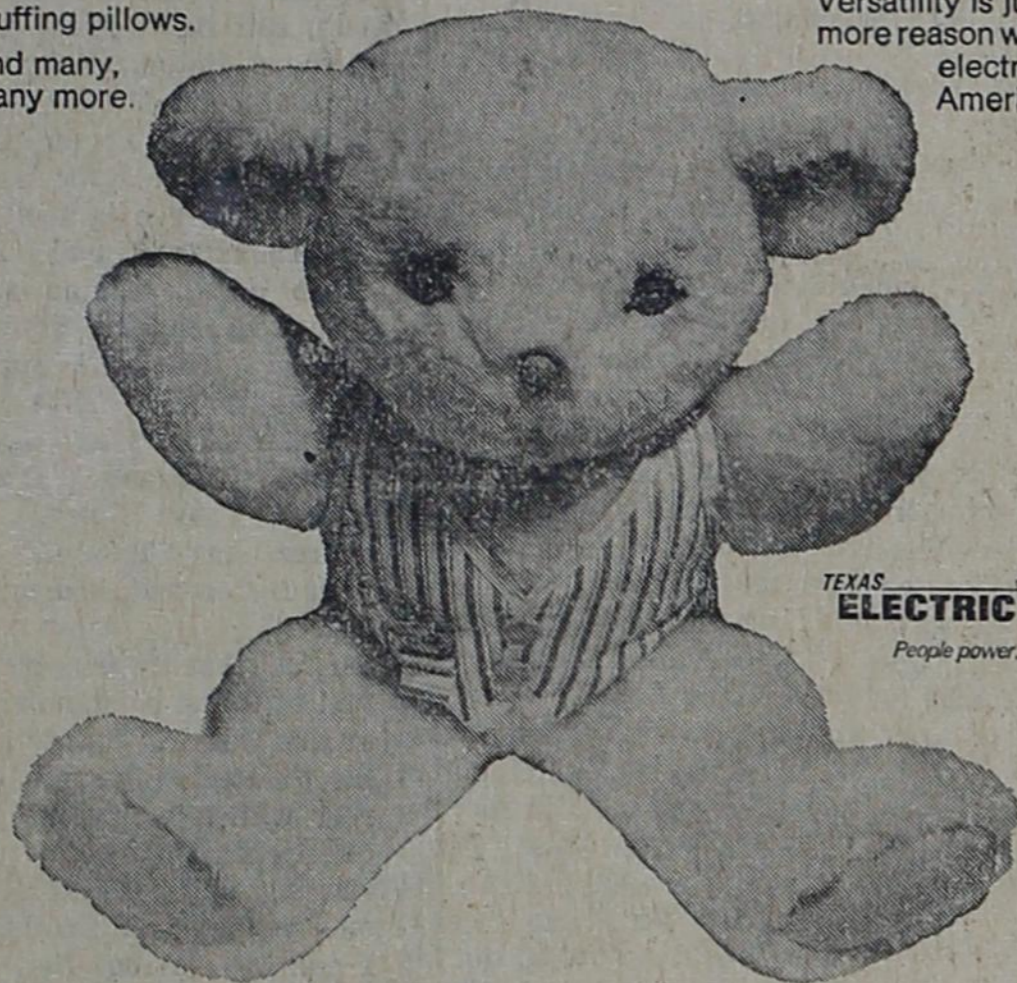
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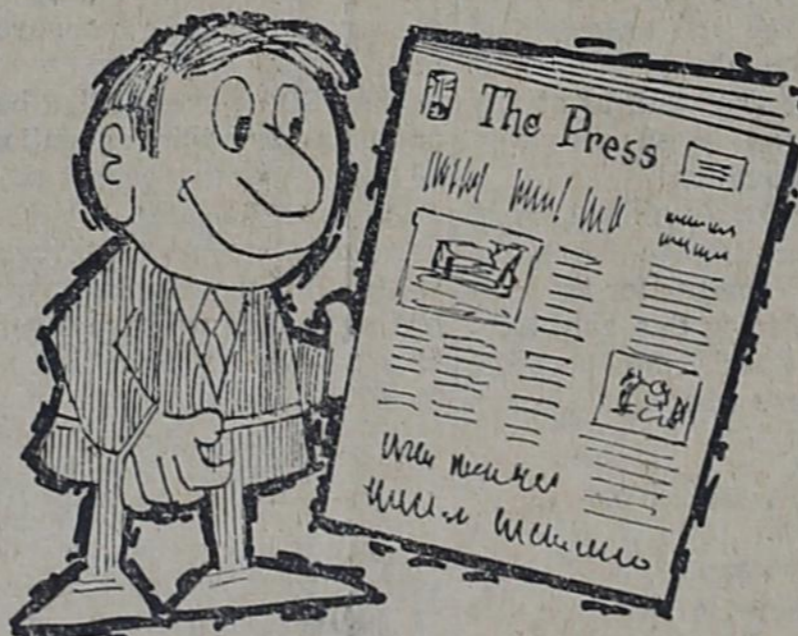
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# KOKOMO NEWS
