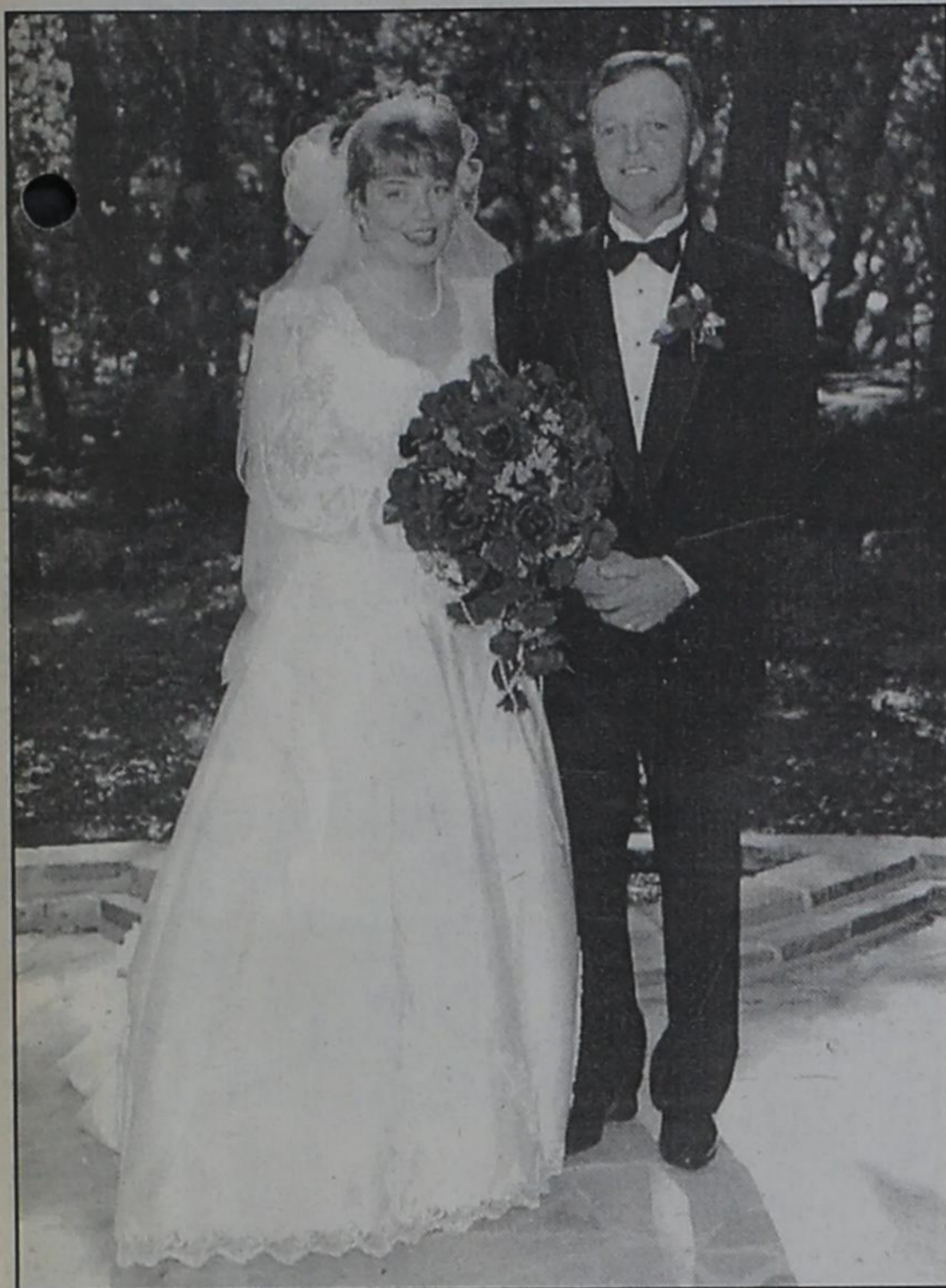

Panthers End Season In Bi-District Loss

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Wylie on Saturday night to take on the Bronte Longhorns and came out on the short end of a 13-12 score after missing on an extra point play and a try for 2 points that came up a yard shy. The Panthers led 12 to 6 at halftime and the Big Red defense had held Bronte to five first downs and seemed to be controlling the strong running game of the Longhorns. But in the final half the



Horns racked up 203 yards and 13 first downs to win the battle.

Gorman scored on their second possession after getting the ball on the Bronte 26 after a fumble and scored in 6 plays with Margarito Sanchez getting the honors from 1 yard out with 9:05 left in the initial period. The drive featured runs of 3 by Dathan Wright, an 11 yarder by Blake Guthery, an 8 yard run by Cody Foster and a 3 yard run by Sanchez to set Gorman up on the Bronte 1. However the kick for point after failed and Gorman had a 6-0 lead.

The teams played on fairly even terms until early in the second period when Gorman took the ball on the Bronte 29 and scored in 6 plays with Cody Foster getting the final yard for the TD with 9:14 left in the half. The drive featured runs of 7 by Foster, 2 by Sanchez, 4 by Foster, 2 by Sanchez and 13 by Cisco Madera to set Gorman up at the Bronte 1. The Panthers tried for the 2 point play but fell 1 yard short to make the score 12-0.

The Horns came back in the second quarter with a 57 yard drive in 6 plays and with an added 15 yard penalty on the Panthers to score with 2:01 left in the period when Daniel Dela Certa ran in from 12 yards out. The kick try failed and the half ended with Gorman 12-6.

Following the halftime in which both the Bronte and Gorman Bands performed some very good routines, the Panthers held the Longhorns at the Gorman 16 by an interception by David Seaton. Gorman drove to the Bronte 25 before being stopped.

Then the Horns got the ball on their own 25 and scored in 11 plays with DelaCerta scoring from 9 yards out with 11:27 left in the game. Blake McKee booted the go-ahead point after and the Horns led 13-12.

The Panthers came back with a beautiful drive of 70 yards in 16 plays but the drive died on the Bronte one foot line when the Panthers tried a pitchout on fourth down and fumbled the ball. At the time nearly everyone thought that the Panthers would be able to score and possibly have a win. But instead of going for a field goal on fourth down the Big Red tired the pitch play on fourth down and failed to score.

The Horns then took over at the Bronte 4 and killed the rest of the time on the clock to drop the Panthers and end their season.

Gorman had a great season and are to congratulate on their performance. They had some trouble converting extra points that cost them the win in 2 of their losses and they were defeated by Albany in their third game. So all in all the Big Red had a fine season and deserve our praise.

Blake Guthery led the Panthers with 104 yards in 17 tries. Sanchez had 72 yards on 15 tries and had a 72 yard scoring run called back due to a holding penalty. Cisco Madera got 72 on 5 tries, Cody Foster had 53 on 11 keepers and Dathan Wright hit for 10 yards in 3 tries.

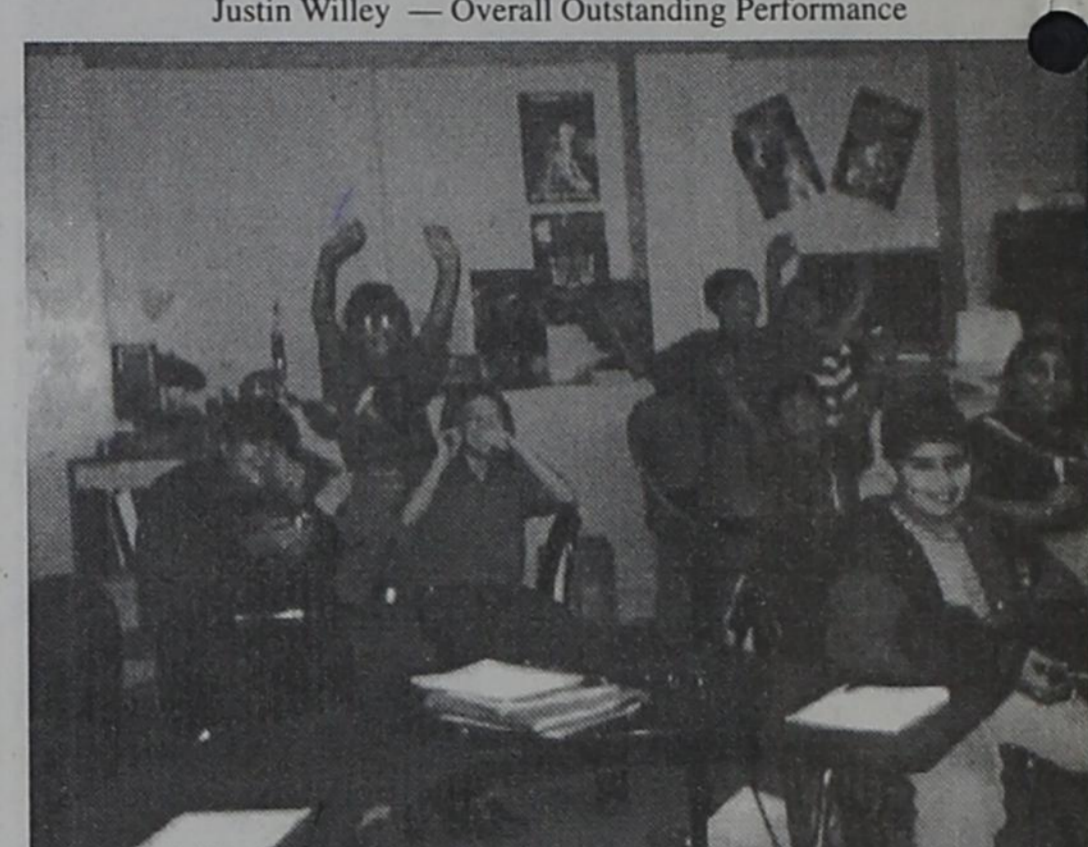
Mystery Storyteller Visits Maxfield Elementary Citizenship Party Held

Beyond Turkey Sandwiches: Simple Heart-Healthy Ways To Use Leftovers



(NAPS)—When you think about the holidays, you can't help but think about turkey. And when you think about turkey, you usually think about leftovers. After all, what holiday feast would be complete without leftover turkey meat?

Despite our best efforts to only cook as much as we and our guests can reasonably enjoy, we always tend to prepare too much turkey and "fixings"—leaving the holiday table with full stomachs and even fuller platters of excess food.

Turkey sandwiches aside, there are some great ways to maximize leftovers while minimizing time and effort. Keeping things simple is the key, according to weight management expert Jenny Craig in her newest cookbook, *Simple Pleasures: Recipes to Nourish Body and Soul*.

"Weight gain can reflect a lifestyle out of balance," Craig said. "To re-establish balance, we need to simplify our lives. One place to begin is in the kitchen. Reducing the time spent in creating elaborate recipes frees up more time to relax, rejuvenate and indulge in other pleasurable activities."

One easy—and healthy—way to use leftover meats and vegetables, as well as the water used to cook them, is to add them to soups, stews and casseroles. This not only provides additional vitamins and minerals, it's a tasty way to get children to eat their vegetables.

For another simple way to use extra turkey meat, try the following recipe for **Autumn Turkey Salad** from Jenny Craig's *Simple Pleasures* cookbook:

- 1½ cups cubed cooked turkey breast
- ½ cup sliced celery
- ½ cup halved red seedless grapes
- 1 Tbsp. coarsely chopped walnuts, toasted
- 2 Tbsp. nonfat mayonnaise
- 2 Tbsp. low-fat sour cream
- 1½ tsp. chopped fresh dillweed
- 1 tsp. cider vinegar
- ¼ tsp. salt

Combine first 4 ingredients in a small bowl, tossing gently. Combine mayonnaise and remaining 4 ingredients, stirring well. Add mayonnaise mixture to turkey mixture, and toss lightly to combine. Cover and chill for an hour.

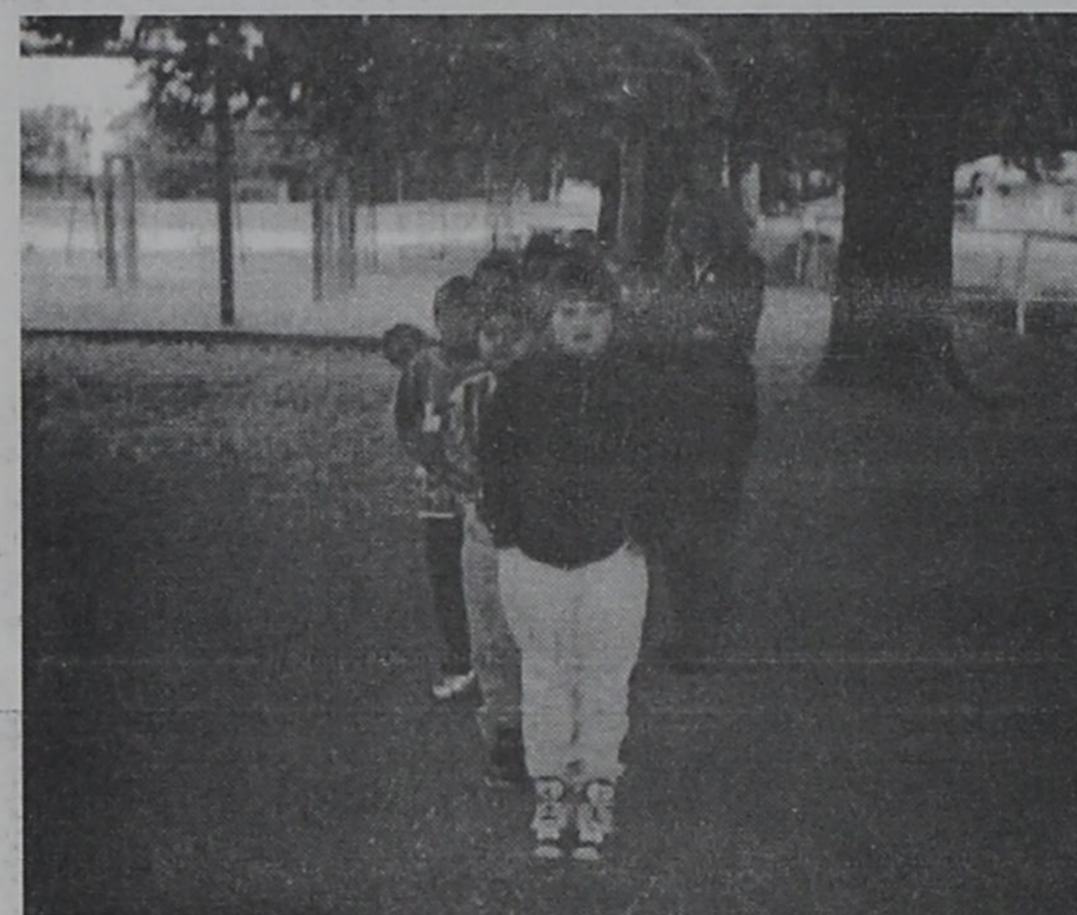

Cynthia remembers making 12 pies for a church Thanksgiving celebration, and having fresh cucumbers from their fall garden. Other fresh things from fall gardens included beans, peas, evergreen onions and corn (cut off the cob and creamed in it's own juice). Of course there was always plenty of corn bread and biscuits.

There was tea, coffee, milk and hot chocolate to drink. Sweet potatoes were taken out of storage. Storage as in dug up, put in a pile outside and covered with straw or dirt to protect from freezing. Irish potatoes were stored in the cellar along with the buckets of lard. Onions were tied up in bunches and hung from the rafters.

We talked about what to do with the leftover turkey (for those that had it). "Gave it to the dog" was first, "Fed it to the cats" was second. I guess in the days before the freezer, storage was limited. Jack's daughter-in-law was visiting and said they never had leftover turkey except for the bones, and they made soup with that. Cynthia's family made sandwiches.

I asked about leftover pie and everybody laughed, seems there was never any leftover pie. Till next time, Brother Bob
