COUNTY PECAN-BAKE SHOW THIS WEEKEND

Pecans - the delicious nuts that are packed with more energy than any other natural food that has ever been discovered - will be on display in Eastland Friday and Saturday, November 30 and December 1. The pecans will be displayed in both the natural state and in baked goods, reports county Extension agents De Gordon and Janet Thomas. These items will also be sold to those whose appetites are stimulated by the display of goodies. The event will be the Twenty-first Annual Eastland County Pecan Show sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The show will be held in the old Majestic cafe building, 102 West Commerce in Eastland.

James Wright, Chamber of Commerce Manager, says visitors will see some of the best quality pecans in Texas as well as prize pecan pies, cakes, candies, nut bread and cookies. A third feature will be a display of centerpieces using pecans in various forms.

Wright stated that parking meters will be sacked Friday and Saturday for the big event. He encourages everyone in the county and surrounding areas to come and see the Pecan Show Friday and Saturday.

The Home Demonstration Club members will operate a concession where coffee and food will be sold.

Plaques will be given for the Champion In-Shell pecans, the Champion Shelling pecans, the Champion Native pecans and rosettes will be awarded to Reserve Champions. Ribbons will be awarded to the first, second and third place entries of each variety. In addition, ribbons will be given for the largest pecans and the smallest pecans.

Dan Childress, president of the county pecan growers association, estimates that about 200 entries of top quality pecans representing over 40 different varieties will be on display. Each entry consists of at least 40 pecans. They must have been grown in 1973 by the person entering the pecans in the show. All entries of pecans must be entered by 10 a. m. Friday.

Judging for the pecan show will be done Friday afternoon by Dr. Earl Puls, Texas A&M University Extension Horticulturist, and Mr. O. S. Gray, owner of Gray's Nursery in Arlington. Mr. Gray is one of the leading pecan experts in Texas. He has developed several varieties including the GraTex, Gray King, GraZona and others.

Members of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce will help process pecan entries for the pecan show.

In these days of increased realization of Agriculture's importance, I have become very concerned about the pattern that is developing for the formulation of our National farm policies.

This year, the Congress passed a new farm bill, but not without a great deal of difficulty. Part of this difficulty stemmed from the fact that the Congress had to write the bill with little guidance from the Administration. Traditionally, farm legislation has been drafted by the Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Congressional Agriculture Committees and then carefully considered by the Congress after full public comment during Committee hearings. This has resulted in legislation being written with the combined expertise of the Administration, the Congress and the interested public. However, this year, the Congress was forced to shoulder the entire task of drafting legislation without formal proposals from the Department of Agriculture. After lengthy, careful consideration and constructive com-

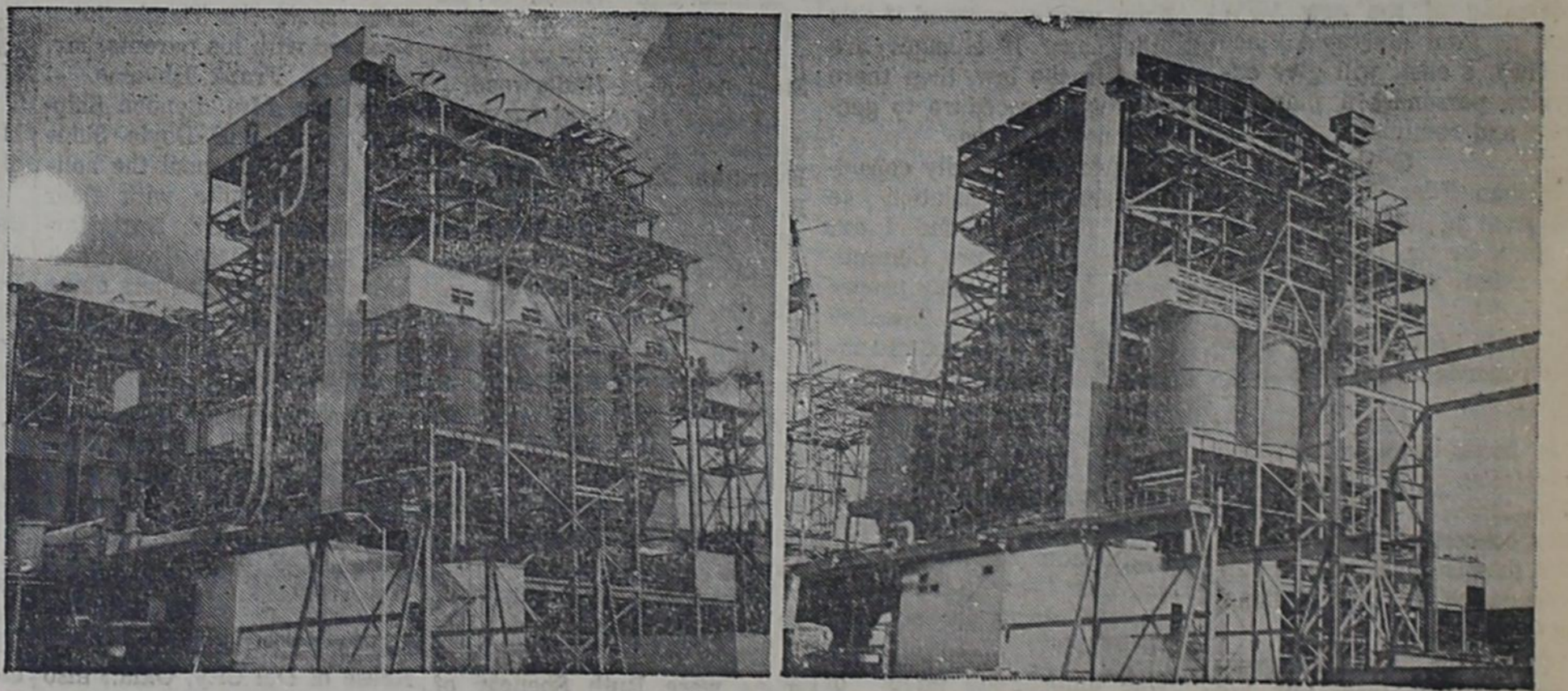

The first unit of the new lignite-fired Monticello plant will become operational in 1974. It duplicates the first unit at Big Brown, right down to the last kilowatt.
But there'll be one major difference - the cost. Equipment for the Monticello unit was ordered only three years after Big Brown. But during that period the cost of the same equipment had increased 25%.
We need these new lignite plants because supplies of natural gas and oil, our traditional boiler fuels, are becoming increasingly difficult to obtain.
To diversify our fuels even further, we're planning to have our first nuclear power plant, near Glen Rose, operational by the early 1980s.

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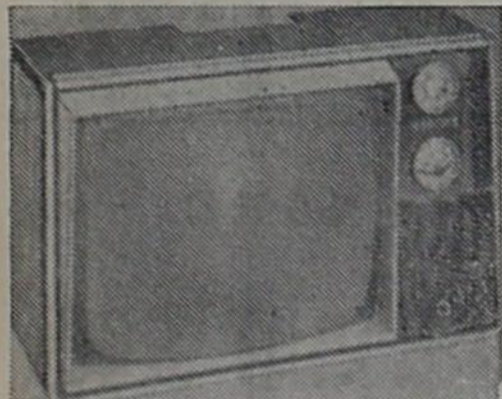
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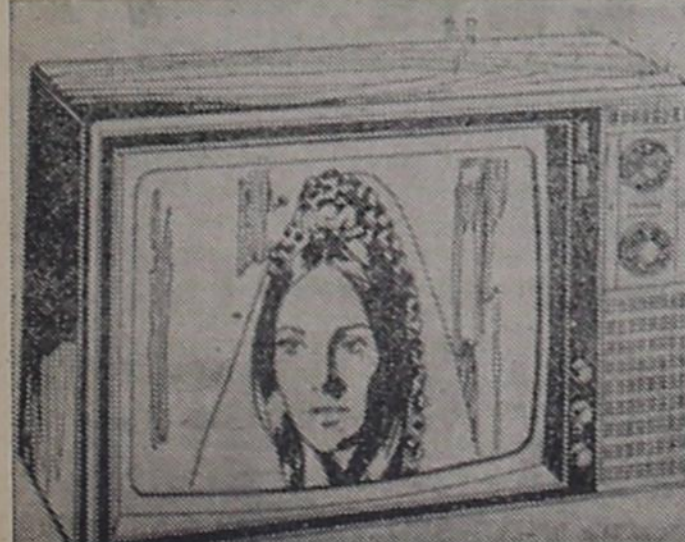
